### AYURVEDIC COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

THE OPENING OF THE AYURVEDIC College of Medicine on the 10th inst. by His Excellency the Governor marks the beginning of a new era for the study and practice of indigenous systems of medicine. For two decades those interested in their progress and development have been pressing in vain on the Government the necessity to give State recognition to them and to take practical steps to place their study and practice on a scientific basis. In 1916 the subject was debated in the Legislative Council and notwithstanding the almost unanimous desire of the Ceylonese representatives the Government remained obdurate. Subsequently nothing was done in this matter until 1925 when the Hon. Mr. K. Balasingham, who has done yeoman service in the cause of Ayurveda and whose name will ever be associated with the establishment of this College, brought the following motion:

"This Council urges the Government either to make provision for the proper training of those who are seeking to qualify themselves to practise the indigenous systems of medicine, or to render adequate assistance, to societies, institutions, and physicians who are prepared to do so, and for this purpose requests Government to appoint a Committee to advise Government as to how effect might best be given to this recommendation."

At this time the Government took a sympathetic attitude and agreed to consider favourably any workable scheme that may be submitted for its consideration. Accordingly the Committee that was appointed published its report recommending the establishment of an Ayurvedic College with a hospital and dispensary attached to it. In 1927 the sympathy of the Government took a practical shape and a sum of Rs. 75,000 was appropriated in the Budget of 1927-28 for that purpose. Again Mr. Balasingham brought a motion for the appointment of a Board for the control and development of the indigenous systems of medicine and to make the necessary arrangements for the early opening of the College. The scheme of studies was agreed upon, a commodious building was rented out, the services of a capable Principal possessing adequate knowledge of both Eastern and Western systems of medicine were secured, and the institution was made ready for the opening. Already on the roll there are 75 students. The course of studies are divided into two parts, theoretical and practical. The theoretical course includes subjects such as physiology, hygiene and anatomy. We are sure that the College which was opened under such happy auspices is bound to be successful and will fulfil a useful function in the national life of the people.

The only organisation which appears to feel nervous about the Ayurvedic College is the local branch of the British Medical Association. There is no reason why this Association should be alarmed regarding this small encouragement given by the Government to a system of medicine on which more than ninety per cent. of the people rely for medical relief. Apart from the admittedly superior efficacy of the Ayurvedic treatment in certain diseases we are sure that if its study and practice should be placed on a scientific basis it will be of invaluable assistance in promoting the health of the people.

Science cannot be regarded as the monopoly of one country or race, nor can one system of medicine claim the exclusive right to appropriate its virtues. It is common to all. It is but right and reasonable that Ayurvedic system which has unfortunately remained stationary for some centuries should make itself abreast of modern progress in the field of medicine and surgery. Therefore we think that the above Association instead of showing any antipathy towards it should welcome its establishment and should co-operate with it for the realization of the common ideals for which both systems stand.

### Hindu Education at Urumparai

#### ACTIVITIES OF THREE SCHOOLS.

##### AN APPEAL.

The strength of the three Hindu schools at Urumparai under the management of the Board of Directors of the Jaffna Hindu College (including the new School, Chandrodaya Vithisalai, established in October last) has considerably increased. There are over 600 pupils in the three schools with five lady teachers on their staff.

The strength of the English School is over 250 and the number of new admissions alone since July last is over 80. It has 14 teachers on the staff (including the two lady assistants).

The Magazine Committee of the School has been publishing regularly for the past one and a half years two fortnightly "The Swan" in English, and, "The Vidya Vinodhini" in Tamil. These contain articles on various subjects contributed by the pupils, and information on the various activities in the School, in addition to local and foreign news of importance. It is the desire of the Committee to publish a monthly Magazine from July next containing some of the contributions of the boys published in the class Newspapers and information on various activities of the three Hindu schools in addition to local news of importance.

It is also proposed to paint in the first issue of the Magazine the names of the old pupils of the School with their present address. Further it is the intention of the Committee to organise an Old Boys' Association and make this monthly a connecting link between the old boys and their *Alma Mater*.

#### Students' Literary Union.

##### ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION.

The fourth anniversary of the Student's Literary Union of Chuliparam, Tholuparam, Moolal and Pannagum was celebrated on Saturday, 8th June, 1929 with great eclat in the Panagum Tamil School. In the afternoon competitive sports were held among the young and energetic members of the Association and national games were played.

A public meeting was held at the School Hall commencing at 6 p. m. with Mr. S. Solvapadasudram B. A., Principal, Victoria College, in the chair. Others accommodated on the platform were Messrs. M. Balasudaram B. A., B. Sc.; S. Natesapillai B. A., B. L.; Principal, Parameshwara College, and Pandit V. S. R. J. Aiyar of the Thiruvaiyala Salva Training School.

