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Great enthusiasm prevails at Galle Bishop's Silver Jubilee Celebrations

Ceylon's Bishops were all present

His Grace stresses position of Bishop in Church

FOR the first time in ancient Galle's history, all six of Ceylon's Bishops were present in person at the Silver Jubilee Celebrations of His Lordship the Bishop of Galle, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Nicholas Laudadio, S.J., on Sunday, 25 October 1959.

Despite rain-sodden, dreary skies and overnight thundery showers, Jubilee day itself dawned fine and kept shining throughout. Great enthusiasm was displayed by the faithful who mustered strong for the celebrations. The Bishop's House was brightly illuminated and the Cathedral flood-lit.


Highlight of the occasion was the Solemn Pontifical Mass sung by His Lordship the Jubilarian. By 10-30 a.m. the Cathedral was filled to capacity. Busloads had arrived from the various parish units, earlier.

Special accommodation was provided for the 51 priests, 16 brothers and 85 nuns representing every diocese and religious order.

PROCESSION

Sharp at 11 a.m. the procession headed by the Cross and Candle Bearers and acolytes, moved out of Bishop's House. Rev. Brothers and Revd. Fathers came next while their Lordships the Bishops of Kandy, Jaffna, Trincomalee, Chilaw and the the Jubilarian Bishop with His Grace the Archbishop of Colombo followed.

As the procession entered the Cathedral the Choir under Revd. Fr. A. D'Mattia, S.J. sang Ecce Sa-

IN town this week was young, competent and confident Mr. Hideo Inohara, National President of the Y.C.W. in Japan, full of Japanese charm and courtesy, but no less of Japanese grit and efficiency, Mr. Inohara left us in no doubt that though it may be a long way yet to the brightness of noon, Japan is indeed the land of the Rising Sun.

He himself "saw the light"—

He himself "saw the light"— the true Light that enlighteneth every man that cometh into this world— ten years ago, and from that time nothing would stop him from spread-ing that light.

With Hideo Inohara Catholic Life and Catholic Action have been, as they ought too be, synonymous, and right from the word "go" he threw himself into the apostolate of the Y.C.W., that dynamic Movement which Pius XI, once called "an authentic form of Catholic Action." And for nine of his ten years in the Faith he has held the responsible office of National President.

Mr. Inohara was on his way back from a meeting of the International Executive Committee of the Y.C.W. The International Committee deals

with the affairs of the Y.C.W. from one World Council to another. The last Council was held in Rome, just after the Y.C.W. International Rally in 1957. The next World Council is to be held in 1961. Plans for that, as well as for the 1st Asian meeting of the Y.C.W. scheduled for early next year (with Kuala Lumpur a

venue), were discussed at the meeting of the Executive which Mr. Inohara had just attended.

had just attended.

The Y.C.W. in Japan, its President said, comprised some 160 sections and counted about 1,200 active leaders. Their work lay mostly amongst non-Catholics (Japan's Catholics numbering only 265,000 against a total population of 95 million) and they had about 3,000 non-Catholic contacts. A monthly publication, New World, meant again mostly for non-Catholics, has a circulation of 17,000.

One gathered the impression of slow but steady and consistent progress against heavy odds in an obviously difficult field. The influence of foreign materialist philosophers, a native naturalism, industrialism in full swing, the cult of success and pleasure, the struggle for existence—all these things put together certainly do not make an environment that is easy to penetrate. A Catholic intellectual revival and a more carefully thought out approach might possibly make some impact.

PAKISTAN SEEKS FR. PIRE'S HELP

AT a meeting in Oslo recently Fr. George Pire, the Belgian Dominican Nobel Peace Prize winner, while announcing a six-point programme of tan to help solve the problem of its refugees. Following are the six points of Fr. Pire's programme:

of Fr. Pire's programme:

1. An attempt to relieve the poliomyelitis problem in two areas of Europe and two countries of Africa.

2. "Effective aid" to those who need it on the other side of the "Curtains" in Europe and Asia.

3. Aid for "poor brothers" from those who were more fortunate, especially in Pakistan which had a problem of ten million refugees and whose Government, Fr. Pire said, had given him the task of trying to solve it.

4. Aid without regard to colour beginning with exchanges of letters, newspapers and visits between African and white children.

