

Editorial Notes

The last issue of our Miscellany came out in December, 1986. Since then events of great significance have taken place in rapid succession both in this country and abroad. One event of particular significance to this part of the country was the "invasion" of Vadamaradchy by the Sri Lankan Army undertaken in May 1987 - the "search and destroy" operation against the armed dissidents. resulted in such an upheaval and such heavy loss of life and property and consequently to international concern. Many students of Vadamaradchi had to leave their schools, many of which had to remain closed for weeks. Some of these students sought admission to Jaffna College. On the other hand many students from this village left our College fearing that the invasion might be extended to these areas as well and moved to Colombo and to schools in South India. The international concern thus raised resulted in due course to direct Indian intervention. One consequence of this was the Indo - Sri Lanka accord signed on the 29th July 1987.

The Indian Peace Keeping Force which moved into the Northern and Eastern Provinces in accordance with the terms of the Treaty was at first welcomed as saviours by the Tamils. The L. T. E., the most important dissident group, refused to accept the terms of the treaty and clashes broke out between the I. P. K. F. and the L. T. T. E. on several occasions. By October 1487 the clashes had led to open war and the I.P. K. F. started moving in force into almost every village in the Tamil areas. Recent changes in the political situation, in particular the agreement between the L. T. T. E. and the Sri Lanka Government and later the changes brought about by the General Election in India, have resulted in the Indian Government agreeing to withdraw its army from Sri Lanka. The withdrawal is now in its last phase. As we go to press the Bicknell Memorial Pavilion and the surrounding buildings occupied by the I. P. K. F, since October 1987 have been vacated. The L. T. T. E. has moved into a house which was previously held by the I. P. K. F. The public of Jaffna are once again beginning to be optimistic of their future and looking forward to an early end to the distruption of civil admini stration and to a freely elected democratic government and to economic development.

It is our earnest hope that communalism which had dominated Sri Lankan politics since the introduction of Donoughmore Constitution will cease to raise its ugly head again in this country. We believe that the present Government will agree to devolve real political and economic power to the Tamil areas and thus lay the foundations for a prosperous future.

During the period referred to above Jaffna College itself had to face many vicissitudes. During October — November 1987 as the I. P. K. F. moved into Vaddukkoddai thousands of frightened villagers sought refuge in our College buildings and hostels. The Gurkha Rifles, the Madras Regiment and later the Maratha Light Infantary moved into the Bicknell Pavilion and surrounding houses.

More recently for a period of three months from June 1989 we were unable to conduct classes as students were dragged away, against their will and inducted into compulsory military service. Some who were thus forcibly dragged away were subsequently released on the intervention of school authorities. A few students lost their lives in these and other similar situations. Some who were due to sit for public examination had to run away to other parts of the country or to foreign lands and thus miss their chance to sit the examinations.

Although the future remains uncertain it is our firm belief that Jaffna College which has survived various crisis during the 167 years of its existence (e.g. the situations that developed in 1855, 1911, 1960 and 1974) will be oble to face successfuly any situation that may develop in the future. Our ability to survive vicissitudes in the past gives us the hope that we will be able to overcome any difficulties in the future as well. God we believe is the 'Lord of History' Everything happens according to his will. Our faith in God gives us the strength to believe that we will not waver in our determination to serve our people and our motherland.

Rajan Kadirgamar Number:

Mr. Rajan Kadirgamar who was Principal of the College from 1968 retired in October 1988. Dr. S. Jebanesan assumed duties as Principal and Mr. W. D. Kulatungam became Vice-Principal. Mr. Kadirgamar deserves our gratitude for his efficient administration of the College during these years of crisis. His main concern was that the students of the College should develop their interests in various spheres. He was eager to maintain the tradition of freedom and independent thought which has been the distinguishing characteristic

of Jaffna College ever since its inception. He has handed over the College to his successor in prime condition in spite of the difficult times the College has had to pass through. In recognition of the services he has rendered to the College and to the people of Vadduk-koddai we have decided to dedicate this issue to him. Articles have been contributed by his personal and family friends and his past students. We thank them all for their willing acceptance of our requests for such contributions. Mr. Kadirgamar is now serving as Registrar of the Christian Theological Institute at Maruthanamadam, The Miscellany extends to him and to the Institute its best wishes.

Beyond the Veil:

During the period under review (1987—89) some members of the teaching staff and of the Board of Directors and some old boys and students have passed beyond the veil. Detailed references to a few of these departed ones appear in the Principal's Report. Mr. A. R. Abraham, Miss Rasammah Eliyathamby, Mr. T. Ponnambalam and Dr. S. P. Appasamy were members of our teaching staff. They continued to have close contact with the College even after retirement. Special mention must be made of Dr. S. P. Appasamy who regularly contribued articles to the Miscellany. He was serving as English Editor of the Christian Literature Society of Madras at the time of his death. Even while holding this post he continued to give whatever help he could to Jaffna College and to the Jaffna Diocese of the Church of South India.

Dr. Luther Jayasingham was President of the Collegiate Section of Jaffna. College from 1966 to 1974. Prior to that he had served as teacher in the High School Section and also as Lecturer in Geography in the Collegiate Section of Jaffna College. The fact that it was during his period of service as President that the Technical Institute and the Agricultural Institute were started is evidence of his far sighted vision. We owe to him our gratitude for the effort he put into the building up of these Institutes during his period of service.

Mr J. M. Sabaratnam and Mr. R. E. J. A. Setukavalar were members of the Board of Directors of Jaffna College. Mr. J. M. Sabaratnam who was also an old boy of the College had served as Chairman of the Board for many years. He passed away in August, 1988 while he was staying with his daughter in London. Dr. James Ratnam was one of the best friends of the College. The fact that he has donated the Evelyn Ratnam Institute for Inter-cultural studies to the College, amply testify his affection for this Institution.

Farewells 1

It is often claimed that the teachers of Jaffna College do not leave the service. They either retire or die in harness. During the period under reference Miss Mary Elias, Mr. T. Visuvanthan, Mr. A. I. Sinniah and Mr. V. Selvaratnam and Mr. R. Kandiah retired from service. Mr. Charles R. Rajkumar left us to join his family in the United kingdom.

Paranthan Branch School:

The Board of Directors of Jaffna College decided to start a branch institution at Paranthan which could serve as feeder school to Jaffna College. Land was purchased in the neighbourhood of Paranthan Railway Station and plans were drawn to put up suitable buildings. Two teachers quarters have already been completed. Mr. S. Mahilrajah, B. Sc. has been appointed Principal. It is proposed to start primary classes this year.

It is our hope that this school will serve as the nucleus of an institution which well be in a position to provide the younger generation of the Kilinochchi electrorate access to good English and Western Science.

200 Th Anniversary of Dr. Daniel Poor's Birth:

On the 27th of June 1989 we celebrated the 200th Birth Anniversary of the Pioneer Missionary, Dr. Daniel Poor.

The lack of suitable buildings to accommdate the primary school has been a matter of growing concern in recent years. Mr. Edward Marks, Charge De Affairs of the American Embassey who came to Vaddukoddai to participate in the Daniel Poor Centenary Celebrations laid the foundation stone for the building on the 27th of June 1989. The work is progressing fast and it is hoped that the three storey block designed to accomplate the Primary School will be completed before 1991. We are hoping to have the formal opening of this complex during 175th Anniversary Celebrations of the American Ceylon Mission.

Alumni Associations:

Alumni Associations are functioning regularly and efficiently in London, Toronto Sydney and Melbourne. The Toronto Alumni Association honoured our new principal with a Special dinner organised to felicitate him. Dr. J. B. selliah, Dr. W. L. Jeyasingham Dr. E. A. Champion Major K. Ratnam and Mr. A. M. Brodie spoke at this dinner. The London Association held its annual Dinner on 10th September 1959. Mr. J. Ratnarajah was elected President and Mr. K. Kanthasamy Secretary.

The Board of Directors:

A number of changes have taken place in the composition of the Board of Directors during the period under review. After the passing away in August 1988 of the Chairman, Mr J. M. Sabaratnam, Mr. K. Pooranampillai served as Acting Chairman. Subsequently at the meeting of the Board held in February 1989 Mr S. S. Selvadurai was elected Chairman of the Board and Manager of the School. Rt. Rev. J. J. Gnnapiragasam, Bishop of Colombo (Church of Ceylon) and Mr. C. E. Rajasingam former Vice-Principal of Union College, Tellipallai were elected as new members. Mr. A. C. Canagarajah has returned to the Board after his sabbatical year.

Board of Trustees:

The Board of Trustees has continued to show considerable interest in the multifaceted development of the College. Rev. Paul C. Clayton a member of the Board paid us a visit on 6th March 1984. This was followed by a visit by Rev. Eric Gass on 28th April. 1989. The new Principal of the College Dr. S. Jebanesan attended a meeting of the Board held at the Boston University on 17th May 1989 and was encouraged to note the immense interest shown by the Board in the various activities of the College.

The Board of Trustees has assured the Principal of their readiness to give all necessary assistance and co-operation in the development of the College. Dr. Telfer Mook continues to serve as President of the Board of Trustees and Rev. Eric Gass and Mr. Richard Edmunds as Secretary and Treasurer respectively. Dr. Robert Holmes Rev. David shire Mr. Carl Holdrige and Rev. Paul C, Clayton continue to encourage us by frequently corresponding with us and inquiring about our progress and about the problems we have had to face in recent times.

This issue is coming out as Rajan Kadirgamar number as has already been mentioned earlier in the notes, it contains a record of the activities of the three years 1987—1989. The New Principal

From time to time among the new Principals, there have arisen, in the various countries of the world, men with extraordinary insight and sensitiveness to new ideas and the problems they have raised and have not merely solved them, but discovered new problems arising from them, which also they were able to solve.

These are not learned men but geniuses. They have given impetus to civilisation and learning. Learning consists of the preservation of insights and ideas formed earlier and systematising them. Learning is increased by its depth and variety. These do not give an impetus to civilisation but preserve it from generation to generation. This is a cultural heritage which descends from age to age.

Geniuses are hard to find Their actual phenomena are not made by their circumstances, but are born. But the other kind of figures are not so hard to find. There are learned people in all countries These are persons who thirst for knowledge, of things a ready available. These learned people are people with a quest that can hardly be quenched. They seem never to stop. The more they know the more they want to know.

Dr. Jebanesan seems to belong to this latter class. After his basic degree at Peradeniya University, which is equivalent to a London Degree, he put in a short spell of teaching at St. Anthony's College, Kandy. He thought of the best way of furthering his ambitions and he thought of India. The nearest place in India with a University is Madura. After the B. A. Degree there is of course the M. A. and Dr. Jebanesan thought that he would take not one M. A. degree but two: one in Philosophy at Madura and one in Tamil at Peradeniya. These he proceeded to do but there was another idea gnawing at his mind. This was a desire to know something of Theology. In the Middle Ages and for a long time after, Theology was called the 'Queen of Sciences'. So he said to himself "Why not a degree in Theology also?" and he began to sit for the B. D. Exam, part by part. At the end of it there was dangling behind him, a long list of academic degrees a B. A. degree, two M. A. degrees and a B. D. Degree. As if all these qualifications were not enough he worked for and obtained a Ph D deegree at Jaffna

The writer who solemnised the marriage of Dr. Jebanesan's parents in 1937, did not however know much about him, until by chance he came into occupation of a house opposite the one where the writer was residing. When the writer who had his own writing work to do in plenty had the necessity to fall back upon someone to

verify certain matters, he found Dr. Jebanesan well — informed on all the matters on which, he consulted him. From that time he began to call him, the learned one The title spread among our intimate friends. This title had to be given up, when Dr. Jebanesan became the Principal of Jaffna College where the subrogate could be applied to many persons each learned in his own field. So now we are content to apply the term 'Principal'.

When the Principalship of Jaffna College fell vacant a Sub-Committee was appointed to make nominations. We understand that the Sub-Committee was searching high and low for a suitable person and even wrote to the American Board of Trustees. We were wondering why they were taking so much trouble when there was one available so handy so close by, because Dr. Jebanesan who was already the Vice-Principal had all the necessary qualifications, and qualities.

In a Principal the public expects certain indispensable qualities. In the first place it is expected that he would be a person of great academic ability. In Rev. John Bicknell this was supposed the be pre-eminent. To a certain extent the Principal's task of administration has become far more difficult than in the days of Mr. Bicknell. From another point of view it has become much easier. It has become difficult because the number of students is now immensely larger. It is also because free Education has brought the government into the picture and greatly increased the volume of work. It has become easier because what was done by one person is now distributed among an army of assistants—Clerks, Accountants etc.

There are also certain other qualities which are generally associated with a Principal. In the first place, personality, second, the gift of speech, third the ability to get on with people. Dr. Jebanesan's personality is not formidable but inviting. As for the gift of speech, he is not an orator but an easy and fluent in two languages but he can be impassioned in either language. As for the ability to get on with people, this is a gift which he wields with superb confidence and skill.

To crown his whole figure as a perfect embodiment of everything necessary for the head of a Christian Missionary Institution he decided to enter Holy Orders and was recently Ordained Deacon and very soon will be a full Presbyter. This is a tradition which is kept up in many public schools in England. The famous Dr. Thomas Arnold was associated with Rugby, Dr. William Temple was associated with Ripon. Archbishop Fisher was alss associated with Ripon, Here, in our country St. Thomas College, Colombo is associated with Warden Stone and Canon One can enumerate other de Saram. names equally famous but it is sufficient to say that the head of a Missionary Institution should be a cleargyman.

We wish Dr. Jebanesan all success and God's Blessing in the enterprise he has undertaken.





Truly One of the Greats

The historian, Lipson, once confessed that the most difficult task for historian is to write the history of his own times. The objectivity and distance that is required will not be there. I have known Principal Rajan Kadirgamar for over 40 years. Like Lipson. I have stood rather close to him as a friend and a colleague and as an alumnus of Jaffna College. However, my absence from Sri Lanka for the last 23 years gives me a certain distance from which to view the contributions, accomplishments, may be even the disappointments, of Rajan Kadirgamar as principal over a period of 20 years.

That Rajan would one day become Principal of Jaffna College or even the Principal of any one of the leading institutions in the island was almost a given. One could almost predict that a life given to the school, the church, and the community, without a serious blemish, had to be taken advantage of or else we would have been guilty of wanton waste.

In the late 1940's, when Rajan came to Jaffna College as a student, it was the beginning of the end of an era signaling the birth of a new nation. Therefore, as students in the university entrance classes, we were caught up in the freedom movements in India and in Ceylon. For us, Mahatma Gandhi,

and Nehru were much larger than life personalities that we almost regretted the absence of such men at that particular time in Cevlon. I remember the discussions we would have when we took long walks to see the sun set in all its splendor over the horizon on the Punalai Road but in its very setting, it always inspired us with the possibilities of an even brighter day for our people. We were simply caught in the idealism of youth in Jaffna in the late 40's. I am happy to note that at least two of those who walked and talked down the Punalai Road ended holding two of the highest positions in Jaffna. Rt. Reverend D. J. Ambalavanar, Bishop in Jaffna and Rajan Kadirgamar, Principal of Jaffna College.

Rajan assumed office without the benefit of a period of apprenticeship The sudden death as Vice Principal. of Mr. S. V. Balasingam meant two things. First of all it deprived us of any particular stamp that S. V. Balasingam might have left on Jaffna College and the contribution he might have made Sri Lanka. Those of to education in us who were his students and knew him quite well are left with upanswered questions. An even greater question that posed itself was whether the still young Vice Principal, relatively untested, was ready to take on the heavy responsibilities. That question was ultimately answered when Principal Rajan Kadirgamar brought the school through the firestorm in 1987 and has bequeathed to his successor what was entrusted to him 20 years ago without a major upheavel or physical breakdown. No other Principal of Jaffna College was ever called upon to deal with the political and social demands as they have been in the past few years. For this accomplish, ment, we the alumni must always remain grateful.

As Principal of Jaffna College. Rajan had an advantage which benefited the school. He never allowed himself to become parochial or provincial by confining himself to the boundaries of the school and the school only. He made it his task, first of all, to keep himself intellectually abreast with the latest thinking not only on educational matters but also on the social and religious issues. He was quite well known both in the country and outside and used his degree from Columbia University to great advantage. Over the years, and I have corresponded frequently and I could see that he was in step with all the issues that were of concern to people like him who had the burden of educating a new generation. In 1968 when he became Principal. there were definite guideposts and symbols that nobody questioned. The authority of the Principal and the faculty was beyond dispute, but he has lived thru time when two young boys raised the barrel of a revolver into the face of a Principal in Jaffna and ended his life. That day so many walls came tumbling down. It is very easy always to break down a wall and it was left to principals such as Rajan and others to try and build those walls again. It is to their credit that we still have the semblance of a wall in that our schools still do function. How they function and how long they will function we knew them is a question that appears unanswerable right now. Sitting at a desk thousands of miles away dictating this tribute to my friend, I feel very strongly that our schools will still be our salvation only because we have had strong and deeply dedicated men such as Rajan Kadirgamar and others like him.

To be the Principal of a school such as Jaffna College demanded qualities of a versatile nature. It was not enough to know the rules and regulations of the Department of Education. The Principal had to be knowledgable and interested in the various activities from the classroom to the chapel to the playing field. It also demanded that the image of Jaffna College be seen through the Principal and his vision for the school. As Principal of the school he projected an image of Jaffna College which bore the motto, "Jesus Christ, the Light of Life." In this he was not overly pious, nor overbearing with his piety. He was quite comfortable with sinners and with saints and he could understand one and walk with the other.

