Branding the schools' closure moves as "illegal," the State's education department has sent out a warning to Catholic school managers in Trivandrum district. Catholic spokesmen state that the Managers will ignore the government warning.

Police desecrate

Chapel

The Secretary to the Auxiliary Bishop of Trivandrum states that Police broke open the chapel of Trivandrum's leading Catholic school and desecrated it.

The incident was part of an outbreak in the premises of the St. Joseph's High School owned by the Diocese of Trivandrum. It was climaxed by a prolonged exchange of stones between Catholic "volunteers" and supporters of the Kerala government.

The secretary said the first set of 137 volunteers posted inside the school were arrested by the police. The action followed a "not true" report to the police to the effect that the volunteers were kept there for the purpose of picketting government schools.

Reds break open

church school

A grim street fight raged for about 30 minutes outside a Catholic school in Trivandrum following an obviously Communist-inspired attempt to defeat the schools closure move.

Communist-backed students broke open the barred gates of St. Joseph's High School. They were locked in a 30 minute fight with Catholic volunteers who tried to defend the school from inside. The incident was the first "show of force" by opponents of the closure move.

Earlier, police entered the school and

Earlier, police entered the school and emptied it of its original set of volunteers. More than 130 Catholic youths were arrested, leading to a protest to the central government by the school's owner, Bishop Vincent V. Dereere of Trivandrum.

"Why this selective shooting?" asks Bishop

INVESTIGATIONS into three brutal police firings on unarmed Catholic populations strengthen the widely-held belief that the Kerala's Communist Government is adamant in exterminating

In Trivandrum Chief Minister Namboodiripad refused flatly to order the usual judicial inquiry into the Police attacks.

Leader of the Kerala Socialist Party, Mathai Manjuran, charging Kerala's police minister with giving distinct orders to begin the firing in Angamali, stated that the Kerala government's intention was to "isolate" Catholics in preparation for a "religious persecution" against them.

Bishop Peter Bernard Pereira, Auxiliary of Trivandrum, has writ-ten to Governor Ramakrishna Rao protesting against what he calls the "selective shooting" of Catholics by the Communist government. Two of the firings were in the Bishop's diocese

diocese.


The Bishop has said that they were 'on a pattern' and "were preplanned to terrorise the Catholics."

In the letter, Bishop Pereira also named two Communists who he said went to the police station and brought the police to fire on the Catholic crowd.

The Bishop denied government claims that Catholics were assembled by the tolling of church bells, "After having made local enquiry, I can safely deny this," he said.

Newspaper reports had held that it was based on disclosures made by "highly-placed spokesmen." How-ever, the houses of both Archbishop Joseph Attipetty of Verapoly and

SCHOOLS TAKE-OVER "NATIONAL DISASTER"

says Justice Pulle

(by a Messenger reporter)

Presiding at the annual Prize-giving of St. Aloysius' College, Galle, last Saturday, Justice M. F. S. Pulle had some very forthright remarks to make on the campaign for the take-over of assisted schools. "The day that happens," said the Judge, "we shall find ourselves face to face with national disaster of the first magnitude."

national disaster of the first may "Catholics have built schools," he said, "for the education of their children as a duty of obedience to the Church. If this right is denied, in the name of honesty let there be a stop to all this talk of freedom and fundamental human rights, and let a plain confession be made that under a so-called democratic system a demand can be made that certain minority groups, whether religious or racial, must submit themselves to a process of strangulation. Those who, is the name of ushering in a new and supreme system of education, make false accusations against institutions which have served mankind, do not realise that they are doing a disservice to education."

Justice Pulle also referred to the malicious campaign against Catholics. He decried the tendency to hard accusations with reckless aban-

don with perhaps no other object than that of inflaming passions which ought rather to be submerged in these troublesome days, when citizens of

The name Cana recalls, of course, the marriage feast at Cana of Galilee at which Christ worked His first miracle Christ worked His first miracle and evidenced His concern for the happiness of married couples. The Cana Conferences take varied forms, but in general they can be described as a movement which has as its purpose the indoctrinating of married couples with the Christian ideals of marriage. lian ideals of marriage.

While the Conferences discuss the meaning of marriage and the problems of family life, emphasis is rather placed on the Christianizing of marital and parental attitudes than on the here and now solution of a peculiar problem of a particular married couple.

ticular married couple.

The atmosphere at a Cana meeting is one of marked informality. Husbands and wives sit side by side. Where possible, comfortable chairs are provided and smoking is permitted. Questions are invited by the speaker. All types of couples of varied educational and economic background participate.

