Maulana Shaukat Ali's Address

Moulana Shaukat Ali said that he was sure they would excuse him if at the very beginning of his speech he would tell them that he was not a very polished speaker. Neither in speech making nor in the field of science had he any training. He had neglected his studies but he had spent the money he got from his mother on beautiful cricket shirts and flannel trousers and boots. He was not sorry for it now. He would also ask them to excuse him as he was hoarse. It was practically after two years that he had this strenuous campaign. They were practically two years of rest for him at Government expense, free board, free lodging, no doctor's bills to pay and solid 14 hours' sleep a day. Certainly after his release on the 23rd October he had five consecutive hours of sleep a day. Wherever they were, whatever they were doing, day and night for India there was one figure always present before them and they had made up their mind, god willing, they would get their great chief Mahatma Gandhi, out of jail or the whole of India would become one huge prison for 32 crores of people. (Applause). He would like to tell them something about Mahatma Gandhi. He had known him intimately. He had worked with him day and night and they travelled together for long hours and on many an occasion that huge bulk of his had been useful in protecting the Mahatma from being trampled by the mammoth crowds that crowded round to greet him. Many a time with the Mahatma he had worked for 10, 12, 14 hours at a stretch and travelled hundreds of miles. He the speaker, had wrapt

him in that huge cloak of his and put him to sleep like a baby. But the man had the strength of his convictions. The speaker then referred to some of the works of Mahatma Gandhi in self-sacrifice and added that when Mahatma Gandhi had the whole country ready for civil disobedience he gave up the programme after the Chauri Chaura incident. Mahatma Gandhi could never forget that incident. His heart and lips always went together, when he gave a promise he meant to keep it. When he heard of the Chauri Chaura incident all his plans were wrecked. He had the courage to stop all civil disobedience and tell the country that it was not ripe for civil disobedience so long as Chauri Chaura incidents were possible. He (the speaker) and others were in jail when they heard that. Had they been out he dare say they might have fought with their chief but he doubted whether they would have succeeded because Mahatma Gandhi's convictions were so strong. The Government tried to make out that the Mahatma's movement was a movement of violence. The speaker however would tell them that if there was one man who had stopped revolution in India, it was Mahatma Gandhi. If it was not for Mahatma Gandhi the country would have broken out long ago. When the Mahatma went into jail he issued orders to his intimate friends, that if there was any agitation which would result in violence he would never come out of jail. The country obeyed his call and kept absolutely quiet. What did they think the British press said about it. Instead of appreciating the Mahatma's motives that said that the influence of Mahatma

pillai, Sriman Muttusamipillai and Dr Sivapirakasapillai, God has removed from us one of these shining lights and rendered our community and country the poorer.

Sriman Muttusamipillai the scion of illustrious families, combined in his person physical prowess, intellectual ability and religious favour all of a high standard. His was a life of splendour and service. Though still under 70, he had become an institution in Jaffna and in the Hindu world in Ceylon. His premaxure demise makes many people including my humble self sad. May almighty Shivaperman bless the soul of the departed leader and give consolation to his family circle and bless the public whom he tried to serve with independence and devotion during these critical times.

Gandhi was ephemeral, that it was only temporary and that he had no hold on the people's imagination. (Laughter). Mahatma issued orders that when they went into prison they should be

The Late Mr. T. M.