Twenty years is a long time in any man's life. Very few principals have been blessed with longevity in office, but what is important is not the span of years but what those years have meant to the history of the institution. The history of Jaffna College will one dayrecord what Rajan Kadirgamar

has left as his legacy. Perhaps as I said earlier, we stand too close to make a judgment on his accomplishments, but we cannot be denied the privilege of having known him and to salute him as friends and Colleagues.

We salute a very humble man who genuinely delighted in the accomplishments and successes of his friends and students. His is a man who knew them all by name, just as librarian, K. Seliah, knew each and every book by its title and many by their content. In a world of computers and statistics, the personal touch of a Principal may soon become a tale told by old men and women who may remember of such things. That such a day may soon be upon us is no more an idle dream.

The sciences have shown us a way to a more comfortable life, have unlocked what for many years has been the mysterious, but in the process have also systematically dehumanized life as we knew it. We are today paying in human terms the price for this dehumanization process. We can now kill without remorse, slaughter without shame, because we are not answerable to anybody, least of all the God of our fathers, be it Christian or Hindu.

Rajan Kadirgamar's first degree is in biology but he is in many ways a romantic. A man who understood very clearly that man does not live by the laws of Newton alone, that the scholar saints of Tamil literature, Shakespeare, and Michael Angelo add a dimension to human life that the sciences cannot give. This basic understanding he tried very hard to impart to his students. Our students will always remain indebted to him for this. I for

one will always remember him for this great contribution to generations of Jaffna College students.

If there is a disappointment in Rajan's tenure as Principal, it is a disappointment of circumstances rather than that of purpose. From 1983 thru 1988, the political and social revolution in Jaffna did not bypass our schools. As a matter of fact, our children became the tools of this revolution. One can only speculate at what our schools would have achieved and to what heights Rajan would have taken Jaffna College given the normalacy his predecessors enjoyed.

This much can be said. History did not deal the same hand to Rajan as it did to his predecessors. In the same breath it must also be said that Dr. Jebanesan now has to live with the hand dealt to him.

Even as I pay this tribute to Rajan, I also wish God's blessings on a former student of mine, Dr. Jebanesan, who I believe has the right temperament, scholarly credentials, and a great sense of humour to lead Jafina College into the 21st century.

Forty years have disappeared "like an evening gone." In the very act of writing this tribute, I make my own pilgrimage to hallowed moments, people, and places and feel young again. There in lies the great mystery of the act of rememberance.

It is not for me to say it, but I firmly believe history will one day say of Principal Rajan Kadirgamar, "he was truly one of the Greats."

Reminiscences of the Family Dr. S. Dura Raja Singham

Manipay, 5 miles from Jaffna is a village, expanding into a flourishing town. Its important landmarks are the Green Memorial Hospital, the Maruthadi Pillaiyar Temple and the Manipay Hindu College. Herein one finds the ancestral home of Sir Mutu Coomaraswamy. Almost 300 yards from the market there is a prolific group of Sir Mutu's kinsmen in North Manipay. The above prefatory note is being mentioned because the home of the Kadirgamars was at Manipaythe brick building where Mr. Katpaka Kadirgamar and family lived. While a student at Manipay Hindu College Stonor Kadirgamar, the eighth child of a family of eight children and I were classmates. The home of the Kadirgamars housed partly in later years the Manipay Post Office during my time. It was just a walk for me to accompany Stonor whenever I wanted to purchase stamps or post a letter. I have already mentioned how Stonor and I carried one slipper each of the slippers of 'B. A' Master after Sarojini Naidu's lecture. Many years later, Stonor was living at the Singapore Y.M.C.A. Whenever I visited Singapore I would call on him and recall old memories and spend a nostalagic evening talking about T. H. Crossettes, the Principal and others. I recall my association with him with great respect.

Whilst at manipay Hindu, Stoner had mentioned to me about a brother of his studying at United Theological College in Bangalore, India and who

was to be married to a daughtet of the Tamil scholar Rev. Francis Kingsbury. He was for a considerable time at the Poet Tagore's school Santiniketan. The Kadirgamar brothers are well known in the professional world of Sri Lanka, I. G. C. Kadirgamar was a lawyer.

One day during the College recess, at Jaffna College, I saw a gentleman entering the school compound, perhaps on his way to the office. That was the future Rev. J. W. Kadirgamar The bell rang and I lost sight of him. Later, I was asked to meet him by one of my classmates W. K. Bonney, as I then had an idea of joining Santiniketan. I cannot recall when I met him. A year or two later. he bought over Ceylon Patriot Jaffna and I have cuttings of one or two articles I wrote on C. P. Andrews for this weekly. Years later, we met in Malaysia at Seremban where we lived. He was in Charge of the church here. This was during the Japanese Occupation of Malaysia. We met very frequently at our homes or at functions. As our outlook was similar friendship strengthened. When the British returned to Malaya, he was in charge of the Tamil Church at Malacca Street, in Kualalumpur and I was back teaching at Kuantan, His house was situated very near to the bus station at Malacca street. Kualalumpur. I often went to see him and partook of a meal or a cup of tea.


Recently, in my own researches on the biographical details of Coomaraswamy,



I found it mentioned in a Jaffna journal that it was Mr Katpaka Kadirgamar who proposed the resolution of awarding the title of "Vidya Vinodhan" by the citizens of Jaffna. This interesting detail has brought to me great pleasure. It was always a pleasure to meet his wife with her welcome smile.

Another interesting family tit bit I came to know of was that Mrs. Primrose Mahamalar was a niece of E. W. Aryanayakam, who served India at the institutions of Tagore and Gandhiji, The reader should forgive me if this is only of sentimental interest, And again, this priece of writing would not have originated, if not for the request of Rajan, to write an article for the Miscellany Centennial Issue titled "Those were the days", it has now been enlarged into a volume of my memories, which I had never thought of writing. Dear reader, if you ever happen to read these memories, please thank Rajan and offer him your thanks as well.

When Rajan (as we affectionately called him) wrote to me that he was visiting Malaysia and Singapore with his wife Mahamalar my joy knew no bounds. Malaysia is not a new place for Rajan. It was here that he had his early education, living with his parents. I shall not write about my reminiscences of a country where he has several relatives, friends, teachers, classmates and his own students of Jaffna College. He did enjoy his visit I should say though he had very often anxious thoughts of his students,

home and country. For a principal to be in the company of his Alumni gives great pleasure. This is usual but to be in another country and to read of disturbed conditions in one's homeland is another. If my sensing of his thoughts are correct, I should say that Rajan was always all smiles during his stay.

Revisiting Malaysia and Singapore after an absence of more than three decades must have been for Rajan, a voyage of discovery and to use his own words the visits "gratified the sentimental and emotional aspects of his life — his old church, his old school, friends and teachers and his own students", It was a time when there was great tribulation news about awful events in his homeland-I could see the great uneasiness, something that all of us would naturally experience in his movement, his conversations and even in his laughter.

Both our countries had a constant flow of pupils from one another for over a hundred years. The College had an overflow of boys and girls who served Malaysia and Singapore in the educational, medical, clerical and missionary fields. All may have gone to the College for higher studies and served their country in all walks of life. But that was under pax Britannica. Many Principals have visited Malaya and past pupils have entertained their friends and teachers.

But as I sat in that little restaurant where we were entertaining Rajan, most of those assembled were in their 80's, 70's, 60's and so on till the figure of 40 for the flow of pupils from Jaffna College had ceased as a result of political and economic changes. Those assembled were pupils who had their education during different decades. When my conversation centered on J. V. C. or Minnie Harrison those in the audience wondered who they were. Of course, I did not mention that Lily Chelliah was the first girl to join college. J. A. Thuraisingam. my desk mate at the College could not attend owing to ill health. How happy would I have been to hear him sing "My Bonnie is Over the Ocean", the song that he sang at one Brotherhood Song Galore, sixty years ago repeated by encore from the audience. The other man at the opposite table was speaking of Dr Holmes. We could not compare notes of our doings. Mr. Nagarajah referred to his jumping over a wall. I could hardly fathom which wall he was referring to. The abiding unifier was the Principal.

Mr. and Mrs. S. Rathichandran acted as host and hostess in which capacity they behaved with much satisfaction. Amongst those in the small but distinguished gathering were Mr. M. Rajasingam, the Director of the Postal Services. There were many eminent lawyers, doctors, engineers, teachers and scholars. Wives of most of these and past pupils were jovial and entertaining. This dinner was held at a restaurant in the Petaling Jaya Supermarket. Today, the Alumni group in Malaysia is not as

large as the one in Singapore, though statistics might falsify this statement. The Principal thanked those present after he had narrated the activities of the College. It could be seen by those of us in the audience that he and his staff were endeavouring to make the College come to the forefront of similar institutions in the island. The pleasant function came to an end with reminiscences by me, the oldest alumni in the gathering, Mr. Rajasisingam and Mr. Nagarajan,

Past pupils of Jaffna College are today studying or earning a living in various parts of the world. Most of them have settled down in foreign cities and nearby Singapore, Malaysia and India. Though a minority, they acquired citizenship and prove useful citizens. Jafina College deserved the tribute that Gandhiji paid when he said that "The boys of this institution are today distinguished servants of the country".

Quite a number of these past pupils are not only from Jafina College but from the other leading colleges in the peninsula. In these day of stress and conflict one finds a large number of students continuing their studies in India.

The years of close relationship between our families was during the period of the Japanese occupation in Malaya. Never have so many of us thought so often of our home and country than during these dreadful forty four months of Japanese tyranny. We were caught in a most unexpected manner.

Some of us after the fall of Singapore did not know what to do. We lost our nerves, Some were without homes, food and money. Some of us were suffering from mental inertia, esprit - de - corp of Malayan comradeship pulled us all through during those hectic days after the British withdrawal. were proud to have a common cause and we salute the memory of those of our comrades who fell in the struggle. Some of our dear and beloved ones are no longer with us. Men. Women and children have died as a result of bombing, imprisonment, assasination and the ravages of war. Many have been left with no bread-winner in their homes and have had to face new problems unthought of before. The sheer desire to live in the most trying circumstances pulled 115 through that awful nightmare of Jap rule.

Principal A. Kadirgamar has stated at a Prize Giving function of the College in 1986 as to how he spent his days at Scremban during this period. I quote below a part of his speech.

I pause here to elaborate a little on this point from personal experience. Some of us became victims of World War II at a very impressionable age and our formal education became paralysed under enemy occupation in a foreign land. Regular disciplined schooling became a problem. Our contact with the outside world too became almost impos-

sible for four and a half years. thank God, we had an enlightened older generation of parents, teachersfriends who were meeting to read and to discuss matters in depth day, day, evening after evening. We younger ones just eaves-dropped on them. They were discussing men and matters and events of contemporary relevance Hitler, Mussolini, Tojo on one side and Churchill. Roosevelt and Stalin on the other including B-24 bombers, V-2 rockets and the atomic bomb: they were discussing the men in the Indian Independence struggle, Gandhi, Nehru, Patel, Andrews, Tagore, Rajagopalachari, Sarojini Naidu, Patel, Subhas Chandra Bose; and on religon they were talking of Sadhu Sundar Singh Vivekananda, Kagawa Schweitzer, Stanley Jones, Harry Emerson, Fosdick, Leslie Weatherhead and so on. One of the men very active in these discussions a young teacher later became a scholar and author and was recently conferred a doctorate by the Jaffna University, namely S. Durai Raja Singam of Malaysia. Those of us who listened to those men talk and discuss among themselves were being educated in a way no classroom teaching would have succeeded. We went for the books they were discussing and involved in something worthwhile when we could not do anything better. When the time came for us to settle down to more systematic work, we were fairly well and better equipped than many others to continue the process of education here at Jaffna College,

The Association Press of Calcutta had published a volume in their "Heritage of India Series" in 1921. "Hymns of The Tamil Saivite Saints" authored by Francis Kingsbury and G. E. Phillips. These translations were perhaps one of the first publications in this field. Both the authors were at the United Theological College, Bangalore. Kingsbury, a son of the great Tamil scholar. C. W. Thamotherampillai, was later Lecturer in Tamil at the Ceylon University College. Colombo in its early stages.

I enjoyed Francis Kingsbury and G. E. Phillip's translation in The Heritage of India Series and cannot help but wonder if there are still copies of this quoted book in the College library. I now own a copy and it is a bedside book.

PRODUCT STREET THE THE SECOND STREET

"The Hymns of the Tamil Saivite Saints" was a book which I found I could easily absorb. Rev. F. Kingsbury had just then returned to Jaffna, after having served in Mesopotamia during World War I. I saw him many a time at the College in military chaplain robes. His son Johnson Kingsbury was a classmate of ours. On leaving College he (Willie as we called him) worked at the Y. M. C. A. Colombo as a Physical Education Instructor. Full of fun and always with a jovial temperament, he was always a pleasant man to meet at the Y. M. C. A.

Six decades later, living in another country. I found this book, a treasure of my college days a constant reference book read though these translations.

THE ROLE OF JAFFNA COLLEGE

Jaffna College has been called upon to play significant roles in education from time to time and the debates and discussions on its present role has not ceased. It has been an ongoing debate ever since the College's predecessor the Batticotta Seminary was founded in 1823. The college was a Seminary and for most part a secondary school, then a college affiliated to the Calcutta and Madras Universities and for sometime with an adjunct an undergraduate department preparing students for the external examinations of the London and Ceylon Universities. The College now has well established Technical, Agricultural and Christian Study Institutes and splendid libraries with expanding resources for learning. The English medium classes in the form of the London Ordinary Level and Advanced Level classes have been re-introduced. There are sporadic requests now for private English medium classes at all levels and for private medical and engineering colleges, and we have in principle accepted the task of establishing educational enterprises for the lesser privileged in the Kilinochchi area. We possess the patience and willingness to listen to these debates, discussions and requests; the wisdom and energy to pioneer the more feasible proposals by finding the personnel and the funds and will certainly keep our minds open to the ongoing debate as to what our role should be from time to time. "Jaffna College always was conscious of the special needs of the community', said Professor Indrapala at his Prize-Day speech a few years ago We are happy that we are kept on our toes to constantly evaluate ourselves and to respond to changes and needs and we accept with gratitude the generous compliments paid to us that we have the potential in men and matters to do so.

Mr. A. Kadirgamar by: Rt. Rev. Dr. S. Kulandran

As the public knows Mr. A. Kadirgamar who was Principal of Jaffna College for clear twenty years, retired from this position in October, 1988.

He joined the College as a student and later went to the Madras Christian College, Tambaram. He completed his studies in the Union Seminary, New York. He became vice-principal in 1966. In 1968 Mr. S. V. Balasingham died suddenly to the consternation of everybody. The Directors were wondering to whom they should turn.

There was of course the viceprincipal, but they wondered whether he would measure up to the standard required, Mr. S. V. Balasingham and been an outstanding scholar, highly respected by everybody, Mr. Kadirgamar on the other hand was a light in a bushel hiding his qualities and practically unknown generally. He was a teacher of Botany and a good teacher. But a teacher of Botany doesn't make as much mark as a teacher of History. They decided to take a chance and appointed Mr. Kadirgamar. He continued in this capacity for nearly two decades.

Those who have watched him as Principal would have noticed a particular quality about his work. He was almost continuously in his office. One wondered what kept him there. What kept him there was his desire to conform to

European standards of efficiency. No question be kept unattended to. When the meeting of the Board of Directors took place one saw the fruits of his labour.

The questions that demanded the Principal's attention cover a wide range. A number of them rather small but mostly all of them demanding a mastery of large variety of facts and figures. But Kadirgamar came to any question it was obvious that he had a perfect acquaintance with all details big and small which enabled the Board to come to its decision with all the data in front of it. In this way he saved the Board a lot of time and trouble. On general questions he stated both sides of the case and left the Board to make its own decision, never forcing his own views upon it.

This was an attitude greatly appreciated by the Board. One particular trait which greatly amused us was his constant reference to his ancestor R. O. D. Ashbury. In fact it has become quite a joke. But he considered it, his strength. It was not a novus ordo seclorum but a person with a family tradition of about a hundred years behind him. To some extent therefore, he could say that he embodied some of the history of Jaffna College. To others it was something of a joke, and to him, and when looked at from a historical point of view quite a strength.

Dr. E. S. Thevasagayam (Principal, St. Johns College, Jaffna)

It is a privilage to be called upon to pay a tribute to a colleague. I do it rather diffidently as I may not do justice to a very illustrious career. It was my misfortune to have missed the most productive and distinguished years of his life as we were separated by distance and most of what I know about this period is what I have heard and what I have gleaned from "the Morning Star."

We came in contact with each other through the Student Christian Movement in Jaffna in which Rajan was already taking an active part as a student. He was the student Secretary of the Jaffna Inter Collegiate Christian Fellowship (JICCF) when I, as a teacher at St. John's was the Senior Secretary. This was in the years 1947/48 and I recall with joy that we were the Secretaries when the Ashram Chapel was built as a gift of the JICCF. There was no doubt even then, that in young Kadirgamar we had a future leader of the Christian Community in Jaffna.

He went on from Jaffna College Madras Christian College where I too had gone earlier and followed a similar course. His doings both as a teacher and later as Principal of Jaffna College and in the many other activities in which he took a very active and be it in the religious, leading part, educational. sports, music and other fields. I will leave to others who had first hand knowledge. Let me therefore confine myself to a few aspects which struck me about the man after I became very close to him in the past two years.

Mr. Kadirgamar was Principal of Jaffna College for twenty years and one doubts if anyone in the future will be able to achieve that record in Jaffna College or for that matter in any other College. He was very young when this tremendous responsibility of

guiding the destinies of one of the leading educational institutions in the country was entrusted to him. carried out that responsibility with great distinction bringing credit to himself honour to his College. He guided the school through one of the most turbulent and traumatic times in her history. and did and left guide her he her untarnished better and even 9 place than when he took over. He will go down in history as one of the greats of Jaffna College.