5. Aid to youth.

6. Intellectual exchanges.

T IS SAD THAT ANY OF THE APOSTLES SHOULD EVER BE "FOR-GOTTEN." WHEN THOSE MAGIC WORDS "COME FOLLOW ME" CAME FROM THE LIPS OF THEIR LOVING MASTER, THEY LEFT ALL THINGS AND FOLLOWED HIM. IN THE FACE OF GRAVE ODDS THEY PREACHED CHRIST CRUCIFIED AND WERE HIS WITNESSES "IN SAMARIA, JUDEA AND IN ALL PARTS OF THE EARTH," UNTIL THEY OFFERED UP THEIR LIVES FOR THE TRUE FAITH.

The Church down the ages has a special regard, reverence and devotion to the band of Apostles selected by Our Lord and we cannot afford to "forget" any of them. It was an unfortunate coincidence that Jude, the cousin of Our Lord and His faithful Apostle, should have had the same name as the traitor Iscariot. The people despised Judas and hated his very name, and thus the name of the Saint too fell into disrepute.

But it would seem that Our Lord Himself was anxious to repair the good name of His faithful disciple, this "servant of Jesus" as he calls himself in his Epistle (Jude 1; 1). Devotion to St. Jude soon spread, and "when some special devotion takes root and flourishes in the Church, it is a sign that God wishes it so," comments Fr. C. C. Martindale, s.J. St. Bridget tells us how Our-Lord appeared to her and bade her to have recourse to St. Jude. "In accordance with his surname Thaddeus (the amiable, the loving) he will show himself most willing to give help," said Our Lord. St. Bernard had a great devotion to St. Jude, which he had preserved, be placed on his breast, so that even in death he should not be without him who was a powerful protector of his purity.

St. Jude was the son of Cleophas, brother to St. Joseph, the foster-father of Christ. His mother, Mary Cleophas, one of the holy women who stood at the foot of the Cross on Calvary, was a cousin of Our Lady.

We can just imagine St. Jude at the home of the Holy Family at Nazareth, playing with the Boy Jesus. The other apostles of Christ were all novices, trained, taught and inspired, but the Apostle Jude must have had some idea of Our Lord, true God and true Man, even before the calling. And what is most striking is that he never mentions his early association with Christ, or his relationship, anywhere in his Epistle. He just walked humbly with the rest. It was probably due to that great humility which this Saint possessed that he is today on a very high pedestal. He is popularly invoked in all countries as the "Saint of the Impossible."

countries as the "Saint of the Impossible."

His clients look up to him and ask his intercession before God in cases despaired of. The Shrines dedicated to him draw large crowds and many testify to the favours received. There is a Shrine of St. Jude in the Church of Mount Carmel, in Faversham, Kent (England), of very recent origin. It is in charge of the Carmelite Fathers, and Fr. Lynch, o.c., writing on the Shrine, says: "St. Jude may be the forgotten Apostle, but he is at the same time a common ground between Anglicans and Catholics, on a devotional level." The Shrine in Chicago, America, is in charge of the Dominican Fathers, and is of special interest as the forearm of the Apostle is now a priceless possession there.

The most popular Shrine in Asia

there.

The most popular Shrine in Asia is perhaps the one at Jhansi, in North India, in charge of the Capuchin Fathers. Apart from this Shrine which draws pilgrims from all over India, there is at Jhansi the Hospital of St. Jude, and a monthly magazine (The Voice of St. Jude) is being regularly printed under the care of the Fathers. A Ceylonese, Bro. Seraphin, does yeoman service at the Jhansi Shrine, and due to his efforts the devotion to St. Jude became increasingly popular in our country as well.

INDIGOLLA .

Steps to build the first church in Ceylon in honour of this great Apostle, was first mooted by Rev. Fr. Philip Dissanayake, o.M.I., when he was Parish Priest of Gampaha. There was a 5 acre block of coconut land which the Archbishop of Colombo had purchased in the village of Indigolla, on the road between Yakkala and Gampaha, and the authorities agreed to build the church there in 1952. Thanks to the initiative of a well known Catholic business man in Colombo it soon became possible to purchase the adjoining block of 30 acres, which is today a Catholic colony with little bungalows springing up.

House and a Monastery for the Carmelite Fathers have also been built. The floor of the church and some of the walls have yet to be cemented and this may be an accomplished fact very soon with the help of the numerous supporters of this church.

