'I doctrine of modern Communism,' 'In Pope Pius XI, 'there is no room for the idea of God, there is no difference bet idea of God, there is no difference between matter and spirit, between soul and body; there is neither survival of the soul after death nor any hope of a future life.' Then, speaking of man and the family under Communism, the Holy Father says: 'Communism strips man of his liberty and the spiritual principle of moral conduct, robs human personality of all its dignity and removes all the moral restraints that check the eruptions of blind impulse. Further, in man's relations with other individuals Communists hold the principle of abso-Communists hold the principle of absolute equality, reject all divinely constituted authority, including the authority

of the parties. His Holiness then explains that such a doctrine refuses to human duties any sacred character, and logically makes marriage and the family a purely artificial and civil institution. The metion of an indissoluble marriage in is repudiated. Communism would the is repudiated. Communism would seek to emancipate women from the family and the home, and the care of the children devolves upon the State, which demands exclusive rights in the education of the child.

"To discover the evil effects of Com-

munist teaching and practice, we should recall the annexation by Soviet Russia of Lithuania, Estonia and Latvia, and the setting up of a Communist regime there, against the independence of these nations and contrary to the wishes of the people. We remember also the setting up of the Lublin Committee by Moscow, which has prevented Poland from achieving the freedom for which she fought so gallantly. The peoples of Albania, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia and, more recently, Hungary and Rumania and Czechoslovakia, are denied their legitimate freedom. Human rights are openly violated, and these nations are deprived of their independence. Operation that Cures Insanity. -American surgeons and scientists claim to have discovered an operation

which cures "incurable" insanity.

The operation, known as topectomy, entails lifting off part of the skull, while the surgeon operates directly on the frontal lobes or certex to remove outer parts of the front portion of the brain.

The operation takes from four to six.

The operation takes from four to six

It was developed as the result of an analysis of the after-effects of lobotomy, which, it was argued, sometimes caused brain haemorrhage because it involved drilling two holes through the skull.

Doctors who perform topectomy claim that it is not a dangerous operation and does not result in the same damaging after effects as lobotomy.

It does not, they add, decrease the patient's intellectual powers although it may increase them. Patients who have undergone the operation have lost the fears and worries which had driven them insane and suffered no change of personality as a result of it. them insane and suffered no change of personality as a result of it.

Of 24 persons who have so far been operated upon, the doctors report that

20 have been sent home cured. Ten of these are now at work. None died as a result of the operation.

Government Servants' Strike in Calcutta

Early April witnessed the Calcutta Early April witnessed the Calcutta strike in the offices of the Central Government. It was banned immediately and the ban was timely and justified; timely because it ninped in the bud a most dangerous tendency; justified because the strike implied political aggression against the state. It had little in common with an economic aggression against the state. It had lit-the in common with an economic con-flict in a private nodertaking; it was not even a desperate means of redress in a public utility service in which the common good is a supreme considera-tion. It was not only a breach of con-tract on the part of public servants. It was a first attempt, by a great to expected was a first attempt by a gang to seize power by wrecking national peace and economy. Alleged grievances were flimsy, recourse to peaceful redress neglected, appeal to public opinion despised. The sabotage of the Government by the occupation of offices, torceful picketing, hungerstrike, etc., was planned with re-morseless cunning; state-life would be disrupted and the Government would be cornered into surrender. The Gov-ernment showed all desirable speed and frimmers. Pandit Nehru threatened re-hellious employees with dismissal; armed cordons fenced off public offices and buildings. From the first it was clear that the strike would fail; few incidents occurred and even feminine

incidents occurred and even feminine support failed to stir the people or alarm the authorities; in a fortnight the strike fizzled out in dismal ridicule.

The people of Bengal are often reproached with being emotionally prompt to listen to tales of woe. On this occasion they saw through the game of the mischief-mongers who played on public sentiment I eople realised that there was no case for officials to strike, and that this strike of theirs was in a category by itself. A government servant is gory by itself. A government servant is not in the same position as an employee in a private firm; he is in one of the essential services and has undertaken not to impair the administration which is vital to civil peace and order. His work does not only concern him and his superior officers, but it is of direct interest to the public. He is not like a shoemaker who would fail to produce a few pairs of shoes for possible buyers; his services are necessary to the smooth running of the running of the country, and his remissness is certain to affect dutiful citizens who have a right to efficient administration. A combination of public servants to upset government services is bound to cause incalculable damage to the common good, and can best be compared to a mutiny in the armed forces. The firmness of the authorities was fully justified,—The New Review, May 1948.

Behind the Easier Relations in Berlin

The process of eliminating political nonconformity continues inexorably in the Soviet zone of Germany. Attention has been distracted from this by the international crisis in Berlin. As in the device of disguising Communism inside the Socialist Unity Party in Poland, the Communists are afraid of the effect of their own reputation. So also in Italy, where the great value of Signor Nenni is that he serves as a stalking horse. The Italian Communists, on March 9th, decided to defray all the election expenses of Nenni's Socialists because they judge their funds to be more profitably laid out in the propaganda of "fellow travellers" than in their own.

Cardinal Fulfils Pledge.-Car-Cardinal Fulfils Pledge.—Cardinal Spellman announces that he has been able to fulfil the pledge he gave last May to spend £6,250,000 on church, school, hospital and other building work in the New York diocese. Work already contracted for totals about £4,122,000. Another £1,600,000 worth of work will be started soon. A further £640,000 worth is expected to start later this year. Altogether, there are 29 plans in the present Catholic building programme.

Two of the largest are the new Alfred E. Smith Memorial at St. Vincent's Hospital, costing about £1,500,000 and the Archbishop Stepinac High School, costing about £1,050,000.

Truman's Envoy at the Vatican.—Mr. Myron Taylor, President Truman's special envoy to the Holy see, handed a letter from the President to the Pope during his 45 minutes audience with His Holiness on the 5th of last month. Mr. Taylor arrived in Rome from the United States, after stopping at Lisbon and Madrid, where he met General Franco. He is expected to stay in Rome two or three months—much longer than any previous visit—and his wife is expected from America in the next few days. Mr. Taylor's trip to Rome, the first in six months, caused speculation in view of the Italian general elections beginning April 18, but it was stated that the visit was merely routine. The Rome Newspaper Quotidiano commented that Mr. Taylor's merely routine. The Rome Newspaper Quotidiano commented that Mr. Taylor's return to Rome "is definite proof that he is firmly in his post and that the hostility of some groups of Protestants in the United States is an isolated stand of no practical importance." This referred to the recently-formed Protestant organisation, in Washington, which has protested strongly against the maintenance of such diplomatic relations between the United States and the Vatican.


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