A characteristic note of Cana is that it is a couple movement. It is not a husband movement, nor is it a wife movement. It is a married couple movement designed to benefit the spiritual and tem-poral welfare of both parties as a unit.



Since its beginning, Cana has

enjoyed a spontaneous growth
throughout the country. The
response from couples has been

instanteneous and enthusiastic. It has effected a unity, a joy, and a love in the husband and wife relationship which has shaken many couples out of the dull, jog-trot routine in which they may have become ensnared.

The wife sees that she has a husband who is not only an economic man, but a man standing in the place of God to her, complementing and





perfecting her and in turn being completed by her.

The husband begins to see marriage as a tremendous vocation of love to which he and his wife are called. In it they continue God's creation by making of each other better lovers of Him and giving to God more lovers of Him in their children.

Cana is not a cure-all for the problems affecting modern marriage and family life. It marriage and family life. It is, however, a positive attempt to help couples find in marriage the satisfaction and joy that Christian marriage, lived according to the pattern of Christ, can give. King Kundasale would not allow the Roman Catholic religion to be exer-cised in his dominions and caused the principal church of Bogambara to be destroyed and ordered the padres to quit it.

His successor King Kirti Siri conti-nued the persecution but after-wards attributing a famine and plague which afflicted the country to this cause, he ordered the images which had adorned the church of Bogambara and which had on its destruction been deposited in his stores to be given to the people

2. When the narrative speaks of 12 padres being attached to Bogambara, it obviously means that this church was the headquarters of the mission that had 12 priests working in its various stations.

3. This is, as far as we know, the first reference to King Kirti Siri having restored the statues of the former Bogambara church (Fr. Vaz's) to the Catholics of Wahacotte.

4. We now ask ourselves whether those Catholics did not apply for the restoration to Catholic hands of a still greater treausre that had "adorned the Church of Bogambara," namely, Fr. Joseph Vaz's holy body?

Since the king was thus favourably disposed and accorded them full "enjownent" of their religion at Wahacotte, why did they not ask for this favour? If they did and really got their request and transferred Father's holy remains to Wahacotte, how is it they have not left us any record or tradition about it.

Such a suggestion is based of course on the assumption that the Catholics of Wahacotte were sufficiently organised and not just a group of frightened Christians of the Catacombs at the time.

Quite possibly then, our holy Aposte's remains are still in Kandy and we suggest that the young Levites of holy Israel — our Seminarians — should in their weekly walks and excursions go circling round the walls of Jericho sounding the trumpets of the Lord —i.e., say their Rosary as they trudge along round and round, again and again, the areas declared by one or other expert as probable: the Police Barracks, the Railway Station, the Hospital and the borders of Hantanne Estate, round Pillaiyar Kovil, Palledeniya Vidiya.



Here Comes the Bride!

SOMEHOW or other, the month of June has come to be associated in a very special way with brides — and so we have that exquisite creation known as the "June Bride," the one who symbolises all brides of every month and every week of the year; those radiant young women, with the joy of youth on their faces, the happiness of love in their eyes, and the faith of God in their hearts.

It is to all such women that we turn today, as we too join the general chorus and bow in respect before the brides of today — women with a vocation, women stamped with one of the noblest missions in life.

And yet, it is not so much of the sublimity of marriage or of the life that the bride is commencing, that we wish to speak today; it not so much the joy that fills her life, nor the family that she is founding. We would wish to turn from all these joyful and pleasant thoughts, to other thoughts which may not be quite as pleasant; we would wish to take our gaze away from the incense-filled church and the flower-bedecked altar to something else which should be the logical consequence of the tremendous change that came over bride and bridegroom before the altar of God.

As she comes down the aisle on this her wedding-morn, the face of the bride lights up with happiness. This is indeed the day for which her heart longed. But what a change has come over her! A brief hour or so ago, she had entered the Church, free and independent. Now, she leaves God's Church, no longer free nor independent, on the arm of her husband — and they are now two in one flesh. Bound together for life! Linked together in time and in eternity! Ministers of salvation unto each other! A life-long partnership has commenced — a partnership which so interweaves one life with another; that they can no longer be separated. A most extraordinary unity, because there is nothing else similar to it in the whole wide world — this unique, responsible, but everso-beautiful unity of husband and wife.