The Novenas for the annual feast commenced on 23rd October. There was evening Mass on the 28th, the Feast Day of St. Jude. The Feast is however celebrated on 1st November, and there will be Solemn Vespers this evening at 6 p.m. On Sunday there will be several Masses in the morning, followed by the High Mass at 9 a.m. and a late Mass at 11 a.m.



improvements. Very Rev. Fr. Marcel, the Superior, and his assistants have taken up residence there and are at the service of the pilgrims who now come daily to Indigolla. A lone relic of the Apostle, brought from Rome, is placed in a reliquary, and special prayers are offered by pilgrims. Every Thursday thousands of devotees go to Indigolla.

Thanks to the co-operation of the numerous clients of St. Jude, the church building commenced in 1952 is now completed. The Mission

Rev. Fr. Ignatius, one of the Carmelite Fathers directly in charge of the Shrine, leaves today on a holiday for Belgium, his native land. The clients of St. Jude will miss this energetic monk who worked very hard to make the Shrine what it is.

His place is taken by Rev. Fr. Victor, a Sinhalese Priest who has been in the Carmelite Monastery in South India for many years. Friends of St. Jude welcome him to his native land and to the first church here dedicated to St. Jude, Apostle, Martyr and a Helper in difficult cases.

FATIMA LETTER TO BE OPENED NEXT YEAR

. Wrote at Bishop's

Request

THE Bishop entrusted with the third and final part of the Fatima "secret" has disclosed that it will definitely be opened before the end of 1960.

Bishop Pereira Venancio of Leiria has said that the sealed envelope containing the account written by Lucy—sole survivor of the three children to whom the Blessed Virgin appeared here 42 years ago, and now a Carmelite nun—"is to be opened after Lucy's death or at the 1000." He said that "therefore it shall be opened in 1960." school at the convent of the Sisters of St. Dorothy in Oporto.

The final part of the Fatima message does not consist of threats or prophecies of woe. This is

Lucy herself, in her strictly en-Lucy herself, in her strictly enclosed Carmelite convent in Co-imbra, the old Portuguese univer-sity town some 500 miles north of Fatima, has recently denied that she foretold terrible punishments for the world in the shape of new wars and the destruction of whole cities.

Discourages Speculation

No one except Sister Lucy knows what the third part of the "secret" contains. But Bishop Pereira Venancio, whose diocese includes Fatima, discourages speculation about the message.

"Tell the people not to preoccupy themselves with that, but to do what Our Lady has already told us to do," the bishop said when asked when the sealed envelope containing the "secret" will be opened.

The year 1960 was fixed by Lucy herself for the opening. But the bishop said he does not yet know at what time of the year or where the message will be opened. Neither does he say who is to open the envelope, which is understood to be still locked in a drawer of his desk. drawer of his desk.

No one, not even the late Bishop of Leiria, Bishop Alves Correia da Silva, who was the confidant and friend of Lucy for so many years, has read the document.

First Two Parts of "Secret"

The full account of the first two parts of the "secret" which the Blessed Virgin gave Lucy at Fatima on July 13, 1917, were divulged only at the onset of World War II.

World War II.

Before then, her spiritual directors did not allow her to speak or write of them for the public. To the world at large, the Fatima message known before that, was simply that of prayer and repentance. But Lucy had made allusions to devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary from 1927 onward.

At the time of the Marian apparitions at Fatima—there were six, beginning on May 13, 1917, and ending the following October 13—Lucy could not read or write. She learned to do so only after she left her parents' house at the age of 14, in 1921, to go to

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

Sisters of St. Dorothy — wrote at the request of Bishop Correia da Silva a full account of the first parts of the Fatima message or "secret."

This manuscript, the third which Lucy wrote for the bishop about the apparitions, is in the episcopal archives at Leiria. None of Lucy's accounts has yet been published in its entirety, but accurate type-written copies of them exist and can be seen by persons whose business it is to know them.

The 1941 account was written.

The 1941 account was written The 1941 account was written in Lucy's painstaking handwriting at the convent of the Sisters of St. Dorothy in Tuy, Spain. Lucy had entered the congregation in 1926. It was 22 years later, in 1948, that she was able to realise her girlhood wish and be transferred to the Discalced Carmelite Order, entering the Carmelite convent of Coimbra. It is there that she remains cloistered today.

