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

THE FRANCHISE BILL.

Elsewhere we publish a summary of this Bill as published by our contemporary of the "Ceylon Independent". It has been drafted closely on the lines of the recommendations of the Reform Commission. But it will be seen that the qualifications of voters for the Ceylonese electorate receives a notable addition by the inclusion of those who have passed the Junior Cambridge Local Examination. The Commission considered the question of including this Examination as a qualification and did not in their report recommend it. His Excellency the Governor is further given the power of declaring by publication in the "Government Gazette" any other Examination to be accepted for the purpose of this Ordinance as an equivalent for either the Senior or Junior Cambridge Local Examinations. It is to be hoped that in the case of Government officers the passing of the Clerical Examination will be held as a qualification to vote for the election of the Ceylonese member, as this Examination is a more difficult test than either the Cambridge Local Examinations or the Examinations which give one the status of an Undergraduate.

The penal provisions of the Bill especially the section relating to "treating" are very acceptable and will have the effect of preventing corrupt practices at these elections. It is in the Southern parts of the Island "treating" is likely to be included in to influence voters, and it is to be hoped that the penalties attached to this offence will have a salutary effect in putting a stop to this practice.

The Ceylonese should be extremely thankful to the Secretary of State for having given them at least one elected member, to begin with. It behoves them to use this highly valued privilege newly conferred on them in such a manner as not only to secure the services of the fittest person to represent them in Council, but also to prove that they are fit for the extension of this privilege in the near future. The Ceylonese memorialised the Secretary of State for the granting of the elective franchise and Provincial representation. He has granted one general member to represent the "educated Ceylonese". It will not be long, we have every confidence, before the Ceylonese will be given more than one elected member and that to represent the Provinces in the Legislature of this Island, if we will only make a right use of the privilege which is conferred on us.

The passing of the Bill will not be long delayed. The destriptions are sent to the confedence which is conferred on us.

A Bis Scheme to improvit Calcutta—A Bill was introduced last week in the Bengal Legislative Council to provide for the improvement and expansion of Calcutta. The Bill provides for fifteen miles of new thoroughfares, the clearing of all the congested parts of the town and the provision of new dwellings in the Suburbs for the displaced population. It is anticipated that the Scheme will make Calcuttain every sense the finest city in the East and justify its being called the "Queen of the East." The Scheme is to cost Rs 822 lakhs and the money is to be met by taxes on East. The Scheme is to cost his 522 takes and the money is to be met by taxes on property transfers, Jute and railway passengers. Fifty lakes will be Government Contribution and the remainder is to be raised by loans. The Scheme has been already sanctioned by the Secretary of State.

THE JAFANESE FLOODS—The recent floods in Japan caused much greater havoc than was at first supposed. Official estimate shows that 112 persons were drowned, 150,000 houses flooded and 3,900 houses swept away. In Tokio alone 260,000 persons are receiving relief.

THE PHYSICAL DEGENERACY OF THE RACE.

(Communicated).

The duty of all duties which we owe to The daty of all duties which we owe to ourselves and to our posterity is to preserve the physical vesture given to us by God in its natural and perfect state and transmit it to our posterity unimpaired. The greatest national asset is the physical strength of the individuals composing it. All intellectual attainments will be of it. All intellectual attainments will be of no avail as factors in individual or national development if they are not founded on the solid bed-rock of sound physique. Hence it becomes our chief duty to make every endeavour, and to take all necessary steps to promote physical culture in the country. That this most important work is not now properly attended to, especially among the classes that pass their lives in intellectual pursuits and sedentary occupations will be admitted by all. It should, therefore, engage our serious attention to organize ourselves and make an endeavour therefore, engage our serious attention to organize ourselves and make an endeavour to remedy the evil. But before we set ourselves to the task we should try to find out the several causes that have brought about the physical degeneracy in the community, so that the remedy may be suited to counteract the evil. We will therefore set down here a few suggestions to meet the requirement. to meet the requirement.

