The fluorine has to be supplied during the first eight years of life to give future freedom from the dentists' chair. Teeth canno: absorb it after they are fully formed.

Asked what influence the asso-

ciation has on the government, a spokesman said me that such outstanding members are in a position to approach present offi-

cials.

The society does not enter politics nor seek to propagate Christianity. Included as supporting members are a number of non-Christians, and working in a calculate way, it hopes primarily to modest way, it hopes primarily to

educate for peace.

However, in aiming at its goal of "establishment of permanent peace", the group inevitably touches the political field. Sri Sankara's Contribution

(By Dr. P. Nagarajah Rao M. A D. Litt.)

By the very methods of logic he proved that logic or human reason is not the Madonna that she is made out to be. She is just clay-footed. Like scienific power and cunning, intellectual alarity too, Sankara thought, was amoral i. e., neutral. It worth is to be judged by the purpose to which it is harnessed to. Mere intellectual speculation unvivified by spiritual experience is as vicious and barren as the antisocial use of scientific in ventions. Sankara believed that the final religious experience is a form of intuition. Such an intuition is not anti-intellectual but supra intellectual. It is a fact of spiritual life. The rich contents of his spiritual experience and its force are revealed in his poetical works. There he describes his experience rather than sets forth the doctrines. He believes with Euripides it is not wisdom, only to be wise. He anticipates Kantin saying "I shall destroy reason to make room for faith". THERE is no greater intellectual giant and Master spirit than Sri Sankara in the entire history of Indian Philosophic thought. Born in 788 A. D. of poor parents Siva Guru and Aryamba in Kaladi. a village six miles from Alwaye, quite early in life he renouncel and acquired great knowledge of the Sastras from Govinda the disciple of the famous Gaudapada. The more devout sects represent Sankara as an avatar of Lord Siva. He performed several miracles like most of them had an intellectual approach to the problems of religions and philosophy. He was of opinion that the foundations of a true religion are based not on the mere findings of reason and the deliverances of science. He himself had the integral intuitive experience of Brahman.

He set out to preach the truth of his experience to all. He travelled all over North India and defeated many a ritualist to creed by the power of his dialectics. He, no doubt, belived in ceremonial purity and ethical excellent, but still he did not mistake them for enlightenment. He valued the art of logic and the power of argumentation, but did not exclusively trust them. By the very methods
