DESECRATION OF HINDU TEMPLES.

II.

IN OUR LAST ISSUE WE REFERRED TO the desecration of the Suthumalai Amman Temple by the Government Agent, the Superintendent of Police and the Maniagar of Valigamam West. To day we are in possession of facts connected with a similar desecration of three other temples in the same division and on the same day. We have no reason to doubt their correctness. They were related to the writer by the persons who were present at that time and their statements were reduced in writing then and there. These three temples are situated at Mahipittu. Two of these temples viz Kannakai Amman and Meenadchi Amman Temples are situated in one quadrangle having one common inner courtyard. While the other which is a Pillar Temple is standing at a distance of a few yards from the outer *Peethi* of the two Amman Temples. The theft of *Yanthra* plates took place at the Meenadchi Amman and Pillar Temples.

Mr. Russell visited this village in August last in one of his perambulations for historical knowledge accompanied by his Extra Office Assistant, Madaliyar C. Kananayagam. Both these Officials halted at the Meenadchi Amman Temple, inquired about the theft of *Yanthra* plates and did not go into the Temple as they were told that entry into it was prohibited to non-Hindus.

On the 4th inst. it was known in the village that the Government Agent would go there at about 11 or 12 a. m. to make inquiries about the theft of *Yanthra* plates. The G. A. did not turn up at the appointed time. The officiating priest after weary waiting had gone away on his priestly business. The minor head men with a few worshippers and one or two Brahmins continued to maintain their weary watch till the G. A. with the two other Officials went to the scene at 2.30 or 3 p. m.

Immediately on their arrival the upholders of British religious centrality, the representatives of British justice, entered the sacred precincts of the Kannakai Amman Temple by the northern entrance amidst the tramp of their boots with the dumb-founded Brahmins and worshippers following them close at their heels and wondering what this strange visitation may portend. From the *Pelpedda Mandapam* of this Temple the demigods of official hierarchy strutted forth into the *Sthamba Mandapam* of the Meenadchi Amman Temple. There having reflected for a while on the strength of the Hindu fortress and having measured their height with that of the flagstaff the Christian demigods marched as if they were the soldiers of their crosses to the southern door of this Temple. There they carefully scrutinised the strength of the door and compared its powers of resistance with the weapons of attack in their Christian armoury. Then having heard of the existence of an outer Hindu fortress, known as Pillaiar Temple, they sallied forth thither. The Maniagar was weary of the long march dropped on the way while the great powers of endurance, which are proverbially associated with beef-eating, stood his superiors in good stead to brave the fatigues of the long march. Leaving the Maniagar behind they scaled the heights of the Pillaiar Temple, entered its inner courtyard, walked to the southern door and peeped inside from the door-step which even the holiest devotees barring the Priest fear to tread. Having completed their reconnaissance the G. A. and his party had marched off with the confidence that the citadels of the Hindu religion would fall before the firmness and prestige of the supermen of the Public Service!

All this while the humble folks of the village who have been reduced to a condition of helplessness by the 300 years of foreign rule looked on in bewildering amazement at the desecration of their temples in their very presence. They only sighed to the Gods and took comfort in the faith that the mills of God grind slowly but surely.

At this Temple no permission to enter was obtained and none was given. Is such a permission necessary to this Government Agent, intoxicated with the insolence of power and puffed up with the pride of prestige?

His conduct at this Temple is that of an inconsiderate, supercilious and erratic official. To him the Hindu temples are curios shops and not places of worship whose sanctity can be violated with impunity. To him the Hindus appear to be the coolies of Christendom whose feelings can be wounded without any compunction. We are sure that no Hindu who still retains the self-respect of his ancestors and in whose heart the spark of Hindu patriotism still burns undimmed will sit with folded hands and will tamely submit to the insults which this Official, inspired with anti-Hindu feelings, has offered to our Gods, our Priesthood and to our Community.

Kemal and the Koran.

It is said that an authority on Turkish affairs who has lately returned from Constantinople to England, pointed out that no passage in Mustafa Kemal Pasha's speech is calculated to arouse a greater feeling and have a wider echo than his references to religion. The President declared that the new Turkish State had no connection with religion. On one occasion, at the inauguration of a school in Ezzarni, Mustafa Kemal Pasha brushed aside the priest who was about to offer up prayers with the remark that the President of the Republic came first. It is also reported that at a meeting of the Commissioners, when his attention was called to some canonical law which could be urged against his policy, he hurled the Koran across the room with a remark that Progress could not be fettered by rules and regulations laid down for a past generation. — "Times of Ceylon".

LOCAL & GENERAL.

WEATHER:—There are good showers occasionally commencing from yesterday. It is said that young paddy plants that shot forth after the recent showers are thriving well but the older plants have become stunted.

BUDDHIST VIHARE IN LONDON:—Definite steps are said to have been taken and that a Buddhist Vihara will be built in London at an early date.

RE ORGANISATION AT THE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE:—It is understood that the Principal, University College, Colombo and the University College Council are contemplating to reorganise the Classics and Philosophy departments.

