The following letter from Professor Lynax of Dublin which appeared in the London Daily Telegraph of 14-10-69 will I think interest your readers.

"As one of the Psycho logists who contributed to the recent Black paper on education I should like to comment on Mrs. Irene Mc Merdie's assertion (Oct. 9) that "anyone with minimal knowledge of psychology would know that the reason that the sons of dustmen and mines underachieve is not ligitation of innate abilities but lack of atimulation in achievements." their

In making this asser-tion Mrs. Mc Mierdie differs from both Prof. Sir Cyril Burt and my-self. Both of us stated explicitly in the Black paper that the poor average performance of working class children in school is to some extent due to their low innate priest, intelligence.

It has always been the misfortune of the only Municipality in the North to be rent asunder by mischief being set afoot by rival political parties or groups. The result has been the delay or postponement of important projects and schemes being introduced or carried out.