Sir,—The issues of the *Hindu Organ* and *இந்து சாதனம்* dated Friday 12th July and the editorials in same enlighten us greatly about the late Mr. T. Muttusamipillai's multifaceted personality and talents and make us feel proud of the fact that we have had the good fortune to be contemporaries of such a distinguished person, and at the same time we are forced to remind ourselves that in the future whenever picture-images of the genial Mr. T. M. in action arise in our minds we cannot help pondering over the question — "what makes such men tick?" In thinking so provided we don't vainly assume that we have it in us to be as Mr. T. M. was in his hayday there is no harm in reading and re-reading the editorials referred to and wish that even it is beyond us in the changed context of times to do things in a manner which would remind others of the way Mr. T. M. did them it is at least possible to recall with pleasure and pride to our children and others that we in our humble way watched and applauded men like Mr. T. M. At one time all Jaffna watched and envied the activities of three men among others—Late Gate Mudaliyar V. Pon nampalam of Urumpirai, my late father Mr. M. Sabaratnasinghe and of course Mr. T. M. himself who was a few years junior to the other two mentioned. All three are now no more but it is our duty not to forget such men and all of us should make it a point to see the tradition set by these greats through the issues of the *Hindu Organ* and *இந்து சாதனம்* and through the progress of educational institutions in the Island.

Our family was well known to Mr. T. M. and I have watched with childish admiration Mr. T. M. on horseback, in his big blue car and on foot while on his walks along Kallundai Road and very

often used to ask my mother about him and the reply always amounted to establishing the fact that all his words and actions spelt efficiency and culture through and through. About Mr. T. M. the leading lawyer I am not qualified to comment but I may be pardoned if I recall with pleasure tinged with sadness that at J. H. C. carnivals Mr. T. M. never showed himself off in any fashion but set about to see that he was one with the decently enjoying younger set, about the place. Towards the end of 1964 I had a very trying personal crisis and I take this opportunity to recall with deep gratitude (at remembrance level) that it was Mr. T. M.'s kindness in his capacity as Manager of Sri Somaskantha College, Puttur (popularly referred to by the local inhabitants as Malavarayar school which set me on my feet again. At Puttur he was held in great esteem and it would be no exaggeration to say that to the humble folk of the area he was their uncrowned king.

Mr. T. M. was a gifted writer but for reasons known to him only never sat down to write any book.

In the special issues of the *Young Hindu* (the J. H. C. magazine) down the years may be an occasional contribution by him and these and his contributions to the *Hindu Organ* and *இந்து சாதனம்* can be read with profit by many and looked upon as guide pieces by aspiring young writers.

Mr. T. M. was a Saivite Hindu in the full sense of the term but was tolerant of others with weaknesses and in his home life observed in practice sweet simplicity mixed dignified elegance and while he was in company one cannot help feeling small in his presence. Such men die because all men are mortal but this does not mean it is impos-

MISCHIEF-MONGERING!

The most shameful mockery of religious reform is being exhibited of all places, in the sacred precincts of the time-hallowed historical shrine at Maviddapuram. As if life in this part of the world would come to a standstill if entry of Harijans into Saiva Shrines is not forthwith gained, the organisers of the movement have chosen the wrong moment and the inapplicable method to put their cause into execution. The High Festivals in any Temple and particularly those in the renowned places of religious import have a solemnity and reverential significance that demand peace of mind, purity of heart, cleanliness of body and above all a true spirit of devotion in the worshippers and the priests. The days of these festivals by reason of the fact that they are chosen in conformity with the requirements of Agamic pronouncements have acquired a traditional noteworthy attention of all worshippers. Hence no responsible Saivite could ever think of disturbing or discrediting the religious performances on such days by means of mass demonstrations and satyagraha which eventually would develop into show of strength. This tangential trend is quite unwanted particularly at a time when responsible religious bodies and workers have espoused the question of unrestricted Saiva entry of Hindus into Saiva shrines

and have made much headway in this direction. The presence of atheists and members of alien faiths in the movement at Maviddapuram only tends to create misgivings in the minds of those who are ready and willing to reconsider the question of entry of Harijans into Temples.

We who have a frank mind in this matter are compelled to observe that the enthusiasm of the members of the movement has overreached itself. A serious situation has been created rendering the religious ceremonies at this ancient Temple on the most significant occasion—High Festival—look ridiculous. Several thousands of sincere worshippers who have been participating in these festivals from their childhood are now prevented from continuing to do so by the launching of a movement where discussion between the priests and the congregation on one side and the campaigners on the other and resulting persuasion can achieve fruitful developments the leading hand of the irresponsible revolutionary emerges to bring discredit to all concerned.

