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PRACTICE OF MEDITATION

MEDITATION is the only way for attaining Immortality and eternal bliss. Meditation kills all pains, sufferings and sorrows. Meditation destroys all causes of sorrow. Meditation gives vision of unity. Meditation helps the aspirant to soar high into the realms of eternal bliss, everlasting peace and undying joy. Meditation is a powerful tonic. It is a mental and nervous tonic as well. The holy vibrations penetrate all the cells of the body. The powerful, soothing waves that arise during meditation exercise a benign influence on the mind, nerves organs and cells of the body. The Divine energy flows freely.

Requisites for meditation

You must have a pure mind if you want to realise the Self. Unless the mind is set free and casts away all desires, cravings, worries, delusion, pride, lust, attachment, likes and dislikes, it cannot enter into the domain of Supreme Peace and unalloyed felicity. A glutton or a sen-

sualist, a dullard or a lazy man cannot practise meditation. He who has controlled the tongue and other organs, who has acute acumen, who eats, drinks and sleeps in moderation, who has destroyed selfishness, lust, greed and anger can practise meditation and attain success in Samadhi.

Saguna meditation

Meditation is of two kinds - Saguna (concrete) meditation and Nirguna (abstract) meditation. In concrete meditation the aspirant meditates on God. In abstract meditation he meditates on his own Self.

When you meditate on Lord Siva, in the beginning keep His picture in front of you. Look at it with a steady gaze without winking. Look at all parts of the Lord. Do

this again and again for half an hour. When you feel tired, look steadily at the face for some time. Do this practice for three months. Then close the eyes and mentally visualise the form and rotate the mind on the different parts as you did before. You can associate the attributes of God such as omnipotence, omniscience, purity, perfection, etc. in the course of your meditation. If evil thoughts enter the mind, do not drive them forcibly. Substitute divine thoughts. They will pass away. Be indifferent. Keep quiet. Think of the picture of the Lord, utter the Mantra forcibly. Pray. The evil thoughts will vanish.

Nirguna Meditation.

Meditate upon the following truths: 'I am the All-pervading Immortal Self; I am diseaseless, deathless Soul; I am pure Absolute Consciousness; I am distinct from the body, mind and senses; I am Existence, Knowledge, Bliss Absolute.' Repeat 'OM' mentally during the meditation. This is Nirguna or formless meditation.

General instructions.

Have a separate meditation room under lock and key. Burn incense there. Wash your hands and feet before you enter the room. You should be alone yourself in communion with the Lord. Get up at 4 a. m. and meditate. Have another sitting from 7 to 8 p. m. Sit in front of the Lord's picture in a comfortable posture. Keep the head, neck and trunk in a straight line. Do not lean either forward or backward. Lock the fingers. Never wrestle with the mind. Do not use any violent efforts in concentration. Relax all the muscles and nerves. Relax the brain. Gently think of God. Slowly repeat your Guru Mantra with feeling and meaning. Still the bubbling mind. Silence the thoughts. Make no violent effort to control the mind, but rather allow it to run

The Head of the State— Symbol of a Nations Unity

Dr. Rajendra Prasad, the President of the Republic of India has written a brilliant foreword to an English translation of a work in Tamil.* Though he never read the Ramayana of Kamban in the Tamil original, Dr. Prasad is not ignorant of the story of Rama; he has read with tears and buried himself in the Ramayana of Tulsidas in Hindi and that of Valmiki in Sanskrit.

Rajendra Prasad is just one in the galaxy of leaders of resurgent India who mastered not only their own mother tongues, but also the classical-tongue and drank deep at the fountain of Indian culture. Their claims to leadership is much more than all these. Their recognition and appreciation of the feelings and aspirations of fellow human beings belonging to other linguistic, religious, cultural, racial and political groups, have earned for them an everlasting place in the hearts of people not only in India, but across the oceans, especially where oppressed people struggle for liberation.

