In a letter from Canterbury on Good Friday, 1944, Dr. Temple, after expressing deep sympathy with the Holy Father in the position which he and Rome were placed by the war, wrote:

"May God in his great mercy grant an early restoration of peace on a foundation of justice, and may the whole fellowship of Christ's disciples be so guided by the Holy Spirit that we may together declare the Christian principles for the ordering of human life and for the ordering of human life and recall our suffering world to that obedience to God's will in which alone can be found deliverance from the evils which afflict mankind."

In his first letter Dr. Temple had

asked Archbishop Godfrey to inform the Holy Father of his profound sympathy in the "grievous restrictions upon his freedom of action and unterance by those who pose as his protectors."

The two letters are quoted in a letter to the Church Times by Canon John A. Douglas, to whom Dr. Temple gave them for transmission to the Apostolic

"He would not and could not consider a definition of that tradition to which all types of thought in the Church of England would not assent.

"The second letter quoted by Canon Douglas was to be a preliminary ap-

## Christian Underground In Russia

OVER 69 MILLIONS WORK IN SECRECY

The Christian underground in Russia now claims a membership of some two million youths and more that 67 million

These startling facts are revealed in an article on "God's Underground in Russia", in a recent edition of Collier's magazine, as related by Fr. George, a Catholic Croat priest, who entered Russia as a Jugoslav Partisan officer to contact the religious underground.

The article is written by Gretta Pal-

mer, a recent convert to Catholicism. Fr. George's real name, of course caunot be revealed.

The priests, after helping Archbishop Stepinac, the imprisoned Zagreb prelate to aid fleeing Jews from the Nazis, himself sought refuge with the partisans

in the forests. It was then that he met Red soldiers who were giving assistance to the Partisans. His identity as a priest was a closely guarded secret and only known

closely guarded secret and only known to a few.

"During my service in the forest," he said, "I learned that a widespresd belief in God has survived bitter persecution and that at least a third of the young Red soldiers have a strong, although secret, faith in the Christian Church.

to the peasants. The Communist "elite", the graduates of Moscow's universities, have begun to doubt the truth of the Marxian philosophy."

#### "300,000,000 SLAVES"

A Russian general made it possible for the priest to enter the U.S.S.R. when he offered his proposition:
"Ours is a country of 300,000,000 students and most curical despotism of

bloodiest and most cynical despotism of history," he said.

"The proof that we Russians are not all Communists lies in the continued existence of a Christian underground

BETHLEHEM. Christ's birthplace lies beside and above the one macadam road from the South—from Hebron and Moslem Egypt—into Jeru-salem. In Bethlehem is the Church of the Nativity, occupied by both Catholics and Orthodox, the oldest Church in Christendom.

(6) NAZARETH. The fate of the home town of the Holy Family rests upon that of two other cities, both Jewish strongbolds, Haifa and Tiberias. Nazareth sits on a high spot on good roads between these two, but is itself an Arab city. Whether the Jews will allow the Arabs to continue to dominate this point on an important line of access remains to be seen. ### "TREAT EVERYONE AS A SPY"

Treat every man who calls himself a priest and does not flee from Com-munist detection as a quisling and as a spy," the priest was told.

"The churches in Russia are open today. Yes. But they will be closed again to-morrow if the Communist

clique remains in power.

"Above all, avoid the followers of Acting Patriarch Sergei, the man who has called Stalin 'our leader under God'. He betrayed his Church to the Communists once before in the 20s. This 'toleration' is a before

richeration' is a hoax.

Fr. George visited Moscow, Kiev and other cities where he saw evidence of the great Christian underground and the hunger of the people of Russia for Christianity.
"Before I left Moscow I had baptised

seven members of the dreaded NKVD.

seven members of the dreaded NKVD,"
the priest remarked.
In the cellar storeroom of a large
apartment house, Fr. George met one
of the "travelling priests" of Russia
who care for the spiritual needs of about
half of the underground, and was told
that their number probably exceeds the
5,665 registered priests.
The travelling priest is a graduate of
the Moscow cellar seminary, which has
since been destroyed.

