Education and Unemployment

Sir,

Before I pass on the subject proper, permit me to make a few observations on two recent proposals of the Minister of Education. Firstly the Minister wants the Colombo University to be exclusively Sinhalese or in the alternative he wants a high percentage of vacancies to be reserved for Sinhalese both at Peradeniya and Colombo in the science section. The Minister seems to assume that all those taken in will successfully graduate and that after graduating they will be willing to become teachers. From the Science Faculty, the restrictions on entry of non-Sinhalese may spread to other Faculties as well. There are also plans afoot to take in more Sinhalese into the Government Services. Placed in this context, higher education and employment prospects of young men who are non-Sinhalese are going to be badly affected in the near future.

The Minister's second proposal is that Religious knowledge should be compulsory for all higher examinations like the H. S. C. This has been already decided upon and newspapers report that Heads of schools have been informed about the decision. What Ceylon needs today is religion at the practical level. Making religious instruction part of the school time-table for higher classes does not appear to me to be desirable for it may amount to an attempt to force something down the throat of unwilling students. Providing shrine rooms and places for silent meditation and discussions would be more welcome and desirable. The decision of the Minister also raises questions like the nature and extent of religious

instruction and staff. I feel that on the whole it would be better if matters are left as they are and the question of spiritual instruction to the grown-up student is left to the community at large.

Re un-employment it is a national tragedy that the number of educated unemployed is fast growing. This is partly due to the academic bias in our present system of education. Further the 'Drift from the land' and social conditions have altered the pattern of employment. The association of social status (caste) with particular types of manual work is a grave handicap to countries like India and Ceylon. We can only hope that in course of time any man will be free to take up any work he likes without any fear of social stigma. Here it will not be out of place to remind readers of the message behind Ruskin's 'Unto the Last' (as understood by Gandhi) viz:- (1) "The good of the individual is contained in the good of all." (2) "a lawyer's work has the same value as the barber's inasmuch as all have the same right of earning their livelihood from their work." (3) "a life of labour i. e. the life of the tiller of the soil and the handicraftsman is the life worth living."

Attention of readers is also invited to the fine article by Malcolm Muggeridge (ex-editor of Punch) entitled "Pursuit of Happiness (International) Ins." in the Ceylon Daily News dated 27-9-58. A change of attitude on the part of the Ceylonese nation and a sincere effort to reduce the gap between talk and action in all spheres of life, will go a long way to broaden education and reduce unemployment.

CHILDREN AS FUTURE CITIZENS

The Universal Children's Day is not an occasion merely for entertaining children. This annual event should be in the form of a planned welfare week for the child to be protected, cared for and provided with means for its normal development. Celebrations on lavish scales make parents, welfare workers and the administration lose sight of the spade work that has to be done to help the handicapped child. The heavy responsibility of ensuring children of their rights lies with parents, society and the Government. Whether this duty has been discharged, and with what result, should be reviewed at the yearly meeting with a view to re-arranging the future plans for welfare work according to actual needs.

Social welfare must begin with the child. This requires learned attention and skilled planning. Not only should the scheme for social security secure for the child, education, vocational training and guarantee of means of livelihood, but also must protect the child from being exploited by interested parties and enable it to develop its talents for the common good.

Parents and social workers should remember that the Children's Day is an occasion for them to clear their conscience and dedicate themselves to the service of the handicapped child in sincere and well-planned effort. The present generation is watching with dismay the decline of the world. The only hope for the future is the child that is pro-

Tomorrow's World Depends On What We Do For Our Children Today

(Speaking at the Universal Children's Day held at the Annamalai College, Mr. G. C. Niles, Magistrate of Madurai, uttered the warning that the results of neglecting children would be both immediate and long-term in their effects. Continuing he said:

Universal Children's Day is celebrated every year in every part of the world.

It is our privilege today to join in these celebrations. We owe a deep debt of thanks to the organisers of this meeting in our locality. If one looks at the census report one will find that in every village in Jaffna District there are a large number of children. Of these some do not attend school. Some have no homes either because their homes are broken up. Some have been thrown upon the world early in life. Some are handicapped children: blind, deaf and dumb or disabled by illness.

These are the citizens of tomorrow. Tomorrow's world depends to a large extent on what we do for our children today. The biggest and most arduous job in the world, therefore is home making.

