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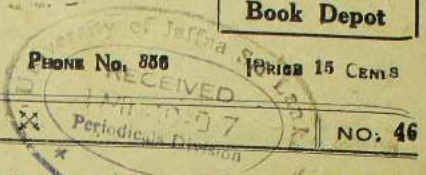

The Indian Approach To Anti-Colonialism

As human society moves forward to perfect its organisations, ideas and concepts undergo vast changes. New thoughts emerge and modify or enlarge the old ones. Sometimes, new emphasis is placed on old themes and they appear in different garbs.

Colonialism is one such concept which has undergone many changes. Yet, the underlying idea of domination and exploitation of a people by another remains unaltered. Only new ways and sometimes different names are found to make the bitter pill more palatable.

We in India — having ourselves suffered under a colonial rule for nearly a century, have, naturally, revolted against all forms of colonialism new and old. We have always accepted the right of all countries to be free and to chalk out their destinies according to the genius of their people. We have also believed in the quality of nations — large and small and their right to free association and peaceful co-existence.

Since we support the freedom of all peoples and oppose the domination of one by another, India's policy has been traditionally anti-colonial.

In the orthodox sense, colonialism means the policy of exploitation of a weak or backward people. The word exploitation is the essence. It is not mere domination, although it is an essential part of it, but something more. It is the material gain beyond the mere feeling of political grandeur. Thus, it is clear that colonies were not created only to add territories to empire but to derive definite economic advantage from them.

There is another point which we have to bear in

mind. The exploitation is always of a weak or backward people. The exploited people do not stand to gain. They only become weaker and even more backward. Colonies are thus not the white man's burden but his bread. Inevitably, the colonizing power would and actually did suck the wealth of the colony and leave it poorer. India's approach to anti-colonialism is based on the recognition of this predominant economic stranglehold, is therefore, broken or the colonial power is made to realise that the colony is no longer profitable and is actually a liability, the struggle for independence is half won. This is, however, not easy to achieve. The colonial power has very many means at its disposal to break the resistance of the people against her economic interest. She has other colonial powers to support her and there are many other partners in business. Everyone helps to preserve the common interest.

For nearly a 100 years, India struggled to achieve independence. It was a bitter struggle, for it was fought on the theme of non-violence. It is, comparatively speaking, easier to hit back, to retaliate, rather than to turn the other cheek. The Indian people endured these trials. They had a leader in whom they had an abiding faith, a guide who was the champion of freedom, equality and dignity of man, not only for Indians but for all people living under subjugation. Mahatma Gandhi became the symbol of hope for all

In many ways, big and small, he mobilised the nation. He launched simple but massive movements that shook the foundations of the greatest empire over which the sun never set. Boycott of

foreign goods, non-cooperation, passive resistance, courting imprisonments became household words in India and acquired new meanings in other lands. Colonialism was delivered a death blow. India became free in 1947; and many other countries in Asia and Africa followed suit.

It was at this stage that colonialism began to undergo change. Traditional colonialism was unpopular, outdated. Freedom had to be given to non-self-governing territories. The United Nations was constantly demanding early action. New ways had, therefore, to be found by the colonial countries to perpetuate exploitation. Having had to concede political independence, the colonial powers tried to maintain their economic hold. They invested money gave economic assistance, even generous grants so that they could retain and promote their business and financial interests.

The new look was introduced with the change of winds. However, the purpose remained the same. Even the ideas were not terribly new, for, just over 100 years ago, Disraeli had said: "Colonies do not cease to be colonies because they are independent." This new form is a greater menace for it corrodes the newly independent country from within. The outer shell remains intact but the inside is eaten away.

It was left to Jawaharlal Nehru to meet this challenge. He found the answer in planned economy for newly independent and developing countries. Control on foreign investment and exploitation — both direct and indirect through local capitalist — development of public enterprises and economic collaboration with all willing to do so without strings attached. A co-operative venture which will leave the control of the national economy in the hands of the government of the country, bring the fruits of labour to the toiler and develop the country on scientific lines free from foreign domination (I. S. I.)

EMINENT LAWYER ENTERTAINED AT DINNER

ADVOCATE KULASINGAM ACHIEVES DISTINCTION

FIFTYFIRST YEAR OF PRACTICE AT THE BAR

Colleagues and Judges assembled in strength at the Town Hall, Jaffna on January 29 at 8 p. m. to felicitate Mr A. V. Kulasingam, Advocate, on his commencing the fiftyfirst year of practice at the Bar. Advocate C. Pon nambalam presided over the function. Mr C. C. Somasegaram, Proctor, who proposed the toast of the chief guest referred to Mr. Kulasingam's entire career and how he achieved distinction.

Hon'ble Mr. Justice V. Sivasubramaniam who supported the toast said that he could vividly remember the significant occasion when he at his first appearance at the Jaffna Bar soon after taking his oaths as an Advocate, was introduced to Mr. Kulasingam, the Senior Counsel in a case in which he was retained as junior as a mark of being welcomed to the Bar and how he was able to notice one feature that has remained in his mind namely the innate ability of his Senior Counsel in the art of advocacy.

Advocate S. Thambithurai referred to Mr. Kulasingam as the ablest of them all who had brought added distinction to the legal profession.