No wonder, then, that the loyalty and devotion of the Indians to the Head of the State is true and spontaneous throughout the country, transcending all barriers of language and religion.

APPRECIATION Mr. K. S. Veeravagu

The death of Mr. K. S. Veeravagu Notary Public removes a landmark among the outstanding personalities of Jaffna. He was perhaps one of the last links with the Victorian era and for over half a century the impress of his personality was felt in the social life of Jaffna. Although he avoided limelight and shunned active politics his counsels were frequently sought by the leaders of Jaffna of the past generation such as the late Hon. Mr. Sabapathy and the late Hon. Mr. Canagaratnam whose close friend he was. He directed his energies more towards social and religious work and even in this sphere he preferred to work unostentatiously. It was characteristic of him that if he once took up a cause he espoused it fearlessly and with sincerity and devotion and would not spare himself until success was achieved. He was associated with the Jaffna Hindu College and the other Hindu educational institutions under the same management for over four decades and was at the time of his death the oldest member of the Board of Directors. Up to the very last he took an active and abiding interest in the welfare and progress of these Colleges.

Mr. Veeravagu will perhaps be best remembered in his professional sphere. As a Notary he had few equals in the whole Peninsula and his services were widely sought after. His outstanding integrity and meticulous care and thoroughness in his professional work earned for him not merely the implicit confidence but also the affectionate regard of a very large clientele. To all of them and their families he was not merely their Notary but their friend and guide to whom they turned confidently for advice and assistance

LEADER OF OPPRESSION

THE break-away of that irrepressible Mr. K. M. P. Rajaratne from the M. E. P., being the first incident of deflection, must necessarily make the ordinary man ponder over the situation in relation to the growth of party system in this country. During the long regime of the U. N. P. there was frequently heard the relayed gossip about *contact men* and their influence on those in power. The M. E. P. administration, however, appears to have been faced with another type of canker—the *coercionist*.

The resignation of the M. P. for Welimada from the post of Parliamentary Secretary and membership of the M. E. P., within the all-too-short space of four months of Mr. Bandaranaike's taking over of power from the U. N. P., confirms the popular view that the Government Party is merely an unhappy combination that has been effected by force of circumstances. Mr. Rajaratne has crossed over to the Opposition but he cannot hope to gain recognition there owing to his die-hard racio-religious fanaticism. But he will begin to operate as the Leader of Oppression which task he ably performed during the demonstration of unrestrained devilry at the Galle Face Green on June 5. He has in Messrs Mettananda and Jayasuriya ardent supporters of anti-Tamil activities.

Now the explanation of Mr. Rajaratne in the House of Representatives and the rejoinder of the Premier require to be analysed in the context of the situation that has been created by the

passing of the 'Sinhala Only' Bill. The former in his accustomed viciousness demands from the Government an assurance that non-Sinhalese political parties shall not be permitted to hold mass meetings or take out processions for that purpose. The determined racial fanatic cannot be more maleficent. On the other hand, Mr. Bandaranaike has taken high ground as the champion of democratic conceptions and has decried Mr. Rajaratne's communalism. But we fail to understand how far the Premier differs from his former supporters in the patriotic duty of denying fundamental rights to a substantial section of the people. Mr. Bandaranaike's act of dethroning Tamil from its rightful place of parity with Sinhalese stands as the most unjust act of violation of democratic rights. Moreover the statement that the Premier has granted permission to the Federal Party to hold its annual meeting and conduct a procession to Trincomalee, only indicates that he has assumed dictatorial powers. Add to this the 'top secrets' that became public during the cross talk between the Premier and his erstwhile follower. Do these events augur well for the common good of the country? The accusations of the kettle and the steaming pot against each other may afford amusement but the campaign of oppression continues to operate unhampered:—What a brand of democracy?

