lar was a man with some private means but it is equally true that he did not spend his time enlarging his private fortune and multiplying his wants. We need politicians and ministers who would work full time for the national cause. Many of our leaders have professional interests which they maintain in such fashion that politics appear to be a side-line hobby to them. Our top-ranking Government servants are fond of taking up to religion as a hobby after retirement. Our teachers go all out to fatten their bank-balance through private tuition breaking departmental regulations in the process. Many give away what they do not want for themselves in a charitable spirit but very few give away what they need for themselves in a spirit of self-sacrifice. All of us must strive to bring about communal and religious harmony in the Island and live for others at least partly and also learn to live with others.

## The Egalitarian Myth

The following letter from Professor Lynax of Dublin which appeared in the London Daily Telegraph of 14-10-69, will I think interest your readers.

"As one of the Psychologists who contributed to the recent Black paper on education I should like to comment on Mrs. Irene Mc Mierdie's assertion (Oct. 9) that 'anyone with a minimal knowledge of psychology would know that the reason that the sons of dustmen and mines underachieve is not litigation of their innate abilities but lack of stimulation in their achievements'."

In making this assertion Mrs. Mc Mierdie differs from both Prof. Sir Cyril Burt and myself. Both of us stated explicitly in the Black paper that the poor average performance of working class children in school is to some extent due to their low innate intelligence.

The reason for this can be quite simply understood. Intelligence is principally determined by inheritance, and for some centuries clever people have risen in the social hierarchy and unintelligent ones have fallen. The effect of this is that the genes for high intelligence have inevitably come to be more concentrated in the middle class.

Both Sir Cyril Burt and I drew attention to this fact quite independently. I did so, and I imagine that he did so too, because of its crucial importance in the present debate on education. The progressivists wish to turn the educational system upside down because they refuse to face up to this simple truth of innate class differences in intelligence. Some of them are even willing to destroy society itself in the quest of the egalitarian dreams. Alas, it is only in Utopia that all children

### MUNICIPAL MUDDLE

Here is a matter which cannot be overlooked by us. True to tradition the annual activity of creating tension and disruption amongst the City Fathers has begun. It has always been the misfortune of the only Municipality in the North to be rent asunder by mischief being set afoot by rival political parties or groups. The result has been the delay or postponement of important projects and schemes being introduced or carried out. This anti-national activity has become a hobby and habit with politicians who have nothing but the consideration of selfish interests in view.

The rate-payer and the common man who have daily dealings in the city have a right to expect and demand the proper functioning of the Municipal Council so that the affairs of this area may not be neglected or mishandled. The chief bone of contention in the working of a Municipality is the Mayoral office. Such a great value is attached to the election of a Mayor that there is the inevitable tendency for groups to be formed.

Any policy of obstruction and that when actuated by petty squabbles for selfish power and pride, must be condemned and thwarted by the co-ordinated mobilisation of public opinion on a democratic basis. Whether it is a Municipality or a Town Council or a Village Council, the concern of the rate payers and citizens should be to put down all divisive tendencies and to safeguard the interests of the people by working for the proper functioning of these Local Bodies.

Village Councils and Town Councils have the same problem of the tug of war for power between opposing factions. The people are compelled to be mere spectators of this disgusting development and in certain

## Twenty Fifth Sessions of the Tamil Congress

At the twenty fifth sessions of the All Ceylon Tamil Congress, Mr G. G. Ponnambalam Q. C. the President clarified the policy and program of his Party and called for united effort for the achievement of the needs of the Tamil speaking people.

The following resolutions were passed.

The manner in which the Soulbury Constitution has been worked recently by successive Governments has revealed the urgent necessity for the incorporation in the Constitution of a Chapter of Fundamental Rights. We therefore undertake to work for the incorporation in the Constitution of a Chapter of Fundamental Rights to ensure, inter alia.

(a) Equality before the law and equal protection of the law to all citizens irrespective of race, religion, caste or creed;

(b) Non discrimination by the State against any citizen on grounds of race, religion, caste or creed;

(c) Equality of opportunity for all citizens in matters relating to employment or appointment to any office under the State or in any State sponsored Corporation or in any local authority;

(d) The right to all citizens to freedom of conscience and worship, to freedom of speech and expression, to freedom of assembly and association;

(e) The right to all citizens to move freely, to secure employment, to acquire property, to practice any profession and to carry on any business or trade, in any part of the Island;

(f) The right to any section of the people of Ceylon having a distinct language and culture of its own to conserve the same;

(g) The right to any citizen to be admitted to any educational institution maintained by the State, or receiving aid out of State funds, without discrimination based on grounds of race, religion, or language, caste or creed;

(h) The right to any citizen to be educated through the medium of his mother tongue to communicate with, and to be communicated to by the State in his own language

and to transact any business with the State in his own language;

(i) The right to all religions and linguistic minorities to establish and administer educational institutions of their choice;

(j) The right to any citizen to move the Supreme Court for the enforcement of the rights enumerated above.

