

JAFFNA IN SALIVAHANA SAAPATHA 1849.

ADCHAYA ANDU WHICH THE FORULAR mand had associated with dire calamities has now nearly passed. There is nothing in Astrology which justifies the glocmy forebodings of season prophets in respect of this year. It has been nothing worse or better than any other year.

Today we are on the eve of the end not merely of the Adchaya Andu but of the cycle of sixty years. On the thirteenth of April, a new cycle commences. During the past cycle Juffua has witnessed great charges in every department of life. A review of the important events of this period is a vast surject and we propose to deal withfit in a subsequent issue.

In this issue we confine ourselves to the review of the important events that took place in the year that is now passing. The Hindu community has made good progress in every direction during the year. Nowhere is this progress more marked than in the field of education. The Hindu Board of Education has maintained its usual reputation for vigorous work. The number of schools under the management of the Board has increased from 23 to 33 doring the year. The number of children receiving instructions in schools under the Board has risen from 2250 to over 4000. In the matter of English education there are been a distinct movement among the Hindu public to send their children wherever possible to Hindu schools and colleges. Since January there has been a large in flox of students from non-Hindu schools to Hindu achools. As days pass by, we are sure, this movement will gather strength and force and every Hindu parent will realise the supreme necessity of educating his children in Hindu schools. The Jaffea Hindu College has been fortunate enough in securing the services of Mr. W.A. Troop as Prizeireme necessity of educating his children in Hindu schools. The Jaffea Hindu College has been fortunate enough in securing the services of Mr. W. A. Troop as Principal in place of Mr. N. Selvadurai who retired in last April. Mr. Troup's reputation as a great teacher and disciplinarian has preceded him in Jaffea. The fact that the number of pupils on the roll and their average attendance have both considerably increased since he took charge of the administration of the College, has justified the choice made by the Board of Directors. The Education Commission, which is appointed to pursuance of amotion throught in the Legislative Council by the Hoa Mr. A Canagaratnam, and whose report is awaited with great interest is sure to recommend important changes in the policy of the Government in respect of Vernacular and Oriental concation in English schools. The opening of the Hindu Women's Training School at Chunnakem for the building of which the Government gave the Hon. Sir P. Himanathan a grant of Rs. 32,000 took place in the same year. The difficulty of obtaining qualified lady teachers for Hindu schools has been a great hindrance for the progress of the education of Hindu girls. The training classes. The poor Hindu girls who desire to become teachers have to submit to Christian beptism before they are allowed to join the training classes in the Mission schools. The establishment of the Training School for girls at Chunnakam

will not only kelp the Hindu managers in obtaining qual fied lady teachers for their schools but it is since to limit the apportunities of proselytising Hiodu girls by Christian Missions. The opening of the Ramakrishna Mission Home for boys at Vannarpannal by Swami Vipulananda supplies a long felt want of the Hindu community. The Ramakrishna Mission has established similar homes in different parts of India and has managed them with success. We hope that this Home too would follow the lines of work adopted in other Ramakrishna Mission homes and prove a centre for the strengthening of Hindu influence in the country.

In the field of politics the most notable event of the year is the Village Committee elections under the new Village Committee elections under the new Village Committee ordinance. Under this Ordinance the people of each village or parish are given the option of having elected unofficial Chairman. This is a momentous change in the village government in Ceylon. The extraordinary interest which the people in the village government in the Committee elections confirms the wisdom of the charge. It is a matter for congratulation that many village have taken advantage of the privilege accorded to them by the Ordinance. We can say without any fear of confradiction that the Village Committees with elected un-official Chairmen have proved as efficient as any Committee under ex officio Chairman. Juffica has been lacky enough during the year to have the visit of His Excellency Sir Hugh Clifford. During the week of His Excellency's stay in Juffica he had been able to see things for himself. The untimely departure of His Excellency, who had admirally adapted himself to the spirit of the times and has proved himself a constitutional Governor is regretted by all communities. The cne thing which will keep the memory of his administration green in the minds of the people is the abolition of the pill tax which is a relic of the hard times of the past. A Million-Year Old Discovery. FOSEIL AFE FIND IN INDIA.

FOSSÍL AFE FIND IN INDIA.

Human Arceston Theory.

Great leter st, it is believed, will be evinced in sciennific circles when Dr. Pikgim, of the Geological Survey of India, publishes is the near thure a paper dealing with the discovery of the palate and lower jew of a tossil ape as I'll apur.

According to the "Shatesman," Dr. Pilgrim considers that the fossil ape is possibly a remove ancestor of man, belonging to a period nearly a million years ago, whereas the carliess hitherto obtained has been of a period not more than a quarter of a million years. He considers that a quarter of a million years. He considers that myprobable that smough the fossil apes of India we have the actual human ancestor.

FOINTS OF ISSUE.

Commenting on Dr. Pilgrim's discovery to a "Morning Poss" representative, Dr. Grafton Edica Simith, Professor of Anatomy at University College, London, said:—

"The cablegram refors to an important specimen recently obtained by Dr., Gay E. Pilgrim, the Superintendent of the Geological Survey of India, from the Middle Sivalik Bode in the foothills of the Himalayas, not very far from Delbi. It represents the largest part of a Terriary Anthropoid ape's face that has ever been found. It is nothing like so complete as the Taung's skull found in 1924 in Bechuanstand, which Professor Raymond Drats described, but the deposit in which the latter was embedded is not so carly as she Pilocene, which is the probable geological age of the new fessil.

"The jaw and part of the face that Dr. Pilgrim has just obtained is regarded by him as the fragmens of the Ape "divapithecus," a genus fixed discovered by him in 1911; but other page intologicts are doubtful whener it is justifiable to separate is from the better known fessil ape "Dryopithecus," which occurs in the Miocene and Flicerne deposits both in India and Europe.

AKIN TO MAN.

"When first discovered in France "Dryopithecus" was regarded as a sort of chimpanzee, but it has recently been shown to be more closely akin to man than perhaps any other known age, lying or extinct. My friend, Dr. William D. Mathaw, who has seen the foseil, tells me it is in an unusually good state of preservation. Hence, the discovery of a more complete specimen than had previously been obtained of a possible ancestor of man is a matter of peculiar interest and scientific importance.

"The foseil is at least double the age of Pithecanthropus. Whether it can be regarded as the remains of a direct ancestor of the human family, as Dr. Pilgrim is said to claim, is a matter for further discussion, for which this new specimen will provide important data."