First and foremost should be placed the precocity of boys in their sexual side, as the chief contributory cause to their physical decadence. "All posterity slumbers now in our bodies as we did in our ancestors" says an eminent professor. "The basis of the new biological ethics of today and of the future is that everything is right that makes for the welfare of the yet unborn, and all is wrong that injures them, and to do so is the unpardonable sin—the only one nature knows" It will thus be seen, that not only our own welfare, but the welfare of all future generations is committed to our honor and virtue. Sexual evils and abuses unknown to our forefathers, two or three generations ago, have now been introduced into our country, and if not checked betimes, and their horrible after-effects revealed before it is too late, they may take root in the country and cause the decadence of the race. The old sentiments of delicacy and false reticence observed in such matters must now give way and a mission should be started in right earnest to preach to young men and boys individually and wherever needed, the appalling nature of the evil and the prophylactic to wean them from it. All the best qualities of man—bravery, independence, patriotism, and in fact every quality that goes to the building up of perfect manhood—are founded on the basis of sex and it goes with ut saying that any weakening of that foundation will surely be followed by a corresponding weakness in his physical structure if not its premature collapse. First and foremost should be placed the

Our religious bodies have a duty in this respect which they cannot shirk; for it is religion alone that can effectively wean young men from all sexual aberrations. During the trying period of adolescence youths always hanker after excitements and if they could be guided to seek it in worthy and noble objects they will not be tempted to seek it in the baser forms. Every glow of religious fervour, every act of noble self-denial in the cause of religion or country, to which impressionable youth is readily susceptible, will weaken the potentiality of all low desires. The Saiva Paripalana Sabai or the Saiva Educational Sabai which are doing and have done immense good to the country in the field of religion and morality should take up this work too, and engage the services of some educated pious men of undoubted purity of life to help them in this work. The Y. M. C. As, in England and America have an organization to cope with this evil and are doing immense good to their respective countries. To preach to our young men a right knowledge of the Hrahmacharya Dharma with its vows of celibacy and parity in thoughts, words and deeds, is certainly a religious duty, the performance of which should reward the agents with untold merit and be the means of securing the grace of the Lord. It is the negligence of our Dharmas graciously laid down by the old Rishis of transcendental knowledge and experience, for the proper guidance of humanity, that has brought about our downfall; and it can only be by returning to the old path adhering strictly to its spirit though not to the letter, that we can ever hope to regain our lost position.

Besides the one mentioned above there are other causes that contribute to physical degeneracy. Absence of suitable provisions for physical exercise in most of our Schools and Colleges is another cause. Parents as well as teachers should here co-operate, and the educational authorities may well compel students to pass an annual physical test just as they are required to pass the intellectual, before they qualify themselves to earn a grant. A register may be kept in all educational institutions where the physical development of each pupil ascertained by proper medical examination may be recorded quarterly, defects noted and the attention of parents drawn to them, so that timely precautions may be taken to check or eradicate the cause. Such a system is followed in many European countries and we may well follow their example in this respect.

### THE NEW LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ORDINANCE,

The following is an epitome of the principal pro-visions of the Ordinance:—

visions of the Ordinance:—

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This Ordinance is intended to give effect to Royal Instructions for creating electrates and for the admission of elected members to seats in the Legislative Council.

Fravision is made for the election of members to represent four electorates, which are respectively named:—

- (a) The Europe n Electorate (Urban.)
  (b) The European Electorate
- The European Electorate (Rural.)
  The Ceylonese Electorate, and
- (d) The Burgher Electorate.

(a) The Burgner Electorate.

As regards the European (Urban) Electorate, the Municipal towns of Colombo, Kandy, and Galle are declared to be electoral districts, th Government Agents of the respective Provinces to which these towns belong being made the registering officers for the districts.

officers for the districts.

As regards the European (Rural) Electorates and the Ceylonese and Burgher Electorates, each revenue district of the Island is declared to be an electoral district, the Government Agents and Assistant Government Agents of the respective districts being made the registering officers for the different districts. In the case of the Burgher Electorate, a person to be appointed by Governor will be the registering officer, and he will act with the assistance of an advisory board composed of not more than three persons, also to be nominated by the Governor.

Provisions is made for the preparation, publica-tion, and revision of registers of persons entitled to vote for the election of members to represent the several electorates, and for the appointment, respectively, of returning and revising officers.

(d) Has been adjudged by a competent court to be of unsound mind.

No person who is in the permanent employment of Government or who is serving the Government for a term of years shall be entitled to have his name on any register of voters relating to the European (urban) or the (rural) electorate.

