HINDU BOARD OF EDUCATION -:0:-

IF THERE IS AN EFFICIENT ORGANISAtion to which the Hindu community in
the Island can lock for the revival of the
Hindu Religion and for the rec very of
the lost ground in the field of
Education it is the Hindu Board of
Education. Its fifth annual report published elsewhere furnishes the best evidence not only of its growing popudence not only of its growing popu-larity and of the increasing measure of support it receives from the Hindus, but also t the zeal, enthusiasm and unfl oching determination with which its work is being carried on The income for the year is nearly a lake of rupees. The amount realised by subscriptions, donations and contributions amounted to nearly Iva nearly Rs 18,000 The number of schools has increased to 55 with nearly seven thousand children on the roll. If the importance of an organisation to be judged by the number of children to be judged by the number of children receiving education under its auspices, then the Hindu Board should be regarded as the most important in the sphere of Vernacular education in the Jaffna District.

The Board does not confine its acti-vities to the Jaffoa District alone. It has vities to the Jaffoa District alone. It has taken larger view of its responsibilities. It has also extended its activities to districts other than Jaffoa. There is a flourishing school under the Board at Nawalapitiya. Three of its schools are situated in the malarial and sparsely populated district of Mullaitivu while one is in the Eastern Province. It is an undoubted fact that this Province is very backward as regards Hiodu education. More than two-thirds of its population are Hindus. But little of its population are Hindus. But little work has been done to open Hindu ach ols in this Province. The C. M. S. has schools in this Province. The C. M. S. has seven schools there under its management; the Roman Catholic, 35, th. Wesleyans, 87; Hindus have only ten Vernacular schools. In the case of the Muslim children Government schools have been opened for their education in villages where they are found in large numbers. But the poor Hindu children have been long allowed both by the G vernment and the Hindus themselves to be explainted by the allowed both by the G vernment and the Hindus themselves to be exploited by the Christian Missionaries. In these circumstances it is but proper that the Hindu Board should make the appeal to the Hindus of this Province for their help and co-operation to open more Hindu schools there.

The most striking feature of the work one during the year is the establishment of the Sawa Training School and the Sawa Orphanage. The great part which these two institutions are destined to Saiva Orphanage. The great part which these two institutions are destined to play in the uplift of the Hindu community in Ceylon has been elequently set forth in the report. We commend the special appeal made therein for the support of these two institutions. port of these two institutions.

We are of opinion that the revival for which the Hindu Board stands should be regarded as a grand edifice.