LOCAL OPTION SUCCESSFUL IN OUTSTATIONS:—At the recent local option pollings the arrack tavern in Matsie and the toddy, arrack and foreign liquor bars in Haputale were declared closed.

—The polling for the closure of the arrack and toddy taverns and foreign liquor bars in Nattadiya, Chitaw District had recently proved a success, a percentage of 73.9 being obtained.

PROPOSED SCHOLARSHIPS IN MEDICINE:—It has been proposed by the Government to grant a scholarship yearly on certain terms to the best student of the Ceylon Medical College who passes the final examination in the first class and within the statutory period, to proceed to England and obtain University degrees. The term of "apprenticeship" will be three years.

SUB-POST OFFICE AT PONNALAIKADDUVAN:—A Sub Post Office is to be opened at Ponnalaikadduvan from the beginning of next year. Mr. K. Somasundaralayar, brother of Mr. K. C. Balasubramaniam has been selected as the sub Postmaster. Mr. Iyer is at present undergoing training. — Ponnalaikadduvan Cor.

KHADDAR PRO TEM:—It is reported that among those assembled at the Melbourne Jetty, Colombo on Saturday last to receive Mahatma Gandhi and his party there were a few members of the local Tamil community attired in regulation Khaddar, though they ordinarily wear approved western costumes of the latest cut. The Tamil ladies appeared in white Khaddar saris plain but dignified.

GERMAN PROFESSOR ON UNIVERSITY SITE.—Professor Heinrich Lueders, Member of the Prussian Academy of Science and Lecturer in Indian Psychology at the University of Berlin in the course of a lecture at Kandy stated that he had been asked several times in Colombo which particular site he would advocate for the University. He was unable to express an opinion as he had not then seen the Kandy site. Since his arrival at Kandy he had had the opportunity to see and admire for himself her wonderful scenic beauties. If any one were to ask him now in what University he would wish to occupy a Professorial chair, he would say the University of Kandy.

Saiva Mahasabai at Mathagal.

INAUGURAL MEETING OF RESIDENTS.

A public meeting of the Saiva inhabitants of Mathagal was held on Friday the 11th inst. at 6.30 p. m. at the Mathagal Vigowara Vidyalyaya to organise a Saiva Mahasabai to protect the interests of the Saiva inhabitants of Mathagal and to consider what steps should be taken regarding the insult offered by Mr. Leo, alias Singarasayar of St. Joseph's School, Mathagal to the Hindu community by compelling certain Hindu students of the 5th Standard who had received Saiva initiation to repeat to him the Mantras of their Faith. The meeting was largely attended. Mr. M. S. Ramanathan, Secretary of the Hindu Board presided. Brahma Sri Arunadasa Kurukkal, and Brahma Sri Sathasiva Kurukkal were accommodated on the platform. Mr. K. Vignayagomathy acted as Secretary. The Chairman explained to the audience the object of the meeting, the sacredness of initiation, and the secrecy that should be observed by the initiates in respect of the Mantras. He pointed out that the action of the teacher in compelling the boys to repeat the Mantras to him (the teacher) was high handed, and the repetition by the teacher himself of the Mantras which he had learnt already from another student by adopting a similar method was intended to ridicule the sacredness of initiation and to undermine the faith of the students in its efficacy. Brahma Sri Arunadasa Kurukkal moved that the incident should be brought to the notice of the Authorities and to the members of the Legislative Council. The resolution was seconded by Mr. V. Ambalanayar, and was carried unanimously. A Saiva Mahasabai was organised, and office bearers were elected. It was further resolved to request the Hindu Board of Education to convert the present Saiva Tamil School into an Anglo-Tamil School so that the boys in the first three Standards may receive their English Education there, and to send the Hindu boys of the higher classes to the nearest Hindu school. The meeting terminated with the singing of Thevaram. — Cor.

PENSION TO DESCENDANTS OF SRI WICKRAMA:—The Committee which was recently appointed to investigate the existing system of payment of pensions to the descendants of the former Royal Family of Kandy has made certain recommendations on applications received from some of the Kandy State Pensioners who are at present in South India.

GIGANTIC GAS BOILER EXPLOSION:—20 persons are said to have been killed and 500 injured in an explosion on the north side of Ponnagur when a huge storage gas tank containing five million cubic feet of natural gas was ignited. The great steel gas tank rose hundreds of feet in the air like an enormous balloon, remained intact for an instant and then burst like a colossal firework.

Christian Officials' Insolence.

CATHOLIC TEACHER'S ARROGANCE.

The following is an account of the interview given by the Hon. Mr. W. Doraiswamy to a representative of the "Ceylon Daily News," in connection with the recent entry by the G. A., the S. P. and the Maniagar, Valigamam West, into certain Hindu temples and the incident at the Mathagal Catholic School:—

Mr. Doraiswamy said that he had very carefully read the letter sent by Mr. Russell. So far as he could see, the letter did not contain a single word of denial as to whether he had entered the sacred precincts with his shoes on or not. That constituted the real crux of the matter. Whether the G. A. was informed that he was not to enter certain portions of the Temple was not the matter at issue.

