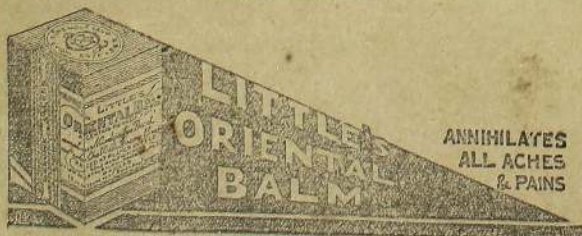

EDUCATION IN 1926.

II

FROM THE STATISTICS GIVEN IN THE Report of the Director of Education for 1926 it is evident that Vernacular education made slow but steady progress during the year. There were 3,020 Anglo-Vernacular and Vernacular schools thus showing an increase of 57 schools over those of the previous year.

It is reported that "except in a few cases the school buildings do not appear to have improved during 1926." The District Inspectors of the various divisions complain that a large number of school buildings are of a temporary character and in some instances "classes and teachers are packed together in one or two rooms where teaching has to be done under very difficult circumstances."

In the matter of school furniture and equipment, it is said, that sufficient attention has not been paid to them by the Managers of many Assisted schools. In this matter it appears that the Northern Division has escaped from blame.

Adquate supply of trained and certificated teachers is commented upon in the Report. Nothing in our opinion is more important to the progress and efficiency of Vernacular education in this country than the question of trained teachers.

Railway Excursion Tickets:—Cheap return tickets at single fare for the double journey will be issued in the Ceylon Government Railway on all lines for all the three classes to all stations 50 miles apart from the 17th instant up to 3rd proximo for the coming Christmas and New Year traffic.

The work of the Oriental Studies Societies in Colombo and Jaffna finds a place in the Report of this year. We are glad to note that the examinations of these Societies are becoming increasingly popular in the country. The Jaffna Oriental Studies Society is doing good and useful work in popularising its examinations.

LOCAL & GENERAL

OFFICIAL.—Mr A R Hallock having been selected as a Cadet in the Civil Service by the Secretary of State for the Colonies, he has been attached to the Patialam Kachcheri from the 2nd inst.

—Mr H J L Leigh Clark is appointed as Assistant Government Agent etc. Mannar from the 5th inst.

—Mr J Kadramattamby is to be Additional Police Magistrate, Batticaloa from Dec: 11 to 17, 1927.

NEW NOTARIES.—Mr C Navaratnam, Proctor S C, Nalor is to be a Notary Public throughout the judicial division of Jaffna practising in the English language.

—Mr V S. Soppamaniam of Veerampakam, is to be a Notary Public throughout Temaradebi Division practising in the Tamil language.

ALLOCATION OF BUILDING GRANTS.—Last Friday's Gazette publishes certain amendments to the Code of Regulations for Assisted English Schools, which have been passed by the Board of Education, referring to the allocation of building grants to schools.

MEDICAL.—Dr W S. Ratnayake has been appointed to act as Medical Superintendent, General Hospital, Colombo, for one month vice Dr H C Loebruggen, who is going on leave.

THE CAMBRIDGE EXAMINATIONS.—The Junior and Senior Certificate Examinations held by the Cambridge University commenced today (Monday) in Ceylon. This year there are 119 to 1404 candidates sitting for the Junior 100 of whom are girls and for the Senior 1352 boys and 158 girls.

Rail Motor to Run in JAFFNA.—The Ceylon Government Railway Department have recently received several rail motors from England. One of the sections on which a rail motor-service will be run is said to be the section between Kankesanthurai and Pallal on the Northern Railway.

ORIENTAL STUDIES' SOCIETY, JAFFNA.—The annual general meeting of this Society was held last Saturday at 4.30 p.m. at the Parambhava College Hall. Sir A. Kanagasabai presided. After the adoption of the Report and the Balance Sheet, Officers bearers and Committee for the ensuing year were elected.

Mahatma Gandhi's Message.

LESSON FROM STARVING MILLIONS.

