The following is the speech made by Mr E. T. de Silva, Barrister-at-Law, one of the founders and Honorary Joint Secretary of the Ceylon National Congress, and one of Ceylon's noblest leaders, and one who came nearest in Ceylon to Mahatma Gandhi's conception of a votary of communal unity, and who was deeply inspired by Gandhiji's life and message. During his life time, Mr. de Silva did his best to bring the various communities together and to keep them together. He was also a great believer in India—Ceylon good will and co operation. On innumerable occasions, Gandhiji has stressed the value and significance of communal unity. An extract from one of his speeches is also given below:—

"That unity is strength is not merely a copy-book maxim but a rule of life, is in no case so easily illustrated as in the problem of Hindu-Muslim unity. Divided we must fail. Any third power may easily enslave India so long as we Hindus and Muslims are ready to cut each other's throats. Hindu Muslim unity means not unity only between Hindus and Muslims but between all those who believe India to be their home, no matter to what faith they belong"

What Gandhiji said of India applies mutatis mutandis to Ceylon as well.

The Vote of Thanks

Mr. E. T. de Silva in proposing a vote of thanks at the public reception to Moulana Shaukat Ali, Gandhiji's colleague, said:

It is a convention that there should be a vote of

thanks on occasions like this. An English Bishop last month advocated the abolition of the practice. But the vote of thanks it is my privilege to propose today is not a mere act of courtesy but the spontaneous desire on the part of the public of Ceylon to express their thanks to our guests for their presence here today. Seagirt within a little island we are apt to be insular and isolated in our views. We are lulled to sleep not only by the monsoon breeze but also by the soft lullaby that Ceylon is the premier Crown Colony of the British Empire. And so we have cause to be thankful to the leaders of the neighbouring continent for their visits to us from time to time to rouse us from our slumbers. A few years ago we had in our midst the great Tilak and Bepin Chandrapal. Quite recently the singing bird of India despite her broken wing and broken heart caroled to us and the echoes of her songs are yet to be heard in our valleys. Today we have with us the venerable lady whose sublime example of brave motherhood has thrilled the women of India. We have her son Moulana Shaukat Ali— I verily believe the stars in their courses are fighting for the liberation of India. In one generation there have been born to India Mahatma Gandhi and the Ali brothers. They profess different religions and perhaps their outlook on life is different. But the inscrutable Providence guiding the destinies of India has willed that these men should join hands, that they should preach the gospel of love and reconciliation among the Indians themselves in order to obtain Swaraj. To me my religion, to you yours said Mohamed Ali. This is a

noble utterance we should take to heart today. Moulana Shaukat Ali is making a gallant fight for the Holy places of Islam and for the spiritual authority of Islam. Some of us of other faiths have sympathised with him and his cause for Moulana Shaukat Ali in fighting for the Holy Places of Islam is fighting also for the principle of the freedom of the Holy Places of all religions. But, as the President has told you, Moulana Shaukat Ali is not only a great religious leader but also a great Indian hero. He has suffered for his country and has found strength in suffering. He comes to us with a martyr's crown. It is good fortune for us to have him with us for even one brief week. We thank him for his address. We thank Dr. Kitchlew and Dr. Mohamed. I have a profound conviction myself that responsible Government for our own country can come only by peace and good will among all races and all creeds. I know full well your visit, Sirs, and yours, venerable mother, will link in close and yet closer union the ties which bind the Mohammedan community to the Sinhalese, the Tamils, and the other inhabitants of this Island. We look forward to another visit from you and from Mohamed Ali himself. Meanwhile we shall treasure the lesson of your life that the chapter of petty racial and religious quarrels must be closed before we can open the ever glorious chapter of Swaraj. (Applause.)

The vote was seconded by Dr. E. V. Ratuam and carried with acclamation.

"U. N. O. and US"

Sir,

A recent editor in an English national daily under the caption "A Record of Progress begins thus—" Twenty three turbid years have passed by since the founding fathers of the United Nations Organisation (UN) signed the Charter which was intended to guarantee man a life of undisturbed peace and harmony—for ever and a day and goes on assessing critically the performance of this much maligned international set up during the period under review with special reference to more recent events which have caused peace lovers the world over and U. N. executive officials many a headache and fears of diverse sorts. On reading journalistic efforts like these and similar contributions in earlier issues of your journal both in the Editorial columns as well as elsewhere, one is reminded of the late Pundit Nehru and the architects of the Indian Constitution who saw to it that as far as possible the ideals expressed in the U.N. Charter were incorporated in apt constitutional form into the National Constitution itself and those great Indian departed personages like Rajendra Prasad and others who in their speeches and writings exhorted every Indian to look upon himself as a unit of world society without forgetting his national heritage in the process. Further the famous meeting between Rajaji (unofficially India's views on disarmament) and the late President Kennedy in the course of which the latter honestly admitted that plenty could be said for the Asian view of disarmament also comes to my mind. We in Ceylon are no less dedicated to the cause of world peace as other Asians and it is a well known fact that local political leaders of all lines, whatever differences they may have as regards other problems affecting national interest are all agreed that even if the U. N. O.