The President in an inspiring address in Tamil, exhorted and encouraged the members to cultivate a spirit of reverence to religious ideas. Then the Secretary, Mr. K. Subramaniam, read the Fourth Annual Report which was followed by the distribution of prizes to the champions in sports. Then the English Editor, Mr. R. Nitchingam, read the paper which exhibited the keenness with which the members studied current problems.

Mr. Balasudaram then delivered an instructive address on "Pseudo nationalism and some Reform Movements in Jaffna." He pictured the nationalism which has recently been gaining ground in India and Ceylon in its true colours with special reference to some of the uplift movements and reform movements in both the countries. A little less of public rantings and a little more of action, of moral courage, remarked Mr. Balasudaram, then India and Ceylon will soon attain their desired goal.

Mr. S. Natesapillai followed with an inspiring speech on "Public Life." One ought to have an avocation for the career one chooses. He traced the link between Spirituality and Public Life and emphasized on the necessity of the former.

Then Pandit V. S. Raja Aiyar spoke in clear, sweet and classical Tamil on "தமிழ்நாடு வாழ்க்கை". He commented on the glory of the great Tamil works, the *Tolkuttural*, *Paripatrau* etc. and particularly on the remaining literary monument of the ancient civilised Tamil world.

Mr. K. Thillaiambam, The President of the Association proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the chair, the lecturers and to those who had responded to their invitation. This was seconded by Mr. M. Thamothersapillai and carried with acclamation. The meeting came to close with the singing of *Thavaram*.—Cor.

### Government Ayurvedic College.

#### INDIGENOUS SYSTEMS OF MEDICINE

##### OFFICIAL SANCTION AND SUPPORT.

##### DAWN OF A NEW ERA.

The College of Indigenous Medicine in Coom Road, was opened yesterday (10.6.29) afternoon by the Governor under most promising auspices. There was a very large gathering present, including several Ayurvedic practitioners who had come from various parts of the country for the unique occasion.

Two stately pandals were erected at the entrance to the institution and the premises were gaily decked with flags. The large gathering was accommodated in the main hall of the building. The Governor arrived at 5 p. m. attended by Mr. M. E. Antrabus, Private Secretary, and was received by Mr. K. Balasingham, Chairman of the Board of Indigenous Medicine, and the other members of the Board.

##### REVIVAL OF AYURVEDA.

The Governor was then conducted to the main hall where the gathering was assembled and where the ceremony of dedicating the institution took place. Veda Mahendram Poodit M. S. P. Samarasinghe, a member of the Board, then read and presented to the Governor an address in Sanskrit inscribed on a plaque.

##### THE PEOPLE'S NEED.

Mr. K. Balasingham said that on behalf of the All Ceylon Ayurvedic Congress who had just read and presented an address on behalf of the large public who were interested in the study of Ayurveda and on behalf of the Board of Indigenous Medicine he extended a most cordial welcome to the Governor. The object of that institution was to train those who desired to study and practise the indigenous systems of medicine. The spirit that animated those who were behind that movement was not one of antagonism to Western medical science nor a false sense of Nationalism.

##### PURE MEDICINE.

They realised that the vast majority of the people of the country were dependent on the indigenous system of medicine for medical relief and that it was their duty to do something to train those who gave medical relief to that large majority. They were the first to recognise the great advanced Western medicine had made in all its departments during the last few years especially in Surgery, Midwifery, the Diagnosis of Diseases, Pathology and Hygiene. But, perhaps in the matter of pure medicine itself as opposed to surgery the progress in recent years had not been as marked in the other departments and in that branch it was generally recognised in Ceylon that Ayurveda held secrets which were worth preserving and that some effort should be made to make those secrets public and available to the world at large and that those who wished to practise the system should have a thorough study of the text books on the subject.

##### PROGRESS OF MODERN SCIENCE.

They also realised that it was the most important duty on the part of the public and of the Government that those who sought to practise medicine should have some idea of the great progress made in modern science all over the world and that it was necessary to teach such subjects as anatomy, physiology, hygiene and modern science to anyone aspiring to practise any system of medicine in any part of the world. It was, therefore, that they made an attempt to bring to the notice of the Government and of the public the need for some action in that direction. Although they realised that Ayurveda had certain merits they were the last to suggest that perfection was reached even in any branch of medicine thousands of years ago. Change was inevitable and with the knowledge that people were accumulating in every part of the world differences of methods of treatment must take place and therefore they realised that something should be done to assist those who desired to practise those systems to obtain something of the spirit of modern scientific research. In that connection he desired to mention that they had been treated cordially by many members of the British medical profession who had helped them with their advice while the Committee was sitting and even recently. One of them Dr. Appaswamy, had been so good as to offer a collection of text books on English medicine because he believed that it was necessary for persons who wished to study any system of medicine to have a knowledge of other systems as well. That was the spirit in which many members of the British medical profession were receiving them. It was for a moment to be suggested that Ayurveda was not a progressive science.