The Kadirgamar family has made a significant contribution to the life in Jaffna both in the Church and in education. Rajan has certainly added another notch on that tree, may be more distinguished than all others.

Mr. Kadirgamar was one who was dear to his students and the mark he left on them while at school stayed with them in later years as one can see by the love, affection and respect he is treated with, whenever he meets the Alumni both here and abroad. He knows them by name and could rattle doings with utmost off their irrespetive of where they were or when they were at school. It is this prodigeous memory for names and events endears any Principal to students and to his Alumni. Rajan had this in great measure which explains at least in part his great success as a Principal.

His qualificiations in Biology, in Education and Theology are impressive enough. The wide experience he had gained by his exposure, by his travels and the many conferences he attended, also must have helped to make him a very wise and highly respected person both here and abroad. More than any of these, what impressed me was the width and depth of his reading and his ability to remember and quote and then be able to communicate that knowledge at all levels. As a Public speaker. he was not only a great speaker but he was able to present subjects with clarity and depth of meaning. Every time I heard him speak in public, I had nothing but admiration. In addition he is a very good conversationalist too.

More than anything else, it was his Christian life and witness that has probably made the greatest impact on the community in Jaffna and elsewhere. Simple and humble in his ways, he was endeared by everyone he came in contact with. He continues his Christian mission as Head of the Christian Theological Seminary at Maruthanamadam where other students are going to benefit by his knowledge, life and experience. I wish him many more years of useful service to the Seminary as well to the May God bless him and community. his family.

smoker and a person of truthfulness and moral integrity, you are the symbol of an ideal lite for the staff and students. You are a connoisseur of the fine arts control of the and matters of tast mind, disciplined life and moral rectitude is the secret of your healthy life even at the age of retirement. Another admirable quality of yours is sociability which is one of the essential components necessary for the building up of a full personality which is your chief aim in life. You very seldom fail to attend a social function in which you are obliged to participate and you would advise your assistants also to do their duty in such matters.

Your mastery of the English Language was an asset to you as teacher and Principal. It is a pleasure to listen to you speaking English fluently and gracefully, in conversation or while delivering a beautiful oration on the platform or while reading the prize day report.

At the present time owing to the political unrest in our country, education has become shoddy. It is heartening to find that a good standard of education is maintained in some institutions such as Jaffna College, where an all round

education has been imparted. Unlike the tutories, Jaffna College under your Principalship has been preparing students not merely for examinations but for life by developing their physical, mental and spiritual faculties.

In your visits to foreign countries you have enhanced the reputation of Jaffna College Alumni Associations and contact with great personalities in those countries.

We are very sorry to bid farewell to you Mrs. Primrose Kadirgamar. Your gentle disposition and amiable manners have endeared you to us all. You have been an asset to the Principal in the perfomance of his duties. May God give you a happy life.

We are very happy that you Sir, have done everything possible to promote the welfare of Jaffna College. We hope and wish that you will maintain your connections and interest in Jaffna College. May God help you to continue to do you service to humanity.

It was the year 1974. The whole college gathered in the school hall for a special assembly in a hot sunny day. There were rumours, anxiety, anger and gloom in the year. All feared that the tradition of a century and a half of liberal education was going to face an abrupt end. Many an alumni and loyal friends of Jaffna College contained the sentiments of George Morris, "Woodman forbear thy stroke: And cut not its earth bound ties. O spare that aged Oak Now turning to the skies". Our Principal Mr. Kadirgamar was standing by the lectern to address the staff and students. I heared his message of the days as a student in the Grade 9 class and is fresh in my memory still "Plant your tree today even if tomorrow is quite uncertain". He was standing before us to instill strength, the one that comes from indomitable will, one's character and faith. His regular assembly talks inspired many a young minds to explore Jaffna College"-Its past, its tradition of imparting knowledge in the process of character building and man which is typical of our 'Alma Mater'.

It was in the early seventies with the restrictive changes in the admission policies of the Universities of Sri Lanka, there was a practical change in the emphasis of secondary education. Schools were geared to send as many students as possible to the universities. The Universities could provide opportuntties

for tertiary education only to a small percentage of students who qualify in the G. C. E. (A/L) Exams. Our principal was keen on the overall personality majority of development of the vast students and prepare them for the challenges they would face in the wider arena of life. The numerous opportunities for extra curricular activities and the encouragement and support helped the students to discover their potentials and develop confidence in themselves. The successful alumni of Jaffna College in all walks of life all over the world testify the same.

Jaffna College library was acknowledged as one of the best in South
East Asia. Mr. Kandirgamar took a
personal interest in rebuilding the same
into the present Daniel Poor library
with modern facilities. This also
serves as a breeding ground of school
student journalism. Budding journalists
gain writing and editorial experience and
see their creative works in black and
white in Young idea, College Misscellany
and the local newspapers.

Mr. Kadirgamar deviated much from the stereotype of a 'Principal with a cane in hand'. Discipline through responsibility was his motto. He always took pride in our college being the pioneers in having an elected student body-the school council and was sensitive to student opinion in decision making. It was by building an intimate rapport with students, their parents and teachers he could win their confidence and respect, the requirements of a successful administration. When the college bell rings after a forty minutes class, we have a tendency to rush out of our classes and walk bundled into groups in the verandhas. If by chance you find us spontaneously forming into queues and walk studiously, you can as well see our principal at the other end of the quadrangle on his twice daily classrounds!

He instilled a sense of responsibility and spirit of team work among students by his personal interest and the encouragement he gave to sports, literary and social activities of the college. Whenever Bickhell Field rocks with enthusiasm and cheer one could see Mr. Kadirgamar in the first row of the pavilion seats. He played regular Tennis until his retirement. The annual socials of Lyceum, Forum and Brotherhood are not complete without the presence of Mr. Kadirgamar in his favourite Batik shirt and Mrs. Kadirgamar in her silk saree one among the kids as their chief guests of the evening.

His natural flair for effective public speaking with the wisdom and was well expressed in his addresses at the annual Academy Dinners chaired by the student president. When the student secretary comes out with his anecdotes and quip at personalities including the principal and teachers Ottley hall looses itself in the hearty laugh and thunder of applause. This is somethig special and symbolic of the liberal traditions of Jaffna college. The proceedings of the Annual prize givings held in the traditional way in the college quadrangle and the Joy experienced when the teachers, students alumni and parents joined in the college song to say hurrah and cheer for Jaffna college, were also instrumental in building a lasting reverence for our Temple of Learning when we were young.

Mr. Kadirgamar's training as a Biology teacher started with his undergraduate training at Madras Christian College Tambaram and he obtained his B. Sc. Degree from the University of Madras. His leadership qualities were acknowledged right from his student days and he served as the general secretary of the Student Christian Movement of that College. Later he obtained a Master's Degree in Science Education from the prestigeous Columbia University, U. S. A.

Though a Science teacher by training he has an extraordinary appreciation of History and Times and an interest and enthusiasm for Literature and Arts. He was very fond of discussing customs and life styles of Jaffna with students in formal and informal situations and made us think about our roots and what we are.

As Albert Schweitzer said, "Example is not the main thing in Life-it is the only thing". The early life of our principal, the interruption in his education due to the second world war while being in Malaysia with his parents, the compulsory

service to the then Japanese government as corresondence clerk and later his service to the youth wing of I. N. A. would give inspiration and strength to the Tamil youth of this day.

He was boin to Rcv. J. W. Kadirgamar of Chavakacheri in the year 1928, an eldest son in the family of nine children all doing well and leaders in different walks of life. Mr. Kadirgamar was well aware of the difficulties of parents and the middle class of Jaffna in particular which is education oriented and depended on the same for its sustenance and survival. During his Principalship numerous merit and need based scholarships were instituted supporting students through primary, secondary and tertiary education. On many occasions without this emphatic generosity of the college our dreams in persuit of knowledge would not have seen light of the day. His initiation and effort and the support of the Alumni have resulted in the generation of Rupees six lakhs for the prize fund.

The country faced many natural and political calamnities du ring his tenure. Under his leadership our college rose upto higher humane dimensions to shelter the refugees in the college premises, care them with food and medical facilities and support the refugee children with school admissions and financial aid.

In the fied of Education, the Swabasha scheme and the social and political consequences in the seventies and eighties in the country and the radical changes in the thinking and value system of the youth and students were some

of the issues any Principal of our times had to address. Mr. Kadirgamar had to handle the same issue as a Principal of an instituition with the longest tradition of English Education. If I my be allowed to quote the words of Rt. Rev. Dr. S. Kulcndran in his forward to the book. "The contributions made to Tamil by the American Missionarics who scrved in Jaffna" (in Tamil). It is new influences. insights and experiences that renew a culture and make it live," The same can be applied to education as well. It was during Mr. Kadirgamar's time that the college had to renew its task of preparing a new generation of students who could think and write exceptionally well in their mother tongue and meet the language demands of their time.

It is much due to the forethought and vision of our principal, Jaffna College continued to provide an effective environment for passive learning of English in addition to the teaching of English as a second Language. Regular assembly talks in English, the opportunities to deliberate in English in the student forums, the opportunities for English Music, Dramatics and elocution and the facilities in the English lab gave the outgoing students of Jaffna College greater confidence in their skills of communication.

On the other hand, Tamil studies and cultural activities flourished under his patronage of "Tamil Peravai" and other literary associations. Tamil films and documentaries were produced with students and staff playing the roles depicting college life and Ottley hall witnessed numerous recitals of Tamil music and dramatic performances, classical and modern. Our principal's personal interest in art and music inspired the students to bring out their talents with the able guidance of our dedicated teachers.

Mr. Kadirgamer served as an ambassador of Christian Tamil Community of Jaffna. As early as 1960 he visited India and Pakistan leading a team of members of Student Christian Movement. He continued to participate in worldwide conferences held in Phillipines and U. S. A. He followed the program for Advanced Religious Studies and was awarded Ecumenical fellow Degree during his stay in U. S. A. He served his community and church faithfully in many capacitles sharing his richness of experience and now he serves as the Registrar of Christian Theological Seminary Chunnakam,

The Hindu community of Vaddu-koddai and surrounding villages adore him. It is a pleasant sight to see our principal dressed in his national shirt, verty and shawl attending Hindu ceremonies at the homes of students and staff and participate in the traditional lunches served on Banana leaf. He shared their happiness and sorrow with genuine interest and an abounding sense of belonging.

For thousands of parents and his fellow teachers Mr. Kadirgamar has been a great strength in their times of distress. We, students who are fortunate enough to have his personal impact on our lives in our formative years, to have his constant guidance and encouragement to excel and his unfailing support in all our times of need, will always love his name and guard his fame till our lives and memory last. May we join in wishing him and his family all Happiness.



As we enter the portals of the College several impressions both visible and invisible stand out reminding us of the solid foundations of religion and education here which has stood the test of time. Even though we had to experience the traumatic "valley of the shadow" of the acquisition of part of the College in 1974, the experience of witnessing the restoration of the College and soon after that the establishing of a splendid Library Commemorating the courageous spirit, vision and commitment of one of the very first New England missionariees here and the fitrst Principal of the College Dr. Daniel Poor stands out as a meaningful spiritual experience and pilgrimage in faith and as another act of thanks giving for the never failing goodness and mercy of God.

It is the second occasion that a principal of Jaffna College has been given the singular privilege and honour to preside the Prize giving at St. Patrick's. Though you are now the Principal Emeritus of Jaffna College and have taken up the onerous task of guiding the destinies of the future Missionaries as head of the Christian Theological Seminary at Chunnakam, you will ever remain our memory as The Principal of Jaffna College.

Baptised in the American Ceylon Mission Church at Chavakachcheri. you hail from a distinguished and illustrious family having many members as priests including your father, the Rev. J. W. A.


Kadirgamar of the Jaffna Diocese of the Church of South India. That you were able to guide the course of Jaffna College so successfully during the most turbulant and difficult times of our history may be due to the early education you have had in Anglo-Chinese School at Seremban, Malaysia, under the Japanese occupation for four years from 1942. Though confirmed as a Christian in the Methodist Episcopal Church at Seremban, Malaysia, as a student of of Jaffna College in 1946, having witnessed a football match played against St. Patrick's, you were sealed with the stamp of Jaffna College for all time. where you excelled in Tennis, Basketball and Hockey. After completing your London Inter-Science in 1950 from Jaffna College, vou entered Madras Christian College and graduated from there, ob taining your B Sc degree with Botany as your main subject. The experience you gained as president of the Student Christian Movement (SCM) at Jaffna College payed the way for you to be elected as the General Secretary of the S C M of the Madras Christian College and as Associate General Secretary of the National SCM. The several SCM conferences you attended on the Indian National level and International level were only the forerunners to the other International conferences you attended

later the Asian Leaders Conference of the Y M C A in Philipines in 1954-55, the Triennial Conferences of the S C Ms of India, Pakistan and Ceylon in Lahore. Pakistan, in 1960, Education and Theology Conference in Geneva in 1973, the Mission to Rhode Island, U S A in 1977, Consultation on Eucumenical Studies in New York, U S A in 1988 and the International Visitor, Washington D. C. in 1988.

Your versatality in any subject or topic under the sun would have been no surprise to us if only we knew that having joined the Staff of Jaffna College as a Science Teacher in 1953 and taught Botany in A/L classes, Biology, Chemistry and Christianity in the O/L classes, you did your post graduate studies. on a scholarship, at the Union Theological New York, U. S. A. in Seminary. certificate in 1961 and obtained a Advanced Religious Studies and Eucu menical Fellowship and later obtained M. A. in Science Education from Teacher's College, Columbia University; New York in 1963, and acted in many plays active member of the Christian Dramatic Society of Jaffna, Your excellent qualities of both mind and body have acknowledged at one time or other by different sections of the Society by your being elected as President of All Ceylon Christian Teachers Guild, of Science Teachers Association of N. P. T. A. of Hockey, Cricket and Soccer Associations Schools, of Jaffna Western of Jaffna Music Society as Chairman of the Music Committee of the Diocese; as Manager of "Morning Star" as Secretary and Chairman

of the Religious Education Board of the Diocese as Vice-president of the Northern Swimming and Life Saving Province Association; as Secretary of the Jaffna College Institute of Technology from its very inception in 1971 as member of the Executive Committee of All Ceylon Head Masters Conference and of the Governing Board of Madras Christian College. As the present member of the Council and the Executive Committee of the Jaffna Diocese of the Church of South India, as Chairman of the Medical Board of the Diocese and as a member of the Governing Boards of Vellore Medical College and United Theological College Bangalore India. it is but fitting that an able administrator, a genuine Christian and a Gentleman that you are, be appointed as the head of the Theological Seminary at Chunnakam Our heartiest congratulations and our sincere wishes are with you always.

Mrs. Primrose Mahilmalar, too are no stranger to us. You have never failed to accompany your husband to all our functions at College. Your generous hospitality made us at home in College. Furthermore formerly member of the Staff of St John's College and as the sister of our dear friend and former colleague, Late Mr. Anandarajan former Principal of St John College we have shared in your sorrows. Though some of our students have already had the privilege of receiving from your hands the awards at the English Day celebrations I wish to assure you that they and many others are now eagerly awaiting moment, to come forward to obtain the rewards for their achievements off your gracious hands today.

Professor and Mrs. Balasundarampillai, our Bishops, Chairman and members of the Board of Directors, Parents, Alumni and Friends:

We at Jaffna College welcome you once more to this our most important function of the year. Inspite of all our pressing problems through these years we are grateful we have been able to continue this function even though with some delay. Thank you for the encouragement always given to us and for your kind presence here with us this morning.

Professor and Mrs. Balasundarampillai, we extend to you a special word of welcome to this our most important function of the year. You are both involved in the important task of education at different levels and therefore, you have a special place on this platform today.

Professor Balasundarampillai, you hail from two well known colleges—St. Anthony's College, Kayts, which has produced very outstanding education ists in our time and Jaffna Hindu College with which we have the most cordial of relationships through these many years. You had a brilliant career at the University of Ceylon obtaining your B. A. (Hons.) degree in Geography and later obtained your Ph. D. at the University of Durham, U. K. You have been a University teacher

from 1965—as an Assistant Lecturer, Lecturer and Senior Lecturer at the University of Ceylon, Peradeniya. You were appointed Professor of Geography at the University of Jaffna in 1980 at a very young age, probably one of the youngest to be appointed as professor. You had also been a visiting professor at the University of Durham and were awarded the Commonwealth Academic Staff Fellowship in 1985/86. We also note that you have several valuable publications to your credit.

We are grateful to you for holding on to the task of University education in Jaffna and Sri Lanka, and for contributing your share to the academic world here. We also find in you, a scholar and don who besides your university tasks is deeply interested in secondary and higher educational matters and has very liberal views on the expansion of education in this part of the country. We have watched you with some interest and have been inspired by your views. We know you will have much to contribute to the development and progress of this college.

IN MEMORIAM

Mr. J. Sinnappa, the retired bursar of the college, passed away peacefully on Christmas morn in 1986 at the age of eighty-seven. He joined the clerical staff in 1921 and was appointed bursar in 1954 and retired in 1962 after forty-one years of service and was the last of the retired employees receiving a pension from the College. He had completed twenty-five years of retired life at the time of his death. He was a simple, happy, hardworking man and one of the very loyal men Jaffna College has ever seen. He had a great and abiding affection for the American Ceylon Mission, and its missionaries and institutions in Jaffna He was a pillar of the Navaly Church. While working in the college in the early years he took residence here and educated all his brilliant children very well and along with them helped to educate a number of other children in a private boarding house he ran. We owe much to him for the devoted services rendered to Jaffna College behind the scenes. We remember Mr. Sinnappa with much affection, gratitude and praise.