hasn't lived up to its expectations, it should not be done away with. It is heartening to note that a united approach is also being made to celebrate the birth of that great lover of humanity and world peace viz the late Mahatma Gandhi and in this connection one is happy to note that the grandson of Gandhiji is closely associated with a well-known movement working for world peace with a spiritual bias about it, along with world famous cricketers, like Conrad Hunte, Wesley Hall and others. (I am referring to the M. R. A.). The Ceylonese nation at large will do well to participate at various levels in this centenary celebrations and thus come to understand fellow humans better and appreciate the efforts of lesser units of creation to function happily on their own in the face of predatory and similar destructive tendencies of man. Without a change of attitudes on the part of the man of today which must come off as a sincere change of heart and conviction, men cannot improve themselves and if individuals don't improve a nation cannot progress and if nations do not progress unitedly world peace is international understanding is very badly affected. Let us all cooperate with those in charge of organising the centenary celebrations and also pray for divine guidance unitedly to show us how we can contribute our mite to make this small but famous Island of ours a living symbol of peace and prosperity in the true saintly tradition expressed by great religious teachers and thus enable the Govt. of the day to work more efficiently for the cause of world peace and abolition of misery in any acute form, in any part of the world. Let us all make a start towards preparing ourselves for this truly worthwhile task and hope that Lord

THE ARTS AND CRAFTS OF NORTH CEYLON

V. MUTTUCUMARASWAMY B. A.

Sir Emerson Tennent has made a great complaint in his admirable book on his Ceylon in 1859 to the goldsmiths of Jaffna. The Ceylon Tamils gave many presents to King Edward — the 'hen Prince of Wales in 1879; among them were many jewels made by the goldsmiths of Jaffna.

The goldsmiths do their work in the same fashion as done by their forebears centuries ago. Now instead of the beautiful designs of old, these men look into the catalogues of the European jewelry merchants. The Goldsmiths of Jaffna shone in their art of making fine work (Amumbu Veerpedum, Sama Velan). A few have annexed prizes and certificates for their high standard of craftsmanship the objects of which have been placed in many exhibitions in Colombo and Wembley, London.

Craftsmen making Panneer Chembu, Santhana Kumba, silver tray, Sinhamuhak kappu are very few. The people and the Government should encourage these craftsmen.

Sculpture

Sculpture is of two kinds. One is the construction of the spires to the temples, the other the art of making statues. There are very few temples which have been left to show the architecture of the ancient type, as they have been destroyed by the Portuguese. The imposing temples, the Nallur Sattanathar temple, the Maviddapuram Kandaswamy temple, the Nallur Kailasanathar temple and other temples of Jaffna had been razed to the ground. Fortunately we have the plans of some of the temples that were with Jaffna Kalaipulavar Navaratnam.

When the tank at the Nallur Sattanathar temple was dug, a few statues were unearthed. They were Uma Devi Thadehanamurthy Gaja Luxumi, Valli eyvanai and Subramaniam a peacock carved from one stone and Saneeswaran. The Uma Devi statue is still in this temple. The other statues have been handed over by the owner of the Sattanathan temple. Mr. T. Muttusamipillai to the Jaffna Museum. These statues possibly belong to the period of Singa Pararaja Sekaram 1479 or possibly the 15th century but before the coming of the Portuguese. The sta-

tues may have been made during the Vijayanaga period (14th-16th century) Representatives of the Vijayanagar Kings ruled at Jaffna during this period.

Pattini images were made out of sandalwood, of brick, of copper, and bronze and ivory.

At Kanthavanak-kada-vai is a beautiful image of Arumugasamy. Since its hand is slightly damaged this is kept outside the temple. This was once at Kumarapuram Subramania Temple which was an important shrine of the Vanni. It is said that the sculptor who fashioned Subramaniam images Ettiendi and Palam. Subramania Temples fashioned this image. The Subramania image in the Moolasthanam (inner sanctuary) of Maviddapuram is remarkable. The Murugan Valli Theyvayani and the peacock are cut from one rock Ilankai Kali Vatalaru — Kalaipulavar Navaratnam page 48.

The King's palace was not far from the present Kandaswamy temple. On the Nallur Pt. Pedro Road lies a piece of land known Chettiar Thottam behind the Araseo Industries. That was the Sangili Thoppu - the site of the palace of the Arya Chakravarthi Kings of Jaffna.

It is said that Singai Arya Chakravarthi got a triangular well dug up, got down water from the Yamunai and consecrated the well. This was called Yamunai Eri, and this has been shortened to Yamuneri.

Carpentry

Carpentry has a good following, but we find few carpenters with skill. Fifty years ago the beds and almyrabs and chairs were entirely made by the carpenters of North Ceylon. Today the people get down these items of furniture from South Ceylon.

There were many carpenters who have shaped Temple Cars. A remarkable piece of work by the carpenters of North Ceylon is the chariot of the Veeramakeli Aman Kovil at Nallur Jaffna. The silver peacock of the Jaffna Kathiresan Kovil which was done about 75 years ago is the work of craftsmen of Jaffna. Dr. AnandaCumaraswamy observes that in England the people have a sense of cultural values and will not fill their houses with furniture that has no