The Saiva religion should not be the hunting ground for hypertension revolutionaries. Entry of Harijans into Saiva Temples is a matter that deserves to be examined. There are temples all over the island and each temple has a congregation and a Manager or Board of Trustees. At this initial level the question must be discussed and decided. Decisions at such places must be coordinated and a final determination effected at a full conference of the persons who are directly concerned with this problem. No person of any Leftist organisation nor a member of another faith shall be permitted to gain entry into these discussions for it is popularly accepted that religion is a red rag to the Red parties and other religionists do not have everything in common with the fundamental principles of Saivism.

We appeal to all Saivites to view this matter in the proper light and to save the religion from being forced into the ridiculous position of reducing High Festivals to a farce and also to arrange for the burning question of the day, that is, the entry of Harijans into Saiva Temples, to be solved at the proper forum in a cultural manner.

Reference at the Point Pedro D.C.

When Mr. V. M. Cumarasamy, District Judge, Point Pedro came on the Bench on the 13th instant Mr K. Ratnasingam, Crown Proctor addressing Court said:

"Sir: Before your Honour commences work for the day, with your permission, I wish to bring to your notice the sad death of Advocate Muthusamipillai of Jaffna, who had been practising in this Court as well. Mr Muthusamipillai was the son of the late Thambiahpillai who was a Proctor of the Supreme Court, who had a very large lucrative practice in Jaffna. Mr Muthusamipillai belonged to a very respected and historic family in Jaffna. He had his early education at the Jaffna Hindu College and at St Thomas College. Thereafter he entered the Law College and passed out as an Advocate and was very popular in Jaffna in the different Courts. He was honoured by the Government and in 1946 he was made the Crown Advocate, Jaffna. He continued to be Crown Advocate till 1964. During this period he was called upon to act on several occasions for long periods in the District Court, Jaffna and in our Court also. When Mr. Muthusamipillai acted as D. J. from 1954 to 55 for a period of over 2 months he cleared lot of arrears. He was specially appointed to hear the most difficult partition cases in this area. He proved his abilities to the task.

Sir, he was of great help to his brother Lawyers and to the Proctors. He was so amiable and acceptable.

The late Mr. Muttusamipillai was famous as a great Religious leader in Jaffna. During his time he was the President of the Saiva Paripalana Sabha for 10 years. He was the Editor of the Hindu Organ for a very long period. He has done a good service to the Hindu world. Being the Manager of the several Hindu institutions which have catered largely for the benefit of the Hindus he gained his sympathies from the large Hindu public. He was well versed in Saiva Sithantham and was very popular in Jaffna. He was always found in any religious meeting and he participated to the fullest in the deliberations of these associations. He was the Manager of the Saddhanadhar Sivan Temple at Nallur.

He leaves behind his widow, his daughter and son-in-law who is the present Crown Advocate, Mr. Kathirgalingam.

May your Honour be pleased to direct that a copy of this reference be forwarded to the bereaved family."

THE DISTRICT JUDGE REPLIED THUS:— "Mr. Crown Proctor and Members of the Bar. It is with deep regret I associate myself with every word which the Crown Proctor has said about the late Mr. Adv. Muttusamipillai. It was only about 6 week ago that we saw him here last full of life, and a couple of days later we learnt that he had entered hospital for a heart ailment. Three or four days ago we heard that he was improving and he would come to work as usual. Even on the evening before he passed away people who had gone to see him said that he would be returning to Court very early. But to our deepest surprise the following morning we heard that he had passed away. Those of us who attended the funeral saw him even in death full of life and we were so sorry that a man of such a calibre should have passed away so soon from our midst. Mr Muthusamipillai was the second son of the late Mr. Thambiahpillai who himself was a leading practitioner of Jaffna Courts. Born to a well to do father the late Mr. Muthuswami pillai had all the facilities of life. He exhibited lot of physical powers and earned for himself the well known name 'Sando'. He was a giant of a man. When I jocularly asked him, how as a vegetarian he managed to preserve all that energy, he replied back saying 'Elephants eat only grass and leaves'. He was a strict vegetarian and a staunch Hindu and devoted his life for the promotion of the Religious and Social activities of the Town. After the passing away of the late Sir Wythilingam Duraisamy the mantle of Social and Religious Leader fell on his shoulders. Speaking professionally Mr. Muttusamipillai enjoyed a very lucrative practice in the Courts of Jaffna, Point Pedro and Chavakachcheri. More or less he had become an active practitioner of our Courts, so much so, practically every day we saw him here. He maintained the highest traditions of the profession. He lived well and conducted himself in a very dignified way which any of us should emulate.