And this is precisely the note that we wish to strike today. Decked in all her splendour, smiles greeting her everywhere, the Church herself lavishing every happiness on her—is it not more than a possibility that the Bride should forget the essential core of her entire life? Is it not more than a possibility that she should forget the real significance of this entire new life that has come upon her, and which she has embraced with eagerness and with love? Is it not, in fact, even a strong probability that amidst the cake and the wine and the finery and the music, the real vocation of a bride is apt to be forgotten and put away among the unremembered things of life?

That is why, we would wish to fix the attention of our readers on this aspect of the Bride—the sublime vocation which is hers. Newspapers will talk of the June Bride; others will immortalise her in song and verse; still others will talk of fashions and dresses for her. But alas, how few will even mention what does indeed make the Bride the all-important personage that she is; the fact of her vocation in life!

Bishop Fulton Sheen has said in his own inimitable way that in marriage, there are three rings — the engagement ring, the wedding ring, and suffering. And strangely enough, this is the very point that we wish to make today. It may not be very gracious to stress the role of suffering in marriage, in a Special Bridal Issue of our paper when our readers would perhaps expect us to concentrate on the beauty of the life of the bride. And yet, that is precisely what we are doing.

Suffering suggests strength; it suggests a virile, unflinching approach to life; it points out to a person who puts his shoulder to the task, never looks back, and never deserts at the first sight of difficulty or trouble. And all this and more the bride needs; all this and more she must address her mind to. For, the tragedy of today is the broken home, and the broken marriage — which, in almost every single case, is due to the total absence or the lack of true suffering.

Why is it that so many wives succumb so easily today to the difficulties that face them? Why do so many so quickly stumble and fall by the wayside, the moment the cross begins to weigh somewhat on their shoulders? Why is it that there is a constant looking-back, and an early desertion in the face of difficulty? The answer is just this: the approach to marriage has been all wrong! The approach to the biggest thing in her life has been messed up! Problems and difficulties there have always been in marriage—and yet how valiantly and how admirably our own parents battled through life, and struggled through difficulties, till in God's good time the sun of achievement and fulfilment shone in their lives.

And so, in this our special issue dedicated to brides everywhere, this is the thought we would wish to leave with her—happiness has to be earned and won—often, the difficult way. It has to be enthroned on the altar of selflessness and sacrifice and even of suffering. And so, the preparation for marriage has to be serious—it has to be one of facing up to the life that she is about to commence, and an understanding (as our parents understood) of the strength and fortitude that go together with love and joy in marriage.

LORD BUDDHA A "REACTIONARY"? Grave words from the Dalai Lama

OVER 65,000 Tibetans killed since 1956, numberless monks killed, over 1,000 monasteries destroyed, valuable Buddhist manuscripts destroyed or removed to China, all-out war against Buddhism, and the Buddha himself labelled as a "reactionary" in true Marxist style—these are some of the accusations that the Dalai Lama has made against Red China in the course of his first Press Conference which he gave last week.

Considering the position of the Dalai Lama, one would not expect him to make irresponsible

Dalai Lama, one would not expect him to make irresponsible charges against the regime from which he was compelled to flee. And yet, when he chose to break his silence over 2 months after his arrival in India, the indictment that he has made against Communist China has been extremely serious indeed.

The ultimate Chinese aim, as far as he could see, was the extermination of the Buddhist religion and culture in Tibet, —grave words these, for a person of the position of the Dalai Lama. Still graver indeed for the Buddhists of Ceylon, some of whom have sometimes preferred to believe that Communism was only anti-Catholic, and not anti-religious as such.

If his charges were repudiated, the Dalai Lama went on to say, "let them agree to an investigation by an international commission." This is a very serious challenge that he has thrown out to Peking — and perhaps also to Marxists everywhere who have been trying sedulously to whitewash the rubbish-heap of their creation in Tibet.

But for us in Ceylon, this first Press Conference of the Dalai Lama is full of possibilities. For years now, we have ourselves tried to point out that Communism is hostile to all forms of religion;

to point out that Communism is hostile to all forms of religion; that it carries out a constant war on the religious front; and that, even if, as sometimes happens, it will pretend to be gracious towards "eastern religions" (witness, for example, Chou-en-lai's gift to the Dalada Maligawa), it is always only a well-calculated phase in its ultimate objective of wiping out all religion.

If the lesson of the Eastern European countries has been in vain, one can only hope that the grave words of the Dalai Lama will find a chord somewhere in Ceylonese hearts. Perhaps Buddhists of Ceylon will find a familiar ring somewhere, when they hear the Communists brand Lord Buddha as a "reactionary." We have ourselves heard that language before!