The following persons shall not be deemed to be in the employment of Government, namely:

Persons in the employment of Municipal Councils, Local Boards, the Board of Health and Improvement of Nuwara Eliys, Sanitary Boards and Boards of Health, Provincial and District Road Committees and Village Com-

ittees; Crown proctors; Crown advocates not being Crown Counsel. Crown advocates not being qualified to be Where any person, being qualified to be registered as a voter for the Burgher electorate under section 14 (b) and also for the Ceylonese electorethe as applied to have his name entered on the register relating to one of such electorates, or has suffered his name to be entered in such register without objections. tion, he shall be deemed to have made his choice in favour of such electorate, and shall thereafter be deburred from being registered as a voter for the other electorate.

EUROPEAN VOTERS FOR URBAN ELECTORATE

Any person of European descent, not otherwise disqualified, shall be qualified to have his name entered on the register of voters for the European (urban) electorate, if he—

(a) Is resident within the Municipal limits of Colombo, Kandy, or Galle; and.

(b) Has on the first day of January of the year in which the register of voters for the time being in operation is published, been resident in Ceylon for a period of three years, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to three years; and

(a) Possesses an annual income, or receives an annual salary, of not less than one thousand five hundred rupees.

EUROPEAN VOTERS FOR THE BURAL ELECTORATE

Any person of European descent, not otherwise disqualified, shall be qualified to have his name entered in the register of voters for the European (rural) electorate if he—

(a) Resides in Caylon outside the Municipal limits of Colombo, Kandy, or Galle; and

(b) Possesses the qualifications mentioned sub-heads (b) and (c) of the last preceding

QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS FOR BURGHER ELECTORATE.

All persons, not otherwise disqualified, shall be qualified to have their names entered on the register of voters for the election of a member for the Burgher electorate if they—

(a) Are the descendants in the male line of Europeans who, on or before the fifteenth day of February, 1796, were in the service or under the rule of the Dutch East India Company in Ceylon, or if they are descended from any such descendant in the female line by marriage with a European; or

(a) Are of legitimate birth, and are des-cended in the female line from any such des-cendant as aforesaid, and claim to be entered on the Burgher register, are able to read, write and speak the English language.

#### THE CEYLONESE ELECTORATE.

Any person, not otherwise disqualified, shall be qualified to have his name inserted on the register of voters for the Ceylonese electorate, if he—

(i.) Was born in Caylon, or if either of his parants was born in Caylon; and
(ii.) Is not qualified to be registered as a voter for either of the European electorates or for the Burgher electorate. And if he also possesses any of the following qualifications, namely, if he—

(a) Is a barrister or advocate; or

Is a proctor of the Supreme or District Courts; or

(c) Is a notary authorized by warrant to practise in the English language; or

(d) Is a registered medical practitioner;

(c) Is a licensed surveyor, or

(c) Is a licensed surveyor, or

(f) Is an engineer who has been employed as such in the public service of the Island, or is a member of the English or Irish Institutions of Civil Engineers, or is an Associate Member of the English Institution of Civil Engineers, or holds any qualifications which is accepted by the Institution of Civil Engineers in lieu of examination for Associate Membership, or holds a diploma in Civil Engineering issued by any English, Irish. Scotch, or Indian University, or has served under Articles of Indenture, and for a period of not less than three years a Member or Associate Member of the Institution of Civil Engineers, England or Ireland; or

(y) Is or has been a member of a Municip-

(g) Is or has been a member of a Municipal Council or Local Board in Ceylon; or

(h) Is a commissioned officer on the active or retired list of any Ceylon Volunteer Corps;

(i) Is a Government pensioner who at the time of his retirement was in receipt of an annual salary of not less than one thousand five hundred rupees; or

(j) Is on the list of persons who are liable to serve as special jurors: or

 $\binom{k}{}$  Is a graduate or undergraduate of any British, Indian, or Colonial University, or

(l) Has passed the Senior Cambridge Local Examination or any other examination which the Governor, by notification in the "Government Gazette", may declare shall, for the purposes of this Ordinance, be accepted as an equivalent for the Senior Cambridge Local Examination.

QUALIFICATIONS OF CANDIDATE FOR MEMBERSHIP OF COUNCIL.

Any person not otherwise disqualified, and who is qualified to be registored and is registered as a voter for any electorate, shall be eligible for election for that electorate. DISQUALIFICATIONS TO BE ELECTED AS A MEMBER.