MATTER AT ISSUE.

The matter at issue, said Mr. Doraiswamy, was whether he did or did not enter the precincts which he knew or should have known to be sacred, with his shoes on or not. An unequivocal answer on that point must be given. The G. A. must state whether he entered the sacred precincts with his shoes on or did not.

"How does it happen," he asked, "that an officer can rise to so high a position as that occupied by a G. A., of a province without his knowing such elementary facts about the religious and social customs of the people as are involved in this question, especially when he was accompanied by the Maniagar of that division? The Maniagar is said to have also entered the sacred precincts with his shoes on. An explanation for that act on the part of the Maniagar is required as much as on the part of the G. A. In as much as it appears from the face of the G. A.'s letter that he lacks an elementary knowledge of the religious and social customs of the second largest community comprising the Ceylonese population, the Government ought to consider whether it is right for them to retain the officer in question in so responsible a position."

ANOTHER INCIDENT.

Mr. Doraiswamy also referred to another incident which occurred in the Northern Province of which so far none of the newspapers in the Island has taken cognizance. If the facts of the matter as reported are correct, he feels it should be carefully investigated by Government.

The incident in question, Mr. Doraiswamy stated, occurred in the village of Mathagal, in the Jaffna District. Some boys, it appeared, studying at the Mathagal English School conducted by the Roman Catholic Mission underwent a Hindu ceremony called *theechai*. The boys were absent for a day or two. When they returned to the school, they were asked for an explanation as to why they had been out of school. When they related what had happened, the teacher asked them to repeat the "Mantrams" that were given to them at the ceremony. One of the boys refused and he was asked.

A DANCE AT SCHOOL.

The next day he was asked again to repeat them and he refused. Thereupon the teacher tied dry banana leaves around his forehead and made him dance.

Mr. Doraiswamy stated that according to information given him this sort of thing happened in the school not once. A similar incident occurred even as late as last week.

Mr. Doraiswamy emphasized that this sort of thing should not be permitted in a school which presumably received grants from the Government. The villagers were in a state of commotion and at their insistent request steps have been taken to open an English school in the village for Saivite boys.

"The matter," he emphasised, "should not, however, be permitted to rest there. The Education Department should conduct a searching inquiry into it and if the facts reported to me are substantially correct, the grant-in-aid should be immediately stopped."

Local Government Board.

The following are the Minutes of the seventy-ninth meeting of the Local Government Board held at the Colombo Kachcheri on Thursday, November 3, 1927, at 9.30 a. m.

Present:—The Hon. Mr. R. N. Tawne, C.M.B., President, Mr. A. H. J. Dawson, Surveyor General, The Hon. Mr. A. C. G. W. Jayakoon and Mr. J. H. Meedeniya, Adigar.

The minutes of the seventy-eighth meeting having been circulated were confirmed, subject to a verbal amendment in item 3.

The Board gave further consideration to the question of the proposed lease by the Jaffna Council of a portion of the Esplanade, a little over one seventh of an acre in extent and approved the rent of Rs. 800/- per annum for the first 5 years, the right to revise the rent at the end of that period being reserved to the Council.

Considered and approved under section 47 (e) the following scale of remuneration assigned by the Jaffna Council to the office of Inspector of Works:—

Rs. 2,400/- per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 120/- to Rs. 3,000/- per annum, plus a motor cycle allowance of Rs. 480/- per annum.

Considered and approved a by-law made by the Chlaw Council in substitution for by-law No. 6 of the by-laws under "Conditions of Issue of Licence" in respect of aerated water factories published in Government Gazette No. 7,568 of October 29, 1926.

Tabled Circulation Paper No. 40—draft general by-laws relating to licences made by the Matara Council and schedule of annual licence duties chargeable for premises or places used for special purposes. The by-laws and the schedule of licence duties were approved.

Considered and approved under section 47 (e) the remuneration assigned by the Matara Council to the new office of 2nd Sanitary Inspector. (Circulation Paper No. 42).

Tabled the budget of the Panadura Council for 1928.

Considered and approved under section 47 (e) the application of the Kalutara Council for the acquisition of land for connecting Sea Beach road with the Main road.

Read Colonial Secretary's letter No. U 127/26 of September 28, 1927, relative to the conditions on which Government would be prepared to give the Matara Council a grant and a loan for its water supply scheme.

It was resolved to circulate for the approval of the Board the draft notifications relating to (a) the conservancy rate proposed to be levied by the Panadura Council with effect from January 1, 1928; (b) the revocation of a by-law under which conservancy fees are recoverable by the Council.

The Board approved the amendments made by the Matara Council in by-laws Nos. 1 and 9 of its model by-laws, dealing as offensive trades, the manufacturing or storing of copra and gingili oil, and penalizing persons who carry on any of the trades referred to in by-law No. 2 without obtaining a licence.

The Board considered and approved under section 141 (b) the water rate of 4 per centum (with certain exemptions) levied by the Matara Council for 1928. (Circulation Paper No. 43).

It was resolved to hold the next meeting of the Board on Thursday, December 8, 1927, at 9.30 a. m.
