#### MAHA SIVARATERI.

MAHA SIVARATHRI.

Sivarathri vigil is by far the most important among the religious observances connected with the worship of Siva. It is said that, at the end of a Kalpa or world cycle, the visible world became merged in the Infinite and there was darkness everywhere. At that time Sakti, the Mother of the Universe offering pupals to the Lord in the form of Sivalingam effected the removal of darkness thereby causing again the manifestation of the visible universe. Creation once more began and Umadevi obtained a boon from the Lord to the effect that the period of darkness during which She offered Her prayers to the Lord should be called Sivarathri and that the devotees who strictly observe vigil and fast and offer pupals during the four watches of this sacred night should be rewarded with eternal bliss.

Another version is that, at the end of Selac when Wishan was annealed.

Another version is that, at the end of Kalpa, when Vishnu was reposing in superconscious state, Brahma approached him and wanted to know who he was. Vishna retorted and put back the same question to Brahma Brahma replied that he was the Creator. Thereupon Vishnu smiled and said that since Brahma appeared from his navel and since he (Vishnu) was the preserver of the whole universe he was entitled to be called the Supreme. In this way there raged for a long time a great battle between these two gods. Finally Siva appeared in the form of a Flame of Light and announced that either of them succeeding in discovering either the top or the bottom of that Flame was entitled to be called the Supreme Hearing this Vishou took the form of a boar and started boring through the earth to discover the bottom of the Flame; while, Brahma took the form of a swan and began to soar high with the hearth of the supreme high with the hearth of the soar high with the soar high with the hearth of the soar high with the soar high was a soa the form of a boar and started boring through the earth to discover the bottom of the Flame; while, Brahma took the form of a swan and began to soar high with the hope of finding out the top of the Flame. Their quest was unsuccessful and on their return, thoroughly discomfitted and crestfaller, the Flame changed into the form of a Sivalingam. That was the time of the origin of Sivalinga-worship and it is said to have happened at midnight on the fourteenth day after the full-moon in the month of Masi. At the request of Brahma and Vishnu the Lord decreed that all homan beings who, with due reverence and piety adore Siva, keep vigil, and fast on Sivarathri should be rewarded with Makti.

Watchnights or nights of vigil in bonom of Siva are of five kinds, namely, vigil observed regularly, vigil once in a menth, vigil during the waning period of the moon, Yoga Sivarathri or vigil on Monday nights, and Maha Sivarathri. Regular Sivarathri is the vigil observed on the fourteenth night after the full moon, generally the right previous to the new moon or fell moon. Lunar vigil is that observed on the fourteenth night after the full moon, generally the right previous to the new moon or fell moon. period is that observed during the month of January by taking only one meal a day for thirteen days consecutively after the fullmoon and fasting the whole of the fourteenth day. Maha Sivarathri falls on the fourteenth day after the full moon during the month of Masi.

Total abstinence from food, drink, and sleep is enjoined on all who observe Sivarathri. Those who observe Sivarathri. Those who observe Sivarathri may have a twofold object in view. It might be considered as the performance of a duty to God for the sake of others or it might be considered as a topasya, that is, penance for overcoming one's own Karma. Observing Sivarathri at a Sivan temple is very advantageous because there, the facilities for worship are many. Even for those who cannot keep vigil, it is considered sufficient if they keep vigil till past midnight, the time at which Sivalingam appeared for the first time, before Brahma and Vishuu.

The Shastras lay down many roles for regulating the conduct of the devotee during the period of vigil. Reading or listening to those reading the sacred books during the nights is productive of the highest good. Separate juices and liquids are to be used for Abhishekams and separate fruits and food offerings are to be made for each watch of the night. It is said that by observing the Sivarathri Brahma became the Creater, Vishuu the Preserver, Indra the lord of heaven and Kubera the lord of wealth. The Poranas are simply full of stories of human beings, who, though they were great sinces, yet attained liberation by observing vigil and fast on Sivarathri.

It simply means that the man who took one bottle last year takes two bottles this year and so long as taverus exist, there will also exist illioit sales because the figures indicating the increase are those relating to arrack sold in the taverus in as much as no one could estimate the quantities sold illicity. It is therefore reasonable to supp se that the taverus are the supply stores for illicit arrack also. Moreover detection now the taverns are the supply stores for illicit arrack also. Moreover detection now may not be possible because the attention of Police and Excise Officers is more or less centred on taverns. If they are freed from this work, then they will be quite free to do detection work which is the sort of work proper to them. Therefore we believe that the only way of putting a stop to all illicit sales is by total prohibition and the closing down of all available sources such as liquer shops and taverns.