"Three Distinct Things"

In the 1941 manuscript, Sister Lucy states clearly to the bishop:
"The secret consists of three distinct things, two of which I will

The first was the vision of hell, The first was the vision of hell, which the three children saw on July 13, 1917, and which made such a fearful and profound impression on them that from that day forward they "made continual sacrifices and did penance for the conversion of singles." for the consecration of Russia to her Immaculate Heart and that people receive Holy Communion in reparation on the first Saturd^o y of each month.

"Russia will be Converted"

This second part of the message

This second part of the message after foretelling the war and the persecution of the Church, ended on a more hopeful note. It said that in the end "My Immaculate Heart will triumph... Russia will be converted and the world will enjoy a period of peace."

This theme of the final conversion of Russia runs all through the Fatima revelation from the apparition in July 1917—when the Russian revolution of November of that same year was still in the future—to the visions which Lucy has since had as a nun, and of which she has also written under c bedience.

The Fundamental Message

The general feeling now at Fatima itself is that this final "secret" must refer to something we already know, but it will spell it out in plainer terms than before. However, it should be remembered that Lucy herself wrote that the three parts are distinct.

The fundamental Fatima message of penance and prayer, including the Rosary, will still be the primary one, as Bishop Pereira Venancio indicates.

Expect Nothing Sensational says Fr. G. Gardiner O.P.

THE third part of the "secret" of Fatima is to be revealed in 1960. What will it be? Will it be some terrifying prophecy of the end of the world? Will it foretell some frightful global cataclysm?

These questions are being asked, with their implication that we can expect something sensational. It is natural that there should be curiosity about the "secret." Its existence, after all, was deliberately announced in 1927, 33 years before the date fixed for its revelation.

But those who expect a sensation in 1960 not only face certain disappointment, they run the risk of missing the whole point of the message of Fatima.

As Told Me By Lucy

This is the story of the "secret," as told to me by Lucy:—
In 1917, the children were told by Our Lady to keep secret three of the revelations made to them.

In 1927, Lucy, then a Dorothean novice, was accorded a private apparition, in which she was instructed to make known two of these revelations then, and the third in 1960.

The two parts of the "secret" then revealed were the vision of hell which was granted to the children in the summer of 1917, and the announcement made by Our Lady on the same occasion that she would come later tolask for the consecration of Russia to her Immaculate Heart.

Lucy had no reason to offer as to why these two revelations should have been kept secret for a time. With her usual unwillingness to add anything of her own to the message given to her, she would make no comment on my suggestion that to broadcast the vision of Hell might have distorted the message of Fatima, which is essentially an appeal and not a threat; while the second part of the "secret" could more fittingly wait until the need for prayer for the conversion of Russia had become obvious to the world—as it would not have been in early 1917.

Whatever the reason, the conclusion is obvious that, on the analogy of the two parts already revealed, we should expect the third part of the "secret" to contain some simple elucidation of, or addition to, Fatima's simple message of prayer and penance and amendment of life—and nothing more sensational than that.

On one occasion, looking for an authoritative answer which I could give when a long explanation would be impossible, I asked Lucy if she could put the message of Fatima for me in one phrase. After a moment's thought she answered: "Our Lady came to ask for the conversion of sinners and the return of souls to God." and the return of souls to God.

Core of the Message.

That is the core of the message. The conversion of sinners and the return of souls to God is the end to which everything else — prayer, penance, the Rosary, the devotion of the Immaculate Heart — are

Whatever there is that is sensational in the Fatima Story must be seen as God's way of vindicating the children's claim to be bearers of a message from heaven. Now that the need for vindication has passed, we should be missing the point of the story if we continued to seek sensation.

Perhaps next year's revelation will provide the final vindication by containing a eference to something that could not possibly have been known when the envelope was sealed. What my many talks with Lucy have made me feel, however, is that if the "secret" increases our urge to heed our Lady's message of prayer and penance and amendment of life, it will be far more in the spirit of Fatima than if it merely provides us with some new sensation. us with some new sensation.

A Glow Over The Tomb?