"The secret priests," Fr. George declared, "continue to work in God's underground, hidden from the eyes of MVD by a score of different disguises baptising and marrying, hearing Confessions and giving Holy Communion.

### MINSTRELS TOO

Minstrels, too, are helping to keep alive the faith, Fr. George said. As they travel from one town to another they slip in hymns between folk songs. "My best sources," Fr. George related, "estimated that youth groups (sometimes called 'Christsomol,) have as many members as the official Com-

(sometimes called 'Christsomol,') have as many members as the official Communist youth groups, the 'Comsomol'.

"This would mean that some 2,000,000 children are acceptable."

"The estimates of adult believers, which vary from one-third to two-fifths

In the cold war that is keeping the world tense, we who are outside Russia must never confuse the Russian people with the tiny minority who are Communists," Fr. George stressed.

"I have discovered there are millions who have kept the faith alive and millions who are eager to learn of it."

### Our Precious Shrines in Palestine

most of our precious shrines and Holy places, in Palestine. Christ's birth-place, the site of the Sermon on the Mount, the place of the last Supper and the Pentecostal appearance, the route along which the Saviour bore His Cross, along which the Saviour bore His Cross, the hill of Calvary on which He died, the site of the Ascension will be particularly vulnerable to the bombs, shells and rifle fire of Jews and Arabs in the renewed flare up. Below we list the following holy places which stand in jeopardy if major military action ensues. Some have already suffered in the present warfare.

(1) MT. CALVARY, on which stands the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. This edifice, shared by Catholics and Greek and Armenian Orthodox Christians, also encompasses the tomb of Christ, scene of the Resurrection. It lies only about two city blocks inside the Walled City of Jerusalem, and just across the wall from the Jaffa Road commercial and communications centre, which must be held by whoever seeks to dominate the city. At present the Jews control this centre. The hill of Calvary has been devastated before, notably by the Romans in 70 A.D. and 135 A.D., and by the Persians early in the seventh century.

(2) THE VIA DOLOROSA, the

The Jewish Arab conflict endangers | the Walled City and is dotted with way side chapels to mark the various stages of Christ's last journey. It will be par-ticularly subject to destruction if street fighting becomes general in the Walled City. The first Station, at the Church of the Flagellation, is maintained by the Franciscans, as are two others. The last five stations are inside the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

(3) MOUNT SION, scene of the Last Supper, the institution of the Holy Eucharist, and the Pentecostal coming of the Holy Ghost. Situated just outside the walls of Old Jerusalem, the mount has already been visited by shot and shell. The Benedictine Abbey of the Dormition of the Blessed Virgin is here, close to the location of the Upper Room (now controlled by Moslems). Room (now controlled by Moslems).
On the Mount too, is the place where once stood the House of Caiphas, scene of Christ's trial by the Jewish hierarchy. The eminence is militarily important because it commands the southern conversely to Jewisley. ern approach to Jerusalem.

#### OUR LADY, 1948

Liturgically we are in a lull. The Feast of the Assumption completed the year's cycle of feasts in Our Lady's honour. The cycle begins again on September 8th, the Feast of Our Lady's Nativity. The season is therefore an appropriate one to take stock of ourselves vis-a-vis Our Lady in this year of grace 1948.

The centenary celebrations are

now history, impressive history in that they were marked with such a tangible demonstration of what a place Mary occupies in our spiritual life. They were none the less impressive for synchronizing with amazing mani-festations of the same devotion, first in Europe and now in Ame-

Everything points to our facing a decisive crisis in history. Mary's intervention always points to that, even if we did not already have evidence enough of the gruesome struggle impending. Of Mary's intervention easily the most striking in our time is Fatima.

Fatima means many things. It means a call to renewed devotion to Our Lady, particularly to Our Lady of the Rosary who has always been invoked successfully in times of acute crisis. One remembers the Albigenses and Lepanto. It means a call to penance which in these modern days is such an effective protest against the encroaching philosophy that would assure us that on bread alone man lives.

