

Sir, With reference to your special request to forward representations on the question of a University and its location in the North or the East, we, the people of Karainagar and its numerous Societies, beg to submit our views briefly in the hope that we may be offered an opportunity to give oral evidence in support of the statements made.

All Commissions and Committees have hiestablishment of a University at Jaffna as the next logical site to those in Kandy and Colombo. With the passing of years and the growth of population and the need to meet increasing demands for development the need has become very urgent.