TO Knight G.I.O.M. we are indebted for the map of the Bogambarawewa that accompanied Fr. Justin Perera's article in the Messenger of 3rd October. The outline can now be considered fairly definitive and, as a first result, sites within that thick black ring are definitely disqualified. At the time of Fr. Vaz's death and burial (1711) they were under water—at the bottom of the Wewa.

this connection an interesting legend has been reported. Father Vaz is supposed to have stated that the place of his burial would be marked by a light; could this be fulfilled now by the votive lamps of the Mosque?

Forgetting for a moment that we have just excluded the Mosque as out of question because where it stands was right in the Wewa, we must say that the legend of the light is completely out of harmony with all we know of our revered Apostle. Humility marked him in and out, from beginning to end (most of all at the end). He would never have referred to his tomb as being of any consequence whatever.

No doubt there are two sides to the question. Patriarchs (of the New Testament as well as the Old) have sometimes been inspired to leave

definite instructions for their burial, because they could not close their eyes to the fact that in God's Providence their tombs were to be rallying-points of unity and fidelity for their spiritual offspring. Thus

even St. Benedict had his tomb made beforehand, making Monte Cassino, not Subiaco, the cradle of the Benedictine monks.

Fr. Vaz belongs to the other set of God's Saints who would have liked their bodies to be buried where nobody would think of them again,

With an amendment, then, the legend could stand. Fr. Vaz did not say so; but a belief has sprung up that a heavenly light should indicate his Tomb.

Such a legend is in keeping with the high esteem and deep veneration in which successive generations have held our Apostle. It is in keeping with the needs of the situation; for under the circumstances only a heavenly light can guide us to the Tomb that has been lost for two and a half centuries.

If Heaven, responding to the ingenu-ous prayers of our children and Nuns, does drop a "flare" over

the spot of our seeking, all to the good and glory of Religion. What all of us should be able to expect (and ask for in prayer) is that a heavenly light will shine in our hearts and minds and keep us on the trail — with both eyes open, all our scientifice instruments adjusted to the task and a sixth sense (the "flair") sniffing the right clues.

clues.
Getting down to immediate tasks, we would say that the *next step* is for our Knights to draw another ring — an outer one — indicating the area round the former Wewa that was so low-lying and marshy in Fr. Vaz's time that the church (and consequently, the Tomb) could not have been there.

There is the antiquarian's approach to the problem — combing the archives for old maps and surveys. Tenants might have the plans on which the "reclamation" was carried out for the sites of their present grounds and buildings.

Another approach — also scientific, we believe — would be to map the former marshes with the help of our water-diviners. We are not sure just where the possibilities end; but from what we hear the frontiers of this science have been considerably extended with a new entrant (N. C. F.) in the field. Here, of course, the light may be, only a will-o'-the wisp since we are on marshy ground; but let nothing be neglected in the great all-out concerted Quest.

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
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Trinco Rally Opposes Family Planning

There was a preparatory triduum of Masses both morning and evening and Rosary, Sermon and Benediction. On Sunday itself when more than 200 delegates from the different parishes of the diocese were present, Holy Mass was offered by the Rt. Rev. Mgr. d'Sa, Vicar-General, at which a sermon was preached by Rev. Fr. Henry Ponniah, the Parish Priest of Puliantivu. This was followed by breakfast at which the Catholic Association of Puliantivu acted as hosts to all the delegates. the delegates.

Then followed the Annual General Meeting at the beginning of which a message from the Holy Father was read in which he imparted the apostolic blessing which was pronounced by Mgr. d'Sain the absence of the Bishop. The chief business of the meeting was the passing of the resolution:

"The Trincomalee Diocesan Union protests emphatically against every form of artificial contraception which is disguised under the name of the Family Planning Movement and which directly flouts the religious convictions of the Catholic Body, and calls upon all Catholics to have nothing to do with the Movement."

Before the resolution was put to the house, Rev. Fr. Henry Ponniah, very learnedly but at the same time in language adapted to the understanding of the average layman, showed how contraception is a sin condemned the average layman, showed how contraception is a sin condemned by Holy Scripture, the traditional teaching of the Church, especially of the recent Popes, and by the natural moral law. Then Dr. C. Saverimuttu who proposed the

resolution gave the medical aspect of artificial contraception. He spoke very plainly to the mixed audience which however consisted of adults only, of the methods of contraception employed and the dangers to the physical, mental and moral health especially of the women. The resolution was put to the house and passed unanimously.

