## THE LATE MR. A. CANAGARATNAM

THE HON. MR. A. CANAGARATNAM whose untimely and sudden death is mourned in Jaffna is one of the outstanding figures in the public life of the Island. Mr. Canagaratnam comes of a distinguished family which has adorned the legal profession and the public life of Jaffna for about half a century. No one can review the history of Jaffna of this period without appreciating the honoured place which his distinguished uncle, Mr. V. Caspillai, holds in the shaping of it and the valuable services which he has rendered to the progress of the Hindu community in particular. Being nurtured and trained at the feet of so great a personality it is no wonder that Mr. Canagaratnam unstintingly spent the best portion of his life for the welfare of his country and rose to the pre-eminent position which he held at the time of his death.

Mr. Canagaratnam was born in 1871, eight years before the death of Sri La. Sri Arumuga Navalar and seventeen years before the organisation of the Jaffna Saiva Paripalana Sabha. His boyhood and the early part of his youth were passed amidst the surging tide of Hindu awakening which Arumuga Navalar had brought into Jaffna. The mind of this generation could not remain impervious to the yearnings and aspirations which animated the better mind of the Hindu community of the day. Nor did it fail to be impressed by the strenuous struggle which it had been maintaining amidst overwhelming odds against the tyranny of foreign agencies which monopolised the control of educational institutions.

Though forced by circumstances to attend Missionary institutions to receive his early education his sturdy and undaunted spirit refused to submit to the injustice of forcing alien religious observances and instruction on Hindu youths in educational institutions subsidised by public funds. At that time there was no conscience clause to rely on. Nor did the educational authorities grant redress to the grievances of the people when the Missionaries happened to be the accused. Hindu youths who felt the injustice of the situation and who were impatient of the cruel regulations which denied them the right to wear Saiva symbols on the school premises were left for their own scanty resources to find the remedy. Sometimes they argued and resisted the authorities and at other times their indignation found expression in adopting a policy of passive resistance. We are informed by some of the living contemporaries in school of Mr. Canagaratnam that he did not remain a silent spectator. He put heart and soul into the movement and led the revolt against the religious tyranny perpetrated in Missionary institutions. It was not possible for such a young man to continue his education under such cramping conditions. His uncle who supervised his education and training availed Mr. Canagaratnam's further conflicts with the school authorities by sending him to Calcutta so that he might complete his education in the freer and the more elevating educational atmosphere that prevailed in the then metropolis of the Indian Empire.

On Mr. Canagaratnam's return to Jaffna he took to the study of Law as it was then the only opening which afforded scope for the abilities of an independent and patriotic young man. Having completed his legal studies Mr. Canagaratnam joined the profession as a Proctor. He practised his profession for nearly fourteen years. But on finding that the exacting nature of professional duties and engagements only checked and repressed his zeal for public service and afforded little leisure and freedom to contribute his mite to the public weal he gave up the allurements of a lucrative practice and commenced his public career as a journalist. When the "Ceylon Patriot" changed hands he became its proprietor and edited the paper till the time of his death except during his tenure of office as Chairman of the Urban District Council when his cousin Mr. C. Arulambalam discharged the editorial duties. As the Editor of the "Patriot" Mr. Canagaratnam showed considerable study, sound judgment and fearless independence in the handling of public questions.

In 1921 a change in the constitution of the Island was effected by introducing the principle of territorial election instead of nomination of Members on communal basis. Northern Province was given a single seat and the entire Province was constituted into an Electoral area. The friends and admirers of Mr. Canagaratnam who had watched the ability with which he handled public questions as a journalist invited him to stand for the seat. Though Mr. Canagaratnam was defeated in the contest against the Hon. Mr. W. Daraiswamy yet the large and extensive support which he had received throughout the Province constituted a striking testimony that he was very popular among the people and that they appreciated his services as a journalist and public man.

