True Democracy

The present turbulent state of affairs is due not only to the impact of modern trends of gross materialism but also to the form of government. Party government has brought with it many detestable and harmful results which eat into the very vitals of a peaceful and contented life.

Democracy has been defined by eminent statesmen as Government of the people for the people by the people. This is a very comprehensive and fine definition. In theory it is well and good. But when it comes to the practice of the ideal, the very moral code of democracy is broken and the ideals are thrown to the winds for the sake of self-glorification and self-advancement. In true democracy there is no room for self-glory. The self gets itself emerged in the great compassion for doing good to a greater number. There is no room for bribery or corruption, nepotism or favouritism.

After the general election is over, the Ministers are chosen by the Prime Minister who is pledged to implement certain good things for the better living of the people. In certain countries as in India at present the ruling party moves heaven and earth to retain their seats for the present and for the future. In many cases the Ministers do not possess a balanced power of judgment and do place the interest of the people first and their interest last. Certain officers stoop to the mean act of squandering public money and Ministers go on unnecessary trips abroad in the name of the country. There is ample scope for public waste of money, unless Ministers and officers are votaries of good wisdom and unless they are equipped with a sound religious background ever doing their duties with a prayerful heart and dedication. The Ministers and

others who have a major share in the Government of the country should consider that the public money and public property are God's wealth and that they are custodians of the country's wealth. They must have a burning sense of patriotism and must inspire good and healthy ideas among the people so that these may permeate among the people and elevate their thoughts for better living. They must lead exemplary good lives for their own good and for the good of the people at large.

In countries like Great Britain and U. S. A where democracy took firm roots many centuries ago there is tension now. Owing to the impact of imported ideas of Communism, there is some tension even in these countries.

The Opposition Parties also trade on the mistakes made by the ruling party. From the time of election till the next election, carry on propaganda against the ruling party and are unwilling to accept the gains achieved by the ruling party. Sometimes the leaders in the Opposition group distort facts and

publicise the wrong acts and short-comings of their rivals. They create an unhealthy atmosphere. They are always ready to start strikes at the expense of the tax-payer and put a spoke in the wheel of the progress of the country. Whenever there are strikes, there are untold hardships to all the people including those who participate in the strikes. When the strike begins in one sector, it spreads and paralyses the smooth running of all types of work. Immense loss is made not only to the government but to many individuals also. More than ninety per cent of those who participate in strikes do not like strikes in their heart of hearts. They strike work owing to pressure of bodily harm. If not for the political parties the workers will not strike. The Trade Union bosses have their parties' interest at heart. The dire consequences of strikes are due to the party system. The party system is not suitable for India and Ceylon. The spectacular progress made in Ceylon in the field of agriculture and industry is marred from time to time by strikes. There are countless murders of great leaders committed in various parts of the globe by power-hungry and self-seeking persons. The names of Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther King and Kennedy stand as glaring and outstanding examples.

If we want to retain democracy in this beautiful island of ours, we must revolutionise our thoughts and purify them. In this connection the people will have to be taught the right use of the vote. The masses must be educated. If democracy is to be maintained at any cost, there must be a sound education with a religious background. Moral values must be inculcated in the minds of the people. Honesty, sincerity, strict self-discipline, regard for public property, speaking the truth, respect for elders, patriotism, humility last but not the least piety and fear for the all-pervading supreme spirit must find a firm root in

LEFT, WHY LEFT OUT?

Drawing our attention to our editorial of March 13, a dejected correspondent has taken serious exception to our statement that the Leftist Parties had no status in the political affairs of the Tamil speaking people. He has called upon us to clarify our general statement more elaborately.

In the first instance it is heartening to note that they who pay homage to the theories of Marx, Lenin and Mao are watching with bated breath the real reactions of the people of the North and the East to the persistent propaganda of the Communist Party and the L. S. S. P. in these areas.

