

BACKGROUND NOTE ON KOREAN CRISIS

The Soviet bloc, have on the other hand, refused to recognise the Republic of Korea in spite of the U. N. General Assembly's resolution and have instead recognised the "Democratic People's Republic" of North Kores.

First Report of the U. N. Commission

The first report of the U. N. Commission on Korea, published on September 8, 1949, revealed that the Commission had only been able to fulfil a small part of its tasks and that, in the words of the report, "the situation in Korea is now no better than it was at the beginning" (of the Commis-sion's activities). The one posi-tive result of the Commission's work was the verification of the withdrawal of U.S. occupation troops which was completed on June 29, 1949, with the excep-tion of a Korean Military Advi-sory Group of 500 officers and enlisted men, without comba-equipment, who remained at the request of the Republic of Korea, to assist the training of the Re-public's forces. Offers by the Commission to observe the withhave withdrawn all its forces from North Korea by January 1. 1949.

The Commission in its report emphasised that all efforts to establish contact with, or gain access to, Korea were fruitless. In the words of the report most courteous appeal for faci-lities that would permit a visit to the north and allow the initiation ofthe subject of unifica-tion have been.....without reply unless the systematic vitupera tion of Pyongang (North Korean) Radio was such".

How To Educate The Farmer

Indian Example

Uttar Pradesh is a pioneer in organising agricultural extension services which will, in future, be a wing of the Agricultural Depart-ments of all States, according to a proposal of the Government of India.

The idea of this extension service is to carry the results of agricultural and allied research to the homes of the kisans. Its other tasks will be to promote nigher and better production, to improve rural living conditions and also to loster cultural deveopment.

Progressive cultivators will b approached to spread the results of their experiments through demonstration on their own Twenty-three of the State farms and Government gardens are specially set apart for the extension service. Six Duputy Direc-tors are in charge of the six main functions of this service. Plant protection is under the Entomologist to the U. P. Government.

Lack of sufficient resources and personel of the right type needed by the service is, however, proving as a handicap.

synonymous with completeness and infinitude. Nothing that is dependent is eternal and nothing that is finite or individualised is independent. The subject cannot hope to exist eternally and at the same time be a relative of some external existence. To be eternal, the subject must be absolute, which is the fusion of the totality of existence in the subject or the Self. In order that it should be Real, the subject must at the same time become all objects, the entire existence, in which case the subject-ness of the subject is sacrificed to or rather swallowed by a large infinity of being where the subject and the object are not separated even in the least. Hence, if the Self is eternal it cannot be something existing apart from the three empirical bodies which are objects of the witness-Self. And, the Self must be eternal, for, at no time is it possible to depy the existence of the conscious Self.

Now we are led to a two-fold


Now we are led to a two-fold quandary. The Self cannot be called a differentiated wirness of three bodies, for objective consciousness and individuality vitiate selfexistence and eternity. At the same time, the three bodies cannot be included in the Self itself, because they disclose their character of being devoid of consciousness and also being absent at all times. Reality is that which exists without break time and space. This test rejects the three objective conditions of walking, dreaming and deep sleep from inclusion in the Self.

This urge is corroborated by direct intuitive experience. It is heard from such sources that the Supreme Reality is free from the functions of thinking, the notion of individuality and the perception of external existence. It is all unlimited, spaceless, timeless, non-dual, pure Consciousness, It is called Super-Consciousness, for, it is greater than the ordinary it is greater than the ordinary consciousness experienced in life-This does not contradict the pure reason and since reason has nothing better to say, it has to accept the trustworthy character of what is heard from those who have reached the kernel of existence.