Just before Mahatma Gandhi left Jaffna for India one of the Joint Secretaries of the Reception Committee asked him to leave a Message behind for the people of Jaffna. Mahatmaji has been kind enough to send a message from Talasbannar under date 30.11.27, the text of which is as follows:—"The message that I can leave for Jaffna as for the whole of Ceylon is:—

CEYLON LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.—The adjourned meeting of the Ceylon Legislative Council commenced on Thursday last at 10.30 a.m. The chief item of the day was the discussion on a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to amend the law relating to Indian Labourers". The whole of the day was spent on discussion and at about 5 p.m., the Council adjourned for the following day. When the Council met on Friday last the debate on the Indian Labour Bill was resumed and after a lengthy discussion the Bill was passed in all its stages with certain amendments.

Mahatmajji may visit Malaya.

IF TEMPTING OFFER GUARANTEED.

FOR KHADI FUND COLLECTION. Mr. S. T. writes as follows:—"In the course of an interview I had with Mahatma Gandhi (while in Jaffna) when asked as to whether he would visit Malaya, Mahatmajji seemed to be favourable to the idea provided Malaya had a tempting offer. Ceylon has given over a lakh for this cause which took him to this island, and Mahatmajji would not be satisfied with anything less than two lakhs from Malaya. Nothing can be more welcome to the people of Malaya than a visit from the Mahatma on a cultural and humanitarian mission. For his mission of Truth and Non Violence is a thing but cultural and that of Khaddar nothing but humanitarian."

EVILS OF DRINK AND UNTOUCHABILITY.

Mahatma Gandhi paid a visit to Victoria College on Tuesday, the 23rd of November. Long before his arrival all the students gathered in the hall which had been beautifully decorated with flowers in abundance. Mahatmajji arrived sharp at 4.30 p.m. and was received at the western gate by Mr. C. Mageswary Chellappan, the Manager, who sprinkled rose-water and by Mr. S. Sivapattanabandaram, B.A., the Principal, who garlanded Mahatmajji. He was led along the profusely decorated and carpeted path to the front door of Ridge way hall where hung the national flag in Khaddar with the figure of a bull worked in it. At the entrance was the Nirankaram 'Deva'.

"Our shrines are sacred for the feet of saints Did feed their precincts, and their songs were heard Within their walls. And lo, today the word Of one as pure and truthful falls like rains On thirsty crops, upon our ears. All sinless Within our minds and school are washed and secured By your bright presence. From our hearts are poured Our thanks. Such gratitude as ours words never paint. Moved by our Mother's state God sent you down To show how man grow fearless, upright As the palm-tree aspiring straight to stars With winds of heaven fanning his stately crown. To praise and blame indifferently you do fight. Bless us and school to break our hateful bars!"

When the reading was over, the Mahatma received the address graciously remarking the beauty of the design which was also the work of Mr. Menon. The marginal decoration resembled the elaborate relief work on the walls of South Indian temples. A picture of the College as completed was worked into the design. Mr. P. G. Theambipillai, Lecturer in Science, presented the pot of yellow Khaddar which the Mahatma in his speech characterized as liberal. It was the contribution of the students and the staff. The Mahatma with his wonted interest in children fell into conversation with Miss Bistampalam, the grand daughter of the Manager and gave her a bouquet. In return he got a liberal contribution to the Khaddar fund. He then addressed the boys exhorting them to be truthful. The speech was translated by Mr. C. Rajagopalsachari. Mahatmajji remarked that the address had been beautifully decorated. The address was then auctioned and a good price was realised.

At the door of the Hall Mr. V. Ponnampalam, Chairman, Village Committee, Changkonal, received Mahatmajji and led him to the platform which had been erected at the portico. The vast crowd was able to see the Mahatma clearly and the people were quite orderly. As a result, the special police found it an easy task to maintain order. Mahatmajji was garlanded and presented with a pure and address by Mr. V. Ponnampalam. In his reply to the address Mahatma Gandhi emphasized on the evils of drink and untouchability.