But Fatima means more. is a re-assertion of the truth embodied in her title of co-Redemptrix. This title means that not merely did she suffer on account of her Son's sufferings but that she suffered with Him for us and for our sins. It is in line with the mysterious statement of St. Paul 'I help to pay off the debt which the afflictions of Christ leave still to be paid.' It is founded on the doctrine of Christ's mystical body and on the fundamentally human de-mand that we should not be satisfied with being mere spectators of Christ's sufferings for us but

### The Devotion of St. Bernard and St. John Eudes to the Blessed Virgin

The Feasts of two great lovers of Our Lady are commemorated this month by the Church. In the annals of the Church, no more remarkable instance of the power of an individual over the men of his age is there than in St. Bernard. A solitary religious, without office, rank, worldly control, or even the ecclesiastical dignities, he acquired and wielded a power over the people. Although he was confined within his monastery, his was the ruling will of his time. He stands forth as a preacher, reformer, mystical writer and statesman. All this power of dealing with affairs and with men came by spiritual cul-ture, through the grace of the Holy Ghost.

Among all writers of the first thousand years of the Church, none is more full of fervent, tender, and ardent love and veneration for the Mother of God. was erroneously thought that he was opposed to the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception, which had then not been defined as a dogma of the Church. the Epistle to the canons of the Church in Lyons, St. Bernard maintains;—(1) That the Bless-ed Virgin Mary was throughout her whole life without sin. (2) That she was without original sin, and (3) That she was born without original sin.

The doctrine he rejected was the supposition that the Immaculate Conception was a peculi-arity arising from the order of nature including her parents, and even her ancestors, within its range: It was his own doctrine, perfect in identity, only expressed with more accuracy, that was later defined as a dogma.

St. John Eudes, was like St. Bernard a great Missionary Founder and reformer, and within a life of seventy-nine years, he wrote a number of valuable books. For many years his works were practically unknown. Only in 1905 about twenty volumes were found and edited by the famous Fr. Charles Lebrun. The

The Citizenship Bill deals with the

The Citizenship Bill deals with the creation of a status of a citizen of Ceylon and the Immigrants and Emigrants Bill provides for controlling entry into Ceylon of persons other than citizens of Ceylon, for regulating the departure from Ceylon of citizens and persons other than citizens of Ceylon and for temoving from Ceylon undesirable per-sons who are not citizens of Ceylon. Both Bills have been the subject of

sons who are not citizens of Ceylon. Both Bills have been the subject of protracted negotiations with the Government of India.

According to the Citizenship Bill, citizenship of Ceylon will be granted by descent as well as by registration, the persons being referred to as citizen by descent or citizen by registration.

descent or citizen by registration.

A person born in Ceylon before the appointed date which will be fixed later will be given the status of a citizen of Ceylon by descent, if his father was born in Ceylon or if his paternal grandfather and paternal great-grandfather were born in Ceylon.

A person born outside Ceylon before the appointed date will be given the status of citizen of Ceylon by descent, if his father and paternal grandfather were born in Ceylon or his paternal were born in Ceylon or his paternal grandfather and paternal great-grandfather were born in Ceylon,

A person born in Ceylon on or after

the appointed date will be given the status of citizen of Ceylon by descent if at the time of his birth his father a citizen of Ceylon.

A person born outside Ceylon on or after the appointed date will be given the status of a citizen of Ceylon by des-cent if at the time of his birth his father was a citizen of Ceylon and if within one year from the date of his birth, it is one year from the date of his birth, it is registered at the office of the Consular Officer, Ceylon, in the country of birth, or, where there is so such officer at the appropriate Embassy or Consulate in that country or at the office of the Minister in Ceylon.

#### NO DUAL CITIZENSHIP

Special provision is made in the Act as regards dual citizenship. It-states: No person who is a citizen of any other country under any law in force in that country shall have the status of a citizen of Ceylon by descent unless he re-nounces the citizenship of that country in accordance with that law.

As regards persons who will be enti-tled to Ceylon citizenship by registration the Bill lays down that they should have the following qualifications:

That the applicant is of full age

and of sound mind.