We do not propose to deal with this question in the practical way of referring the inquisitive correspondent to the efforts of the Leftist Parties in Lanka during the last four decades and the reaction of the people at the polls particularly in the Tamil-speaking areas. For, it is quite patent that the Leftist Parties have badly failed in their feverish attempts to gain a foot-hold in our Parliament. The North and the East had almost rejected their appeals and that resoundingly.

Often had we pointed out in these columns that the efforts of the S. L. F. P. to secure a coalition with the Leftist Parties and the ready response of the revolutionaries to be led by a Party and a leader not of their way of thinking must be viewed as a pointer to the indisputable fact that marxist maxims had contemptibly failed to make any effective impress on the voters and that the Left would never be able to lead a Government of its own in Lanka. Having exhibited all methods of appeal to the masses in the form of strikes, sabotage and other subterfuges, making capital of mishaps in the midst of the people, jointly and severally in overt and secretive

manner, the Leftist Parties today stand exposed as opportunists who could neither establish Marxism nor introduce even a modification of that ideology in this country.

All that these leftists could do was to repeat parrot-like hackneyed terms such as Capitalism, Imperialism, Monopoly and deliver harangues of devastating criticism of everything that is not Marxist in meaning or method. But the public, by and by, came to know that the very leaders who had labelled every other party as composed of capitalists were themselves possessors of capital and that these leftist leaders should no longer talk with their tongues in their cheeks and try to create the impression that they stood in the same level of economy as that of the indigent wage-earner or labouring classes, popularly known as the proletariat.

Misuse of words and terms has become the most-favoured modus operandi of the Marxists. Misnomer in political propaganda is a moral misdemeanour in this that the masses are told something that is incorrect or liable to be misinterpreted. Socialism and progressive are two words that have been mostly misused by Marxist mob-orators. In politics and economics, the word socialism stands for specific theories and significant inferences. Leaving aside the learned exposition of the term 'Socialism' in political philosophy, we may for the present use the commonly understood form of socialism namely the principle that individual interests should be completely subordinated to those of the community. Paraphrased, this philosophy would mean that measures for the better living of the community should be advocated and enforced. To be more explicit, equal opportunities for education, ownership of adequate land by all, fair distribution of produce, facilities for earning and other similar necessities of normal free life must be provided. In this context, it remains to be stated that the Marxist leaders cannot be considered as correctly conforming to the concept of Socialism. Who is the Marxist leader who does not own land and possess money much more than what a score of the labouring class or common men have? Is there any Marxist propagandist who does not live luxuriously driving about in his own car, having an

account in the Bank and making trips to foreign countries? If however, the question is raised that they who belong to the non-marxist parties are themselves not conforming to the ideals of socialism, we can only say that the burden of proof is on the marxists to show that they are socialists.

Parties that pay homage to Red Russia and Communist China and plan their political activities to make Lanka a satellite of either of these Powers cannot certainly be said to have patriotic feelings. Lanka that has the holy heritage of a high culture based on the roots of several religions, Hinduism, Buddhism, Christianity and Islam cannot be the happy hunting ground of leftist leaders to whom religion is nothing but a narcotic. Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Tibet are glaring examples of how Russian and Chinese aspirations deal death blows to freedom and in our own land, the shameless stand that was taken by the Leftists in collusion with the S.L.F.P. on the question of language and the *Masala vada!* line that was adopted by the Coalitionists show that the reason for Leftists being left out of our reckoning is simple and clear.

And now Punjab! After That?

Another State in the Union of India is in commotion. The alliance in Punjab has been found wanting.

Alliances are necessary factors in political diplomacy; but certainly they cannot be formed for the purpose of putting back the clock of progress. It is a challenge to the glorious past that India should be strife-ridden by untenable and unholy alliances of forces which normally cannot get together. Feeding fat on the internal disruption of the All India Congress, the professional disruptors have now set afoot mischief on a nation wide basis with the result that not one of the states in the Union of India can be said to be secure even for a month, the Tamil Nad Administration excepted.

At this juncture the former Army Chief of India has propounded a more dangerous method of rule for India. The veteran statesman Sri C. Rajagopalachari is inclined to consider this proposal.

