BUDGET CRITICS

WHAT WAS HAILED AS THE common or poor man's budget or sunshine budget by spokes-men from the Government benches has been described Thuttu-dekka or Pensay Budget or dicky-dicky budget those of the Opposition. Healthy criticism is always necessary to make Government realise the point of view of the opposition. It is only when all the pros and cons of a matter are discussed that the truth can be discerned. Dr. Colvin R. de Silva, the Deputy Leader of the Opposition stated that as the poor man would be helped to the tune of 3 cents per day, it was a Thuttu-dekka budget, or as the individual from the middle class stood to benefit 4 cents a day it was a Pensay budget. The Member for Vavuniya explained that dicky-dicky meant 'unsound, shaky or queer'; it also meant 'a male donkey'; so he called the budget a dicky-dicky one-