Ceylon,
A person who has these qualifications A person who has these qualifications has to apply for registration as a citizen of Ceylon to the Minister concerned. The Minister is vested with the right of refusal of such application an his decision shall be final and shall not be tested in a court of law.

The Act also provides for registration as citizens of Ceylon provided the application is made to the Minister on the following grounds: that he is a person

following grounds: that he is a person who firstly, has rendered distinguished public service or is eminent in professional or commercial, industrial or agrisional or commercial, industrial or agri-cultural life or, secondly, has been granted in Ceylon a Certificate of Na-turalisation under the British National-ity and Status (Aliens) Act, 1914 of the United Kingdom or Letters Patent United Kingdom or Letters Patent under the Naturalisation Ordinance and has not ceased to be a British subject and secondly, that he is and intends to continue to be ordinarily resident in Ceylon.

The number of persons registe The number of persons registered as citizens of Ceylon under this particular section shall not exceed 25 in any year and the Minister's refusal to allow such application is to be final "and shall not be tested in any court of law."

Conditions under which a person loses his rights of Ceylon citizenship are also specified in the Bill. Among these is the case in which he voluntarily or by operation of law becomes a citizen of any other country. The Minister is any other country. The Minister is also empowered under this Act to make all necessary regulations but all such regulations are pubject to approval of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

### The Olympic Games

(By Our London Correspondent)

Every one will suspect that these games have some connection with Greece because of the word Olympic. Indeed the games commenced actually in Greece.

Indeed the games commenced actually in Greece.

The story of the origin of the Olympic Games is lost both in the mist of time and mythology. There was a record of victors from 776 B.C. but the Games were certainly held regularly before that date. There is a story probably confined to mythology that the Games started as a result of races between suitors for the hand of a king's daugater. Another, that they originated in the races among five brothers held every five years. Anyway, it was from 776 B.C. that the Games were first-held at four year intervals, at the first full moon after the summer solstice.

The scene of the Games then was an area at Olympia in the plain of Ellis in the Western Peloponnese. The centre of the festival was a collection of temples to the Greek gods, Zeus, Hera and others. Some German archeologists who have averyed the site start that

of the festival was a contector of the festival was and fishes and many others, and the preached His Sermon on the Mount, the Jewish Haganah organization has set up an important outpost. again put on at Athens.

The chief events in the old days were foot races, chariot races, the pancra-tium, a combination of boxing and wrestling, and the pentathlon, a combi-nation of long jumping, throwing the discus and javelin, running and wrest-

discus and javelin, running and wrestling.

Prizes were at first bronze tripods,
the wreaths of wild olives; but the
most valuable prize of all was free
maintenance for life which the winner
was generally given by his native city.
The first of the modern series that
was really organized on a grand scale
was that at London in 1908. The year

The Motto of the Olympic Games which appears under the rings is citius, altius, fortius' (quicker, higher, more strongly)—indicative of the athletes' endeavour to run faster (citius), jump higher (altius) and throw more strongly (fortius), always in fact get a bit better than what you were before, Isn't it an ideal aim for any progressive society?

The Olympic Games must include

The Olympic Games must include the following events: athletics, gym-nastics, combative sports, swimming, equestrian sports, pentathlons and art competitions.

The value of the Olympic Games.
Of all the values the first and most outstanding one is the international or social value. The amateurs of all nations social value. The amateurs of all nations in fact this year six thousand from 60 different nations are assembled on an equal footing and under conditions as perfect as possible. There is much exchange of ideas among the various athletes and their friends and thus there is a cultural value too. The physical value of Games in general with its attendant sporting value of fairplay cannot too easily be missed. There is perhaps a moral value in the training of character among the athletes. Be-

sides, the intellectual value of strategic moves cannot be forgotten. In grace of movement and style perhaps there is definitely an aesthetic value too. There is also a patriotic value as too. There is also a patriotic value as seen from their Olympic Oath which the competitors take:—"We swear that we will take part in the Olympic Games in loyal competition, respecting the regulations which govern them and desirous of participating in them in the true spirit of sportmanship for the bonour of our country and for the glory of expert."


