INDIAN Ambassador to United States said at Washington that her country's sympathies were strongly on the side of 'democratic nations' despite India's refusal to join either the 'Russian or United States power blocs.'



The East Punjab High Court Ward Gandhi, and dismissed the appeals of the others.

It recommended clemency in the case of Gopal Godse, brother of Gandhi's self-confessed assassin, Nathuram Vinayak Godse.

Of the seven appellants Nathuram Vinayak Godse and Narayan Apte were sentenced to death and the other five to transportator life by a Special Court in New Delhi last February. The appeals were against charges of conspiracy and illegal possession

Nathuram Vinayak Gods who fired the fatal shots, had appealed, not against the murder conviction, but against his conviction for

One of the presiding judges, Mr. Justice Achhru Ram, recommended in a separate judgment that the sentence of transportation for life passed on Madan Lal, who set off a bomb at Gandhi's prayer meeting, should be commuted, but the other judges, Mr. Justice Bhandari and Mr. Justice Khosla, disagreed.

The other man whose appeal against transportation for li'e was rejected is Vishnu Karkare.

The term transportation for life now means 14 years imprisonment, since the Andaman Islands penal settlement, to which prisoners were formerly transported, has been abolished.

Lines In The Palm Do Not Lie

Huxley Believes In Palmistry

T astonishes me to find how many there are who believe that the lines in the palm are creases caused by opening and closing the hand. It is obvious that such people have never scrutinised and compared prints and observed the enormous differences which exist in almost every end to end they'd reach from ences which exist in almost every hand.

It is therefore all the more refreshing to pick up Sanknya, the Indian Journal of Statistics, and read that a scientific test was made to correlate the three major lines in the hands of 600 people in order to find a common denominator. However ridiculous this might appear to the palmist it proves that scientists are wondering at last whether there is a modicum of truth in Palmistry, and if so, how it can be used to assist mankind.

The Editor states the control of the end they'd reach from here to the equator. The doctor asks his patient for symptoms, but one question from a palmist and the client instantly suspects him to be a fraud of the worst kind.

The Editor states that a rough census of Calcutta, a city of nearly three millions, reveals that 63 per cent possess horoscopes and 60 per cent have had their hands read. It is illuminating to learn that the proportions is highest among professional men and lowest among those engaged in petty trade. Moreover, fifty per cent claim that they have been given successful revelations!

Based on Comparison

Economics is supposed to be a science but the predictions of most economists are so hopelessly awry as to make them suspect. There are schools so conflicting as to be diametrically opposed, which is not so with Palmistry, where all compatible exponents agree on fundamentals. Text-books published on Economics are usually out of date a couple of decades after publication, but Palmistry seems to have tion, but Palmistry seems to have weathered the centuries without appreciable change. This is because Palmistry is scientific. It is based on comparison; it is deveveloped by trial and error. It is mathematically computable. Also, that the paims of the students bere far more fine lines than those of the labourers and that the lines on the hands of the latter were coarser and broader. All this corroborates what palmists al-ready know—that students are more highly strung and sensitive than labourers.
