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SACRED CONGREGATION WARNS VOTERS OF 'DANGER'

As the Soviet tentacles tightened their grip on Czechoslovakia and are reaching out more menacingly towards Italy, the Sacred Consistorial Congregation, of which the Holy Father himself is Prefect, warned Italian Catholic voters that they are in conscience bound to go to the polls at the general election on April 8 and vote in defence of morality and

recalls this warning by

The decree recalls this warning by the Holy Father last September:

"A heavy responsibility weighs on whoever, man or woman, enjoys political rights to vote, above all where religious interests are at stake. Abstention in this case is in itself—let them know it full well—a grave and mortal sin of omission."

The decree of the Sacred Congregation reads:
"The Sacred Consistorial Congrega

"The Sacred Consistorial Congregation, in consideration of the dangers to which religion and public welfare are exposed, the gravity of which calls for the united collaboration of all honest people, warns all those who have the right to vote—of whatever condition, sex, or age, without exception—that they are in conscience strictly and gravely obliged to use that right.

"Catholies must give their vote only."

"Catholics must give their vote only to those candidates or lists of candidates in which there is the certainty that they will respect and defend the observance of the Divine Law and the rights of religion and of the Church in both private and public life."

SANCTIONS

The decree followed election warnings by two more Italian Cardinals, Cardinal Fossati (Turin) and Cardinal Ruffini (Palermo), who instructed the faithful to support candidates offering "the most secure guarantees from the Catholic point of view."

Cardinal Ruffini's letter advocates the impositions of the same religious sanc-tions on Communists or Marxist Social as did the recent letter by Cardinal Schuster (Milan).

Cardinal Schuster said that absolution must be refused to Communists and to members of movements against the Faith in cases where they formally adhere to the errors contained in these

A commission of six Archbishops and Bishops under Cardinal Prazardo called on Catholic Action members to play a leading part in the elections and to do all in their power to set up and defend "human and Christian values."

In London it became known that it is believed in Whitehall that Italy is the next country on the Russian list for Communist domination.

'LAST DITCH'

But already a new Catholic organisation was preparing Italy's 300 dioceses to repel the Red threat.

"Italian Catholics regard the elections as a last ditch stand, and to fight this battle the National Civic Committee—fat above Catholic Action in numbers, scope and purpose—has been formed," said Prof. Luigi Gedda, its president, in Rome. in Rome.

THE SPECTRE OVER EUROPE R. H. S. Crossman, M.P., Discusses

Britain has been stirred by events in Prague more deeply than at any time since the Munich conference. "We must not make the same mistake again" is the refrain of numberless speeches and edi-

There is a real danger that sympathy with the Czech people and horror of the consequences of appeasement in the 1930's will blind the British Government to the real lessons of the Communist seizure of power in Czechoslo-

If Stalin were indeed nothing but a second Hitler, the problem would be relatively simple. But is he? If Com munism were nothing but Red thuggery, it could be relatively easily defeated. But is it?

It is not true that all we have to do in 1948 is to study our mistakes of 1938 and do the opposite.

THE REAL LESSON

The real lesson of the Communist coup in Czechoslovakia has so far been overlooked. Czechoslovakia is the first Western democracy in which a Communist totalitarian state has been established. blished. This was achieved completely bloodlessly. Democracy has been everthrown in a few hours without the firing of a single shot or even, apparently, the threat of armed force.

Not a scuffle in the street, not an aeroplane in the sky—hardly an arrest. Mr. Gottwald and Mr. Nosek have made Hitler and Mussolini look like clumsy

Not until we compare the technique of Lenin in 1917, Hitler in 1933, and Gottwald in 1948, and observe the as-cending scale of efficiency and precision in each seizure of power, shall we tealise the menace with which we are faced.

A bundred years ago two young Germans fled to Paris from the Rhineland-It was the year of democratic revolu-tions, when the peoples all over Europe rose against their Government and fought at the barrieds. rose against their Government and fought at the barricades.

But these two Germans were not in-terested in such "infantile leftism." They looked ahead to a new sort of revolution, the "capture of the State" revolution, the "capture of the State" by a small, well-knit group of scientific revolutionaries, who know not only how to address mass meetings and to lead meetings and to lead demonstrations, but how to organise the working class as a lever of revolution and thereby to capture the central gans of authority.

In 1848, when the word had only just been invented, Marx and Engels wrote:
"The spectre of Communism hangs over
Europe." To day this astounding prophecy has at last been fulfilled.

3-STAGE TECHNIQUE

The real spectre of Communism is The real spectre of Communism is not the threat of the Red Army or of mass insurrection—they are entirely out of date—but of the Communists' three stage technique for the conquest Red Army or of

The modern, highly centralised State cannot be overthrown by old-fashioned revolutionary methods, by erecting barricades, or by general strikes. Against such assaults it can easily defend itself, But it can be captured from inside, bloodlessly and unsensationally, by men who know their job and will carry through the three-stage plan. The men of the Communist Parties do know their job. job.

To understand the true lesson of Prague we have only to look at the situ-ation in Italy. Here the Communists have alreaty reached stage (1)—they control the trade unions and they hope soon to reach stage (2).

