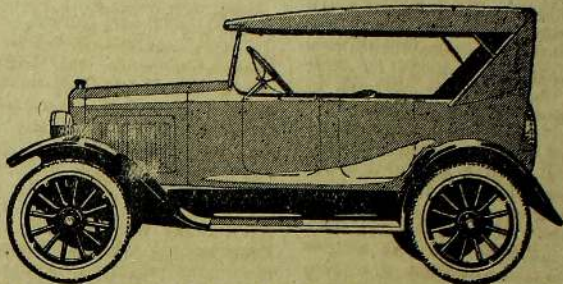

HOW THEY EXPLOIT.

THE HON. MR. S. RAJARATNAM'S LETTER re the Anti-Hindu activities of some of the members of the Committee of the North Ceylon Educational Association brings to our notice a very glaring instance of how certain Protestant Missionaries and their faithful followers, the native Protestant Christians, have been, and are exploiting educational institutions and educational organisations for their own purposes. In their attempt to achieve their ends, they will not fail to adopt the most questionable methods and to descend low even, if we might be permitted to use such a term, if that was found necessary. That Hindus, who have been all along giving them their most cordial support, should have been singled out for their malicious attack, shows how gratitude even is at a discount with those who are misguided by religious fanaticism. The doings of Messrs Peto, Channugam, and others of their camp are eye-openers and the only saving grace is that their arbitrary actions are not morally supported by some of the most enlightened among Christians even. It is really men of the type of Messrs Peto and Channugam that are really responsible for the so-called cleavage between the Hindu and Christian communities in Jaffna, which have all along lived in peace and amity and worked for the common good. The time has come for liberal minded leaders of both communities to make a distinction between this class of people and the rest and so avoid, in future, a line of policy, which is bound to set back the hands of progress a century behind. Plain speaking is sometimes very necessary and Mr. Rajaratnam's letter shows beyond doubt which way the wind blows and who have to shed crocodile tears and pose as the "injured innocent".

Men with vested interests are always troublesome. Ever since the Board of Education came into being, seats on that Board were being monopolised invariably by Christians. It was Mr. Rajaratnam who brought it to the notice of Government that non-Christian interests were not properly represented on it. Subsequently it so happened that Mr. Rajaratnam himself was given a seat on the Board along with a Buddhist and a Muslim. This was the cause of a series of manoeuvring on the part of Mr. J. K. Channugam and others which resulted in last Tuesday's fracas and which would ultimately perhaps bring about the dissolution of the North Ceylon Educational Association. It is easy to deal with people who put up a clean fight but it goes against one's grain to have anything to do with people who adopt questionable tactics.

Mr. Channugam's tactics, if anything, are most high handed and arbitrary. While Mr. Rajaratnam, one of the Vice-Presidents of the North Ceylon Educational Association, has a seat on the Board of Education, Mr. J. K. Channugam, the Honorary Secretary of the Association, on his own initiative and without letting either the Committee or Mr. Rajaratnam know anything about it, starts secret negotiations with the Education Department, representing matters to the effect that his Association was not represented on the Board of Education, presumably with the object of discrediting or disowning Mr. Rajaratnam and to suggest a Protestant member in his place, as subsequent developments clearly show. Mr. Channugam discovers, all of a sudden, the usefulness of having a Christian majority in the Executive Committee. He creates a record precedence by taking the law into his own hands by not only refusing to show correspondences carried on in the name of the Association to a Vice President of the Association but also by insulting the Vice-Presidents by filling, with the help of his Protestant majority, the office of President, which had temporarily fallen vacant, from outside the Committee.

Having tasted of the fruits of questionable practice, Mr. Channugam was emboldened by the success which had attended his partisan spirit so far, to proceed further and to carry on a campaign of ousting Hindus altogether from the Association. In this undermining work, Mr. Channugam was largely helped by his newly found President and his Protestant majority in Committee. Fully conscious of their power they proceeded to exercise it in the most unlawful manner. Application for membership from prominent Hindu leaders, from Hindu educationists, and from Hindu teachers were rejected with a levity unknown in the history of any association. Mr. Rajaratnam has aptly described it as a Pride's Purge. No better term could suit such an unwarranted action. Even members who were formally elected at one meeting and were principals of Colleges at one time were ejected, on after thought, at a subsequent meeting. Never in the history of any Association have we heard of such illegal and unconstitutional methods as were adopted by Messrs Peto, Channugam and some of their colleagues. It was indeed a revelation. It showed to what extent some Protestant Christians would go if they were allowed to have their own sweet will. As for the Hindus, there is only one course left open to them. They must either mend or end the ways of these men. It is clear that they cannot, if they have any sense of self-respect, co-operate with such an undesirable set of men any longer. At the rate things are managed, the North Ceylon Educational Association will virtually become a Branch of the Christian Council and will eventually lose its representative character, if it has not done so already. To be forewarned is to be forearmed. In our opinion, if matters cannot be set aright, the best course open to the public is to organise a new Association representative of all interests. We, for our part, see no other way out. Our leaders have been insulted. The public has been insulted. Even members of Hindu religious orders have been insulted. Can we tolerate this for a moment?