Mr. A. R. Abraham passed away peacefully on the 23rd of May, 1987, at the age of eighty-three. He joined Jaffna College in 1944 after serving some years as a teacher at Kurunegala and retired in 1964 after twenty years of service here. He was a keen teacher of Mathematics in the Primary and Junior Schools; was an efficient sports master, cricket and soccer coach, was a scout master and a study master for the boarders. He maintained his loyalty and enthusiasm for the college right through the end. We remember him with much gratitude and praise.

Mr. S. Kanagasabapathy, who retired after serving the college for a period of thirty-four years, passed away soon after retirement on the 31st January, 1988. He was a talented art and handwork teacher mostly in the Primary and Junior Secondary school sections. He took a keen interest in the sports and dramatic activities and was responsible for many colourful events in the College. He was a very loyal teacher and carried out all his duties in and outside the classroom most faithfully, and being a bachelor he took a great share of the responsi

bilities for a large number of his relatives who were students here. We remember him with much gratitude.

Miss Rasammah Eliayathamby passed away peacefully on 14th March, 1988, at the age of 78. She joined Jaffna College on 1st June, 1950 and served for a period of fifteen years. She was known as a very kind and conscientious teacher of the small children in the Primary School. She had a lasting influence on a very large family of pupils and we remember her with much gratitude and praise.

Mr. J. M. Sabaratnam, our Chairman of the Board of Directors, died unexpectedly in London on the 10th August, 1988, while on a holiday there. Besides being the Chairman, he was also Manager of the College at the time of his death. He became a member of the Board as early as 1949, and served the Board for a period of nearly forty years, except when he was out on sabbatical. He served at various times as Manager of the College, as Secretary as Chairman, and as Authorised Representative of the Board. He also served as member and Chairman of the Council of the Jaffna College Institute of Technology and Agriculture. By bringing to bear on the Board's deliberations, his common sense, his knowledge of procedure, his administrative experience, and his firmness, he guided us wisely. In times of crisis, he was a tower of strength. We thank God for his life and work in the service of Christian education.

As we meet after a prolonged period of violence, suffering and death we are also conscious of the numerous people who have gone beyond the veil; of students, alumni and friends and many unknown to us. We want at this time to remember them and convey to their loved ones our deepest sympathies. We hope and pray that we have come to the end of this tragic period in our history.

STAFF:

There are fifty-nine members on the academic staff—44 in the secondary school and 15 in the primary school, and there are 9 members on the non-academic staff. Of the fifty-nine on the academic staff 37 are graduates with 18 holding trained or post graduate qualifications; 14 are trained or specialist teachers; and 8 teachers with Advanced Level qualifications. There are 13 jubilarians on the present staff, and of the academic staff 35 are men and 24 are women.

It is with much pleasure that I welcome Dr. S. Jebanesan as the new Principal of Jaffna College. He will assume duties on the 27th of October. With his very creditable academic qualifications in Tamil, Theology and Education, and his scholarship and experience in these fields he will be able to make a great contribution to the progress of the school. He is also a very talented and eloquent speaker and preacher in Tamil and English, and author and

editor too. These are skills that are very necessary to communicate with the present day youth and students. As I hand the torch of leadership to him now it is my prayer that God will bless and guide him and the college through the years to come. He will be ably supported by a band of loyal, faithful, well qualified and experienced fellow administrators...Mr. W. D. Kulatungam, the vice-principal, Mr. G. Raja nayagam the supervisor of the Junior Secondary School and Mrs. L. B. Thambyrajah the supervisor of the Primary School.

The following teachers retired during the course of the last two years:

Miss M. S. Elias retired after serving for a period of thirty-five years. had her entire education at Jaffna College, obtaining the B. A. (London) Second Class in Tamil, Sanskrit and Pali and began her teaching career in Tamil and Sanskrit immediately after appearing for the final B. A. examination. Besides her efficient teaching of oriental languages she took an active part in all the extracurricular activities of the college in guiding, music, sports and dramatics. She was the first warden of the Women's Hostel when newly built in 1956 and now called the Howland Hall and remains its warden at the time of her retirement. She was President of the Round Table, the first lady staff member of the Tennis Club, and served as Guide Commissioner in the North. She attended several international conferences in India,

Singapore and USA, on behalf of the Guide Movement, and also served as a missionary in residence for the UCBWM in USA, representing the Jaffna Diocese of the Church of South India. She was a pioneer student and teacher in stabilising girls' education and co-education in the college. As the first lady administrator she served as supervisor of the Junior School (Grades 1-7) and later as supervisor of the Junior Secondary School (Grades 6-8). She was an enthusiastic, energetic, hard worker in everything she undertook and was one of the most loyal teachers the college ever had. Her father, the late Mr. C. O. Elias, served the college faithfully for an equally long period. The family also took Ceylon citizenship and took up residence in Vaddukoddai.

Mr. T. Visuvanathan retired after serving the college for a period of thirty-seven years. He was the first science graduate of the Ceylon University to be appointed to the staff taught Chemistry. Mathematies Physics, mainly in the Advanced Level classes, and served as the Head of the Science Department for several years He was also the time-table master and carried out this task very efficiently. He was a very enthusiastic House master and also served briefly as a warden of a hostel. He was president of the Round Table and the Benevolent Fund Society. His services to the Provident and Benevolent Fund societies in the college and the NPTA have been most

outstanding. He was also the teacher most conversant in matters regarding the teaching profession and his advice and counsel were always sought after. He served for many years as the very knowledgeable and effective staff representative on the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors. His contribution to the progress of the teaching profession is widely acknowledged.

Mr. R. D. Thanabalasingham retired during the course of this year after serving the college as supervisor of the Boarding Department and later as supervisor of works for a period totalling thirty-four years. During his early days he was a very energetic worker and set the Boarding Department on a very sound basis. The Jaffna College boarders were always well fed and the quality of meals in the college boarding was appreciated by all concerned. With the winding up of the undergraduate department he also took over the post of supervisor of works. He had to retire early due to ill health.

We wish all the above well in their period of retirement and thank them profusely for their long and devoted services.

Miss U. E. Gunaratnam, who was the library assistant in the Junior School, resigned to further her studies in India, and Mrs. M. S. Cassiere the Accounts Clerk, resigned after four and a half years of service and we thank and wish them well. Miss S. Benjamin, the assistant librarian left us to join her husband in the Maldives. She served us for eight years and during her period of service at the library she obtained the Diploma in Library science and proved to be an efficient assistant librarian. We thank her for the services rendered and wish her well. Miss R. Thambyrajah resigned after a short period of service here.

Mr. K. Sathasivam and Mrs. I. Jeya. kumar both obtained their Diplomas in Education at the University of Jaffna and have resumed work Mr. A. A. Paul, one of our college. Advanced Level Chemistry teachers. obtained the M. Phil. degree from the University of Colombo, Mr. S. Jebanesan obtained the Ph. D. degree from University of Jaffna. He is the second teacher on the staff of Jaffna College to obtain the doctorate while in service. We congratulate all these teachers on their academic successes, and it is a great inspiration to the academic community of teachers and students to have members on the staff who involved in in research their subjects and who are furthering their academic pursuits. We know many more will now be inspired to follow suit.

Mr. N. A. Vimalendran has been granted a scholarship to follow a course of study at the Ecumenical Institute in Bossey, Switzerland, for a period of five months commencing October this year. The topic of the course being "Peace, Justice and Integrity of Creation". We wish him well.

Messrs. A. Jeyarajan and N. Yogarajah were sent to the American College, Madurai, for a course of studies in Computer Science and Applied Sciences under the direction of Professors Reisz and Principal Jeyapandian. We are happy we could renew our bonds of relationship with American College and we thank the Principal and staff for the very kind services rendered to our teachers.

Mr. G. Rajanayagam was appointed supervisor of the Junior Secondary School succeeding Miss M. S. Elias. With his wide experience as a teacher and his high academic qualifications from Princeton, USA, we expect a great contribution from him in the educational task of the college.

We welcome into our midst Messrs.

P. L. Manuelpillai with a B. Sc degree from the University of Jaffna; D. S Solomon with a B. A. degree from the University of Jaffna.

ON ROLL:

At the outset in 1987 we had 1329 on roll with 614 in the Senior Secondary school, 327 in the Junior Secondary School and 388 in he Primary School. There were 815 boys and 478 girls, and 20 students in the English medium classes.

At the outset in 1988 we had 1,265 on roll with 523 in the Senior Secondary school; 327 in the Junior Secondary school and 355 in the primary school, and of the total number 818 were boys and 447 were girls, with 30 in the English medium classes.

ADMISSIONS :

233 new students were admitted in 1987—110 to the primary school and 123 to the secondary school.

This year 158 were admitted—88 to the primary school and 70 to the senior school. Many of the students admitted were displaced or underprivileged students.

ENGLISH MEDIUM CLASSES:

Inspite of all the adverse problems we had to face, we continued these classes without fail, and we find now that many more students are seeking admission to these classes, having been displaced in many ways by the ethnic conflict in the North. We are trying our best to accommodate as many as possible and hope to provide a worthwhile education for these students. Most of these students have returned from India with qualifications that do not fit into the Sri Lankan scheme of education and therefore have to follow English medium courses to continue their education.

EXAMINATION RESULTS:

G. C. E. Advanced Level-August, 1986:

96 students sat the examination and 36 students passed in four subjects and 13 passed in three subjects. 34 students were qualified for University admission, and the following admissions were made 10 the University Veterinary Science — 1; Bio Science — I; Physical Science—1 and Business Administration — 2.

G. C. E. Ordinary Level-December, 1986:

129 students sat the examination, 116 passed in five or more subjects and 96 qualified for the Advanced Level classes—
11 students qualified for Arts, 26 for Commerce, 32 for Bio Science and 27 for Maths.

G. C. E. Advanced Level - August, 1987:

111 students sat the examination and 56 passed in three or four subjects, 39 qualified and the following admissions were made to the University — one each for Dental, Veterinary, Engineering Bio-Science, Commerce and Arts, and two each for Management and Physical Science.

G. C. E. Ordinary Level- December, 1987:

137 students sat the examination and are awaiting results.

CURRICULUM:

We have now a fully equipped air-conditioned Computer Science laboratory with many more computers. We are grateful to the Computing & Consulting Services (pvt) Limited, for sending their representative, Miss Ramani Jegatheesan, to help to install a new computer and to conduct a few demonstrations However, we have had computer science in our programme for the last five years and it is now part of our regular curriculum for the Advanced Level students on the time-table. We do not

charge an extra fee for such a course for students in school. We also have classes for teachers and for school leavers tor a nominal fee. Messrs. A. Jeyarajan and N. Yogarajah of the staff were trained recently at American College, Madurai, and our thanks to Mr. N. A. Vimalendran, the teacher-in-charge and the head of the department of Computer Science.

SPORTS:

Cricket :

The First XI team was captained by Mas. G. Ragavan. We had a fairly good season and of the five matches played we won three, drew one and lost one. Ragavan was an enthusiastic captain and played the captain's innings. The team was coached by Mr. T. Nithiaratnam.

Sothilingam who was selected to represent the Sri Lanka Relay Team for the 4 × 100 Metres event at the Pre-Olympic Second Asian Junior Track and Field Championship in Singapore, this year between the 8th-11th September. It is creditable that his team obtained the 4th place among twenty-five participating Asian countries. The first place went to Japan, 2nd place to Korea and the 3rd to Taiwan. Sothilingam's best timing of 11.4 seconds for the 100 metres event compare very well with the ground record of W. T. Sanders for the 100 yards event of 10.8 seconds. Today we award him "The Gold"-the most prestigious award available to a Sportsman of the college. He is now the second to obtain through the years. My thanks to Mr. K. There is much activity inspite of the difficult conditions, and we have been hosting the Scouts and Guides camps for the North in our campus as the Old Park premises could not be used. The Scouts served the college in all its functions very devotedly. I am grateful to the teachers concerned, namely Messrs K. S. Thissairasa, A. Jevarajan, S. Rajasegaram, V. E. Jeyaseelan, Miss M. S. Elias, Mrs. K. Navaratnarajah, Mrs. J. J. Mithira Ranjan, Mrs. D. J. Ganeshan and Miss V. Rajendram. We request the parents to encourage these activities.

THE SCHOOL COUNCIL:

The School Council had a fairly active year under the able and accomplished presidentships of Masters J. Aron in 1986–87 and P. Sayanthakumar in 1987–88. Mr. E. S. Selvarajah was appointed warden of the Chelliah Hostel in 1987. We were not able to conduct the Boarders' Day celebrations in 1987.

WELFARE ASSOCIATION:

The welfare work has been carried out well by Mr. R. Kanagaratnam who is also the librarian. My thanks are due to him and to his assistant Mr. S. C. Karunendran for collecting the budgeted sum from the parents and well-wishers.

CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S FUND OF CANADA:

We are very greatful to the devoted stewardship shown by all the officers at the CCF office in Canada. We had the visit of Mrs. Lenore Powell, who spent much time with us in going through all the details of the project and has given us useful advice. JUNIOR SECONDARY SCHOOL:



We have a well formulated system now to award some non academic prizes for CREATIVITY, SOCIAL CONCERN and LEADERSHIP. A silver medal and a cash prize of Rs. 1,000/- is awarded for each prize.

Refugees and Social Concerns

One of the most tragic and humiliating periods in our sad history of violence and conflicts were the months of October, November and December, 1987. were helpless refugees in our own land. More than 2,000 refugees huddled into the college premises with just the clothes they were wearing to seek refuge from the random shells and front-line firing. The old and the young, the rich and the poor came streaming in night and We were taken unawares. formed immediately an ad-hoc committee composed or staff members, alumni and youth, and opened an office. The refugees had to be clothed, fed and given medical aid. We had to even help deliver babies. Sanitation and water supply had to be maintained on satisfactory levels. All the refugees were identified, properly registered and housed, This record is now available to help those in need of aid from government and other sources, for rehabilitation.

My thanks are due to all those who worked round the clock, specially to Mr. Noel Vimalendran who served as the co-ordinating officer, and to Messrs. Ganesharatnam and Rajaratnam for managing the entire physical plant. The spontaneous response to voluntary service by all concerned for a period of weeks was commendable. It was our finest hour in the midst of that awful nightmarish experience

THE SIEGE OF THE COLLEGE BY THE I. P. K. F.

On the afternoon of the 10th of November, 1987, we came under the occupation of the IPKF and the college was partially occupied by the Gurkha Rifles Regiment who approached the campus on foot from Araly. They were later replaced by the Madras Regiment on the 10th of December when almost the entire college was occupied by them. When schools reopened in January they vacated the main campus but continue to occupy the Bicknell Field to this day. Due to the refugee and military occupation we sustained some losses, but negligible compared to what other, similar institutions have lost and therefore we have nothing to complain. We brought the entire campus to working order with the least delay. That we came off so lightly was certainly a miracle and as we recollect and observe the first anniversary of those dark and frightful days our hearts are filled with gratitude.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND STUDENT AID:

Our student aid programme and scholarships in the college here and in the colleges and universities in India have reached very appreciable and recognisable proportions. More than one-third the students in the college are on some sort of full or partial aid, being given the privilege of studying

in school where they would normally not have had the opportunity to study due to lack of financial resources or even the minimum academic aptitudes. But we have been constrained to follow the Bicknellian dictum to "educate as many as we can as best as we can" and to seek for the "last, the lost and the least". The impetus is the Christian gospel and we must admit with gratitude that it has brought health to our souls, though "eye-brows" may be raised from some quarters regarding our university admissions in certain areas We are trying very hard to maintain the balance of giving an opportunity to as many as possible to gain a good all-round education and at the same time to help as many as possible with higher education, not necessarily university education in Sri Lankan universities. It must be admitted that a good education today and university admissions to the Sri Lankan Universities are not synonymous anymore. Admissions to the University have remained static the numbers admitted over several years, though the numbers competing for admission have grown enormously, and therefore the percentage of admissions also dwindled down appreciably. This means that a student has to compete very hard to get those few extra points to gain admission to the university and to do this even the good student has to give up almost all that we cherish and uphold in education in a school like ours. And therefore many university students today need a better all-round school education and many students well educated in school need just a few more marks to enter the universitry. It was Professor Indrapala who said on this platform a few years ago that of the Advanced Level students who gained admission to the Jaffna University that year 13% did not know or did not care to know who the Prime-Minister of Srl Lanka was. It may be argued that it is not essential for a university student to know who the prime-minister of his or her country is and devotion to one's notes and examinations is all that is necessary. Such indifference. ignorance or lack of sheer awareness of one's own country and surroundings is certainly the result of very poor education.