THE JAFFNA GENERAL HOSPITAL

TIME was when the need for accommodation was required more urgently than adequacy of medical staff at the Jaffna General Hospital. After a persistent and prolonged agitation for additional buildings, the necessary extensions have now been completed. But the present complement of medical staff cannot cope with the volume of work at this Hospital. The O. P. D. does not merely function as a registering office where patients are admitted in some order or other. Medical officers have to be in attendance in sufficient strength to enable the admission of patients without undue delay as in many a case late admission had been the cause of unsuccessful medical treatment. The appointment of Receptionists may ease the situation in so far as routine work is concerned. And 'routine' also consumes

Bhoodan As Explained By Vinobha Bhave

Every community has its own special problems. The social discrimination between the so-called 'high' and 'low' has created great illwill and conflict within society. It has become the most difficult of problems in Tamilnad. It is the prime responsibility of the educated, the powerful and the wealthy to end these manmade distinctions. The progress of Tamilnad depends on this. We have got to bridge the gulf between the various communities and groups. Of course, there are some kind of class distinctions in every society. But that is no justification or excuse for allowing such cleavage to continue. It is important to realise that these artificial divisions in a community have blocked our development and progress. All our efforts are failing because of this.

I have often said that an ideal society is like the human body. You know how the various limbs instinctively and naturally function together. Each has a specialised function and yet a prick on the foot is felt by the eye. The body is so well integrated. Every limb is so well adjusted and has such a sympathetic relationship with every other! The same phenomenon is seen in some measure in a family. A child is ill. It is, in a way, a nonentity. It is helpless and dependent. There is no apparent reason why the whole family should be concerned with his illness. But you all know, they do feel worried and anxious. There is something that binds them all together and they feel concerned about one another.

In the same way, I say unto you, that a community can live happily and prosper only if they have real sympathy and fellow-feeling for one another, especially for the lowly and the poor. The community which does not care for its suffering brethren,

is not a living community. Today, in India, there are thousands who are suffering, but their suffering does not seem to touch our hearts. A cord of sympathy is not created. It is not that the people don't feel pity for them, but that pity is passive. They do not know how to put it in action.

A child is ignorant and helpless. It cannot take care of itself. It has to depend on the parents. They look after him. They do not shirk the responsibility, likewise the disabled, the diseased, the poor, the stupid—they cannot take care of themselves. It is the duty of those who are wise, strong and rich to take care of them as the child is cared for in the house. The destitute in the community must be looked after and cared for by society.

If we think of others, we shall not have to worry about ourselves. Community will take care of us. This is the message of Bhoodan. It is an appeal to every one to accept one's social obligations with a fullness of heart.

AMERICAN PUBLIC AND POLICY MAKING

President's Duty to the People

Members of Congress represent districts or states but the President's constituency is the whole nation. People vote for him in every state, but not, strangely enough in Washington. D. C. whose inhabitants do not have the franchise.

The President has a duty to the people as a whole, and it is from this fundamentally, that he draws his power.

The country wants to know what the President is doing and for this reason his actions are widely reported. Indeed, the right of the freedom of the press was written into the Constitution so that the people might be informed, because an informed democracy is a strong democracy.

At regular news conferences the President meets representatives of newspapers, magazines and radio and television stations. This institution both gives him an opportunity to explain his actions and policies to the country and affords newsmen the chance to question him closely. For instance, President Eisenhower has been asked about his Administration's policies on a variety of matters such as the Middle East, desegregation of schools, the situation in Russia or when a dam will be built in a particular locality.

The President also influences public opinion by such means as television and radio speeches and messages to Congress that are widely reported. In these he explains his policies and lays important facts before the public.

Also Presidents generally keep in close touch with public opinion, as shown by mail to the White House, newspaper reports and reports by expert observers. Public opinion may cause a President to drop a policy that arouses too much opposition, or to drive harder to overcome objections to it. An example of an appeal by a President to public opinion is President Eisenhower's statement asking for moderation in the approach to the question of desegregating schools. Similarly he has asked for an increased

amount of economic aid to foreign nations.

To sum up, a President is responsible to, works on and can lead public opinion. He can try to win the public, and through them Congress, over to policies that he believes important.

