RED CHINA RENEWS AGGRESSION

Account Of Activities In E. Asia

Communist China's current threats against Taiwan and the offshore islands of Quemoy and Matsu follow a familiar pattern of aggression in Asia.

Since its establishment in 1949, the Peiping regime has consistently pressed for the use of force in the conquest of Taiwan and the offshore islands as well as elsewhere.

As early as October 1950, the Chinese Communists dispatched troops for the conquest of Tibet while notifying the Tibetan Government to send delegates to discuss methods of "peaceful liberation."

In November 1950, Communist China committed its forces to the aggression in Korea in defiance of the United Nations police action there.

The United Nations in January 1951 branded the Peiping regime as an aggressor in Korea.

Even after a military stalemate developed in Korea, the Chinese Communists deliberately prolonged truce negotiations in a callous disregard for human life. They also openly flaunted their contempt for United Nations authority.

After eventual conclusion of a temporary armistice agreement, the Chinese Communists restricted the inspection process established by the armistice and secretly re-armed and provisioned Communist North Korea.

The Korea armistice was signed in July 1953. No sooner had the Chinese Communists gained forces been released from action in Korea than they sought an outlet for their militarism elsewhere.

In 1955 Peiping renewed its threats against

Taiwan and channelled military equipment to the Communist Vietminh forces in Indo China. Peiping openly threatened intervention in Indo China in a flagrant attempt to expand the war there.

Communist China's threat of expansion into Southeast Asia, was also directed at Burma and Thailand.

In Burma the question of a settlement of the Sino-Burmese border was raised in 1955. Although the problem was submitted to negotiation, the talks were dragged out and prolonged, keeping the threat of an unsettled border as a constant irritant.

Chinese Communist power was brandished in 1956 when forward elements of the Chinese Communist army forcibly occupied several disputed areas along the border. They were withdrawn only after Burma threatened to take the matter to the United Nations.

An attempt to subvert the Government of Thailand developed openly in Peiping in 1954 when former Thai Premier Pridi Phanomyong, in an article in the official Communist Party paper People's Daily, called for the overthrow of the Thai government.

One of the most prolonged records of hostility to a neighbouring state has been displayed toward Japan. Japanese newspapers have charged that the Peiping regime, belying its protestations of non-interference in a nation's internal affairs, has engaged in a persistent campaign of vilification of Japanese political leaders, interference in the conduct of Japan's foreign and domestic affairs and strangulation of Japan's economic trade abroad.

Communist China has

been accused of attempting to sway the course of Japanese elections, institute a boycott of Japanese goods in South East Asia, and use Communist China-Japan trade and the return of Japanese in mainland China as tools for political bargaining.

Through the years Communist China's most persistent attempt at aggression in Asia has been directed at Taiwan and the offshore islands. This design for conquest with the deliberate use of force was conducted in three campaigns.

The first campaign opened in late 1949. Its intensity was slowed down during the period of the aggression in Korea. The second campaign was launched in July 1954 and suspended at the start of ambassadorial level talks in August 1955 between U.S. and Peiping representatives in an attempt to discuss outstanding issues. The third campaign was renewed in July 1958.

EMERGENCY NOT ENDED?

Strange things are happening everywhere in the world. Lanka, therefore, cannot be an exception. But strangely enough this Island has proved to be an exception in this that the Governmental reaction to unusual political developments has been different from that in countries that have been similarly placed.

The outbreak of disturbances in this Island in May this year was certainly of a very serious nature calling for prompt and powerful action. Statesmen like Commanders of Armies must be always on the alert. When events happen so suddenly as to demand immediate action, constitutional powers should be forthwith used in order to bring affairs to normality with the least possible delay and as immediately as circumstances would allow. But, as has been well known, the state of emergency was declared twentyfour hours too late.

It may be that there was an unavoidable delay in declaring the state of emergency in May. But the horrors of rabid racialism came to an end during the early part of June. However, the state of emergency has been extended from month to month though the Premier never failed to make the announcement that the situation had been brought under full control. As a definite step in the removal of the state of emergency the Government released a section of those under House Deten-

tion promising to free the rest in due course. But the next step was the lifting of the ban on the free movement of only a select few leaving some more to languish under the order of prohibition of detention. This grading of detenus seems to be another strange feature in the political procedure of the M. E. P. Government. How those who were released first differ from the second batch and what charge separates the favoured lot from the rest are questions that are agitating the mind of the common man.

To confuse the confounded procedure, news reports have it that the state of Emergency may not be ended in a hurry. Four full months have passed and the common man is still kept in suspense about the necessity for the state of Emergency being extended despite the re-assuring statements of Ministers and the Premier that the situation had been brought under control and that the mischief makers had been humbled into humiliation and submission. We agree with Premier Bandaranaike that he cannot extend the state of emergency to eternity but we are unable to understand him when he propounds the theory that even after an emergency had factually ended, the Government could, and that in the name of democracy, refuse to declare that the state of emergency has ended. And this explanation is typical of the peculiar principles of the M. E. P. Else how could the astounding request of the Minister of Finance to take his wife along with him to Montreal at the expense of the public who had been warned by the same Minister to refrain from extravagance and the equally astonishing approval of the Prime Minister be explained. The M. E. P. would still want the world to believe that there is democratic rule in Lanka!