Rev. Fr. E. Crowther, s.J., the Spiritual Director of the T.D.U., in the concluding address apologised for not having got ready the draft of the revised constitution for discussion at the meeting. The draft was ready a week before, but there was not sufficient time for circulation before discussion. Moreover he himself was not fully satisfied with it, as he felt that it should include some rules on the spirit in which the constitution should be worked, the Catholic spirit which is no other than the spirit of Jesus Christ, the spirit of humility and love as opposed to the spirit of the world, the spirit of pride and selfishness.

Freedom of the Press

SELDOM perhaps in recent years has the subject of the freedom of the press engaged so much attention, been so much before the public eye, and taken up so much space in the country's publications, as in the past few weeks; for, hardly ever has the freedom of the press been so curtailed and rendered so hollow and meaningless a thing as it had been here till the lifting of one of the most extensive censorships imposed in any Commonwealth country.

All that had to be said in the cause of the freedom of the press has been said; in fact, little has been left unsaid, on the necessity of a free press. It would hardly be necessary for us to reiterate the arguments put forward so cogently and so forcefully by the national press about the blanket of an overall censorship that descended on the country barely a few weeks ago. In fact, we are in complete agreement with almost every word that was said so effectively and so well, in emphasising—for the benefit of those who seemed to have forgotten it—that the freedom of the press is in truth the freedom of the public, and that the right to the liberty of the press is a right of the people. All this could not have ocen said eetter nor more effectively; and coming as it did, against a heavy background of one of the most comprehensive and odious press censorships in this country, it told a tale which the people of this country understood.

And yet, there is one other aspect of this entire affair of the freedom of the press which we would wish to take up. At the best of times, this is a point which would be important, but it needs special emphasis just now when there are those who will make the utmost of the present atmosphere, and talk loud and long on the necessity of *freedom* for the press, while forgetting the *responsibility* of the press.

The national press of the country has insisted on the need of a free press in a democracy. And much to our satisfaction, almost the entire English national press added still another word — a democracy, they said, needed a free and a responsible press. Here, to our way of thinking, is journalism at its best — for, it is not easy to think of the higher values when feelings are as charged as they have been, and freedom fettered as it was. And yet, not only did the national press fight for a free press in a democracy as being the inherent right of the citizen, but for a free and a responsible press.

This is precisely the note that we would wish to strike. Freedom of the press is indeed essential in a democracy — but that freedom has to be a responsible freedom; it has to be sober, impartial, decent, truthful. Can that be said of the press in Ceylon? Can we truthfully proclaim that the much-vaunted freedom of the press in Ceylon, has also been at all times a responsible freedom, that was in keeping with the high role of the press in a democracy? Can the national press of the country claim to have at all times oeen trruthful, impartial, and fair to all?

Our thoughts go almost naturally to two burning issues of our day—the religious and the racial. Who is there who would deny that much of the bitter catalogue of crime and bloodshed of last May and June was due in fact to the outpourings of fanatics in certain sections of the press? Who really could deny that racial feelings and racial hatred had been fostered to bursting point by an irresponsible press which had betrayed its freedom and prostituted its exalted role?

And still closer to us, on the religious issue, the same bitter story is being written all over again — a story of bitterness, hatred, envy and mud-slinging. Few surely will have forgotten the "Kanni mariage heti"—over which the government of the day and its successor remained blissfully silent. Few too would have forgotten other scurrilous tracts and papers, weeklies and monthlies, which have continued publishing the most violent attacks against the Church, disseminating the most foul false-hoods against us, and thus carrying on a regular and sustained attack against one section of the citizens of the country. Right in the midst of the recent censorship, our office received two copies of one of these scurrilous monthlies, reeking with hatred and animosity against the Catholic Church, and full of the most baseless and vicious attacks against our supposed machinations. Not, even the censorship seemed to have affected them! And all these in the name of freedom of the press!

When will people begin to understand that there are certain standards of decency to be observed? When will they come to see that even in the parry and thrust of debate, there is a code of morals to be followed? And when will the government itself realise that what is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander as well—that if absolute restraints are imposed on the press when it suits them, it should be equally vigilant when the most elementary principles of journalistic responsibility are violated, and when a section of the country's citizens are being systematically villified and made the target of abuse and unwarranted and utterly unfair attack.