May I be permitted to place before vou some relevant facts we are concerned with in this dilemma. The president of the School Council in the year under review (1986) is one who obtained student aid right through his He was successful in school career. the G. C. E. (Advanced Level) examination on the first attempt and was qualified for admission but missed his selection due to the lack of a few marks. He captained an unbeaten first eleven soccer team; was a very skilled first-eleven member of the cricket, hockey, basketball teams and of the athletic team: a skilled player of badiminton and table tennis and a tennis champion; a gifted and able singer in the Tamil and English choirs; was president of the

Academy, the literary association of the Advanced Level classes during dinner term: the founder president of the Leo Club and also secretary and many other president of associations in the hostels, the S. C. M. and of the Y. M. C. As. Even a student of his calibre has not gained admission to the University because of a few marks. The present President of the School Council, also a scholar of the same calibre appeared for the Advanced Level examination. Such students are certainly assured of excellent careers in outstanding colleges like Madras Christian College aud Women's Christian College in India and we have now three members on our staff, one graduate each from Women's Christian College, Madras Christian College and Bishop Heber College, who were our scholars in India. We have through the last six years helped more than fifty-five students with scholarship aid in Indian colleges. More than forty have already completed their degrees in Arts, Commerce and Science and some are holding resposts in this country and ponsible abroad. All this is possible because of the realistic attitude the Board of Directors and the Diocese have taken to guide us and for the liberal scholarships made available from the Hastings Fund of our Trustees, the Christian children's Fund of Canada and also because of the liberal permanent endowments in the college by generous donors, mostly alumni. I am grateful to the London alumni Association for taking up the possibility of further helping our present-day students.

K. A. SELLIAH MEMORIAL FOUNDATION:

We have now initiated this campaign and within the first few weeks we have already collected a sum of Rs. 40,000/towards this fund, more than Rs. 25,000/of this fund being contributed by the Jaffna College staff. I am extremely grateful to the members of the staff for initiating this campaign as they have done in the previous years for the big projects of the college, namely the building of the Undergraduate Hostel, Bicknell Memorial Pavillion and the Jaffna College Technical Institute, Besides these, the staff have also very generously initiated the S. V. Balasingham Memorial Scholarship and have created two Trust funds for the families of two colleagues who died in harness. This gesture of the members of the staff is recorded with much pride and gratitude. tradition I know will continue for several years to come. A sharing and a caring staff is certainly a great asset to the college.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATIONS:

As usual, the Alumni Associations have been active here and specially abroad. A large gathering of alumni met in London on 30th August, 1987, and again on 30th April, 1988, when the Principal was also present. The London association has two functions every year, and dates are given to members one year in advance, and this enables a large number of alumni, thei spouses and families also to participate. Mr. A, Selvaratnam BEM J. P., Barister

and engineer, is the president of the London association. This association was able to save an appreciable sum of money on the dinner and are enhancing our scholarship fund and the jubilarians' fund of the parent-alumni association.

The alumni association in Toronto also is now fully established, meeting twice a year, and a special complementary dinner was held for the Principal on 3rd June, 1988, with Dr. J. B. Selliah presiding. There were more than 125 present at the dinner. We are also happy to announce that the alumni association in Melbourne was inaugurated on 15th May, 1988 with Mr. A. M. Brodie as patron and Mr. C. Joganathan, the retired District Judge, as the President. On the 17th September, 1988, the Sydney association was formally inaugurated with Dr. S. Satkunarajah as the president,

These are all very encouraging events, and we are grateful to all concerned for the love and loyalty shown to the college.

The parent association met on the 5th of September, 1987, The proceedings began with a memorial service to the late Rev. Dr. M. H. Harrison followed by the presentation of gold medals to five jubilarians of the college who have retired, namely, Messrs, A. Rajasingham. P. A. Amlrthanathan S. A. Paulraj, W. N. Thevakadadcham and Mrs. S. Kanagaratnam, and a cash presentation to retired jubilarian, and office worker Mr. M. C. Ariaratnam, It was then followed

by the Annual Ceneral Meeting and closed with a followship lunch. The Colombo Association has been meeting regularly, but due to the restricted travel between Jaffna and Colombo it has not been possible for the Principal to make the usual visits as the Chairman of Association.

Rajasingam the treasurer, Mr. Rajasingam is also the elected staff representative on the Board. Dr. W. D Joshua had to leave us on taking an assignment abroad. Mr. K. Gunaratnam was re-elected as the alumni representative: Mr. M. R. Selvarajah returns to us after being out on sabbatical, and we welcome Dr. (Mrs.) Maheswary Arudchelvam,, Mr. J. S David and Mr. S. S. Selvadurai, I wish to thank the chairman, the members of the Executive Committee and all the members of the Board for the wise counsel and guidance to all the affairs of the college.

Pillainayagam, the Director, is now undergoing training in technology and education at the Institute of Technology Bowling, Green State University, Ohio, USA. I was able to visit this school of technology on two occasions, in 1986 and 1988, and was able to see Mr. Pillainayagam at work in the later visit. We hope something tangible will come out of this relationship with our college and the Institute of Technology at Bowling Green. The Jaffna College Institute of Technology is now being administered well by Mr. S. A. P. Thurairatnam, the Acting Director, and supported by a very able and cooperative staff.

Mr. C. Jeyaratnam, the Principal of the Institute of Agriculture has also shown some progress in the affalrs of the Institute inspite of the very heavy damages they had to incur in October and November, 1987. A new administration block and a hostel for girls have been constructed.

PRINCIPAL'S TRAVEL:

I was accorded the opportunity to visit several institutions, churches and theological seminaries during my visit to USA for the Trustee meeting in May 1988. This visit gave me an opportunity

to visit and revisit a wide range of alumni in UK, USA and Canada. Special mention must he made of my visit to the Library of Congress, Woodrow Wilson and Thomas Jefferson Schools in Washington D. C., the Education Department of the US., Kennedy Center for the performing Arts, the Science Center, the U.S. State Depart ment on Sri Lankan affairs U. S. Aid. All this was possible because of an International Visitor status given to me by the US Information Agency in Washington, sponsored by the American Ambassador in Sri Lanka. I was also able to make use of this opportunity to attend a very relevant seminar and consultation the Ecumenical on Movement at Stony Point, New York. I also had the opportunity of meeting several church groups at the UCBWM Headquarters and revisit my old schools, Union Theological Seminary and Columbia University, New York.

OUR MISSION IN EDUCATION:

Our mission in education, its philosophy and priorities, have to be underlined. We are fortunate in the heritage we have in our pioneering efforts in education. We are constantly challenged by our well-wishers, trustees and learned professors like you Sir, to new tasks and opportunities in the process of earning in a fast-changing world. Much has been given to us, and therefore much is expected of us. We are constantly drawn into areas of special need and the Institutes of Technology and

Agriculture, the Study Institutes, the Evelyn Rutnam Institute, the English Medium classes, the Kilinochchi projects and earlier the Undergraduate departments are all examples of the results of such expectations and responses, and there are requests for more such innovations and ventures to meet the ever increasing needs of our society. Such requests are not made of other private institutions with such intensity.

The school through more than a century has been the one constant, dominating and energising educating influence and the spring-board, from which such ideas have sprung from time to time. In the school we have now given some priority to the education of the under-privileged, economically and academically, in a way few other institutions of our standing are willing to do. When the American missionary Meigs arrived in Jaffna in 1816 he explored the educational potential in Jaffna and found among women only two who could read and write, one from Alaveddy and the other from Uduppiddy! The American missionaries brought into their schools older students who could not even read and write and educated them into an educational elite far surpassing our population ratio in the country. After almost two centuries the potential for education in Jaffna is certainly more encouraging. It is of course a more challenging and a difficult task to enable a zero or 'E' grade candidate to obtain a 'D' or a 'C' grade than to enable a 'C' or 'B' grade student to achieve an 'A' grade, There are also other resultant factors of educational psychology in helping such underprivileged students who do not even have the minimum parental care or concern, The "College Home" atmosphere has to be maintained for them at at all levels. The challenges are stimulating to the devoted and committed educator and specialised training too is essential for the task.

I must say that the spirit of the early American Ceylon Mission educators of the 19th century is still alive in this village, this college and in this Diocese. The Levi Spaulding Home in this village is a faithful response to that spirit. The rewards are slow but very much in the making and encouraging. If we have such a wide ranging alumni around the world in all walks of life with such concern, loyalty and gratitude, it is due to the response the college made from time to time to meet their special needs.

It is also of some significance that many Jaffna College Alumni have taken to teaching and to the educational mission seriously in this country and abroad. Statistics will be most revealing, but I shall refrain from stating them. Generations of students outside this school therefore are also benefitted and influenced by our life-styles, tradition, culture and heritage. We hope we can continue this service and maintain the balance without being side-tracked by competetive examination and educational standards of an elitistic, academic pattern only,

though the demand to further their pattern is also as acute as ever on us. Priority has to be given to the education of the under-privileged if we are to be faithful to our heritage and mission. The admonition of our Lord to help the poor was not meant only to the rich young ruler - it applies to us as well. It is not easy to give up our prized possessions and positions; it upsets our complacency, our comforts and prestige. It really hurts, but the need is urgent and our response is imperative. I am grateful to the Board of Directors, the Trustees and the Jaffna Diocese and the CCF for the encouragement and direction given and for the sympathetic under standing shown. thanks are also due to the staff for taking on a heavier load than usual.

THANKS AND FAREWELL:

As I come to the end of this report, I am also deeply conscious of the fact that it is also my final report as Principal of Jaffna College, an office I held for the past twenty years, I shall lay down office in a week's time, I have been reminded over and over again in recent times by many people that this period of my principalship was the most tumultous period in our 165-year history. The most traumatic event during this time was the forcible take-over of the College by the government to establish the Jaffna Campus of the Unniversary of Sri Lanka, just as we were jubilantly celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the Institution

initiating technical and agriculture education with the establishment of the Technical and Agricultural Institutes in 1973. We were thrown into the wilderness for five years, from 1973 to 1978. The College was subsequently returned to us. in 1979, miserably mutilated, with much loss of valuable property and equipment with a depleted and demoralised staff. There was no compensation whatgiven for the colossal loss or acquisition of property. It was with worn out tools that we had to painfully rebuild again. Even here the process of rebuilding was immediately marred and obstructed by the horrible violence and uncertainiites of our times. therefore with amazing grace that we have come through many a snare to this time and place. My main given task was to guard the wicket carefully through the twenty mandatory overs even though I was tempted to risk a boundaries and sixers, but saving the innings had to be given first priority. As I walk to the pavilion now retired not out, I begin to acknowledge gratefully the cheers from many appreciative sections of the crowd, We are on the threshold of fresh innings. The pitch is in better condition, the traditional aggressive bowlers and fleldsmen are either tired Batsman Jebanesan can or non-existent. score the boundaries and sixers while I join the throng of ardent and enthusiastic spectators to cheer my heart out.

Three others have held the office of Principal or Head of the Institution for the same duration or more : Dr. E. P. Hastings for twenty-three years (1849-1855 and 1872-1889); Rev John Bicknell for twenty years (1916-1936), and Dr. Syd Bunker for twenty-nine years (1937-1966). In stature and dynamism, I am the least of them, and it is therefore with some justifiable trepidation, awe, humility and gratitude that I now pass on or fade. into the hoary history of this beloved. noble and revered Institution. College was my life and my life was Jaffna College. An array of outstanding men and women have influenced and inspired me through schools, colleges churches in this country, Malaysia, India America. To my wife, children parents, brothers and sisters I owe a deep sense of gratitude for the emotional. spiritual and physical sustenance given to me always to hold on to this task for so long. To the many beloved American missionaries, trustees, directors, my bishops my teachers. fellow administrators. colleagues and helpers on the entire staff. alumni. parents and students. I say a deep felt and sincere thank you. Your precious memories I will cherish while life and memory lasts. It is with much regard and hope and of course with some relief that I hand this sacred task to Principal Jebanesan. To God the Father be all praise, honour and thanksgiving. Thank you and good-bye,

Prize Day Address

Rev. Bishop, Mr. Principal, distinguished guests, staff and students of Jaffna College, ladies and gentlemen. It is indeed a privilege to be invited as the chief guest to the Annual Prize Giving of your great institution. You had invited us for the 1987 annual prize giving of your college but it did not take place due to unforseen events of last October. Although I did not study in this institution, my association with your college started in the 1960s through Prof. L. W. Jeyasingham and the geography staff of the undergraduate section. Jaffna College is an intergrated seat of learning, which has classes from pre-school level to undergraduate level. Further your college has a technical institute, agricultural institute and an institute for the study of religion and society, Evelyn Ratnam institute too functions within the Jaffna College set-up. In this respect Jaffna College has been functioning like a higher educational institution. -college environment is also conducive for higher educational activities. The Library in the college was one of the best in the North before establishment of the University of Jaffna

Let me at the outset congratulate all the prize winners and wish them very best for their future success. The prize winners seen today are an index of the wealth of talent in your school. the students I am confident that Jaffna College, when they go through a systematic academic programme and extra curricular training they will be given the knowledge, wisdom and the courage to manage any situation in life without difficulty. Since the 1980s, the extra curricular activities in the Northern schools have been badly affected due to the unsettled conditions in the region. In the recent past, Jaffna College had good basket ball, soccer and cricket teams. Once peace is restored we have to give top priority to rehabilitate and develop sports activities in Jaffna. (It is a matter for regret that the entire South Asian region with more than 1000 million population won only a bronze medal in the recently concluded 24th Olympic games in Seoul South Korea. East Germany, which has 16 million population, won 102 medals including 37 gold medals. There is an urgent need in the South Asian region to boost the sports activities.) The development of sports activities will help to build a good physique and mind. It will also become a major entertainment for the public. Further, it can generate a large number of jobs in sports and sports-based industries.

Sri Lanka is one of the developing countries which enjoys a high literacy rate. The country when compared to many other developing countries has relatively better educational facilities and its general educational achievement is commendable. The country enjoys a relatively better standard of living in terms of the physical, quality of life index. Our literacy rate have pushed our PQLI to a higher level and placed the country above some newly industrialised countries. Many factors have contributed to the growth of primary and secondary education in the country. The introduction of free education, and the establishment of government schools in backward areas, the adoption of the mother tongue as a medium of instruction had helped to expand and broaden the educational activities in Sri Lanka within a short time. Since independence the successive introduced governments progressive measures to improve the quality and quantity of our primary and secondary educational system. There has been no adequate quantitative expansion in tertiary education to cope with the growth of secondary education. Though our educational system is relatively developed, there are a few problems which seriously affect our educational progress.

Hence I wish to mention a few aspects related to the educational problems of our country such as the problems of school dropouts, duration, gaps and delays in our educational periods, and inadequate growth of tertiary educational periods, and inadequate growth of tertiary educational facilities especially in the University educational system.

The school drop-out rate in Sri Lanka is fairly high. This disturbs the educationist and it needs special effort to control, More than 30% of the children drop out before completing secondary education. The dropout rates progressively increase from lower kindergarten to grade 9. The drop-outs in the entire country from grades LK-8 constitute 3.1% of the enrollment in. these grades. The drop rate also varies from district to district. The higher rates of drop-outs are taking place in Mannar Vavuniya, Mullaitivu, Kilinochchi. Trincomalee. Batticaloa and Nuwara Eliya. In backward rural areas and in poor urban neighbourhoods the drop-outs take place even in primary classes. You can see the extent of drop-outs from the exploitation of child labour in many. sectors. Thousands of children in the early school age are employed domestic servants and servants in the urban informal sector and thereby their right to basic education is deprived.

The drop rate among the Tamil children is alarmingly high. The distribution pattern of the Tamil population in the country and the nature of schools found in their areas have contributed to this trend. In the estate sector, the school system is not properly developed on a par with the national educational system, and most of the schools have classes up to year 5 mostly with one teacher, Most of the estate schools are manned by one teacher and this affects the educational performance of the school and ultimately this leads to the drop-

out students from the school. Vavuniya, Mannar, Mullaitivu, Kilinochchi, Batticaloa and Trincomalee districts have a relatively high concentration of small schools and have been undergoing the difficulties of shortage of teachers and this contributes to the drop out of school children from school. The recent appointment of primary feachers will help to some extent to overcome the teacher shortages in small schools in the above districts. In the Jaffna District, the schools in coastal areas in the Eastern Vadamaradchy are also of very small size and looked after by one or two teachers. In addition to the above factors, the political unrest in the Nothern and Eastern Provinces in the last few years caused the refugee problem and unsettled conditions which led to the rapid drop-out of children from schoosl

Many factors are contributing to the high drop out of school children in the country. Among them, poverty and poor economic conditions are the underlying factors. Out of the 16 million, nearly 7.5 million people of this country are still receiving food stamps. This is an indicator of the economic condition of the people. Other factors such as negligence by parents, peer group activities, presence of large number of small schools in our educational system, inadequate transport facilities in backward regions have contributed to the present situation.

The social workers, community, and religious leaders have to take positive

steps to arrest this trend, and initiate remedial measures to improve the situation. The drop-outs are mainly from the weaker section of the society. If proper measures are not taken it will be difficult to improve the socio-economic conditions of these people. The mid-day meal programme initiated in the Colombo Municipal Council area should be expanded to cover the whole country. This scheme will help to improve and eradicate malnutrition among the school children and increase the school attendance rate. Though we have had a free education system in our country for a long period, the compulsory aspect of school attendance is not effectively enforced. Similarly the labour laws are also not effectively enforced to prevent child labour. So in this respect the contribution of your college towards the poor children through education of scholarships and student aid is remarkable. I am sure you will continue this student aid system to uplift the weaker section.