Though deprived in his first essay of the opportunity of serving his countrymen in the Legislative Council other fields were open to him for the exercise of his undoubted talents. On the establishment of the Urban District Council for the Jaffna Town area Mr. Canagaratnam was returned unopposed for Ward No. 4 and was elected its first Chairman. Mr. Canagaratnam's tenure of office was marked by considerable improvement in every department of the activities of the Council. If the Jaffna Urban Council has maintained a high reputation for efficient administration and if it has escaped from many a pitfall to which such infant institutions are generally exposed and into which some institutions of its class have occasionally fallen in other places it is due to the tact, ability, foresight and administrative capacity of Mr. Canagaratnam.

By the Order-in-Council of 1924 the Northern Province was given five territorial seats. Mr. Canagaratnam contested and won the Council seat of the Southern Division as against such a veteran as the late Sir A. Kanagasabai. The qualities which distinguished Mr. Canagaratnam as a journalist characterised him in the handling of public questions in the Legislative Council. As pointed out by our contemporary the *Ceylon Morning Leader* "he (Mr. Canagaratnam) showed great understanding of public affairs and a willingness to look at questions from a point of view which took in the general well-being of the country. He was singularly free from the taint of parochial outlook."

The sudden termination of a life so useful and so crowded with achievements is indeed a very great loss. It brings home more than anything else the transitoriness and uncertainty of human life. It only vividly illustrates the truth of the saying of St. Thiruvalluvar referred to by his colleagues and friend, the Hon. Mr. Daraiswamy, in his reference at the Jaffna District Court to Mr. Canagaratnam's career:

## LOCAL & GENERAL

**WEATHER:**—There is a very hard blowing of the South-west wind. A refreshing shower at this time will be very opportune.

**KING'S BIRTHDAY:**—The sixty-fourth birthday anniversary of His Majesty King George V. will be celebrated throughout the length and breadth of the British Empire today (Monday). Owing to his illness His Majesty may not be quite fit to partake personally in the celebrations. In Jaffna the celebrations will be carried out in a grand scale. A strong and representative committee having as Chairman Mr. R. Sivagnanathan, Chairman, U. D. C., will be in charge of the celebration. Feeding and distribution of rice to the poor, the sick, and the maimed will be the chief event of the day. Inter-collegiate sports will take place in the Esplanade. Meetings will be held in several centres. The day is a Public, Bank, and School Holiday.

**VAN: VEREMAKALI AMMAL TEMPLE:**—The annual festival at this temple falls on the 4th day of July next and not on the 4th of June as mentioned in the columns of the "Hindu Organ" of the 30th ultimo. From this year onwards the festival will be continued for a period of 18 days owing to the enshrinement of the Image of Sri Supramaniaperumal, which event occurred a few days back. Last year the duration of the festival was for a period of 15 days only.

**JAFFNA OWNED BUILDING:**—A building at Old Market Square, Kuala Lumpur, probably the best and busiest place in the whole of the Federated Malay States has been purchased by the Jaffna Co-operative Society at a price of \$70,000. It brings a monthly rental of nearly \$400. The critics who openly attacked the members of the committee for their dreary and inactive management will be silenced by this action of the Society. The individuals here who are bent on increasing land values in Jaffna can follow the Society's lead with advantage. —Cor.

## More Light on Temple Thefts.

### STOLEN ARTICLES IDENTIFIED

MAGISTRATE "PULLS UP" THE POLICE.

Mr. V. P. Redlich, Police Magistrate, Jaffna, recorded non-summary proceedings on Thursday last in the case in which the Jaffna Police charged Kandiah, alias Subramaniam of Achevely with having horgled the Nallur Kandaswamy Temple and two other temples. Mr. S. D. Tampoe instructed by Mr. R. R. Nalliah prosecuted. The accused was defended by Mr. T. R. Nalliah instructed by Mr. T. C. Rajaretnam.

### AN INTELLIGENT WITNESS.

The first witness called was A. Devanarajan. The witness entered the witness box with his hair decorated with yellow flowers. There was considerable amusement when he entered the Court and some of the members of the Bar remarked that the witness was slightly off his head and was not going to materially help the case. To the surprise of many the witness gave evidence intelligently. Witness stated that he had a large fortune and he was forced to part with it. He was at present a religious devotee. He was known as Vignayagam also. He remembered the day when the accused went and meddled with the till-box. The box was fixed in the Kandaswamy Temple. There was moonlight that night. The incident happened near the building where the Temple Office was kept. The accused came there and pretended he was sleeping. He looked round to see whether he (witness) was sleeping. Then he went up to the till box and began meddling with it. When he (witness) stirred, the accused desisted in his attempts and pretended to sleep. The witness saw four persons coming that way and went and informed them. Those persons were returning after a festival at a temple. There was a Kurukkal from Kantheridai also who formed one of the company. Under cross examination witness said that he and the accused were the only persons who were sleeping there that night.

