When you say that man was made in the image of God, you reverence him whatever be his station in life. In the same breath you speak of God-given rights, of personal inviolability, of the dignity of the individual, of the sacredness of life etc., etc. The entire volume of human rights is bound up with the homage we pay to man as the image and protege of the lavisible Who rules and destines. This is the full import of the word "sacred" when used in conjunction with the term "rights." This is the only adequate qualification for the use of the word "rights" to describe anything that a man, woman or child might lay claim to. Otherwise a man is no better than an inflated carcass, a football waiting to be kicked.

But why the kicks? Would it not be wonderful if each one walked in the possession of his own right and voided the kicking? Would it not be wonderful if there were no ambitious, jealousies, spitefulness, etc.? Would it not be wonderful if men were pure spirits, moving in their separate spheres like the angels, without the encumbrance of a body full of kicks? Of course, it would be wonderful. But we are not here engaged in idle speculations. We have to face hard facts, viz, that each of us is elbowing for a place under the sun; that we are determined on having and defending our rights even if we have to that we are determined on having and defending our rights even if we have to kick others out of theirs; that there is no limit to the rights we arrogate to ourselves at the cost of others. If the definition and enforcement of our rights depend on our ability to kick, then God defend the weal?! Nobody else can or will will.

A recent protest made by the Soviet brought wrinkles to the brows of the other members of the U.N.O. Advertently or inadvertently the latter had written in the preamble of the Declaration of Human Rights "man is created in the image and likeness of God." The Soviet Union and its satellite States wanted this proposition to be expunged. Hence the wrinkles. Said the rest of the world, "But why make bones about it?" So, the Soviet Union temporized by lodging a "friendly protest!"

Having accounted for the rank and file of the Soviet world, it behoves us to ask, "in whose image is the Dictator made?" It is not hard to say. There are two opinions, which though contrary, can be stuck to each other like the obverse and the reverse of a medal. The obverse presents to view a Selfmade Man: a Superman who vaunts his achievements over his fellow-men, a megalomaniac who half imagines that he bestrides the earth like a Colossus, and will not rest till he has given this fancy its ruthless fulfilment. He is the one who seizes thrones and ascends them over the trampled rights and mangled bodies of thousands and millions.

It is his greatest boast that he is a far worther man than those hereditary princes of the realm who did nothing special to deserve the throne. It is his mortification to see princes ascend the throne with natural ease and without that orgy of blood and nightmare of revolt which prelude the making of a dictator. He is forever bewildered at the infatuation of history and of the common folk—it amounts to a veritable superstition—which holds "sacred" the person and privileges of a prince as though he were the "Anointed of the Lord" (if there he a Lord)! In fact the Self-made Dictator, in the act of dethroning the prince is as ready to dethrone God and replace the Omnipotent It is his greatest boast that he throne God and replace the Omnipotent Creator, Judge and Lawgiver. In this is his monstrous transgression. Hence is his monstrous transgression. Hence the obverse of the medal which portrays a Self-made Man, fits in with the reverse that characterizes him as a replica of the devil. It is a belief that comes down from the ages of Faith, from Eden down from the ages of Faith, from Eden itself, that it is either God or the devil that has a hand in the making of man. A man develops either in the image of God or the devil. Taking into account the viciousness of Original Sin, there is no middle course. However much the moderns may deny the existence of God or of the devil, in effect it works out like that. "By their fruits you shall know them."

To revert to the prince, we find ourselves entangled with the belief that by Grace man becomes a son of God and an heir to heaven. To be created in the image and likeness of God means to inherit a princedom, to be His son and (Continued on Page 4)

On December 11, 1946, the General Assembly of the U. N. O. created the International Children's Emergency Fund for the benefit of children and adolescents of countries which were the adolescents of countries which were the victims of aggression or were receiving assistance from UNRRA and for child health purposes generally throughout the World. The Fund is also used for the benefit of expectant and nursing mothers. The Executive Board of the Fund, in agreement with governments concerned, takes measures to ensure the proper utilization and distribution of supplies or other assistance which it provides. provides.

The Fund consists of assets available by UNRRA and voluntary con-

available by UNRRA and voluntary con-tributions made by governments, volun-tary agencies, individuals and others. At the end of April 1948 the contri-butions and pledges to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) amounted to approximately Rs. 491,000,000/-.

2,500.000 Bollars will be Biverted to Ceylon. — When the "Mount Mansfield" left the Colombo Harbour on Friday on her Americabound voyage, the event marked the resumption of direct trade relations in the commercial sphere between Ceylon and the United States after a lapse of more than twenty years.

