ONE WORLD" CAMPAIGN

TIME YET TO SAVE THE WORLD

It Is In Peril Of Self - Destruction

PHILOSOPHERS and politicians who assembled at Copenhagen during the second week of September have a solution for the problem the world is facing at present. Charles Crost, Reuter's Correspondent writes that according to these thinkers and leaders, mankind has to decide either on 'one world' or no world at all.

A pamphlet issued by these eninent men contains the following statement.

Prof. Albert Einstein speaks of a three-way choice for Powers. the

(1) A preventive war against the East while America still has a monopoly of the atom bomb.

(2) The division of the world into two armed camps.

(4) A World Government.

Greatest Test of Civilisation

A preventive war, Einstein states, would mean that Russia would at once occupy Europe to the Atlantic coast. This would mean intensive atom bombing of Europe to drive them out. At the end of such a war, Europe's population would be decimated and Europe itself would be in ruins.

Declaring that a division into two armed camps has always led to war in the end, he stresses that only the third way, therefo.e, offers any real solution. Nor does he consider the prospects of a World Government as hopeless.

"We are all citizens of one we are all citizens of one world and we share the same fate", he says. "Is it really inevitable that because of our passions and inherited customs, we should destroy ourselves? Civilisation is facing its greatest test."

Pandit Nehru, writing in another article in the pamphlet, states: "I do not doubt that a World Government must come, and will come. This is the only cure for the world's political sickness."

Lord Beveridge writes: "A World Government will not be easy to form, but none of us can expect security or a peaceful life without it. World security is today more important than social security."

Lord Boyd Orr, President of the 'One World' organisation, says: 'The shddow of a third tragedy already lies over us. But there is still time to ward it off. I think that we shall win the fight for peace and my greatest hope lies in the United Nations.