Mr. Crown Proctor, I shall certainly accede to your request and cause a copy of this reference to be forwarded to his widow, daughter and son-in-law.

exemplary prisoners. Though the prison authorities treated them as murderers and thieves they obeyed Mahatmaji's orders.

The speaker detailed the hardships and humiliations they were subjected to in prison. He had only one suit of clothes and one morning he found his shirt full of lice. These were small matters however. When one fought for freedom a few lice did not matter (Laughter). The two years he spent in jail had given him strength. He could face any Policeman the British Government could send. (Laughter). He intended one day to write the story of his jail life. It would be amusing reading. The treatment they received was disgraceful. Englishmen outside apologised for the Government orders, but not all the prison walls, handcuffs and warders could break the spirit of the Indians. (Applause). He had told the Englishmen: "you cannot break our spirit, but you have blackened your face in the sight of the whole civilised world." They had thought that the Indians were cowards that they had no gumption to stand up and fight, but the speaker thought that they had shown that it was not so. India today was not the India it was four years ago.

The speaker referred to the self-sacrifice the Indian women made for the cause of the country. They had given up their silks and their jewelleries for the Swaraj and Khilafat. To them the appearance of the audience here in the matter of dress gave them sore-eyes. (Laughter). The material here in the person of youths was splendid. If they formed volunteer corps to work for freedom he was sure that they would be more efficient than those in India.

Continuing the speaker said that India was determined to win her freedom. They were preparing the country for the final civil disobedience. Already the Sikhs had refused to pay the police tax. He thought the Government would be

wise to realise the position. India had made mistakes in the past, but it would make no mistakes in future. He personally was a friend of the British, next to his mother he owed a great deal to his English teacher at Aligarh, but he would tell them that if the Government did not make peace with them, if they did not satisfy them in the matter of the Khilafat and Swaraj, not one Indian soldier would sacrifice anything not one pice, for the Empire even if the Empire went to ruin. They were men of peace, though his appearance was against him, (Laughter). They had given the Government another year to prove that England was true to her promises. If wiser counsel prevailed well and good. If not even the worm would turn some day. India could put up a fight the like of which was never seen in the world. He did not want to make threats. But Englishmen ought to appreciate a man who honestly holds a challenge and then a clean fist in the face. (Applause).

Speaking about Ceylon he said that the time was coming very soon when India would attain her freedom. He could assure them that India was not going to forget Ceylon. (Applause). They did not want to rob Ceylonese of their independence, of their individuality. India was prepared for the federation of races. Burma and Ceylon could not exist independently without India. India would welcome them as jewels in her diadem. They would have absolute autonomy and independence. When the time came he would repeat they could count on their big brother India. It was a pity that Indians had neglected Ceylon. Ceylonese should come more frequently to India and establish closer relationship. There was fine material here. If he could get as fine a lot of young Muslims, Buddhists and Christians in Bombay as he saw here, his work would be ten times stronger. He could not pay them a higher compliment. Probably the young men did not yet realise their strength, but that time would come soon. (Applause). If they would but discard their collars and ties they would be happier and stronger. (Laughter and applause).