Duration, Gaps and Delays

Another important aspect that affects the education are gaps and delays in the educational system. Most of the countries have twelve vears primary and secondary education. But we in Sri Lanka have thirteen years of education over a period of thirteen years and eight months. Earlier a student could sit the G. C. E. (A/L) examination in twentyfour months from the date on which he sat for the G. C. E. (O/L) Examination. At present the student has nearly thirtytwo months to to wait sit the G. C. E. (A/L) Examination at his first attempt and await for the results for nearly four months. A large number of candidates at the G. C. E. (A/L) Examination repeat the examination to improve their performances and to gain admission to the Universities. matter of fact a good number of students practically spend 15 - 16 years at primary and secondary levels. Another important matter that has to be mentioned is that prior to 1970 a student had to wait for six months to gain admission to the University after completing G. C. E. (A/L) Examination. Before 1968, entrance examinations to the University were held in December and the University academic year commenced in July of each year. In 1964

the commencement of the academic year shifted from July to October to conform with the calandars of other Universities in the Northern Hemisphere In the latter part of the 1960s G C. E. (A/L) Examination was conducted in the month of April. The six month gap has remained unchanged but the students spent more months in their schools and they were able to gain admission in the same year. The insurrection that took place in 1971 compelled the government to postpone the examination to August. Owing to this change the students will have to spend an extra eight months in the schools. As the period is very short for the University to admit students, students are admitted the following year and they wait for fourteen months and students lose one academic year. From 1983 onwards, due to the problems caused by unsettled situation in the country, commencement of the academic year shifted to the commencement of the calendar year. Owing to this change prospective students to the university have to waste 16 months from the date of completion of G. C. E. (A/L) Examination. At present they have to wait nearly two years to gain admission to the University. As a students unable to result the are complete their studies within the expected age and stipulated period. This has created many social and economic problems. Now we have to pay close attention to reducing gaps and delays in the changeover from secondary to tertiary education:

Therefore, we should workout a time schedule for completing our courses as in the developed countries. This will help to save time energy and valuable resources. This will help the students to complete their courses within the stipulated period to enable them to seek employment at the earliest opportunity. The state also will be able to meet the projected man-power need and provide satisfactory services to the people.

The tertiary education system in the country is not expanded in terms of places for students. We have 8 Universities and an Open University, The current annual intake to these 8 University is around 6,500. In 1965, the student intake to the university of Cevlon was around 5,000. During the past 22 years, the intake has been. increased only by an extra number of 1,500 places. The increase in the number of places in the Universities is not sufficient to meet the demand of the G. C. E. (A/L) qualified students who want to continue their studies in the Universities The number of candidates who sat for the G. C. E. (A/L) Examination was around 140,000. Out of this figure nearly 32,000 were qualified to enter the University and eventually 6,200 were selected by the UGC based on national merit (30%) district merit (65%) and backward quota The national annual intake of (5%). students to the University is relatively very small when compared to the size of the population. The country should have at least 16 full fledged Universities at the rate of one university for one million population. From 1970 onwards

national discussion has taken place about the mode of selection to the University of Sri Lanka. However, there was no serious discussion at the national level about the quantum of the University admission. There are two schools of thought regarding the admission to the University. One school advocates that the admission to the university should be restricted in terms of the manpower demand of the country. The other school advocates that the admission to professional courses may be restricted according to man power need but for other courses there is no need to adopt strict admission policies-The planning of man power is a notorious lack, and it is very difficult to predict the real needs of the future. Many man-power projections prepared many countries in 1970s and 1980s were not realized. Once a person misses his higher educational opportunity at the proper age, it is very difficult for him to get into the educational system again. The developing countries should liberal attitude towards education because it will help change the social conditions of the population. So opportunity should be given for higher educatiou through internal or external courses. If an opportunity is given in Jaffna a large number of G. C. E. (A/L) qualified students who failed to get admission to the university could proceed to degree studies through the external degree courses of the university of Peradeniya (Arts & Science) Jayawardenapura University (Commerce) and Open University courses

Jaffna College can step in to help the G. C. E. (A/L) qualified students who fail to gain admission in the higher educational institutions to continue their tertiary education. There is an urgent need for a well-organised higher educational institution to meet the demand of the above group, So I would like to take this opportunity to request you to re-start the undergraduate section of your college as early as possible.

Initially the students can be prepared for bachelor of arts and science external degree examination of the University of Peradeniya, Bachelor of Commerce external degree examination of the University of Jayawardenapura. The Open University students of many courses can also utilize the facilities of the undergraduate section.

The college is in a position to provide the facilities and necessary educational background to start the undergraduate section, including a few student aids. It will not be difficult to recruit well-qualified staff in subjects such as Tamil, geography, economics, philosophy, political science and civilization. In this process you may help a good number of qualified persons to get employment and to develop their academic career.

The development and the reorganisation of the library should go hand in hand with the reactivation of the undergraduate section. The Peninsula needs another well developed library in addition to our university library. The development of this library will help a large number of educationists in the peninsular who are interested in updating their knowledge and research activities. In addition to the University and Jaffina College libraries, the Jaffina Municipal Library also should be restored to its former position to meet the ever increasing demand of the tertiary educational students,

Once the undergraduate section is re-established, you elevate your college to the previous position as a seat of higher educational institution in the Peninsula. A systematic well-planned

development with reasonable resource input and the maintenance of higher educational standards will reward this institution with an elevated status. An institution with a one-hundred sixty-five years history should expand its activities with the needs of the time. Higher technical and liberal education are the needs of the time.

I am certain with the new leaderhip at Jaffna College this will be accomplished in the not so distant future.

Report of the Junior Secondary School

I have great pleasure in presenting the report of the Junior Secondary School for the year 1987 and 1988. At the outset I wish to thank Miss M. S. Elias or efficiently administering this section for over 10 years. Her versatile interests and devoted service enabled her to take part in all activities of the College.

The new School structure by the Government has resulted in the regrouping and naming of classes, The Primary School composed of years I to 5; the Junior Secondary School composed of years 6 to 9 and Senior Secondary School composed of years 10 to 14. At each level here at Jaffna College students are given opportunities in leadership qualities and in extra curricular activities and sports.



SERMON PREACHED AT THE INSTALLATION SERVICE OF DR. S. JEBANESAN

As Principal of Jaffna College

29TH OCTOBER 1988

I speed on towards the finish line, to win the prize of the high vocation to which God has called me in Christ Jesus' Philip 3;13-14

Brother Jebanesan and Sisters and Brothers in Christ, we are here gathered to seek God's blessings on Dr. Jebanesan as he assumes the responsible office of the Principal of Jaffna College. It is difficult to know what kind of service or ceremony there was 165 years ago when Dr. Daniel Poor the first Principal assumed this office. We by this service recognise that the long line of Principals of this College from Daniel Poor to Rajan Kadirgamar and now Jebanesan entered into a vocation which God had called them. In affirming that faith, we also commend our brother who now enters into this sacred vocation into God's hands and assure

him in the words of Paul in Thess 5-24 that "the God who calls him is faithful and he will do it". Dr. Jebanesan assumes this office at an important and crucial period in the history of Jaffna College and in the history of our community and our country. All going well we can assume that Dr. Jebanesan will be taking Jaffna Coliege into the 21st century. The coming years therefore will doubtless be a period when he with his colleagues on the Staff will prepare the students and our community for life in the 21st century. Education for the 21st century is bound to be a primary concern for the coming few years. The new Principal and the Staff are much more experienced and qualified than I am to speak on education, but I would like to do is that as pursue their goal, to see if there some insights from the Bible which could guide all of them and us.

Some years ago Lord Butler, a senior Statesman in Britain wrote a book entitled "The Art of Memory". As he goes over his rich and varied career he recalls his years in the war time coalition cabinet. He writes, "Ernest Bevin and Winston Churchill were the two most forceful ministers with whom

he worked. On the surface they might seem to have been totally different in every way.....but both were egotistical both tried to control this fault, both were impatient and both determined on set objectives". "Determined on set objectives" that is what marked out these great statesmen. That is almost the very phrase we find in our text from St. Paul, "Brethren, I do not reckon that I have won; but I hold to the one object; forgetting the things that behind and straining eagerly towards the things that lie ahead, I speed towards the finish line to win the prize of the high vocation to which God has called me in Christ Jesus". Paul pictures his life's struggle as an athlete running a race and the athlete's one object is to get to the finish line and win the prize. For Paul that prize was the high vocation, the one object of all his endeavours. He was a man "determined on a set objective. "The prophet Jeremiah writing of the return of the Jewish exiles from Babylon has something similar to say in 50:5 "They shall ask the way to Zion with faces turned towards it". Those who want to return to Zion must have their faces turned toward it even when they ask for the way. They must be determined on the set objective if they are to arrive. What can these set objectives be for an educational institution, and for Jaffna College in particular? More than 150 years ago Thomas Arnold the great Head Master of Rugby defined what his goals were for education. He said it was to inculcate in the minds of his pupils a high sense

of duty, of public service and the importance of personal character. Thomas Arnold was articulating what had come to be accepted as a goal for education in the leading Public Schools of England, Those were the ideals which no doubt guided the founders of the great mission schools in our country including Jafina College. A high sense of duty, of public service and the importance of personal character. Through the teaching of Scripture Latin and Greek, Mathemates, History and literature they hoped the students would imbibe these qualities and leave the School as Christian gentlemen. I wonder whether even Mathew with his great and erudite mind could have imagined the change that have overcome the educational curriculum 150 years hence. Science and Technology has branched out into such varied directions that Schools can never cope with the kind of preparation that students should get if they are to enter this age of Science and Technology, into this computer age, into the new space age. How can Scripture. Latin and Greek be of any use and so they find a low priority in the leading schools. If our students are to succeed in life in the 21st century they must naturally be equipped to face the new age with its challenge and opportunities. So the challenge comes to education today, the challenge comes to Jaffna College to redefine what our "determined set objectives" should be. No School can succeed today unless it produces good O/L and A/L results.

The most sought after school therefore would be the school that sends the highest number to the universities and professional institutions. Whatever our lofty idealism may be no school Principal can afford to ignore this goal of students entering the universities and producing the best O/L and A/L results. But is that all there is to education?

What should be our determined set of objectives as we move towards the 21st century? 1 am afraid 1 have no answer but at least we can all jointly search for an answer. Many years ago H. G. Wells wrote in his "Outline of History" that "Human history becomes more and more a race between education and catastrophe". As we race towards the 21st century we have all the evidence. in fact more evidence that H. G. Wells was aware of that it all seems to be a race towards global catastrophe. We have only to think of the nuclear arms race, the piling of chemical weapons, disturbrnce of the ecological balance, the threat of pollution and so on. Here in Sri Lanka and more particularly in Jaffna where we have been proud of the contribution of the vast network of mission schools we find we are engulfed in a wave of violence that our people probably never experienced in their whole past history, not even in the much cursed eras of the foreign colonial powers. Can our educational systems really compete in this race with catastrophe? The fruits of progress through science and technology have had great success in their negative and destructive role than in the positive

role of the betterment of human life, There is today much more of poverty; oppression, tortures and violence than there ever was in human hittory. What then is the future? What is the role of education in this situation? When our Lord began his ministry in Palestine 2000 years ago his world was not very different. There was the mighty colonial super power of Rome with its military camps in all parts of the country. There was political and economic oppression, imprisonments, tortures and also the movements of the rebels and freedom fighters taking to counter violence as a of liberation from their oppression. It is in that context that Jesus announced "seek ve first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you". If we put that into our language "work for the fust social order according to the will of God that is the only way out for all your problems". A just social order in God's will, to seek it, to work for it is the commission that has been given to The Christian school should make that its vision for its students and should be committed to it as its ultimate goal. We must understand the cult of violence in our country and in many other countries of the world as the last resort of a desperate and frusurated people whose rights have been trampled on and for whom justice has been denied. All our political systems, our much boasted democratically elected governments, our concern for law and order has left vast sections of the populace as a marginalised oppressed

group. They have been denied the fruits of civilisation and feel excluded. Those peoples have awakened to their rights and now demand them. They want the power to change things but feel helpless within the structures in which they are caught up and so violence seems to them to be the answer. During the youth revolt that engulfed Europe about 20 years ago it is said that the students had written a slogan on the walls of the University "be reasonable ask for the of Sorborne That seems to impossible". be the slogan of the youth of our country today North and in the South. both in the Those of us engaged in education must be able to understand the causes that have led to this cult of violence and place before the new generation the vision and goal of a truly just social order where everyone counts, the last the least and the lost. Jesus who began his ministry announcing the kingdom of God and his justice ended his ministry giving his disciples a vision of the last iudgement in the 25th Chapter of Matthew. That was the parable of the sheep and the goats. I was hungry, thirsty, sick, a stranger, I had no clothes, I was in prison and went on to say "what you did or did not do to one of the least of these, you did you did not do it it to me or to me". Christ identified himself with the least, the last and the lost and the vision of God's kingdom, the vision of the just social order is where those oppressed and marginalised groups are the centre of the concern of our society, a society where justice is understood as rights and privileges for the strong but rights and privileges for all including the last, the least and the lost.

There is the old saying that the teacher who wants to teach Latin to John must know Latin but he must The teacher who also know John. students and make educate wants to society must understand fit for them society and its problems and have the right vision and goal for that society so that through all the subjects he or she teaches the student is being equipped to be one who will work for and be part of a just social order. Some one has said "there is no way of photographing the future, but we may blue print it, and do our best to make the resultant structure correspond to our hopeful blue prints". Education is equipping the young for the future and the task of education is to provide the right blue prints.

Let me come back to our text where Paul talks about a race and the determined set objective of winning the prize of the high vocation. He advises those entering the race "forgetting the things that are behind me". That is an obvious first lesson any coach gives to those entering a race, "never look back" never look back to see what you have covered, or to see what others behind are doing. Paul in the earlier verses in this 3rd chapter of the epistle to the Philippians reminds us of the many things he could boast of, "circumcised the eighth day, of the race of Israel.

of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrew parents, in the matter of the law a Pharisee, in the matter of zeal a persecutor of the church, in the matter of righteousness proven blameless", but now that he is entered this race to win the prize of the high vocation, he says he is not going to stop and look back at those achievements of his and find satisfaction in them because the prize for which he is running is the high vocation. To Dr. Jebanesan and to his colleagues this message is You are entered into very relevant. the race as educators to win the prize of a high vocation of building a new future. There is much in the 165 years of the history of Jaffna College to which you can look back but Paul says don't look back and keep boasting about your past, there is a greater future for which you are running, so strain eagerly towards the things that lie ahead and speed on

towards the finish line. It is not an easy race, it is not a race without hurdles or obstacles, but we are bidden to speed on. I wish to finish with a story from the great theologian Karl Barth. He was once asked to explain how he saw his task as a theologian and he answered that he felt like a man in a boat which he must row and steer diligently, but which swims in a stream that he does not control. change the image of Paul's race to Barth's boat race, Dr. Jebanesan you are now being installed as Principal of Jaffna College to row and steer diligently this boat of the College towards the finish line. The boat you will often find is in a stream that you do not control. but as helmsman you challenged to row and steer diligently so that you might win the prize of the high vocation into which you are entered.



The Situation

Beside the two questions most commonly asked of the foreigner in Sri Lanka, both of which, according to Miss Manners, are tabu in polite western society i. e., "How old are you?" and, "How much money do you make?" is the one reflecting present - day priorities: "What do you think of the Sri Lankan situation?" If I have, as a Westerner, a distaste for the first two questions. I have an overwhelming feeling of helplessness at the third. Am I really expected to express my considered opinion during a two - minute encounter along the road somewhere? However the question is meant, it always leaves me a sense of great inadequacy with as I stumble around for a reply that will not seem trivial orcliche - ridden.

My dilemma underscores, for me, the great value of reading contemporary (and classical) literature. As a reader and student of literature I find myself more and more at a loss as to how to master such an enormous realm of human production and creativity. My own incliniation is to follow the oeuvere of the writers who speak to our contemporary situation, be it Sri Lanka's, South Africa's, Latin America's, or that of some political entity that has passed into history. It is this body of literature that, in my opinion, is alone adequate as an answer to that well-intentioned question about "the situation-" Because

literature develops. with the concrete example of tangible lives, the structure lines of a society, reflects on them, and, when successful, builds a whole that is greater than the sum of its parts. As Heinrich Mann said of his fictive account of the life of Henri IV of France: "it is neither transfigured hitsory nor friendly fable: only a true parable." Jesus, himself spoke in parables when it comes to answering knotty questions with honesty and tact. In this essay I want to show how the parables of modern literature speak to our present situation.

Heinrich Mann's two-volumed novel The youth of Henri Quatre (IV) and the Fulfilment of Henri Quatre, even though they paint a portrait of France in the second half of the sixteenth century. from a parable of civil war that is powerful and thought-provoking; Mann wrote the novels in Southern California in exile from Nazi Germany: at the same time hls brother Thomas was writing his Joseph novels, also in exile in the United States (first at Princeton, New Jersey, and then too in Southern California) It is easy to read a portrayal of the Nazi's gradual strangulation of the German state, its people, and its legal system into Heinrich Mann's account of the Catholic League under the leadership of the House of Guise, rulers of the powerful Duchy of Lorraine, in cooperation with the dreaded House of Habsburg and Spanish Emperor, Philipp II, asthe

they infiltrated the court of Catherine de Medicis in Paris and effectively neutralized her two sons, tuckless and puppet kings of France. One can just as well read into it, as must be possible with any good parable, the eventual stranglehold that any fanatically driven group can get on a constitutional government and that group's brutalization of a scapegoat minority. It is eminently readable in the light of the "present situation," as the reign of terror achieved in France by the League derived its a Catholle fanaticism power from in the general populace that brought on horrifying St. Bartholomew Eve Massaacre, August 23-24, 1572, in the city of Paris, when not only almost all the young nobles among Henri's Huguenots were slain in the Louver Castle, but also the Protestant citizenry was attacked by howling mobs, killed, stripped of all clothing, and left in heaps of stinking flesh to become the prey of black clouds of crows. This Catholic fanaticism had in turn been fed by a Huguenot fanaticism, derived from these Protestants' opinion that they believed exclusively in "The Religion"; traditional form of European The Christianity, the Roman Catholic, but superstition. It is interesting that Henri IV. as leader of the forces of the Protestant Rebellion, was nevertheless able to win the hearts of the Catholic majority by his own magnanimity, his sense of justice, and his popularity among the commoners, such that an era of unprecedented prosperity and

peace eventually came to pass, at least until he was assassinated by an envious and disgruntled faction.

