JAFFNA SITE THE BEST - JUSTLY SO

Well and truly was established the suitability of Jaffna as the best site for the fifth University to be located when the several delegations of educational and cultural organisations of the North placed their considered views before the N. C. H. E. Committee that recorded evidence in the Northern City this week. If a whispering tongue, unfortunately with a thick coating of sodium chloride, had attempted to poison truth, the effort was effectively nullified by the strong exception that was taken by the leaders of these delegations to such a preposterous proposition. A sinister strategist must have musingly thought that Jaffnese being considered the salt of the earth the water they drink must be saltish. The members of the N. C. H. E. Committee would have known that just as it did not require to be proved that the Jaffna Mango was delicious, the wholesomeness of the water of this area need not be established. We take the whisper cum grano salis-

Conclusive evidence was led that

- (a) there was a vast extent of available and suitable land adequate for the establishment of a full fledged first rate University in Jaffna.
(b) the lands belonging to the Ramanathan College and the Parameshwara College had plenty of available acreages adjacent to them stretching up to Kopay.
(c) that the secondary schools in Jaffna have always been

sought after by students from all over the Island and that a University in Jaffna would help forge further links of fraternal fellowship and national unity.

- (d) that the lofty tradition of a rich heritage of the innate thirst for learning has been the pride of Jaffna, a fact fully established by the educational activities of the great Navalur, Sir Pennambalam Arunachalam, Sir P. Ramanathan and other distinguished patriots of the past.
(e) that a fifth University should be located where the demand for higher education was greatest and that such location must certainly be in Jaffna as unequivocally expressed by previous Commissions.

- (f) that Hindu Culture like Buddhist Culture which has already been safeguarded by the Government should be afforded equal recognition

We are glad that the members of the Committee could find the time to visit the areas that were referred to by the delegations and see for themselves how ideally Jaffna was suited for the establishment of the fifth University.

We had on earlier occasions pointed out that the question of the establishment of a University in Jaffna was accepted by the Government and the Opposition, when successive budgets provided a token vote for the Ramanathan University. It is apparent that some disgruntled political group must have prevailed upon the Authorities to reconsider the question and that the present N. C. H. E. Committee must have been appointed as an escape from political pressure.

The overwhelming demand for the establishment of a new University in Jaffna is but the logical manifestation of the religious and cultural spade work in the sphere of education started by the Great Navalur and inspiring continued by the Jaffna Saiva Paripalana Sabha, the Hindu Board of Education and the Hindu College Board under the inspiring leadership of Sir P. Ramanathan, Shri Pasupathy Chettiar, Shri T. Chellappapillai, Sir W. Duraisamy, Shri S. Shiva. padasundarampillai, Dr.

S. Subramaniam and Shri S. Rajaratnam, to mention a few. The opposition to this demand has been engineered by the very forces that had during the time of the Great Navalur thwarted the noble aspirations of the people and had continued to do so even afterwards. These mischief mongers suggest Trincomalee merely to have an anti national confrontation at that ancient seaport where political parties are vying with one another to create chaos, confusion and continuing tension. Educationists worth their salt are all for preserving the rich heritage of Tamil Culture at the only place where it can be safeguarded maintaining healthy contacts with every other culture. The onus of proving the contrary of this conclusion is on the few who are thinking of Trincomalee merely to spite strong and sincere public opinion

The Classical Dance of India

According to Indian tradition the first manifestation of the Dance was the Cosmic Dance of Lord Shiva. To the Hindu the dance demonstrates the fundamental unity and rhythm of the Universe. This concept of unity in diversity and of rhythm is indeed the basis of all the arts of ancient India. The dance is, therefore, not merely an art, nor simply a spontaneous expression of joy and harmony with nature; it is all these and much more; it is an expression of the philosophy of India.

Thus it is that the dance is so closely associated with religious beliefs and ceremonial. Many of the dance themes find their inspiration in Shiva symbolising the Cosmic Force and in Shri Krishna whose sportive play with the gopis (milkmaids) represents the urge of the individual souls to merge themselves in the Universal Soul or Paramatma. Bharata, the father of Indian dance and dramatics, is said to have produced before Shiva and his consort Parvati a play which so pleased them that the Lord caused him to be instructed in His own cosmic. This dance was called Tandava after the instructor, Tandava. The dance form for women; called Lasya, similarly came down from Parvati through Usha wife of a grandson of Krishna.

Since Art itself springs from religion, the temple in India became the home of all the arts. Musicians and dancers were attached to the temples and their performances became part of the ritual. Religious themes were also portrayed in folk dances such as the Ram Leela.

The sages of ancient India regarded the dance as a divine spectacle for the delectation of the gods and called it the Fifth Veda. Beautiful damsels chosen for their perfection of face and form performed before gatherings of kings and sages on auspicious occasions such as marriages, coronations, royal birthdays and religious festivals. The Indian classical dance is indeed the manifestation of the soul of India; more than anything else it represents the spirit of the people. It is a genuine creative force that has come down to us through the ages.

Several treatises on dance and drama were

written in Sanskrit. The best known is the Natya Shastra of Bharata Muni, which deals with every aspect of dance, drama and the allied arts. In thirty-six chapters Bharata describes the Purva Ranga (rites preceding a performance), the various types of stage; the principal hand-poses, actions of the head, eyes, eyeballs, cheeks, eyelashes, eyebrows, nose, chin, neck, chest, hips, waist, belly, thighs, calves, feet; the various facial expressions, dramatic sentiments and moods; the different steps known as charis; static positions called sthanakas; mandalas or rotations of charis; tandava lakshanam, the dance which is composed of the hand movements, steps and stances; gati prachara or stage deportment; poetic composition; the various types of theatre and settings; the costumes; stage jewellery, make-up (powders and ointments), hair styles; types of heroes and heroines, other characters in a drama; certain unusual poses; musical instruments to be used; and diction, prosody and metre.

The technique of the classical dance has undergone some changes, but the principles of Bharata Muni and other masters not only remain as the base of the Indian dance, but have influenced the dance of the neighbouring countries, notably Burma, Siam, Java and Cambodia. Everywhere the spiritual content has been preserved in one form or another and the themes of most dances are religious, being mainly episodes from the Ramayana, the Mahabharata and the Bhagavata.

Starting from one basis system of classical dance, different regions developed their own styles by incorporating movements from folk dances and, in some cases, absorbing foreign influences as well.

All types of Indian dances call for perfect coordination of hand, foot and body movements; but they are all performed barefooted and generally with anklets which vary according to the style. The main accompaniment is the percussion instrument which is the very life of the dance. This also varies according to the style, but is absolutely essential to the dancer even while practising.

The four main schools of the Indian classical

dance are Bharata Natyam, Kathakali, Kathak and Manipuri. Also noteworthy are the Mohini Attam of Kerala, the Mask dances of Seraikela in Bihar, the Odissi of Orissa, and the Kuchipudi dances of Andhra Pradesh. It takes years of hard training and study to be a good dancer; the rhythms are very complicated and numerous, unlike those of the West. The earlier a dancer begins his training the better, and he must have very flexible limbs.

The four main categories of the dance are: Tandava or powerful type which is masculine; Lasya, an essentially feminine form; Nritya, comprising beautiful hand and foot movements which do not signify any particular theme; and Nritya which is dance in the form of gesture; language depicting distinct ideas or themes. All schools of the classical dance in India have these forms.