### OFFERINGS OF VOW ROBBERED.

The next witness was one Sampanthar, aged 30, a trader living at Nallur. He said that he was returning from the Mariamman Temple at Tirunelveli. They were four in all. When they came near the Kandaswamy Temple, Vignayagam went to them and told that a man removed money from the till box. He took them and showed the man. They got hold of him and they found the padlock of the till box opened. There was no money in the till box. He had nothing in his waist. Witness went to see where the accused was sleeping. He found by the side where he placed his head, three cents, a knife and a bunch of keys. He asked the accused to come out with the truth. He admitted that he took only three cents from the till box. One of the keys in the bunch fitted the padlock of the till box. Further search round about the place revealed a money bag under the plank on which the accused was sleeping. Witness took the purse along with the accused and gave him in charge of the Manager of the Temple. The purse was opened by the Manager in their presence and the following articles were found: figure of a dog made of silver, a silver eyelid, the figure of a person, a gold plate and cash eighty-eight cents. The Manager phoned to the Police Sergeant Sabapathy came there. The accused was handcuffed and was searched. He had in his waist a Velayutham (noose). Cross examined witness stated that as soon as the constable came he handcuffed the accused, and after that only the search was made.

### MORE TEMPLE BURGLARIES IDENTIFIED

M. Ramalingam, Ayurvedic Physician, was the next witness. He corroborated with the last witness. Ragnathan Mappanar Mudaliyar, the Manager of the Nallur Kandaswamy Temple gave evidence. Panchadaachra Kurukkal, the officiating priest at Vairava Temple at Tolayai, said that a year ago there occurred a theft in the Temple. He knew the gold plate produced. He identified at the Kumpavishagam ceremony at Colombogam. The inscription was made by his brother. The plate was placed under the feet of the pedestal of the god. The next witness was Sinnathamby Kandiah, the Manager of the Mariamman Kovil at Colombogam. He said that the gold plate produced was the one from his Temple. It was removed on the 8th of last month. He informed the Police about it. The tiles were removed and the burglar had got into the Temple. Aiyathurai Aiyer said that he was the officiating priest of Konamalai Vairava Temple. On the 14th of May his Temple was burgled by removing the tiles. The eyelid produced was presented by Somasundaram Kurukkal. The image of the dog was presented by a person from Colombogam. These were given in fulfilment of vows made to the Temple. Further inquiry was postponed for the 11th of June.

The Magistrate at the end of the case remarked that the productions were not numbered and it was a careless thing that the Police were doing. He ordered Inspector Sourjah to instruct the Court Officer to have the productions ready.

## Letter To The Editor.

HINDU—ROMAN CATHOLIC TENSION.

(Continued from our issue of 27.5.29)

Sir, The Principal of the School (St. Henry's School at Nallay) is very alarmed at the sudden departure of many Hindu students concentrated his attention in finding means and ways to order halt. He being a godly man of resource did not merely trust himself in this hour of difficulty, but apparently asked help from on high. Then he made known to the Hindus of the locality that he was religious without being sectarian, philosophic without being a partisan, and to prove the justness of his bona fide, he would engage more Hindu teachers and teach students to sing "Thovaram" and "Thiruvastakam". To make a long story short he really taught a kind of "Thovaram" to the students in the past also; but the fact remains that no Roman Catholic students were ever converted to Hinduism but vice versa.