Strange contradiction

MUCH was made of the Prime Minister's public declaration at the annual sessions of the S.L. F.P. recently at Kurunegala that he was opposed to Communism. There were those who were elated that at long last the P.M. had made the open disavowal of Marxism which lovers of freedom had eagerly awaited. And we ourselves felt a certain sense of relief that the P.M. had made so frank and outspoken a statement. But what strange conduct is this? We would expect a man of the calibre and position of the Prime Minister to be constant and firm in his protestation; we would expect him not to negate with one hand, what he has tried to achieve with the other. And yet, that is precisely what seems to be happening.

The World Festival of Youth

The World Festival of Youth to be held at Vienna is undeniably a Communist performance. The whole world knows it, and no one

bothers any longer to make any pretence about it. And the largest contingent of representatives from this country to the Festival is not from the Communist Party of Ceylon, but from the Sri Lanka Freedom Party which is pledged to democracy! In fact, the S.L. F.P. contingent bids fair to be one of the largest representations at Vienna.

Which all just goes to show . . .
And it makes us wonder still more, when we find public performances being field under the patronage of the P.M. in aid of the delegation.

Strange contradiction this! The S.L.F.P. is not for Communism, they say — but they will further Communist aims!

Fiddling while Rome burns...

THE re-shuffling of the old pack of cards is still going on. What a glorious re-shuffle this must be, to occupy so much time and use up so much energy! The Minis-terial appointments in Sri Lanka's terial appointments in Sri Lanka's Cabinet seem to be over, with the increase in the number of Ministers to 16 (and this, by the very persons who cried out from the house-tops that they would decrease the Cabinet to 10). And now, it is the same old game with the Parliamentary Secretaries.

Necessary as this may seem to be, what perturbs us is the fact that while so much attention is being focussed on this delicate balancing-trick of Ministers, Parliamentary Secretaries and the precarious governmental majority, a far-reaching tragedy is being enacted in the Port and elsewhere.

a far-reaching tragedy is being enacted in the Port and elsewhere. At the time of writing this comment, the Port is once again paralysed, and work is at a complete standstill. Ships are bypassing Colombo, others have to be paid heavy demurrage, and still others refuse to take cargo for Colombo, while tons of food keep rotting.

It would appear that our politicians are being hoisted on their own petard, and that the boomerang has come back most effectively. They who, in their early months of office, even gave official patronage to some of the unruly elements, and later imagined that the solution lay in haphazard yielding, are now confronted with the giant problem. But the trouble is that the country—and by that, we mean primarily, the common man in whose name so many crimes are being perpetrated—is in the throes of a crisis the many crimes are being perpetrated—is in the throes of a crisis the effects of which will be felt for a very long time indeed.

Ten years of tragedy -and glory

ON the 19th of June this year, it was ten full years since His Excellency Mgr. Joseph Beran, Archbishop of Prague, Czechoslovakia, was made a prisoner by the Communists. They have been ten years of tragedy—but also ten years of glory and of bearing witness to the faith in the most difficult circumstances.

Today, ten years after his im-

Today, ten years after his im-prisonment, Archbishop Beran still remains in confinement, prevented

from exercising his office as Archbishop. Where he is imprisoned just now, what his future is to be, the free world will never know. But today, ten years after the curtain of silence and tragedy descended upon him, he still stands out a symbol to the entire world — for, it was from his lips that, ten years ago, there emanated the last fearless defence of religious liberty in the countries where it had been oppressed and violated. His defiance and his contrage still remain unforgotten — for, he chose to throw himself into open opposition to the tyranny that aimed at crushing all religion and freedom.

But that was not the end of the

But that was not the end of the story—for, since then, every single Prelate in Czechoslovakia has suffered the same fate—cruelty and imprisonment—and every single one of them has had his freedom made a mockery.

And so, today, the Church goes on in silence in this oppressed land—and ten years after the gates of Prague's Archbishop's House were locked and barred, the Archbishop remains a prisoner, and the Catholic world bows before him in reverence and prayer. Another martyr of our modern world!

• Rajendra Prasad ray of light and hope

WHEREVER India's President Rajendra Prasad went du-ring his week-long visit to Ceylon, he blazed a trail of light and hope for Ceylon to follow.

for Ceylon to follow.