The cargo vessel was carrying a shipment of coconut oil to America—the first bulk shipment ever to have left Ceylon for the United States.

Veterans in the Coconut industry may dimly recall similar shipments of coconut oil leaving the Ceylon docks in wooden casks, as far back as 1911, but there were never bulk shipments before. Subsequently, the imposition of protective tariffs interrupted trade relations between Ceylon and the United States.

According to negotiations that have just been concluded, the United States. Government, I understand has indicated its willingness to permit the purchase through commercial channels, of Ceylon coconut oil up to the extent of tons, at a price very much more favour-

tons, at a price very much more ravourable than the United Kingdon Government's price of £89 per ton.

This would mean that approximately 2,500,000 American dollars will be diverted to Ceylon and consequently to the Commonwealth Sterling Pool.—Ceylon

What about rising prices which are so unbalancing to the country as well as to the family budget? country as well as to the family budget? Is it not expected in the first place Is it not expected in the first place that the ministers should bend all their energies to reducing the cost of living, and hacking at the malpractices that are in great measure responsible for rising prices? It ought to be anxiety and work enough for the country's Karbaris without embarking on the highly-diverting and costly experiment of Probibition. That Prohibition is going to be a crippling burden both on the country's economy and a further tax on the rateeconomy and a further tax on the rate-payer need not be demonstrated. What needs to be carefully thought out is that needs to be carefully thought out is that prohibition at this stage will considerably weaken the effort to fight down prices. And the consequent restlessness that convulses the country will be as much a responsibility of the Government as of the subversive elements that hope to profit by it.—The Examiner.

On that ground alone moralists demn the use of the atom bomb; as also the use of poison gas, and bacteriological weapons. The bombing of Nagasaki and Hiroshima shortened the war, but destroyed the prestige of the victors, and left a trail of hatred that effectively precludes peace.

It is interesting to note that Sir James Grigg, Minister for War in 1945, and the United States State Department, are reported to have denied all knowledge of the alleged threat of massacre by the Japanese.—Cath. Times.

The "Christian Communists'

The Lambeth Conference has produced, with the personal endorsement of the Archbishop of Canterbury at a press conference, a new complication in European life. THE WORLD

Malaria occurs most frequently in tropical and subtropical countries; also in the temperate zone in the form of seasonal malaria. In the tropics, it is specially prevalent near the sea coast and on the shore of lagoons. It may be said that malaria is a veritable ma-lady of the people, against which a steady fight has been and is being main-tained, for it causes heavy losses in human life and depleted health.

In countries where this epidemic malady rages, it can also have such a harmful effect on the number of workers available as to interfere with busi ness, especially in the case of a planta-tion, where it may mean a drop in production and a reduction in labour seriously affecting the results of the harvest.

The loss of human life, due to malaria, amounts to millions every year. Here are some figures. In 1909, the American writer L. O.

In 1909, the American writer L. O. Howard placed at 3,000,000 the malaria cases occurring every year in the United States, and reckoned that the total losses by death, expenses and damages from which businesses suffered owing to the shortage of labour thus caused, was at least 10,000,000 dollars per year. Moreover, Sir Ronald Ross proved that the number of cases of death from malaria in British India amounted to 1,300,000 per year.

Alas! it is also well known in the Dutch East Indies that it remains a great danger for farming and similar enterprises which can scarcely ever

escape the risks that it involves. escape the risks that it involves. In certain parts of this colony the question of "malaria or no malaria" is just like "to be or not to be" for the speople and concerns installed there. According to Prof. Schuffner of Amsterdam, malaria heads the list of causes of death in the Dutch East Indies, less perhaps than formerly, but still with a lead over all other ills. And yet, strange to say, we have long pessessed the best to say, we have long pessessed the best cure for malaria that is known to medicine. We venture to affirm that malaria is not fatal if the patient only takes quinine in time and in the correct manner. The service that quinine renders in the fight against malaria is incalculable. incalculable.

To-day, the method prescribed for preventing and curing malaria is the short quinine treatment as recommended by the Malaria Commission of the League of Nations, consisting of taking from 15-20 grains of quinine per day during 5 to 7 days, relapses, if any, to be treated in the same way. As a preventive dose, 6 grains of quinine should be treated in the same way. As a pre-ventive dose, 6 grains of quinine should be taken daily during the malaria season and for some time afterwards, to prevent a recurrence.