We accept the declaration of Human Rights of the United Nations, and shall work for its adoption by the Government.

The All Ceylon Tamil Congress re-iterates its conviction that fair, honourable and enduring solutions to important National issues like the language problem, the citizenship problem and the colonisation problem cannot be arrived at except by taking these issues out of party politics and settling them on a National level at an All Parties Conference.

The All Ceylon Tamil Congress urges the Government to frame a system of National Education suited to the needs of the country, and thereby utilise the man-power and natural resources of the country to the best advantage and avoid human waste in the form of the 'educated unemployed'.

The All Ceylon Tamil Congress urges on the Government the immediate establishment of a University in Jaffna to be named 'The Ramanathan University of Ceylon, Jaffna, utilizing for that purpose 'inter alia' the Educational endowments of Sir P. Ramanathan, Sri La Sri Arumuga Navalar and Malavarayar of Puttur.

The All Ceylon Tamil Congress deplors that under the scheme of State Education, the standard of Education treasured by the Tamils, has steadily deteriorated by the inadequacy of equipment, properly qualified teachers, and accommodation and calls upon the Government progressively to make the educational service a District Service.

The All Ceylon Tamil Congress is pledged to work for the removal of social inequalities and disabilities by a progressive

# Prison Population Problem

Although the total capacity of the 16 Prisons in the Island is about 4950, they appear to accommodate now more than 8000 prisoners. It would thus be seen that Ceylon's prison — almost like our Hospitals — are fearfully over-crowded. This is an alarming situation.

What is the remedy? How are we to tackle the march of crime? Can we control or reduce the explosion of prison population? It is improper for us to ask our Judges not to send offenders to jail. Then, are we to ask the Authorities to provide further accommodation by constructing additional cells in our prisons, before the crisis of over-crowding leads to dire consequences? Let us examine these questions carefully.

The crude method of mental and physical torture in the treatment of the criminal is out dated, and civilised countries have discarded such methods. The chief aims of our present penal system are to deter the potential law-breaker and to reform those found 'guilty'. At present the treatment of law-breakers is based on the principle that the Community has the right to demand and get an offender (law-breaker) punished; but at the same time the Community is bound to rehabilitate him on his return from jail and guard him from a relapse into a career of crime.

Prisoners should not be treated as a lost lot, but as part and parcel of the community, for, they come back to us after serving their terms of imprisonment. We cannot ignore or evade this problem "which is like a recurring decimal." Therefore, let us not remain complacent and feel that our duty ends once a man is convicted and locked up. We must not forget the fact, that the discharged prisoners outnumber the prisoners within the walls of our prison. A discharged prisoner, if not taken up and converted into an honourable citizen, is likely to become a danger to society. He may be compared to a T. B. patient let loose into the country, moving about freely expectorating the virulent bacillus that can decimate our

population quickly and surely.

How can this be checked? We should, inter alia, stir up public opinion to give the necessary impetus to rehabilitate the criminal, reform and train him to be an acceptable member of society.

The modern conception of 'rigorous imprisonment' is not 'hard labour' necessarily arduous and tire some. It means the training of the prisoner by keeping him HARD at work of a constructive nature, during prescribed hours, without reducing him to a mere automaton or mental wreck. We must realise that we are dealing with the various facets of the human mind and that the assignment of work to convicted criminals should be such, that they could relish it and look up to it as something of a productive nature. Keeping them suitably employed and beneficially occupied are the most important factors in the moral and physical regeneration of the prisoner. Prison officials should study the history sheet of prisoners and take note of their inclinations and tendencies and arrange to tap their talents and harness them as best as they could.

After care of discharged prisoners is a major problem that The Prisoners' Welfare Society in Colombo and its Branches are trying to tackle now. After care can be productive, if prisoners could be trained, while inside the prison itself to fit into the community on their release. Often when a long term prisoner is released, he finds that he has no one to go to. Relations avoid him. Business establishments refuse to give him employment. Society shuns him. So his only place of shelter is the pavement and his desire to earn money for his wants are thwarted. Finding no lawful avenue to make a living, he is compelled to launch again on another career of crime till he is caught and confined.

When prisoners come back to society, it must be prepared to receive him. "If we are not prepared to do so, there is something substantially wrong with the set up of our society." Let us face this problem, as stated by

An Employment Bureau in prison should be made available to the prisoner to get his pass-port to the world at large — a pass-port that could get him a billet to make a fresh start and if possible, make a success of his life. One must remember that a prisoner's journey home, on his release, is a tragic one. Society must make every effort to receive him sympathetically as a human being and see that he is absorbed into the community as gracefully and tactfully as possible, without looking down on him as an outcast or as a condemned beast.

It is a responsibility we all have to share, else we will have some day to plead 'guilty' before a Higher Tribunal for having failed to find a solution to this recurring social problem of some magnitude. May the spirit of service to these unfortunate members of Society, urge you to re-orientate your outlook towards convicts and enable you to render the necessary assistance to them to make a fresh start in life so that they may become useful cogs in the wheel of our social mechanism.