Two impressions remain in our mind after this distinguished visitor left our land this week. First, he himself said somewhere that he had come to Ceylon as a pilgrim—and so, perhaps it was: a pilgrim who had brought with him an abundance of sincerity, humilty and dedication, which it would do well for us to emulate. Secondly, there was no mistaking it—he was a giant among smaller men; a giant of true nationalism that uplifts, and not a pygmy devoted to the lower form of nationalism that divides and kills.

And that perhaps is why we

And that perhaps is why we ourselves would prefer to think of India's Rajendra Prasad in our midst more as a symbol than as a pilgrim. For, whenever he made a speech, he always had a message for this land of ours. And looking back on his days with us, we keep remembering the aged leader telling Ceylon, "Shun intolerance and narrow nationalism;" we think of him pleading for unity and harmony; we recall his appealing for tolerance and understanding; and we also remember his saying frankly that the English language is still indispensable for countries like India and Ceylon. India and Ceylon.

The red carpet has been rolled up, and the celebrations are over. Is it too much to keep hoping that at least something of the example of Rajendra Prasad will linger? The religious aspect of the film—in the narrower sense of the term—is done with delicacy, and is always secondary to the narrative. There is no loud appeal to follow any particular thought. 

The Holy Cross Nuns of Menzingen started working in Ceylon just over 25 years ago; They undertook hospital work in Kayts.

Friends of the poor and destitute, irrespective of differences in religion or race, their record of service in the Jaffna Civil Hospital, Kayts Civil Hospital, St. Joseph's Home for the Aged at Colombogam and the Gurungar Housing Scheme have become proverbial.

The primary aim of this Congregation founded in Menzingen, Switzerland in 1844, is personal sanctification by means of the three vows of Poverty, Chastity and Obedience.

The secondary aim is the education of youth, nursing of sick in hospitals, homes for the aged, creches, leper sanatoria and other social work. Their Rule and Spirit is that of St. Francis of Assisi.

It is a very heartening sign that some of these Nuns are now working at St. Michael's Nursing Home and Free Clinic for the Poor in Colombo too. You may have seen them in action.

Their motto is "IN CRUCE SALUS" meaning "In the Cross is Salvation." The emblem dominates with a cross which is meant to show the triumph of the Holy Cross, even to the consummation of the world.

Don't you like to join this happy band of faithful workers for Christ? The minimum qualification of a girl is the S.S.C. English, Sinhalese or Tamil, However, this is waived if the candidate reveals a genuine vocation and a right intention. The age limit is 28

years. The Certificates to be produced are: Birth, Baptism, Confirmation, School and Health, a single copy of each, and two separate certificates of character.

Indeed the finest way to know these good Nuns is to live with them for a few days, and see for yourself what a world of goodness their lifetime is. There are many Ceylonese today who have given up all the fleeting pleasures of this world to be like them — Eternal Brides of Christ. (see pictures).

The genuinely Christian woman radiates goodness so powerfully and in so singular a manner that only the most perverse of men will fail to respond to it. Indeed so tremendous and so wide is this influence for good, that it makes woman's role in society unique.

Is it any wonder, then, that Pius XII once spoke of the "sacred mission" of women. But how many of our women are conscious of, think in terms of, this divine something in them which is meant to lead men on to purity and refinement of soul, to light up for them the path leading to God? In that great book of theology in verse, the "Divine Comedy," after Dante had gone through the frightful experiences of the "Inferno" and the "Purgatorio," and he was at last ready for the vision of God, it was a woman, Beatrice, who led him by the hand into the everlasting happiness of Paradise.

Woman's greatest possibilities for good lie in the home. The family must be taught and inspired by its priestess, the Mother. The Danish Catholic writer, Jorgensen, has an amazing line in which, echoing St. John's "In the beginning was the Word," he says "In the beginning was the mother." How many people there must be who could truly say — all I am my mother made me. This concept of the ennobling influence of a mother is enshrined even in simple, popular songs like "Mother the Queen of my Heart."



I do not think Lord Shaftesbury was guilty of a gross exaggeration when he said, "Give me a generation of Christian mothers, and I will change the face of society in twelve months."

Women should be the saviours of society. This mission of theirs is more urgent today than ever before. May I close with the stirring appeal made by the late Pope Pius XII some years ago in an address to members of various women's Catholic organizations: "This is your hour, Catholic women and Catholic girls . . every woman is under an obligation — a strict obligation of conscience—not to remain aloof; every woman must go into action, each in her own way, and join in stemming the tides which threaten to engulf the home, in fighting the doctrines which undermine its foundations, in preparing, organising, and completing its restoration."