Let us by all means clamour for the freedom of the press; let us defend it at all costs, as a valued ingredient of the democratic way of life that we cherish; let us protest with all the vigour at our command against any inroads that are made. But let us at the same time be mature enough and honest enough to insist likewise on a responsible press, that knows to be loyal to its high vocation. For, if a free press is essential to the democratic way of life, an irresponsible press is surely its most deadly enemy.

Where, O where, is the "People's Government"?

THE most comprehensive press censorship enforced in this country has now been lifted Not even in the dark days of the war had Ceylon or any other Commonwealth country experienced such a total blackout.

Even the blindest observer of the political and national scene can see one fact looming large on the debris of unfulfilled promises — the government which came into power on an unprecedented landslide in 1956, which hailed its own victory as the "victory of the people," and gave itself the name of the "people's government" in the heyday of its popularity, has gradually but surely become the government which has in a moment of panic allowed itself to violate the basic rights of the citizen in a democracy.

It is surely a bitter twist of fortune, that a government which kept insisting that it was a "people's government" should now live in mortal dread of the "people"; that a government which, through sheer bravado threw open the doors of Ceylon's legislature and permitted anyone at will to occupy the Speaker's Chair, should now, for the second time, introduce the most rigorous security blanket that enshrouds the House, and deny the people even the most and deny the people even the most normal access to Parliament. What a far cry indeed from the days of not so long ago!

A "people's government "seeking security from the "people"!
A "people's government taking cover from the opinions of the "people" under the cloak of an unprecedented press-gag! That is the incredible position. the incredible position.



The so-called "People's Government" started off with a fanfare of trumpets, that was largely meant to catch the popular imagination. We were among the many who sounded the warning that their policy would create a monster which would finally devour its very creators. Months and years went by; the damage kept increasing; and yet they refused to see what everyone else was seeing most clearly — until the terrible tragedy of a month ago. It needed the cold-blooded assaination of the late Prime Minister to give people a jolting, open their eyes, and make them realise that it was the monster of their own creation that finally devoured them. And thus has ended the story of the "People's Government." Few, if any prefend any more that a "People's Government" is in existence. The damage has been done; the boomerang has struck; and the country is in the throes of a terrible malaise. The need of the hour is for courageous men with high values, who will risk all to love of country, fearless men with high values, who will risk all to restore the peace and concord that once was . . . and now is no

That "Notebook"!

NO comment on the past weeks could possibly omit reference to the notorious "Political Notebook" of Radio Ceylon. For sheer fatuity, it was hard to beat. One wondered whether its very compilers expected listeners to believe the slightest shred of the propaganda it put across. propaganda

Two of the many purple-patches deserve mention. There was the refrain (repeated on more occasions than one) that it was the national press that had caused and fostered the malady of strikes that gripped the country. Memories must be particularly short if government men had already forgotten the very large part they had themselves played in the sad catalogue of strikes, and if they

chose to forget the weakness and the vacillation that whetted the appetites of the strikers.

Then there was the other strange and blatant statement that now at last the country was enjoying at last the country was enjoying peace, law and tranquillity after four years of lawlessness. Was it the intention of the "Notebook" to imply that the regime that ended on September 26th was one of lawlessness and indiscipline that ruined the country?

These are but two instances These are but two instances—but how many more could be produced. The experience of those two weeks has been a costly but necessary lesson: for it gave the country an object-lesson and a foretaste of what could happen in a dictatorship with a Press that was completely muzzled and a Radio that was totally subservient to the government in power.

THE protest made by the National Press during the days of the censorship was one of the most effective they could have thought of. Editorial columns completely blank, cartoonists off duty—nothing could have been more telling, and in no way could they have made their point so strongly. strongly.

Naturally, some of our readers have asked us what our attitude was during this period, As we then stated, our Editorial Comment had of course to be severely restricted, in order to steer clear of matters coming under purview of the censorship. But beyond that, it was our decided conviction that for a paper such as ours, blank editorial columns were not the answer.

We have always had, and will always have, a message that trans-cends the narrow and limited confines of the passing scene— and that message can hardly be affected by the laws of censor-

Whatever the travail of the nation may be, it is the vocation of a Catholic paper to continue giving that message. And that, we continued to do, and will continue to do . . .

Tibet once again

IRELAND and Malaya have brought Tibet into the headlines once again, and due to the resolution sponsored by them, the United Nations have placed on record their strong disapproval of Red China's rape of Buddhist Tibet.