Of more recent vintage is the novel by the Peruvian writer, Mario Vargas Llosa, The War of the End of the World, which deals with a little known drama in the history of Brazil of the nineteenth century. The incident itself is little more than a footnote in Brazilian history today, but it bears the seeds of the military terrorism that occurred in that country during the last decade. Vargas Llosa has given the incident the breadth of a Russian epic, and he is more convincing in his realism, one might say naturalism, than the Columbian Nobel Laureate, Gabriel Garcia Marquez. The catalyst in this tale is a Christ - like figure who calls himself. The Counsellor and who organizes a fanatically devoted community of poor, ne'er-do-wells and criminals, completely reformed by his charismatic ability to see each one for what he is -reminding us of Jesus' ability to read men and to inspire each to be the best he can be.

Unfortunately, the Counsellor does not like the idea of the recently declared Republic, considering it to be of the Devil, as opposed to the Divme Right of kings and their symbiotic relationship to the Catholic Church. His followers move about with him, first restoring cemeteries, then church structures, and hereby rekindling a life of devotion in an essentially paganzied, albeit nominally

Catholic, populace. Finally he settles in an arid and remote hill-country community. Canudos, with his flock, which grows in alarming proportions, that both the landowners who were once robbed by the Counsellor's reformed bandits and the Republican nationalists who see in him a traitor to the Republic feel so threatened by the existence of the sect that they move heaven and earth to eradicate him. In the process of mounting ever bigger and more wasteful military attacks on the fiercely fanatical defenders of the Canudos community. the authorities of the embryonic Republic provide us with a paradigm of the kind of civil war that brings about mutual annihilation. Only with the most ridiculously overwhelming odds in numbers do the nationalist forces finally succeed in totally destroying this thorn in their flesh, while at the same time the sympathy of the reader is enlisted entirely on the side of the sectarians, and specifically on behalf of a small number of well-delineated individuals whose fates we follow fascinatedly through the nearly six-hundred pages of the prose epic. It is as if history were re-creating itself before our very eyes, to the minutest detail, without the interference of a guiding literary intellect.

The Spanish critic, Jose Miguel Oviedo, writes:

The virtuosity of the montage is always present but appears to be voluntarily subjected to control in favour of a more 'discrete, 'more transparent, more neutral text—that of an author who would want the story to narrate itself. effacing him into a state of invisbility.

This innovation in the language of the novel is immensely important, since what Vargas Llosa has to bring about is the nearly total destruction of the people with whom the reader has come to identify.

Again, this novel, though taking place in a country as remote from South Asia as Brazil, provides a parable for "the situation." " the destructive possibilities inherent in which potentially enormous. Yet this epic form of the "Final Solution" for Canudos is somewhat humorously experienced and later retold by a myopic and superbly cowardly reporter who ventures into the final battle much against his own will. During the heat of the final defense he loses his glasses, which have already been smashed into uselessness, The figure may be a sly literary allusion to the greatest epic poet of all time. Homer, who is traditionally thought to have been blind. Vargas Llosa's fellow is presumably the "documentary" source for certain portions of the text.

A more popular novelist, Isabel Allende, of Chile, has a best-seller entitled The House of the Spirits. In it we follow several generations of women of a prominent Chilean family reminiscent in its style of Marquez's

One Hundred Years of Solitude, although it is not so informed by his magical realism. The major magical ability is the God-given gift of the grandmother-the power to will objects in a room to move themselves, a talent that the family does its best to ignore, while it disturbs and bemuses their guests. Gradually Allende cleverly brings us into "The situation" of contemporary Chile, in which a dictator general terrorizes his enemies, and even the innocent, with impunity.

It is the figure of Senator Esteban Trueba who presents the paradigm of a society bent on self-destruction through its own prejudices, opinionatedness, and wilful disregard of the rights of the lower classes. He is throughly "macho" in the way he has wrought a thriving agricultural business out of a ruined hacienda entirely on his own, the way he helps himself to anyone's wife or daughter among the peasants on his estate (like any nobleman in Henri IV's France might have done), and then the way in which he employs brutality in dealing with the rebels among his own farm workers. He even shatters the teeth of his own wife with one blow of his hand; the political opposition, once he is an established senator and the pillar of the conservatives in the Chilean parliament, gets similar treatment. Yet he is totally unaware of the direction his "macho" prejudices are leading him or his country. His grand-daughter, Alba the one female upon whom he finally dotes, after all the others have turned

against him, is the one who experiences in her own person the sadistic viciousness of Fascist terror. Being involved romantically with a rebel from her grandfather's own estate, also a very popular singer, she herself is finally arrested and suffers tortures typical of those suffered by thousands of detainees under Chile's dictator. Pinochet. It is another young fellow from her grandfather's estate, whom ironically the Senator has helped to get a position with the police, who mistreats her most brutally, in revenge for what the Senator has done to the farmers. Senator once caused a And as the rebel farm youth to sever three of his own fingers with a machete during a face-to-face confronation, so this police officer causes three fingers of Trueba's granddaughter to be severed, before the Senator is able to pull strings and have her released from military (police) custody.

In this novel, The House of the Spirits, we see how the sins of the fathers are visited directly upon the daughters (and sons) of the succeeding generations. But Allende yields to the notion of the Hollywood Ending the grand daughter is released safely into the custody of the grand father, although we realize that for her fellow prisoners there is no happy ending.

The author does the same thing in a later novel, Of Love and Shadows, in which she tells of a young woman reporter, daughter of an exceptionally selfish and egotistic woman who runs a nursing home. The socialite mother is blind to the injustices of her society and the needs of her patients as well. The daughter has great empathy for them and also for a persecuted socialist who is also trying to expose the brutal rape and murder of a girl from his village whom the Army abducted. Eventually the truth is revealed, but the young couple is threatened. The girl miraculously survives an attempt to shoot and the couple flees the her down. country, escaping across the Andes, a bit in the style of The Sound of Music. Here too, even though the bestiality of the "situation" is the main structure line of the novel, there is a Hollywood Ending.

Not so when Omar Rivabella, an Argentine writer, presents us with a "documentary" novel about the "sit in Argentina before the misgovernment of the generals was replaced with an elected presidency. Unlike Allende, Rivabella's work will not likely appeal to such a wide reading public. It is too real. Yet it is this hard look at the reality of the "situation'. that makes it valuable, really invaluable. For this sort of writing can, much more than any Amnesty International report, make us see and feel the sadistic inhumanity of a military system that takes the law into its own hands. misuses it, abuses it, and goes berserk, drunk with its own power.

The very situation of the novel itself shows us how extremely dangerous

it is to dare even to question arrests and disappearances, let alone speak out against them. In this book a priest from a desolate country village is brought a smelly box by an unknown woman, who leaves it in the sanctuary of his church, after Mass. As he investigates it, in his room, finding in it scraps of toilet paper scribbled over with difficult writing, and is at first perplexed. then horrified, as he attempts to put back together a "diary" that has been smuggled out of a secret prison, scrap by dirty scrap. On the dust jacket we are told that Omar Rivabella "interviewed many women who had themselves undergone political torture. Everything in this book, though in the guise of fiction, is true. Shockingly so,"

The priest tells us that he was a social worker, and that he had always thought, like some other priests, that the church would be militant. His superior "thought that...being politically submissive was a contradiction of our faith. He always encouraged us with his own involvements..." And he finally has to assign this priest to a remote village in order to protect him.

The heroine of the novel, Susanna, the daughter of a medical doctor, and her fiance Nestor, a young medical student, are involved in providing medical care for poor families, and as Father Antonio reads the scraps of toilet paper he realizes that the box has been brought to him particularly, because he had been, before his transfer, Susanna's

Parish priest. Both Susanna and Nestor are secretly arrested in their homes and taken, hooded, to an unknown torture center. Thereafter the novel consists of Susanna's brief descriptions of the most sickening tortures and mistreatment imaginable, as well as Father Antonio's increasing jeopardy and finally his need to save himself through feigned insanity.

Budd Schulberg writes, "This is not a novel about the past horrors of Argentina. It's an urgent and unforget-table reminder that brutish assaults on the human body and spirit are going on even as we turn these pages," thus a documentary.

Susanna's diary-keeping must have been discovered eventually, for the story ends when her parents receive a jar from unknown callers (just as at the beginning their daughter is taken away by unknown assailants)—a jar containing her severed hands, in their own blood, her engagement ring still on the middle finger of one of them. Presumably the parents have been presented with these "last remains" as a warning, lest they should be so forward as to try to find out further information.

Another way to silence a person is to make his reputation a matter of public doubt. How it neutralizes one potentially serious rebel is the theme of Mario Vargas Llosa's very different, slender novel, The Real Life of Alejandro Mayta, ostensibly a biography of the fellow, really an account of the would-be bio-

grapher's attempt to find the facts about his life and his disappearance from the Peruvian scene two decades earlier. Mayta's was an uncomfortable personality; his uncompromising seriousness as well as his loner instincts are an annoyance to some. His biographer never actually uncovers the facts, but Mayta's former friends and his relatives drop hints or formulate innuendos that leave his moral reputation in doubt, cast suspicion on his manhood—a most damaging type of character defamation in a "macho"—male—chauvinist—Society.

Through Mayta's story we obliquely introduced to the abuses of state, again, in which the police the military take the law into their own hands or other wise act atrociously, with impunity. One woman tells the "The people's despair " biographer": is boundless. that's why these things happen. For instance, the poor guy the people from the next slum found trying to rape a little girl: they poured kerosene over him and burned him alive." Later he finds out about a newly married hydraulic engineer whose "car broke down and she was wife's outside after curfew, walking from San Isidro. Right in those last few blocks. a patrol caught her. Three cops: they threw her into their car, stripped herafter beating her up for fighting backand raped her Then they let her out in front of her house, saying, 'Just be, thankful we didn't shoot you,' That's the standing order they have when they catch someone violating curfew." Thus, through the "biographer's" investigations, we experince the terror in which ordinary people can live under a military dictatorship, be it in Chile, Argentina, Brazil or Peru. Another passage, a description of news reporting in Peru—sounds familiar too:

Information in this country has ceased to be objective and has become pure fantasy-in newspapers. television. and ordinary conversation. "To report" among us now means either to interpret reality according to our desires or fears, or to say simply what is convenient. It's an attempt make up for our ignorance of what's going on-which in our heart of hearts we understand is irremediable and definitive. Since it is impossible to know what's really happening, we Peruvians lie, invent, dream, and take refuge in illusion. Because of these strange circumstances, Peruvian life, a life in which so few actually do read, has become literary.

A professor in Isabel Allende's story, Of Love and Shadows, argues that "power is perverse, and it always falls into the hands of the dregs of humanity." Each of the novels discussed here in this essay might serve as an illustration of this observation. And yet each work

of fiction produced in this "situation" is an act of will that rises above the general miasma, a flower growing on the garbage heap of human experience in our time. Ironical, but in its way beautiful. that an illiterate public can be seen as possessing literary qualities. Even the Universal Bus and Bus Passenger are elevated to literary status in the Mayta novel, were Vargas Llosa observes..... "a decrepit city bus, gray and leaning over to the right Clinging to its doors. a cancerous growth of people miraculously hangs on, just grazing the cars, the light posts, and the pedestrians." Here even the Sri Lankan reader can chortle to himselef and think, yes, that's the way it is. He's hit the nail on the head!

Perhaps now the reader can better appreciate the dilemma posed by the question about "the situation," From my brief review of the earlier Henri IV novel as well as the contemporary Latin American works he can appreciate the fact that there is much that can be said. As in Alison Wynne's booklet, Lament for Lanka each life has a story, each individual affected by "the situation" reflects only one fact of a multifaceted whole, It takes a creative genius to help us see the whole this our "situation."

At the appointed time the president of the hostel Miss. Kalavalli Kandasamy garlanded our warden. Then our hostel boy S. Thevaraian paid his sentiments by garlanding her. The girls then lead the procession dancing to accordian music played by Miss. Seetha Veerasingam. The college band took over in front of the Sanders Hostel. Although Miss. Elias is retired she still continues to be our warden.

Signs of unrest in the country had started in August. Under the prevailing conditions our school term ended abruptly and our college had become a home for refugees. The women and the girls

were provided accomodation in our hostel. The numbers started increasing as the situation grew worse. People atarted taking shelter under flat roofs for the safety of their lives. Since our hostel is spacious and has the additional advantage of its flat roof, university lecturers, hospital staff and people from the neighbourhood all ran in for shelter. The resident members of the staff and the few girls who remained in the hostel were called upon to help those in need. The known and the unknown, the rich and the poor, the baby and the aged were all under our roof for three months. The hostel was converted into family units to provide accomodation for the members of the staff and others closely connected with the college. Work was hard, heavy and trying at times. But we organised ourselevs and were able to care for all those in need. During the day everybody's only aim was to find food for survival. At dusk all that we could do was to gather around and sing God's glory and seek his help. We thank God for guiding us safely through those difficult times and sparing us to see a new life in the New Year.

On the 15th of November 1987, we received the sad news of the passing away of Mrs. C. O. Elias, mother of our warden on 12th November in Kerela. We record our deep sympathies.

In 1988 it had been very unusual to have a family stay with us for 2 terms. Mrs. Indrani Jeyakumaran a member of the staff and her three children Dilani Yr. 5, Dinesh Yr. 4, and Deluxion Yr. 3 were with us during the absence of Rev. Jeyakumaran who was abroad on an assignment to continue his theological studies at Prinston University, U. S. A. It had been a very rare experience living with a mother and small children making our hostel life all the more homely for us., boarders. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Jeyakumaran for her services as acting warden in the absence of Miss. Elias in January and February 1988

Our hostel union meetings are held on Thursdays at 8, 30 p. m. we have a variety of programmes. At one of the meetings Mrs. Jeyakumaran addressed us on her experiences in Andhra Pradesh where she was one of the two delegates sent by J. D. C. S. I. to attend a conference



Prize Report

Prof. A. Thurairajah, Mrs. Thurairajah, Chairman and members of the Board of Directors, Parents, Alumni and Friends:

It is my privilege to welcome you all most warmly at this function which is the most important event of the year in our calendar. It is an occasion when we review our past, reward those who have performed meritoriously and form opinions of the possibilities of furthering our objectives. It is also an occasion when the pupils and their parents, alumni and well-wishers, the Management and the staff gather in an atmosphere of harmony, cordiality and fraternity.

It is a rare privilege to have as our chief guests Professor and Mrs. Thurairaiah. Professor Thurairaiah is one of the most brilliant and distinguished products of Jaffna. He had his early education at American Mission College, Udupiddy and Hartley College. He followed a course in Civil Engineering at the University and established a record which remains unbeaten to this day. He has served as a teacher at the University for a period of twenty-seven years, and during this long poriod he held the chair of Civil Engineering at the University of Peradeniya, and subsequently became the dean of the Engineering faculty. He has attained an enviable position as an academic and as a specialist in Soil Science. He

has contributed about three dozens of research papers to professional and academic journals in Sri Lanka and abroad, and enjoys an international reputation. No Tamil University academic who is presently in service has won so much of international recognition as he has, and if there is one man who could consolidate and expand the University of Jaffna it is Professor Thurairajah and he alone. Besides, he is a man of humility, simple ways, cultivated manners and with an unsullied reputation for integrity and honesty. His committment to his profession, to the promotion of research and the responsibility he assumes, has always been total. We are thankful to Providence for we have in our midst a man of such accomplishments and character as Vice-Chancellor of our University. He has always resisted the temptation to seek better pastures abroad because of the love he has for his his people. Even in the land and island he has cast away the opportunities of accumulating substantial monthly earnings for the sake of identifying himself with the aspirations of our people and deciding to assume duties at the University of Jaffna.

Professor Thurairajah's success at the University as a teacher and his popularity among staff and students are largely due to the grace, unlimited patience and the charming ways exhibited by Mrs. Thurairajah. She has been bearing the full responsiblity of looking after the home and bringing up their children while her husband used to spend the entire hours of the day and many hours of the late evening at his desk, whether in the Dean's office or in the laboratories. She has earned a reputation as a good host among University circles and she exemplifies the ideals of our Tamil womanhood.

This is the first report I presenting in my capacity as Principal of this great institution. I would express my grateful thanks to God for having given me this opportunity to serve in this capacity. I was appointed as Principal on the 27th October, 1988 after having served here for a period of nineteen years, as a teacher for seventeen years and then as Co-Vice Principal for the remaining two years I made full use of the opportunities provided by Jaffna College and the Board of Directors for furthering my academic interest and enriching my knowledge. It was during this period that I followed four postgraduate courses and successfully completed them. I am thankful to the Board of Directors for giving me scholarship to follow the M. A. (Philosophy) course at the Tamilnadu Theological Seminary. I consider it a rare privilege to have written two postgraduate dissertations on the work of the American Ceylon Mission, and I am again thankful to God and to the authorities of Jaffna College to have given me the facilities to accomplish these attainments. These have stirred in my consciousness a deep and unshakable commitment to the well-being and progress of Jaffna College to which I owe almost everything that I achieved in my academic career.

It is my hope that Providence will continue to guide me in the years to come to discharge my responsibility to the Institution and help towards realising further the ideals it epitomizes. It is my earnest hope that you will extend to me the courtesy of understanding and cooparation in my efforts towards reviving and consolidating the traditions of this Institution and make it once again the most distinguished centre of learning in our land.