A President does not just pull a policy out of a hat. He works it out with his advisers and confers about it with leaders of Congress.

His advisers include the members of the Cabinet, heads of Executive Agencies, the White House staff, the National Security Council, the Joint Chiefs of Staff and private citizens. But the ultimate responsibility for policies, actions and decisions is the President's alone.

The Secretaries of the Treasury, State and Defense are particularly important advisers, for the finances of the Government, its foreign relations and its armed forces are three of the most vital fields of Government operation. Also, heads of Agencies, for instance the head of the Atomic Energy Commission, must play an important role in Government.

The President has a large White House staff. They assist him by collecting facts and recommending policies. The White House staff is called the Executive office of the President. An important figure in it is the Assistant to the President. This position is now held by Sherman T. Adams and President Eisenhower relies heavily on him. The White House staff contains specialists on different problems. In addition to its part in working out policy, it handles as much routine work as possible. This keeps a mass of relatively minor decisions on the running of the Executive branch from reaching the President's desk.

The powerful Bureau of the Budget is also part of the Executive Office of the President. The requests for funds that the President sends every year to Congress—the Budget—is prepared by this office. To do this, it works with the Departments and Agencies that are asking for the money. The Bureau of the

Budget also has an important hand in drafting much proposed legislation.

The National Security Council is headed by the President and its job is to advise the President on how to mesh domestic, foreign and military policy so as best to provide for the security of the security of the nation. The Vice President, the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Defense and the Director of the Office of Defence Mobilization are members. The Joint Chiefs of Staff and the Central Intelligence Agency also take part in its meetings. The heads of other Government Agencies are called in when their opinions are wanted. The National Security Council has a special staff to assist it and is said to have greatly grown in importance under President Eisenhower.

The N. S. C. was set up in 1947. In 1950, after the Soviet Union had exploded its first atomic bomb, the N. S. C. drafted a program for rearmament in the United States, for increased taxes and increased military and economic aid to our allies. This program became the basis of the Truman Administration's policy for national security.

The National Security Council works in secret, but the broad outlines of the policies that are produced by its operations are presented to Congress and the public by the Administration.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff, the top planning body for the Armed Services, advise the President on military matters.

Presidents also call on outstanding leaders in business, labor, agriculture and other fields and on trusted personal friends for advice.

Our system of government though it stakes out different fields for Congress and the President can work only when there is give-and-take between President and Congress. Leaders of Congress confer with the President and advise him of the feelings of Congress on important issues. Various Senators and Congressmen act as spokesmen for the Administration in pressing for bills that the Administration wants passed. Also the White House staff includes persons whose job it is to keep in touch with Congress and explain Administration policies to Senators and Representatives.

You will enter into Nirvikalpa Samadhi or the Super-conscious state quickly. Read good, inspiring religious books. Observe silence for two hours daily. Give up talkies,

INADEQUACY OF MEDICAL STAFF

At The Jaffna General Hospital

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL URGES FOR ADEQUATE PROVISION

At the monthly meeting of the Jaffna Municipal Council held last week, Mr. C. Muttutamby, M. M. C., moved a series of motions deploring the unsatisfactory state of affairs at the Jaffna Civil Hospital owing to the utter inadequacy of qualified medical staff and calling upon the authorities to make immediate provision for an adequate, efficient and competent staff to cope with the volume of work particularly at the Out Patient Department.

Mr. Muttutamby also urged for the provision of Receptionists in order to relieve the congestion of work of medical officers.

The motions were passed unanimously.

Mr. S. S. Navaratnam, the Mayor of Jaffna presided.

(i) "At the Outpatient Department of the General Hospital, Jaffna an average of 800 patients call for medical treatment daily. There are at present only 3 Medical Officers and one apothecary to attend to these patients. These officers are also required to attend to other routine duties like

(a) Issuing medical certificate, (b) performing minor operations, (c) Antirabies inoculation and reports, (d) quarantine regulation and reports etc.