FOLLOWING its brutal aggression against Tibet and its spiritual leader, the Dalai Lama, Communist China is now threatening the kingdom of Laos.

The kingdom of Laos is one of the States into which the former French principality of Indo-China has been divided.

Twelve months ago a strongly anti-Communist government took power in Laos and found itself faced with the existence of armed Communist battalions, known as the Pathet Lao Army, formerly belonging to the Communist for-

In the middle of May the Government of Laos served notice on the Communist Pathet Lao battalions that they must surrender their arms within 24 hours.

This was an act of sovereignty

This was an act of sovereignty by the legitimate government, strictly its own affair, and no concern of Communist China.

The •Red Chinese Ministry of Foreign Affairs at once made a declaration that it regarded it as its own business.

It threatened the legitimate government of Laos with "civil war" unless the order was rescinded and the Communist troops in Laos allowed to retain their arms.

Behind the statement was the threat that Ho Chi Minh's 300,000 soldiers could quickly crush the independence of Laos if their Chinese masters told them to do

There is not even a pretext of legitimacy in the threats of the Chinese Communists.

The State of Laos is independent, and should be subject to its own government.

It is inconceivable that any government would allow armed Communist troops to remain at liberty within its borders.

Once again the "peace-loving" Chinese Communists, behind the banners of co-existence, have shown that their interpretation of "peace" and "co-existence" is strictly on their own terms.

NEW THREAT GRIM ACCOUNT OF RED CHINESE ATROCIT

EVIDENCE has just come to light that convicts the Chinese Communists of atrocities more horrible than those of Nazi Germany.

The evidence — that of Christian missionaries — is unimpeach-

They charged the Peking regime with the murder of 30 million Chinese over the past 10

The witnesses claimed that the Chinese people were bitterly resisting the new commune system

sisting the new commune system by killing livestock, burning their crops, and fleeing to the mountains to fight as guerrillas.

The testimony, which was given of life in the communes, where family units are completely broken up, separating wives, husbands and children.

Corpses for chickens

The Rev. Shih-Ping Wang, now East Asia Director for a Baptist group, testified: "All the elderly people, 60 years

"All the elderly people, 60 years of age and above, who cannot work are put in the Old People's Happy Home. After they are placed in the home, they are given shots . . . for their health . . . They die within two weeks.

"After they die, the corpses are placed in vats. When the bodies decay and maggots set in, the maggots are used to feed chickens. The remainder of the body is used for fertiliser.

"In Hong Kong," he said, "the people do not eat chickens imported from the mainland because of the food fed to the chickens."

He said the Chinese Reds also

He said the Chinese Reds also are digging up old graves and using the bones for fertiliser.

"To' dig up the graves is to sever family ties completely." he

said.
"Chinese people revere their ancestors. Digging up the graves is the Communist method of severing all connections with tradition and the past."

No family life

The Rev. Wang gave this description of what commune family life there is:
"Husbands and wives may

meet only once a week for two hours — they have no other con-

the Diocese of Trivandrum were the victims of the two subsequent firings.

The first victims to fall in Angamali are a 24-year old bullock cart driver, a 35-year old woodcutter, a 45-year old weaver, a 35-year old mechanic and a 30-year old wage carner. Several had bullet wounds on their back clearly indicating that the police fired on fleeing citizens.

The Pulluvila firings have killed two Catholics aged 64 and 46. Each has five children. Barely a few hours later, in Kochuveli, four more Catholics fell under police firing.

Among those who were severely

Among those who were severely injured in the Angamali firings, was a Catholic student, who later succumbed to his injuries. Information has also come to hand that another Catholic student was killed at Kochuveli.

In Trivandrum, the president of the Independent Students' Union announced that he was starting a fast as a protest against the wanton killings.

The first Angamali victims were buried in a common grave with Archbishop Joseph Parekkattil of Ernakulam officiating at the funeral. Thousands of people were present. It is known that a tomb signifying the undying deference "the martyrs" have earned, is to be built over the grave.

Woman torn by horses

"His family and his cousins, brothers, all relatives — altogether 180 persons — have been killed,"

The Minister said the oldest brother went back to Red China in 1957 for peace negotiations and has not been heard from since.

The sister-in-law was tied to five horses by the Reds.

"One horse was tied to her neck," he said, "and the other horses were tied to her arms and legs and they went in all directions.

"The biggest horse ran, and it just tore her body into pieces.

"The blood streamed all over the public square and the people shut their eyes and cried. They could not stand to see it."