##### SINCE ALEXANDER THE GREAT.

The best writers on Ayurveda in India had emphatically declared that Ayurveda had not always been stagnant during its long existence in India. It had progressed and taken much that was good from other systems of medicine and it had given a good deal to the world, to Arabia and to Greece and through them to the rest of the world. But, it was also a fact that the doctors who came along with Alexander the Great to India and who learned from the *Kaviraj* in India took back the systems of India to Greece, developed them and they came back to India as the *Unani* system. *Unani* being being derived from

The Secretary next read letters from various out station members wishing success to the Association, prominent among them being those from Mudaliyar O. Arumugam and Mr. A. Thillaiampalam of Ratnapura. Mr. K. O. Nathan next detailed the activities of the Y. M. H. A. which had gone to sleep for nearly two years and highly praised the philanthropic efforts of Mr. P. L. N. Nagappa Chetty in having rebuilt the Mari amman Temple on his initiative with the help and contributions of the general public. A list of 79 gentlemen who have agreed to contribute Rupees one (Rs 1.00) monthly to the Association for conducting the daily poojas in the Temple and for other Hindu religious literary and social activities was also read and 3 other gentlemen present also joined the list.

## "AMMAL PERUMAI"

"A lecture in Tamil on 'Ammal Perumai' Motherhood of God) was next delivered by K. O. Nathan, Proctor, with apt quotations from the scriptures detailing the beauty of Hinduism in as much as it laid great stress and importance on the feminine aspect of divinity and the three fold forms of Nishkala (attributed), Nishkala Shakala (intermediate) and the Shakala (attributed) thus embodying under its fold all forms of worship and claim to universality. He pointed out that in the attributeless form of worship, four classes have been recognized of godhead, to wit *Evam, Eakhi, Natham* and *Vinthu* which formless and attributeless though they are, connoted and denoted the idea of matter and energy in the universal aspect thus giving room to the admission of the even so called agnostics unto the Hindu fold as real theists. The lecture was interspersed with illustrative songs and hymns from the sacred scriptures.

After the Chairman's remarks and the singing of Thevaram and distribution of prathamam from the Temple the meeting terminated with a vote of thanks to the chair and a lecturer proposed by Mr. Mr. R. Candiah seconded by Mr. S. Ratnam.

Those assembled were next treated to dinner by Mr. A. Ampaer at his bungalow. The next meeting was announced to be held on the 18th June at the Temple when 'Appan Perumal' (the Fatherhood of God) will be explained by Mr. K. O. Nathan.—Cor.

## LOAN FOR LIGHTING JAFFNA.

The following items among others were in the minutes of the ninety eighth meeting of the Local Government Board held at the Colombo Kachcheri on Wednesday, June 5, 1929, at 9.30 a.m.:

Hon. Mr. E. T. Millington, President, occupied the chair and there were four other members present.

Late Mr. R. Sagarasingam.

Before proceeding with the business of the day the Board resolved to place on record in its minutes an expression of its sorrow at the death of the late Mr. R. Sagarasingam, J. P., (a nominated member of the Board) and of its deep sympathy with his family in their bereavement.

The Board approved the following revised scale of salary assigned by the Matara Council to the office of Secretary:—

Rs. 3000 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 120 to Rs. 4200 per annum.

The Board approved, subject to minor amendments in paragraph 21, the draft report of its administration and the review of the work and expenditure of the District Councils for 1928, and resolved that they should be printed and published under section 212, (Circulation Paper No. A 81/1929).

Tabled under section 191 (2) the annual administration reports of the Chairman of the District Councils for 1928.

Tabled Circulation Paper No. E 137/1929 Draft Estimates of Expenditure of the Local Government Board Department for 1929-1930.

Tabled Circulation Paper No. C 89/1929 relative to the vote of the Ratnapura Council of Rs. 100 towards the cost of local celebrations in connection with His Majesty the King's Birthday, 1929. The vote was approved under section 170 (1) (b).

THE INSISTENT JAFFNA U. D. C.

The Board gave further consideration to letter No. 1382 of 26th April, 1929, from the Jaffna Council relative to its proposal to reimpose a conservancy fee in certain cases. The Board considered that the laying of bucket fees in addition to a rate was not free from objection in principle, but resolved that if the Council is still insistent upon the adoption of such a system the Board does not propose to refuse its consent, subject to the approval by the Attorney General of the by laws necessary to give effect thereto.

The Board approved by the Chilaw Council amounting to Rs. 200 for the presentation of an address to His Excellency the Governor on his forthcoming visit to Chilaw.

## ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOR JAFFNA.

The Board approved under section 184 (2) subject to the sanction of the Governor the rate of interest and the conditions for the repayment of a loan for Rs. 280,000 applied for by the Jaffna Council for an electric lighting scheme, the terms being those specified in letter No. 386/519/Local Loans & Development Fund.

The Board resolved to place on record its appreciation of the services rendered to it by the Hon. Mr. E. T. Millington as President during the absence on leave of the Hon. Mr. B. N. Thaine, C. M. G.