Democratic elections are taking place. They are fighting along with the Social-ists as a single 'Popular Front.' This ists as a single Popular Front may emerge from the elections the strongest single parliamentary group the strongest single parliament, by quite and establish a Government, by o

From that moment it will always be possible for the Communists to put stage (3) of the plan into operation.

HOW TO MEET IT

The real beadache for statesmen in London and Washington is how to meet this danger. If the Italian Right were to suppress the Left by armed force, then they would be responsible for destroying democracy and for installing what would probably be as inefficient, corrupt, and reactionary a regime as the present Greek Government. This is no way to fight the battle against Communism.

Now look at the other alternative. If the "Popular Front" establishes a Left Coalition Government, like the Left Coalition in Prague, what should the Western Powers do?

If the Americans give Marshall aid, then at any moment they may find that that aid has gone to strengthen a coun-try which has been suddenly transformtotalitarian member of the Eastern bloc.

But if Washington cuts off E.R.P., for Italy and thus produces economic collapse, then the Communists will carry out their coup on the excuse of forestalling a Right-wing rising.

Is Western democracy, then faced with an insoluble dilemma? Must we either destroy democracy in order to smash the Communist Party or else wait defenceless while the Communists put into operation their three-stage plan in one country after another?

No. There is a flaw in the argument. No. There is a flaw in the argument. In no country of the Western Europe, including Italy and France, can the Communists achieve an electoral majority by themselves. Stage (2) of their plan can only be carried out if they persuade the Socialist parties to form a common electoral front and to share with them in a Coalition Government.

OEVIOUS MORAL

Check Reds Expropriate Church Land

Arrests, expropriation of large estates, suppression of newspapers and a nationsuppression of newspapers and a nation-wide membership drive by the dominant Communist Party are among the latest developments reported since the Com-munist regime began in Prague. The new Czechoslovak Minister of Justice, Dr. Alexei Cepicka, said that about 200 persons had been arrested for offences against the State in Czechoslo-vakia since he took office.

One of them is armed with a pail of ice-cold water which causes the victim to shiver; then comes the second with his furnace making the patient's skin burning hot, reddening his face and causing him to suffer from a high temperature; the third beats the unhappy patient's head with a hammer (in this way the author explains the inevitable headaches from which the malarial subject suffers).

To day we know that malaria is transmitted by the anophele and that this melady can be prevented by taking a daily dose of 6 grains of quinine throughout the tever season; it can be cured by employing the short treatment (by administering daily 15 grains to 20 grains of quinine during 5 to 7 days) as advised by the Malaria-Commission of the League of Nations. On page 125 of its report (English edition) issued in 1938, this Malaria Commission, comof its report (English edition) issued in 1938, this Malaria Commission, composed of eminent experts in malaria control, stresses the fact that among anti-malarial drugs, quinine still ranks fust in current practice, by reason of its clinical effectiveness and almost complete absence of toxicity, coupled with the widespread knowledge of its use and dosage. dosage.

In china each locality has its own gods which it worships in special temples. Moreover, every trade has its patron saint who is worshipped as a divinity.

Chinese religion is based on the writings of three great philosophers: Confucius (K'oung fourtse), Lao-tse and Buddha and is therefore founded on philosophical systems. But of the highminded philosophy and profound thought of the three above-mentioned philoso-phers there is not much that has actu-ally entered into the Chinese religion. And whilst we find this religion some-what strange, yet we cannot condemn it and treat it as a silly superstition, for we frequently find its origin in ancient instincts and profoundly human senti-ments. The Cause of the Trouble

Plus says that the present abuseslow wages, bad housing, sweated labour immoral conditions of work, bad example, are holding men back from saving their souls. The present abuses of private ownership make a man think of nothing but getting his living.

If a man can only think
of getting his living
he cannot think of saving his soul.

If a man must give all his time to getting his living and no time to saving his soul what does it show?
It shows that the moral law is neglected. Yet it is only this law that can control a man's lust after riches and power. The moral law is neglected by owners and workers. The workers neglect it because the owners neglect it. Many workers neglect the moral law because many owners have forced them to do so by conditions of work. Moral dangers in factories, bad housing conditions, and many other difficulties make the workers irreligious and ignorant of Christ's law.

Christ's Law

Most people agree must be reformed. But the social order cannot be reformed reform their consciences. God must come first. This does not mean may not work for gain. It is God's will that men should earn their living, It is right that men who make society richer by their work should themselves be richer. But they must use their riches according to God's laws. If men reform their consciences, they will follow God's law and seek for justice. If they follow Christ's law they will have charity And charity will not let not enough strive only for justice :

Justice does no more than prevent men quarrelling; charity unites them. To bring back justice and charity is not easy.
But it can be done.
There are hopeful signs. Many young workers professional men and leaders of society have become keen to do something about social evils to make the world a better place.

How to Bring Back Christ's Law

Bishops and priests must study social questions. Bishops and priests must inspire laymen to help them. Bishops and priests must inspire the workers to become the apostles and employers to be the apostles of employers. Bishot's and priests must train all these apostles. Laymen and laywomen will become apostles by learning their faith thoroughly; by study and practical work, and especially by making retreats If laymen and laywomen will make retreats, aymen and laywomen will be excellent Christians, real apostles filled with love of Christ. strong in faith, full of courage, aflame with zeal, eager to spread the kingdom of Christ. If Bishops and priests, workers and employers, laymen and laywomen, will be apostles, they must all work together.