It will remain to the undying shame of Asia that it needed a nation like Malaya to spon-sorthis resolution fearlessly, while the big ones who usually spoke loud and long on freedom and

high principles, preferred to take cover under the cloak of absten-tion. In fact, an Indian leader has spoken strong words against India's own silence.

Ceylon — the country that calls herself Buddhist — was among these abstentions. Was it the same policy as that which was pursued in the case of Hungary?

Surely it is not necessary to reiterate the terrible indictment made by the Dalai Lama on the ruin caused in Tibet by the Red Chinese? Buddhists of Geylon, at least to some extent, worked themselves into a pitch of excitement over the massacre in Tibet, the destruction of Buddhist temples and books, and the sustained attack against the Bhikkhus. Buf apparently, it was short-lived. attack against the Bhikkhus. But apparently, it was short-lived. The delegation that went to Mussoorie returned with firm resolutions; for a short while, they continued being active in informing the Buddhist mind; and then, it all fizzled out. all fizzled out.

But the inactivity and the silence has reached a new disgraceful pitch, when Ceylon's represent-ative at the United Nations re-frained from voting on a resolution which expressed grave alarm over the repression and the violation of fundamental rights. Is it that Ceylon's love of freedom varies as it suits or does not suit her politics?

The World Council and Family Planning

A COMMISSION of the World A COMMISSION of the World Council of Churches seems to have decided that contraception is morally licit.' And in the course of the report published in the "Ecumenical Review" (the quarterly journal of the Council), it states rather strangely that there is no moral distinction between the so-called "safe period" and the use of contraceptives.

As we have pointed out on a previous occasion, though we are naturally pained at this position taken by this Christian body, it has not come to us as a complete surprise. The progressive laxity on this matter can be followed down from the Lambeth Conference of 1938, when the erstwhile stand on family planning and contraception was slightly modified, down to the Lambeth Conference of 1958, when all pretence was thrown away.

We find it hard to see how a representative Christian body, dedicated to Christian principles, could proclaim contraception as against the law of God before 1938, and how after that date, it could gradually whittle down its own understanding of God's law.

The position of the Catholic Church is well known — we stand by God's law, and on that, we know no compromise.

The minimum individuals living in a house were five and the maximum thirteen. In

There were over two hundred and fifty people using one lavatory. There were 1,736 sick people; and there were 240 children not attending school.

Explaining their plan of action, he said that they would establish a night school for those 240 children. They would also do something to look after the little children so that the parents could go to Mass. They would erect houses similar to the ones they had built at Rawatawatte. They would also establish a co-operative thrift and savings society. He appealed to the people to co-operate with them to make it a scucess.







This alone explains much of their thrill-seeking, their tendency to react against authority and all the things that remind them of childhood.

DESPITE their bravado, their cock-sure attitude toward life, teen-agers are basically insecure. Beneath their urges for adult life there is fear because they know they are not equipped emotionally and psychologically to handle all these new situations.

It is at this moment that teen-agers desperately need and want a kind of understanding friend, someone who will be patient and gentle with them, and not forever dismiss their new and wild ideas as childish or moronic. Nagging, failure to take them seriously, to accord them respect and treat them as young men and women, is precisely the kind of handling that has forced them to seek acceptance in gangs with standards of their own.

MANY teen-agers grow up outside the Church. Their school subjects are learned without any kind of Christian framework in an amoral environment which is secularized to the core. Parents may not be faithful in the practice of their religion and often there are broken homes.

Yet because our young people have not yet been hardened by life, because they are completely open to new ideas — and ideals — deep beneath that outward show of callousness and independence, there is a refreshing honesty and sincerity and spontaneity.

THIS is what we must discover and cultivate, and I know of no easier way of doing it than by being kind and gentle and understanding. As one writer put it, "Love is the fundamental law of Christianity and also of Christian education."

We must show them how the truths of Faith meet the needs of their lives — in their homes, schools, and neighbourhoods. They must find the Faith meaningful in the day-to-day choices, of adolescent life.

THEY will find that religion is not just another course to be studied. It will also be a programme of personal positions to be assumed, reached and lived. In it they will find a vital and personal relationship to God. This relationship will help them meet the situations of their daily adolescent life in a world of un-Christian social pressures.