During this time there was a meeting arranged to honour a Mr. O. S. Autney, J. P., on his first visit to Jaffna. The Principal and the Roman Catholic Brothers of the school spared no pains to make it a success and at the same time endeavoured to befriend the Hindus, who started to eye the Roman Catholic Brotherhood and their professions with positive distrust. Knowing they appeared to be head and cloudy for a while, but soon became gay and bishosome. Invitations were sent to Hindus of the locality and Hindu students were especially asked to be present. However the general feeling among the Hindus of the locality was that they should refrain from responding to the invitation as a protest of the conversion of the Hindu students, without the consent of the parents. The Hindus regretted very much that the Principal of the school instead of concentrating his undivided attention and energy on matters Educational should devote his talents in furthering the proselytizing campaign.

In order to make the protest felt the Hindu students of the locality had a peaceful and passive demonstration. The musicians who were arranged for the occasion declined to go. The "Pandaram" who was asked to make a garland declined as well. In this hour of trial, it would appear, the Principal's even flow of good spirits had deserted him, and he must have become as dismal as a mourning chicken. For instead of speaking to the Hindu students, he sent for a couple of Policemen. On their arrival a report was made that while a Roman Catholic student was bringing a garland a Hindu student robbed it, or snatched it. The boy was arrested and charged and subsequently released on bail. Legal talents were retained, but the case is said to have been withdrawn. The details of this and the further developments will appear in the next issue.

## His Majesty's Illness.

### SUFFERING FROM FEVERISH ATTACK

LONDON, MAY 30TH.

It is officially announced that His Majesty the King is suffering from a feverish attack, and is confined to his bed. Lord Dawson of Penn has returned from Paris by aeroplane. It is believed that the King contracted a chill while attending a picnic party at Frogmore on May 26th, in celebration of the Queen's birthday, since when His Majesty has not left his room.

### ABCESS ON RIGHT SIDE OF CHEST.

LONDON, MAY 31ST.

A bulletin issued from Windsor Castle signed by three doctors at 1.15 p.m., states:

"The King passed a fair night. An abscess has formed under the site of the old scar on the right side of the chest, and is now being drained. His Majesty's general condition remains good. The King will need to remain in bed, but his Majesty will be able to transact public business."

### STILL FIT FOR WORK.

LONDON, JUNE 1ST.

It is understood that the King's condition is only the result of a local small abscess which is draining naturally without the need of an operation. Though no immediate alarm is felt, in view of the latest phase of the illness, every risk must be avoided, and it may even be considered inadvisable for the King to attend the Thanksgiving Service at Westminster Abbey on June 16th. Apparently there are no fears that the King will be unable to attend to matters arising out of the general election and the appointment of a Government. —"Times Cuttings."

**NEXT BY ELECTION IN THE NORTH:**—Owing to the death of Mr. A. Canagaratnam M.L.C., the Southern Division seat of the Northern Province in the Legislative Council has fallen vacant. It is said that there is a likelihood of Prof. O. Senthalingam, a. a. (Oxop), B. Sc (Lond), Barrister at Law, of the Ceylon University College, standing as a candidate for the above constituency. —Cor.



## A PATRIOT AND A LEADER.

There was a very unusual gathering of all lawyers at the District Court on Thursday last when both the District Judge and the Additional District Judge were seated together side by side on the Bench. Silence and sadness seemed to reign and the Hon. Mr. W. Doraiswamy, Crown Advocate said—

The sad news of the death of the Hon. Mr. A. Canagaratnam was a great shock to them all. He was informed that the death took place at "Kamalakam," at 9 o'clock in the morning. Mr. Canagaratnam was admitted as a Proctor of the Supreme Court in 1899 and from that time onwards he was practicing in Jaffna till 1914, when owing to illness he had to retire. Mr. Canagaratnam was the Proprietor and Editor of "The Ceylon Patriot," a very valuable journal in Ceylon. As a journalist, he was untiring and he worked for the uplift of his country. With the education he received—his early education was at the Central and St. John's Colleges, Jaffna, and Wesley College, Colombo; again he was at the University College, Colombo where he had a very brilliant and successful career—he was doing his work as a journalist very well indeed. He was studying public questions of the day with care and devotion, and with his mature judgment was of very great use to himself, his friends and colleagues in Council, and to his country at large.