If such person,

(a) Is under twenty-five years of age; or
(b) Is an uncertificated bankrupt or an undischarged insolvent; or

(c) Has been dismissed from Government prvice; or (d) Has been sentenced by criminal court imprisonment for an offence punishable

with rigorous imprisonment for a term exceed-ing three months, such sentence or order not having been subsequently reversed or remit-ted, or the offender pardoned; or

(c) Has been debarred from practising as a legal or medical practitioner by order of any competent authority; or

Is in the permanent employment of

Provided that in cases (c), (d), and (e) the disqualification may be removed by an order of the Governor in Executive Council on that

behalf.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS—After the registers of voters have been completed the Governor shall fix by notification in the "Government Grazette" a date and a place in Colombo for the election of members for the electorates. Such election shall be by ballot. Each eandidate shall be nominated by a proposer and seconder and separate nomination papers to be attested by a J. P. and to be delivered to the returning officer before one o'clock P. M. of the day of election. If by one o'clock on the day of election the name of only one candidate is daly nominated, the returning officer shall forthwith declare such candidate to be elected and shall report such election to the elected and shall report such election to the Colonial Secretary, who shall publish the fact in the "Government Gazette".

If more candidates than one duly nominated the Returning Officer shall report to the Colonial Secretary the names of the candidates, upon receipt of which report the Governor shall notify the date and place at which a poll shall be taken and appoint a presiding officer to preside at each polling station and supply him with a copy of the register of voters. The poll shall open at 9 A. M. and close at 5 P. M. unless otherwise ordered by the Governor. The ballot box shall be so constructed that the ballot papers can be introduced therein, but not withdrawn therefrom, without the box being unlocked. Before the polling commences the presiding officers shall show those present that the ballot box is empty and lock it and place a seal on it. A ballot paper will then be handed to the voter with an official mark on it, and the voter's name will be called and the number of such elector shall be marked on the counterfoil and a mark put on the register to denote that he has received a ballot paper. The elector shall then retire into a screened room and place the mark X opposite the name of the candidate he prefers and fold the paper in the ballot box. The valuable contributions appearing from time to time in the Tamil issue of the "Hindu Organ" over the well-known initials of Karai M. S., on the above subject, are indeed worthy of being read, swallowed and digested by every Hindu, who has some interest of his country and of his religion. His contributions are not only very interesting to read, but contain some useful practical suggestions, which, if put into practical shape Jaffna will undoubtedly be in an enviable position. In spite of his earnest appeals, he has made more than once in the columns of the "Hindu Organ" the Hindus of Jaffna are still bent on organising and starting societies and schools unconstitutionally and unmethodically. His last article on the management of schools by the Hindus, should engage the attention of not only the Board of Directors of the Jaffna Hindu College, but also of the respective Managers of the schools in the various parts of the Peninsula. The Saiva Paripalana Sabai, the Hindu College and the "Hindu Organ" are the first fruits of the indefatigable and disinterested labours of the Hindus of Jaffua. These were chiefly instrumental in saving a great many of us from being drifted away by the tide of materialism, which was at a time flooding the whole country of Jaffua. If not for these Institutions in Jaffua, we would have been easily enticed by the missionaries and our time-honoured religion will be nowhere to be found. It should therefore be the duty of every Hindu to see these three are placed on a better position before they divert their attention on some other undertakings. There is no doubt great national and religious awakening in Jaffua at present, which is mainly due to the existence of the College and the Organ, but the way how some Hindus start 'schools independent of the Sabai, and manage its affairs individually more with a speculative view is not at all appreciable. In the various centres of Jaffua, schools may be established, the founders may be the local Managers, but they should be affiliated to the Hindu College and the management should be entirely left in the hands of the Directors. Unless we try to work jointly and constitutionally we shall not be able to carry out our object by establishing schools. We have very often seen how schools started single-handed have found their grave prematurely owing to want of unity, or pecuniary help from the local residents. The main point we have in view in writing this, is to have all the undertakings of the Hindus. This will be the easiest way to make unity exist among us, and to carry out successfully all the objects we have in view. We do not at all appreciate the idea of organizing a Ceylon Sava Union, nor are we in sympathy with any other undertakings as we feel the Sabai can be made to answer, all purposes.