National Government has postponed a review of the Drink Problem to 1972. All politicians know fully well how many families have been ruined by taking alcoholic drinks. The government hesitates even to stop the sale of alcoholic drinks in the trains, although they know the disastrous results of drinks. They have an eye on the election. The government must introduce the permit system and totally ban the sale of liquor in trains. Thousands of youths of the Jaffna Peninsula have taken to the habit of drinking, because there is a free sale of alcoholic drinks in trains.

Even the Government is convinced that Fundamental Rights should be granted to the minorities, they are afraid to implement them, because they always think of the next election. This lack of courage, determination and farsightedness is inspections and goes on for decades to the detriment of the economic prosperity of the country. Take another instance like the granting of a University for the Tamils. The entire country from Dondra to Point Pedro knows fully well that Jaffna should be the centre of a University in view of its pre-eminence in culture and social background. Even a firm communalist knows in the heart of hearts that the Tamils should be granted their just demands. But the lust for power prevents him from uttering the truth. Although tact and caution are necessary, the Government must do the right thing and the just thing with firmness, courage and conviction.

In spite of the thousands of learned men in the country, there is tension everywhere. There are dissensions. There is an incessant turmoil in the life of the people. We have enough education now. What we lack now is not the dearth of educated men, but the want of men of the calibre of Mahatma Gandhi or at least the calibre of outstanding personalities of our country, like Arumuga Navalar, Sir P. Arunachalam, Sir P. Ramaswami, D. S. Senanayake, Sir D. B. Jayatilake to steer clear of the turbulent life of the people and instill into them simple and healthy ideas of true democracy which must be preserved at any cost, as we cannot revert back to the state of the country

being ruled by a good king. If we want democracy, we must have true religious patriotic and sincere leaders who will be able to change the mental attitude of the people and bring about a genuine religious revolution in the lives of the people. Mahatma Gandhi spiritualised politics. He was not a dogmatic person. But he was a man of prayer. Prayer was his weapon which won freedom for India and which made the people enshrine him their hearts. Mahatma Gandhi wrote the following in one of his writings. "Whatever striking things have done in life I have not done prompted by reason but my instinct. I would say God". Politics must be deeply religious. Then they can do something lasting and beneficial to the country.

The general election will be within three months. Some have begun to let loose their tongues coming out with all their prejudices towards their opponents and their parties. The contestants should conduct themselves in a dignified and gentlemanly way speaking the truth, telling the salient and pertinent facts about their programme of work without poisoning and confusing the minds of the young persons who will be the future citizens of the country. The benefits of more than three decades of parliamentary system of government should manifest itself in the dignified election campaign which will begin shortly. It is the duty of the voters to elect honest, able, dutiful, youthful sincere and god-fearing representatives.

We are happy to be able to record here that in the history of the 'Hindu Organ' statements which according to this notice would be deemed to be illegal, had never been published. Our correspondents have always maintained a high level of composure in communications avoiding abuse, invective, vituperation and other unacceptable aspects even when minutely criticizing a point of view.

Journalism is, in true perspective, a service to the people using the gift of writing. Loftiness of thought, correctness of statement, elegance of language, avoidance of commonplace colloquialism, unparliamentary words and phrases, these distinguish the good writer from the rash and the rough. And those of the latter description can never find space in our columns for their irrational outbursts and uncouth utterances.)

N1415 — The following Section of the Ceylon (Parliamentary Election) Order in Council, 1946, is reproduced for general information:—

"Section 58 A. (1) Where there is published in any newspaper any false statement concerning, or relating to, —

- (a) the utterances or activities at any election of any candidate, or any political party which is contesting such election, whether or not such party is a recognized party for the purpose of elections; or
- (b) the conduct or management of such election by such candidate, or any such party,

and such statement is capable of influencing the result of such election, then, every person who at the time of such publication was the proprietor, the manager, the editor, the publisher or other similar officer of that newspaper or was purporting to act in such capacity, shall each be guilty of an illegal practice unless such person proves that such publication was made without his consent or connivance, and that he exercised all such dili-