EDITORIAL NOTE.

Our readers will be glad to note that M. S. E. has come back again and favoured us with his popular "By the way." We are glad to note that our appeal to young Y. M. H. A. men to resuscitate the Y. M. H. A. movement has not fallen on deaf ears and it is but proper that M. S. E., the man who helped so much to organise and conduct the movement, should sound the bugle call once again. The times are propitious. Hand in hand with the Hindu educational movement, there should be an organisation for religious and national propaganda. There cannot be a better organisation for this purpose than a young men's association. We hope our young men will rally round M. S. E. and get themselves busy once more. We hope to see them working before the year is out.

WEATHER.—For a few weeks till last Thursday Jaffna was having heavy dew throughout the nights and scorching sun during the day time. By degrees the North-East Monsoon began to set in and now frequent showers are coming down. At times the rainfall exceeds 2 inches. This morning at the Jaffna Observatory the recorded rainfall is 1.03 inches. The temperature has fallen to 79° and the barometer reads at 29.938".

ANTI HINDU ACTIVITIES EXPOSED.

MR. RAJARATNAM'S CLEAN FIGHT.

The following is a copy of a letter, under date Jaffna 31st October, 1926, addressed by the Hon. Mr. S. Rajaratnam to Mr. J. K. Channugam, the Hon. Secretary of the above Association:—

I am exceedingly sorry that I am forced to write this to you. The situation if I have gauged it correctly seems to be this. Perhaps as a result of my pressing the claim of the Hindus for places on the Board of Education, so that it might represent adequately all the classes of the people of Ceylon, thereby following the recommendations of the Sadler Commission in such cases, I was nominated in the place of Mr. N. Selvadurai. Ever since then, you, the Committee of the Association and the Association itself have taken certain courses of action which resulted in last Tuesday's fiasco.

INJUSTICE I.

FALSE REPRESENTATION.

Although I was one of the Vice-Presidents, you without first consulting the Committee, started correspondence with the Education Department stating that the Association was not represented on the Board, thereby disowning me. Yet I without taking this studied insult fell in with your view for the sake of peace and agreed to three names being submitted by the Association for nomination.

The special general meeting which was held for this purpose when I was away from Jaffna on public duty decided by a Protestant majority to submit three Protestant names. In fairness to all the communities one would have expected the Association to have submitted one Hindu, one Catholic and one Protestant, especially after I had suggested to you previously that one of the names should be that of a Hindu.

INJUSTICE II.

CONCEALING PAPERS.

Desiring to know on what lines your correspondence with the Department had proceeded, I sent my clerk to you with the request that he be allowed to make copies of the same. You allowed the less part of it to be copied, but most arbitrarily declined to show the important part on the ground that without the Committee's sanction you could not show it to me. It is indeed very difficult for one to believe that you who fight so vigorously everywhere for forms and rules did not know that a Vice-President of an Association is entitled to look into the Association's minutes and the Secretary's correspondence on behalf of the Association on all matters. Yet when the matter was brought before the Committee as you requested me not to say anything as to what took place between you and me, I kept quiet, and the Committee decided that not only the Vice-President but also every member of the Committee was entitled to have access to the minutes and all correspondence. Then you were good enough to let me have the correspondence which showed very clearly why you kept it back from me.

INJUSTICE III.

VICE PRESIDENTS IGNORED.

The immediate cause of the present situation arose thus. By one of the rules any vacancy in the Committee has to be filled up by the Committee. The President having left for America, we were having the meetings for nearly three months with one of the Vice-Presidents in the Chair. Yet you found it necessary to convene a Committee meeting to elect a President till the next Annual General meeting which has to come off within two or three weeks. At the Committee meeting confident of your Protestant majority, you insisted on proposing the name of Mr. Peto as President, although he was not even a member of the Committee. It was then urged by some members that the usual practice in cases of interim appointments is to elect one of the Vice-Presidents as the President till the next annual meeting. You would not listen to my appeal or to that of Rev. Mr. Cash to allow the Senior Vice-President to act as President although he happens to be a distinguished graduate with double Honours and a Manager of many important English and Tamil schools, not to speak of his position to-day in the public life of Ceylon. You justified your course of action by saying that you wanted an "Educationist" as President for even these 26 days. I fail to understand the force of your argument.

INJUSTICE IV.
PUBLIC INSULTED.

At the same Committee meeting about 39 new members were elected. But the Committee, at a subsequent meeting, under the Chairmanship of your "Educationalist" President declared them "not duly elected" on the ground that there were no written applications and thus insulted them by asking them not directly but through 3 Committee members, to apply again. On the same day this Committee rejected without reason the applications of thirty to forty leading Hindu Advocates and Proctors of Jaffna, interested in Education, although it knew that the Association has always contained lawyers not connected with any educational institution, as its members. If what one of the Committee members is reported to have said in explanation of his conduct viz "If these lawyers are elected why not all the latrine coolies" is true, it shows what your Committee thinks of some of our best men.

INJUSTICE V.
PRIDE'S PURGE.