## SERVICE TO THE PUBLIC.

Mr. Canagaratnam spent most of his time in doing service to the public. He was the first Chairman of the Jaffna Urban District Council. By unanimous consent he was elected Chairman in 1923 and he occupied that exalted position till owing to the heavy responsibility of state affairs as a Member of the Legislative Council, he had to resign against the wishes of all the members. But, before he left the Urban Council, he had shown that his administration was very sound. The Jaffna Urban Council was a model institution in the Island and was greatly indebted to Mr. Canagaratnam.

## HIS WORK IN COUNCIL.

As a Member of Council, Mr. Canagaratnam was very helpful to his colleagues. He was mainly responsible for the motion for the appointment of the Education Commission. The speaker had taken part in the discussions in committees. The report had been drafted and was being circulated among the Members for personal and remarks. Mr. Canagaratnam had read through the report and made his own comments. It would be very regrettable if he had not done so.

Then Mr. Canagaratnam had served in many committees on the question of unemployment. His work had been very useful. He had a good and comprehensive grasp of things. His loss is unbearable.

## LIFE IS BUT A DREAM

The speaker then quoted the following Tamil saying:—

"உறுதுறை நெருங்கின் நிலையெனும் பெருமை யுடையது இவ்வுலகம்"

The instability and nonpermanence of everything earthly, was urged very strongly by the thoughts that the speaker's friend and colleague, Mr. Canagaratnam was dead.

## MEMBER OF A DISTINGUISHED FAMILY.

Mr. Canagaratnam belonged to a distinguished family in Jaffna. His elder brother was the late Mr. A. Oshiravelu, who was a Crown Proctor & a J.P., U.P.M. He has left behind to bemoan his loss an aged uncle, Mr. V. Oshiravelu, J.P., retired Crown Proctor, and other cousins and nephews of his, practicing as Proctors and Advocates at the Jaffna Bar.

By uttering words expressing regret at the death of Mr. Canagaratnam, the speaker received some consolation and his grief had to some extent been lessened.

The sudden and untimely death was a great shock to them all and removed from their midst a gentleman who would be greatly missed in Ceylon and the speaker wished the Judge to make a minute expressing the great regret of all the members of the Bar.

## An Appeal on behalf of the Jaffna Hindu College.

The public are aware of the noble work that the Jaffna Hindu College has been doing for the last three decades and more. It has served as the focus of national culture in Jaffna and has sent out into the world bright young men imbued with high ideals and noble aspirations. It has, from time to time, been able to adjust itself easily to the requirements of its alumni and the demands of efficiency, and this it has largely done through the support generously accorded to it by patriotic Jaffnese here and elsewhere. The time has now come when it has again to look forward to this support in a wider measure than before.

The spirit that has been roused in our people by this Institution impels them in larger and larger numbers to avail themselves of the cultural benefits offered by it. The result is that the strength of the College has grown and it has also been found necessary to open the Inter Ar's and Science classes of the London University. Signs are not wanting to show that the strength will still further grow and the University classes still further develop. The present accommodation and equipment, however, are far from adequate for our purposes. Commodious lecture halls, well-stocked libraries and up to date laboratories can no longer be regarded as mere luxurious appendages, but should be viewed in the light of absolute and urgent necessities and provided for accordingly. Moreover, the 'creature comforts' of boys have also to be looked after by making provision for enlarged dormitories and easily accessible play grounds. These crying needs of the Institution should not be postponed on the strength of the impetus which mere unaided patriotism gives to those who seek admission to it. It must be noted that the schools and colleges of the working under an extremely severe and of competition, which accident alone has so far prevented from taking an unhealthy turn.

Under the circumstances, it has been considered necessary to issue this appeal to the public, so that they may generously come forward to reinforce patriotism with the sinews of war and enable the College to furnish itself with a complete panoply of arm and march vigorously forth to achieve greater and greater triumphs in its fight with the twin demons of ignorance and vice. The amount required for the objects in view is at present estimated at two lakhs of rupees. It is proposed to collect it by distribution of donation tickets of various denominations ranging from Rs 1/- to Rs. 1000/- each. It is hoped that Old Boys, friends and well wishers of the College will all co-operate to make this scheme a success.