Parents as home makers have a great responsibility in this matter. We must, as parents, find joy in the service of our children. This involves the looking after of the physical, mental and spiritual sides of a child. In other words parents must help to develop their children's personalities.

This means by precept, and more important than that by our example, by the lives we lead in the home and in society.

Lessons regarding human relationships, equality and democracy must be learnt by children in their homes, in the first place.

Let parents, social workers and the Government be prepared to answer this question at the next Children's Day?

Today, by and large, in many a home and community the child is a 'forgotten citizen'. We must remember as parents and members of the community in which we live that the contents of our culture and religious must be given to our children at the right time and in the right form and under proper auspices.

The problems of our world, social and moral are largely the product of broken and unhappy homes and a community that is apathetic and disinterested in the welfare of its children.

In many parts of the world—and to come closer home—in Jaffna there is the problem of poverty. Poverty in our homes shortens childhood. Youngsters who should be playing with dolls and balls are competing in the business world for the chance to earn a living.

Who is responsible for the state of affairs? Firstly we as parents have neglected our greatest and most sacred task as home-makers. Secondly as citizens we take little or no interest in our neighbour's child. In particular the orphan and the child handicapped by ill health or physical disability is the concern and responsibility of every citizen. Such unwanted children need homes and schools, and more of them. They need play centres, playgrounds, children's libraries, workshops and boys and girls clubs.

Children are our most prized assets. If we neglect them they become our greatest liabilities. The community surely owes them a welcome not only in spirit but in kind. We must begin to support all institutions state owned or private that are being run to ameliorate the conditions of life of children. The results of neglecting our children are both immediate and long-term in their effects.

Juvenile delinquency has sky-rocketed every where in the world and in Ceylon too. If we as parents and citizens do not shoulder our responsibilities now and in all humility serve our children we will live to see the twisted personalities of such neglected children wreaking their vengeance on a society that sent them into the wide world so early in life and ended their childhood before it had really begun. The costs of crime have to be paid by us. Tomorrow's world depends on what we do for our children today.

Children's Day at the Town Hall

Mr. M. Srikantha, G. A., Jaffna, addressing the Children's Day Rally at the Jaffna Town Hall, observed that there was a real need for an organisation solely devoted to help children on a planned long-term basis and to make them useful citizens.

The Children's Day celebrations were organised by a committee with Mr. B. G. S. David, Magistrate of Jaffna, as Chairman.

Mr. A. T. Duraiappa, Mayor of Jaffna, drew the attention of social workers to the unhappy lot of many children.

Mr. S. U. Somasegaram, Education Officer suggested that Children's welfare could be ensured by giving them practical training in Agriculture and Cottage Industries.

Freedom Dies Where Communism Lives

"Where Communism lives freedom dies", warns the Labour Party Secretary, Mr. Morgan Phillips, in a statement issued in London.

Mr. Phillips says that the bloodshed in Hungary and the judicial murder of ex-Premier Nagy and his friends were a reminder that "whatever the grandiloquent claims of Communism, in reality it is stark, brutal and horrible."

In countries where personal liberty has been trampled upon by those who served the Kremlin, people are suffering, either in mind or body, in secret places away from the spotlight of publicity, "because they have dared to be true to themselves and to the cause of freedom."

Mr. Phillips, writing in the current issue of the Labour Press Service, asks Social Democrats in Britain to remind themselves that "Communism exists to destroy democracy—not just in Hungary, in Eastern Europe, Germany, France or Italy, but here in Britain itself."

Rejected at the polls in Britain, the Communists had been forced to seek other methods to injure Social Democrats and to weaken democratic institutions.

"They seek to work under the cloak of respectability by infiltrating into 'peace' and 'friendship' committees which have the backing of idealistic but misguided men and women whose integrity is beyond suspicion. In all countries they use Trade Unions to attack and disintegrate the Labour movement."

Mr. Phillips says that the great body of Trade Unionists in Britain could be relied upon to reject Communist methods and intrigue, but the apathy of branch members sometimes allowed Communist manoeuvres to be supported. Apathy suits the Communists because it enables them to begin their "take over" attempts within the branches.

Mr. Phillips concludes by warning fellow Social Democrats: "You can never trust these Communists."