This is not all. At the Committee meeting held immediately before the General Meeting a disciplined band of Protestant members, with the exception of two or three, rejected most of the uncertificated teachers of Hindu Schools though many, if not all, of the uncertificated teachers of Mission Schools were elected members, as your President stated for "private reasons" and not on any principles. Thus your Committee was bent upon excluding from the Association a number of gentlemen actively engaged in educational work because they happened to be Hindus. This Pride's Purge did make me sick of the Committee.

At the same meeting I urged the Committee to revise its decision with regard to the rejected lawyers and the 39 members whose election was cancelled at the previous meeting. But your President ruled out that one Committee meeting could not reconsider its previous decision, although it had done so on previous occasions. It was pointed out at the meeting that Rev. Father Matthews and many others had been elected members in the past without any written application and therefore there were precedents for the election of members when applications were made through others. It would not listen to any reason at all. It went so far as to oppose the election of His Holiness Swami Vipulanada as a member because there was no written application from him. It was however pointed out by Mr. J. V. Chelliah the former Secretary that the Swami was already a member of the Association, and his name had been omitted from the revised list of members he made as the Swami was away in Madras at that time. When a motion was brought forward for the restoration of his name it was opposed by yourself and the President and some others and it was with the greatest reluctance that your Committee was forced to accept the motion. This more than anything else shows the spirit which actuated you, Mr. Peto and some others in conducting the meetings of the Committee.

INJUSTICE VI.
RIGHTS DENIED EVEN TO MEMBERS.

When a motion was brought forward in the committee meeting for the adjournment of the general meeting after due explanation to it on the ground that there was no properly prepared list of all members which could be done only after receiving subscriptions and that due notice was not given to all the members elected at the Committee meeting—over 200 in number—it was opposed by you and your President and it was defeated by the vote of your packed majority although Mr. J. V. Chelliah pleaded for the passing of it. These irregularities as well as my failure in the Committee to have justice done to my lawyer friends and others who applied for membership led me to try for an adjournment in the open meeting of the Association. I am glad that the adjournment motion was carried by a majority in the teeth of the opposition of your President and a few others.

I should like to know whether the Committee of the Association is prepared to make the necessary amends for the irregularities and to elect my lawyer friends and other Hindu applicants for membership in accordance with your rule that all teachers, Managers and others interested in Education are eligible as members. If not they will be responsible for the consequences of their misguided action.

In view of an inaccurate version of the proceedings of the general meeting having appeared in some of our papers I am sending this to the press so that the public may know the real facts.

BY THE WAY.

It is never too late to mend. The last few years of apparent indolence were really years of watchful concentration. The Young Men's Movement is not dead. It can never die. It will seek, as it did in the past, new channels of expression, and new foundations of its exuberant energies. The insistent impulsion of youth—its prerogative—to pour of its best into the forces that mould the future of the world cannot long be repressed, where the vent for the surging feeling to outpour itself is wanting, there youth, withdrawing itself from the heart of the world, lives in the seclusion of its own dreams and gradually drapes itself in the dignified robes of indifference and dull inertia. Fortunately for us, we have a thousand openings for service and self-discipline. In our own village there is work enough for a lifetime. In the field of religion the scope for work is ever widening. Workers of every description are wanted to re-vitalise the old institutions which have been handed down to us for safe-custody. The message of the spirit has to be breathed into the ideals of our age-long Dharma. The temperament of the nation needs to be purified by the elimination of adverse and oppressive forces which seek to disrupt and dismember the social and religious fabric in the security of which we felt ourselves immune from danger. The dark forces are coming to grips with the forces of light and the conflict is begun. The conflict threatens to be a long drawn life and death struggle. It will, however, give us a few sound lessons, on organisation and team work which we so sorely needed. Have we not had one such lesson already? The morrow is full of adventure for us. Let us gird up our loins and offer a united front. There is joy in conflict and thus alone we could seek our own adjustment. Soft words and compromises and pacts stave off the evil day awhile and the inner masculine nature languishes and perishes in a shroud of self-deception.

Our leaders are doing their bit for us. Should we not shout "Hurrah" and offer them our good wishes? Is it not a privilege for us to shoulder their gun as they light a cheroot? What a joy to run on errands for them! They need no demonstrations to keep up their spirits unflagged. We cannot deny ourselves the secret delight of consciously co-operating with them. It is not after all much they ask of us. Recognise in active sympathy, they say. We are prepared, anyone of us to do so. Passive sympathy is a pleasurable feeling which for want of nourishment consumes itself. Active work unlocks the dam and the perennial flood of joyous service, rushes into every nook and corner, and gives new life and new light. The time is opportune to re-organise the Y. M. H. A. in every village in Tamilakam. I know the response to my invitation will be generous. I have done and suffered many things but I have not lost the confidence of Hindu young men. They know their servant could still be trusted to work for them. A hundred thousand hearts will throb in unison and the spirit which produces the hearts of the young as well as the old will bless our venture. Having in all humiliation sought the Blessings of Ishwara let us set about to chalk out our plan of campaign. More anon.