Although these officers attend to these duties and always overwork to attend on the outpatients yet it is obviously an utter impossibility for the outpatients to even get a semblance of a thorough medical examination and prescription. The staff provided is hopelessly inadequate to cope with such volume of work efficiently and competently. This Council, therefore, requests the Hon the Minister of Health to examine the position and to appoint at least three additional Medical Officers for O. P. D. without any delay.

(ii) For the same reasons described in (i) above, in order

(a) to avoid confusion for want of proper direction, (b) to eliminate loss of time and inconvenience to patients who seek treatment at the O. P. D. in the General Hospital, Jaffna and, (c) above all, with a view to simplifying the burden of the Medical Officers and obtaining the

maximum benefits of their expert knowledge,

this Council is of the opinion that Receptionists if appointed can attend with advantage to all the preliminary requirements of patients and Doctors as well. This Council, therefore, resolves that in its opinion the appointment of one or more receptionists—especially in the absence of an adequate number of qualified doctors—is an immediate necessity and requests the Hon. the Minister of Health to appoint such receptionists for the Jaffna General Hospital without delay.

"In the entire Northern Province except the Jaffna General Hospital there is not a single private or Government Eye Clinic with a qualified Eye Specialist in charge, whereas there are several in Colombo and Kandy. Colombo and Kandy Eye Clinics are far away from the Northern Province and are not within easy approach to the average person from the North. At the Jaffna General Hospital there is an average attendance of 175 patients per day. It is, therefore, an utter impossibility for the Eye Specialist at this Hospital to examine each and every patient thoroughly and to satisfactorily complete his indoor and outdoor work, daily. There are also a class of patients who cannot afford the time to wait at a queue at the clinic for hours together but who are prepared to and can afford private consultation and treatment. It is a severe and annoying hardship for this section of the public to learn that the Eye Specialist now attached to the Jaffna General Hospital declines private treatment because he is not permitted by the Government to undertake private work.

This Council, therefore, requests the Hon. the Minister for Health to authorise the Eye Specialist attached to the Jaffna General Hospital to undertake private work outside hospital hours as was done in the case of his immediate predecessor Dr. P. Sivasubramaniam, F. R. C. S. (London)."

"The advertisement by-laws of this Council which are now being implemented are causing much discontentment, hardship and heartburning amongst the ratepayers who are affected by these by-laws. The by-laws appear to be copied direct from some other Local Body and do not suit local conditions and requirements. This Council, therefore, resolves and directs the Municipal Commissioner.

(a) to forthwith suspend the implementation of these by-laws especially the recovery of any fees and.

A letter from a person complains that some Harijans in the villages steal the crop from the fields of their masters. I asked him if the Harijans had their own land I was told that they had none. I said "Give them land and then tell them that they should not steal" You will find that this will have a tremendous effect on them. It is only the misers who create the thieves. Our religion insists on non thieving and also enjoins non-possession. Possession with some creates the tendency of thieving among others. The Shastras have said that the king, fire, thieves

and mice have a right to help themselves from the accumulated wealth of the rich. If there is no possessiveness there will be no thieving.

If I am a judge I will not sentence a thief brought before me with imprisonment for 2 or 3 years. Instead, after careful examination of his life I will give him 2 or 3 acres of land and ask him to make a living for himself and his family by cultivating the land.

But what happens today? The thief is simply sent to a prison where he is sure of two square meals and good rest everyday. In fact his wife and children who have nothing to eat, starve at home and are punished and not the thief. By putting him in prison we only encourage the art of thieving. Thus justice defeats itself.

With the advent of the British rule all talents were drained out of the villages. In olden days there were hundreds of Sanyasins godly men who carried education to the doors of every cottage in the villages. We want to revive this order of walking teachers. Bhoodan is now attempting to revive this old tradition. The new era of Bhakti is dawning and I am sure that all distinctions of birth, caste and wealth will vanish soon.