Advocate S. R. Kanaganayakam who spoke last said: The previous speakers who have felicitated the Chief Guest have dwelt on many aspects of his career as a Proctor, Politician, Editor of leading newspapers in the metropolis and in Jaffna, and Advocate. The

picture is incomplete. Kulasingam is a phenomenon. You say that he is a great Advocate. But I say that he is a great farmer and that farming is his first love and that he appeared in Courts merely to supplement his income in order that he may buy modern implements of agriculture. He loved the open spaces, life of the wilderness; he was a pioneer in the early days of farming at Kili-nochchi. He knew what was good for his people and now the whole country is following his great example.

I salute him not merely for his indomitable spirit, his thirst for adventure, his fights for the independence of the Bar, particular when the Juniors were most concerned. He has tamed many a Judge. He was a great champion of the rights of the Bar and of the Bench which he felt should always act in co-ordination.

He despised Governmental Honours and rejected offers of jobs under Government because he felt that he was a child of

Freedom must be felt. But the several thousands of the educated who are labelled 'unemployed' and have been denied the national duty of placing their knowledge, skill and performance at the disposal of the nation keep on reminding the people that freedom has not yet been felt.

And as free Lanka marches on to her twenty third year let a sense of responsibility befitting the age be felt by those who have accepted the responsibility of leading the nation. Let us all march on the road to progress with that due sense of duty which is necessary to make the nation truly great and really free.

Thiruvalluvar and His Immortal Kural

Tamil Nadu is now observing the 2000th birth day of Saint Thiruvalluvar and is paying its humble homage to the memory of its most glorious son, who gave to the world the celebrated Thirukkural. The message of Thiruvalluvar is a message for all ages and for all humanity and at no time is such a message needed more than at present. The Kural is indeed a lamp of eternal wisdom. Righteousness is the body of that lamp; wealth and statesmanship is the wick; enjoyment is the oil; realisation of Godhead is the fire; eternal wisdom is the radiant light.

The Thirukkural is a rare work, to which in perfection of form, profundity of thought, nobleness of sentiment and earnestness of moral purpose, very few books in the world can be compared. It is also unrivalled and inimitable in its brevity, in its bewitching beauty and in its haunting melody. "The grandeur of a Milton, the grace of a Dante, the universality of a Shakespeare, the sublimity of an Aristotle, the idealism of a Plato and the moral fervour of a Marcus Aurelius are all to be found in a harmonious blending and appropriate proportion in this "Bible of Mankind". The terse and the vigorous style of the Kural is such that it has lent itself to the expression of every variety of thought from the plain to the most sublime and dignified that the human mind can conceive. The Kural reflects the Indian spirit in its truest form. It is the pride of Tamil Nadu and the crowning glory of its culture. It can be said that to it more than to anything else is due the high regard and respect in which Tamil Nadu is held throughout the world. It is the most valuable and the most cherished treasure of the Tamils.

Eternal Verities

In his work, Thiruvalluvar has shown himself to be a moral teacher of the very highest order, a consummate statesman and a very thorough man of the world. In his work he deals in extenso with all the values of life which foster universal love and happiness. As is well known, the Kural is

in three parts — Ethics, Wealth and Polity and Love. These, together with Self-Realisation as the fourth are traditionally regarded as the four objectives of life. Though Thiruvalluvar does not treat of the fourth objective separately, the first part of the Kural, Ethics inculcates every principle the following of which leads to Self-Realisation. All aspects of human life and all the eternal verities are enshrined in this immortal work. It is also noted for the unsectarian nature of its theology which has made it command acceptance from the votaries of different religious persuasions. It is truly a Cosmopolitan Scripture.

The Kural is considered to be one of the two most ancient and outstanding Tamil classics (The other is the well known Tholkappiyam, the oldest extant Tamil Grammar.) In

respect of both the classics there are a number of commentaries, both ancient and modern. The Kural has been translated into almost all the important languages of the World.

Chiselled Perfection

Thiruvalluvar is rightly acknowledged as one of the greatest of poets and philosophers of the world. It has been the wonder of learned scholars as to which in the Kural is the more marvellous — the matter, the thought content or the manner, so absolutely perfect,

Scholars have found that one cannot take out a word or syllable from a couplet of the Kural without ruining the thought that one cannot alter or substitute a word or syllable without distorting the meaning and that one cannot rearrange a word or syllable without affecting or falsifying the suggestion. There is a fine and delicate engraving in each verse of the Kural and instead of the monotony, which generally one may expect to find in

couplets; each couplet of the Kural has a rhythm of its own, with initial and internal rhymes and subtle and suggestive alterations.

The remarkable excellence of Thiruvalluvar's marvellous work has been well appreciated by great scholars of all lands. In the words of Dr. G. U. Pope, "in value it (Kural) outweighs the whole of the remaining Tamil literature and is one of the select number of great works which have entered into the very soul of a whole people and which can never die." When V. V. S. Iyer read out portions of his translation of the Kural to Mahatma Gandhi, the latter is said to have observed that Valluvar in his Kural verily reflected his (Gandhi's) heart. It is indeed a happy coincidence that the 20th birthday of Thiruvalluvar and the centenary of Mahatma Gandhi should synchronise this year.