I wish to place on record the cooperation extended to me in my career at Jaffna College by the former Principal, Mr. A. Kadirgamar, the former vice-Principal Mr. A. Rajasingam and other members of the staff.

Improvement of the quality of education, maintenance of staff and student discipline, and establishing harmonious and close ties with the community outside the school are three items to which I have given priority since my appointment.



Principal Reading his Report

I have taken steps to ensure that teaching and examination work at all levels in the school are conducted as efficiently and regularly as possible under the circumstances. Action has been taken to pursuade the staff to pay serious attention. The attendence register of the staff is carefully maintained. Besides, a record of work relating to teaching is regularly maintained and this is inspected by me personally and the other officers of the College. The other officers of the College are now required to submit a terminal report of the written work done by the students in the classrooms. In relation to this matter I wish to express my thanks to Mr. K. Pooranampillai whose advice has provided me with inspiration in this respect.

In Memoriam:

Dr. James T. Rutnam, one of the leading representatives of the old generation of our community passed away on 4th November, 1988. For a period of over sixty years he had been a regular columnist in the principal newspapers that were being published in the island. He was political activist, social worker and a bibliophile. He was very much interested in history, politics, government art and literature. He probably had the best private collection of books in the island, and he deposited the entire collection at the Institute which he established in the vicinity of Thirunelvely in memory of his beloved wife Evelyn, and named after her. The land, the buildings, the equipment and the entire collection of books belonging to this Institute were gifted by him to Jaffna College in 1986. This is the greatest and most valuable gift we have ever received. We are indebted to him and his family, and we hope that we could honour the trust reposed in us.

Mr. R. E. J. A. Setukavalar served as a member of the Board of Directors of Jaffna College during the critical period when a part institution was taken over by the Government in 1974. His loyalty to the institution and his comitment to ideals for which it had stood were deep. Mr. Setukavalar died on 27 December, 1988, and by his passing away we have lost an able, lovable and trustworthy friend and a champion of our causes.

It is with regret that we note the passing away of Mr. T. Ponnambalam who served as a music teacher at Jaffna College for a long period of thirty-flve years. He was conscientious in the performance of his duties and earned the goodwill and respect of all his colleagues and friends by his simplicity and generosity. Mr. Ponnambalam died on the 14th February, 1989, and the school was closed at 12-00 noon as a mark of respect.

Staff:

There are fifty-seven members on the academic staff 45 in the secondary school and 12 in the primary school, and there are 9 members on the nonacademic staff. Of the fifty-seven on the academic staff 35 are graduates with 16 holding trained or post graduate qualifications; 13 are trained or specialist teachers; and 8 teachers with Advanced Level qualifications. There are 13 jubilarians on the present staff, and of the academic staff, 31 are men and 26 are women.

The following teachers retired during the course of last year. Principal Kadirgamar, Mr. R. Kandiah, Mr. P. Marianayagam.

Mr. A. Kadirgamar who carned the distinction of having been the Principal for a period of twenty years retired in October last year. He took a very keen interest in the affairs of Jaffna College during the most unfavourable circumstances. With his confidence and spirit of buoyancy he surmounted many hurdles that came in his way and sustained the spirit of his colleagues, many of whom have a deep sense of affection and loyalty towards him. We hope that he will continue to show the same degree of concern and interest in the affairs of the school and will be a source of strength to us in the coming years.

Mr. R. Kanthiah who was a well qualified and competent teacher of English, relinquished his position at the end of last year, and I wish to place on record our appreciation of his qualities as a man and teacher. Mr. Kanthiah had put in seven years of service here.

Mr. P. Marianayagam who taught Agriculture for a period of two years also left us during the course of last year and we are thankful to him for his services.

We welcome into our midst Mr. S. Sahayascelan with a B. A. Honours degree in Political Science from the University of Jaffna.

Mr. N. A. Vimalendran who attended the 37th session of the Graduate School Ecumenical Studies of Bossey. Switzerland from the 15th October, 1988 resumed duties at College on the 1st March, 1989. He travelled extensively in Europe and 1 am happy to note that the paper that he submitted on "Justice Peace and Integrity in the context of struggling and suffering people in Sri Lanka" was well received. He is the Head of the newly created Department Computer Science which is expected to make substantial progress soon.

Mr. G. Nadarajah, our Commerce teacher has been selected to follow the Diploma in Education course at the University of Jaffna and he will be on study leave from the beginning of second term this year.

Miss H. A. Thambinayagam has been selected to follow the two year Teacher training course at the Government Teachers College, Kopay. She is on study leave from February, 1989.

Mr. A. D. Adisayathasan who is now following the Teacher Training course

at Kopay is expected to resume duties in 1990.

On Roll:

We have on roll 1, 374 students with 572 in the Sonior Secondary School; 427 in the Junior Secondary School and 375 in the Primary School. There are 908 boys and 466 girls, and 34 students in the London Ordinary and Advanced Lovel classes.

Admissions:

163 students were admitted - 81 to the Primary School; 64 to the Junior Secondary School and 18 to the Senior School.

Additional Classes:

We have made arrangements to conduct TOFEL classes (Teaching of English as a Foreign Language) since March, 1989. The classes are conducted by Dr. Robert and the response is found to be very encouraging, and at present there are 17 students involved in the programme.

As some students have expressed a desire to study French we are planning to make provision for the teaching of French during the course of the year with the cooperation of Alliance Francaise in Jaffna.

We continue to provide the London G. C. E. Advanced Level and Ordinary Level classes in the English medium. Dr. Robert Porter has been appointed Patron of the Literary Association of these classes.

We are in the process of making arrangements for providing a course in tertiary education at Jaffna College.

Examinations:

G. C. E. Ordinary Level Examination December, 1987 (held in July, 1988):

137 students sat the examination.

108 students passed in five or more subjects. The following numbers qualified for the G. C. E. Advanced Level classes:

Bio - 17, Maths - 24 & Arts/Commerce - 43

G. C. E. Ordinary Level Examination

December, 1988 (held in Feb. 1989):

100 students sat the examination and are awaiting results.

G. C. E. Ordinary Level Examination — December, 1987 (held in July, 1988):

100 Students sat the examination 19 students passed in three subjects and 40 students passed in four subjects. 43 students obtained the minimum qualification for University admission and are waiting for their first form.

For the G. C. E. Ordinary Level examination of December, 1988 which was conducted in February, 1989 we arranged special classes during the months of January and February, and we are thankful to Messrs. W. D. Kulatungam, G. Rajanayagam, P. L. Manuelpillai, K Sathasivam, T. Sivashanmuganathan and N. Thatparananthan for coaching those students before the examination.

Sports:

Cricket:

Our Cricket team played in all four matches during the first term. The first match of the season was with Mahajana College which ended in a draw. The next match was played against Manipay Hindu College at the Brown field which resulted in a victory for Jaffna College by an innings and three runs. On he 6th March a match was played at the Brown field against St. John's College which was won by the latter by an innings and 50 runs, The 72nd Battle of the the Golds (Jaffna College Vs. St. Patrick's College was played at the latter's ground and this match ended in a draw. The following week on the 18th of March the fourth encounter of the Battle of the Golds for the Rajan Kadirgamar challenge cup for a limited over match was played at the Brown field where our college won the match by an exciting one run and retained the cup for the fourth successive year.

Gymnasium:

An important event of the college was the ceremonial opening of the George Gymnasium establised to commemorate the contribution made by the members of the George family to the progress of sports at Jaffa College. The former Principal Mr. A. Kadirgamar was invied as the chief guest for this ceremony which took place on the 23rd February I am happy to know that the Gymnasium is

attracting a large number of students Mr. M. D. Thambirajah trains our students in gymnastics with much enthusiasm.

Tennis:

There is a great amount of enthusiasm for tennis. Many students are taking up to the game. At the Luther Selvarajah Tournament held at the end of last year R. Arukshan annexed the Under 18 boys singles championship, and again R. Arukshan and S. Kapilan won the Under 18 boys doubles championship.

Soccer:

The college soccer team was captained by N. Nithiarajan. The team played four inter-school matches and won one, drew two and lost one. The Under 17 team was captained by S. Vinothan and the Under 15 team by S. Mohan Babu.

Hockey:

The College team could not play in the Inter-School matches last year. The team played three friendly matches of which they won two and drew one.


Badminton:

During his long period of service at Jaffna College as a Teacher Mr. Anadaratnam has identified himself with Jaffna College to such an extent that it is generally said that he spends twelve hours of the day in the school premises. He has taken special care in all the sports activities and has maintained a very cordial relationship with all those who were under his care. Our performances in the field of sports during the past two decades was largely due to the inspiration and guidance provided by him to our teams.

We also wish to thank Mr. A. Jeyarajan, the coach of the first XI Cricket team; Mr. M. D. Thambirajah, the coach of the second XI team; Mr. T. Nithiaratnam, the coach of the third XI team, and our thanks are also due to Mr. V. Selvaratnam the coach of indoor games. Miss S. P. Gulasingam, Miss S. S. Selvadurai and Miss K. Rajendra for coaching the Netball teams.

Religious Activities :

We started the first term programme with a retreat in collaboration with the

teachers of Uduvil Girls College. It was most ably conducted by the Rt. Rev. D. J. Ambalavanar. All the evening services at the Cathedral Church are now conducted in English with a view to providing an opportunity for the young people to familiarise themselves with the service order in English. We are appreciative of the efforts made by Mr. G. Rajanayagam head of the department of religious activities in organising the activities of the department as efficiently as possible.

Library:

I have pleasure to record that I was able to enlist the services of Dr. S. Packianathan, an experienced librarian to rearrange and reorganise the Daniel Poor Library. With his assistance the whole collection of books comprising a total of 29,000 volumes have been classified, catalogued and shelved. Similar progress has been made in respect of archival collection and now our reader-service had been put on an efficient footing. A substantial addition has already been made to an impressive collection.

'Young Idea':

The Young Idea, our student journal which is published regularly was released on 23rd January by Dr. S. Maunaguru who commended the quality of the publication.

Primary School:

As usual our Primary school conducted many activities during the course of last year. Their Christmas programme deserves special mention on account of its quality. They were able to conduct the sports meet under most forbidding circumstances. We are thankful to Mrs. L. B. Thambyrajah for managing the affairs of the Primary school commendably as in the past years.

Hostels:

There are 119 boarders in the four hostels of the College. We have set apart one lakh of rupees for boarding scholarships for deserving students. For effective counselling and guidance we have divided the Boarders into fellowship groups. Each resident teacher takes charge of about ten students. They will have close supervision over their studies and general progress. We have also plans to start a mess each at Bunker and Howland Halls next term. T am thankful to the vice-principal Mr. W. D. Kulathungam, the wardens, sub-wardens and Mr. V. Ganesharatnam for the efficient running of the hostels.

Donations to Prize Funds & Scholarships:

The Alumni Association in London has made a donation of £1,350-00 to be utilized for scholarships of needy students. They also made a contribution of £250-00 for our alumni association. The Women's Board of Pacific (Hawaii) has contributed a sum of US\$200 through the auspices of Miss M. S. Elias towards a scholarship fund. The Western Board of Pacific also contributed Rs. 17,143/-in 1988 for the same purpose.

Prize Day Address

Vice-Chancellor, University of Jaffna
Delivered on 5th April 1989.

Principal, Dr. Jebanesan, Members of the Board of Directors, Teachers of Jaffna College, Parents, Alumni, Ladies and Gentlemen.

I am very happy to state that members of the Board of Directors who are partly responsible for my success in life are present here. I wish to name them: My old teacher, Mr. S. S. Selvadurai, who is the new Chairman of the Board of Directors and Mr. A. Rajasingham who was at Hartley College and is now the Treasurer of the Board of Directors. I spent quite a lot of time with them outside the classroom, and I am happy to see them amidst the audience. In addition my Principal at Hartley College Mr. K. Pooranampillai is also with us.

My wife and I are very thankful to the Jaffna College community for inviting us to participate in the Prize—Giving Ceremony. My association with Jaffna College is mainly through its sister college, namely the Udupiddy American Mission College, where I studied up to my Senior School Certificate. Of course I have served in the Council of the Jaffna College Institute of Technology for some years. So, I must say that my wife and I are very

happy to be with you this morning. I also want to congratulate the students of Jaffna College who have won prizes both for academic work and sports. Sports is neglected in this part of the country due to various reasons. Special efforts have to be made to encourage sports. I am happy that the college is taking steps in that direction and I can see that from the Principal's Report.

While congratulating the winners I wish to tell the others not to be disheartened because only a few can get the prizes. You Should continue to try and you also can be successful in whatever attempts you make.

Spirit of Volunteerism:

Now coming to the College and its surroundings, I think I do not have to tell you the amount of hardships this part of the country had undergone during the past few years. There is an obligation on all of us to the society and to the young students of Jaffna College. We must dedicate ourselves to this cause because we see much suffering around us. We must dedicate ourselves for the development of this part of the country. You have a responsibility to the society, as much as I have, so, what is required is a sense of dedica-

tion, a spirit of volunteerism, a spirit to volunteer to help. We must volunteer to do things. Don't say, what is there for me, in return as it happens in a materialistic world such as the developed world. We are a people of the underdeveloped world. In the third world happiness in things other than materialism, A spirit of volunteerism should developed among the youth of the country, the youth of this school. You will succeed in this and participate in the development of the Tamil nation. Now, when you go to think of development, obviously the question will be what are the resources we have for development. Resources are limited and development has to be within the resources available.

Human Resources:

We have to develop human resources through good education. Our teachers are dedicated to their profession. Well, that is how I saw them at Hartley College and at Udupiddy American Mission College.

We have good schools and we have Universities here. The University is a place for teaching and research, but that alone is not enough. The community needs guidance in this hour of distress. We have to go on expanding the work in the Universities.

Think of how we can contribute to the development of our society. Our courses and curriculum therefore must be geared towards this goal. Our teachers in our Universities should have this in mind and participate in the development of the Tamil community. I have taught at Peradeniya for twenty years. At Peradeniya you can do anything as a teacher and the community does not worry too much about the University. This is not so in Jaffna, Jaffna people expect much from the Universities, from schools and so on. We have to yeild the goods to the people. Education must be geared to the needs of the people.

I am pleased to state that the Faculty of Agriculture is taking shape in the University of Jaffna. This will have not only teaching facilities, but also meet the requirements of the society. An Engineering Faculty too will soon emerge. apart from the teaching This research will also work in the extension activities of the community. I hope this will take shape in the near future. Look at the state of education not only in Jaffna but in the whole country. The opportunities provided to our youth are limited because of the lack of facilities in Sri Lanka. It is worse in the North. Look at the state of the Technical College we have in Jaffna at Kokuvil with the assistance of the A. D. B. It is supposed to develop into an institution at the N. D. T. level as in Moratuwa. Money is provided for its use, but the money has still not reached Jaffna. I know that the other Technical Colleges in Sri Lanka are being developed and the only reason given for Jaffna is that "things are not normal in Jaffna".

I have been telling outside Sri Lanka and also in Sri Lanka that things are 'normal' in Jaffna. Because this is the normalcy we are going to have in Sri Lanka for the next ten or fifteen years. This is going to be way of life for us. There was a time when we older people non violent type, dominated in part of the island. We could not survive in this situation. We ran away as refugees a number of times. But times have changed. People have changed. Here is a society different from a society in my days. This is going to be a "normal" society and we have to live society. We have to take steps assuring that things are "normal" and it is not going to be anything better. In this situation we must make every effort to develop the Technical College.

Open University:

Similarly there is an Open University in Sri Lanka. At the moment I am holding the position of Professor of Civil Engineering in this University, and from where I have been released to be the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Jaffaa. This University has four regional centres, and one of them is in Jaffna. I am not sure how many parents or aware of the facilities students are available in this University. People who do not enter the educational stream through the normal channel like Advanced Level can educate themselves and reach higher grades In Colombo there is a Centre of the Open University and it is very popular. We have courses leading to degrees in Science, Law and

Engineering, This year we started the engineering programme. We have Diploma courses in Technology and Management. We have certificate courses in English, pre-School education and so on. But unfortunately many of our people are not making use of these facilities, Of course we charge fees, which is very small, when compared to the sum one has to pay when they send their children abroad.

I wish to make use of this opportunity to popularise this University. Because, we have to struggle hard to make this Jaffna Centre going. However, the number of students who are following these courses are very small.

Technology of course is very important. We need many technicians if one is thinking of developing this country. I am in the Institution of Engineers in Sri Lanka, Now, you know in this Institution of Engineers in Sri Lanka there are mid grade and low grade technicians. In Jaffna if a technician wants to become an engineer the only way is to enter the Institution of Engineers as a student. As a member he can go to Colombo to follow classes and obtain the Institution of Engineers qualification. Obviously only the people in Colombo and its suberbs will benefit by this. But people from Jaffna will not be able to benefit by this. One thing we have done now is to make the Open University qualifications recognised by the Institution of Engineers. If the Open University students want to become engineers, they can achieve this through the Institution Engineers.

I am glad to find that Jaffna College has established the Institute of Technology and doing a great service to the country by providing Technicians. In fact, the Jaffna College Technical Institute has also asked for recognition by the Institution of Engineers and I hope they will get this soon.

Educational System:

Now look at the educational system of this country. There are eight Universities in this country admitting people full-time students. The ninth one 25 is the Open University meant for people to do their studies at their own time at their own place. Now look at the intake. Even though more people are admitted to the Universities, the total increase has been a small number. Even now in 1989 the number is 6,000 per year, and this is very small compared to the population we have in this country. The State does not appear to be very keen on increasing the intake. Wherever I had the opportunity I had stated that education is a fundamental right. Every child should have access to education up to the degree level, but the reply I have got from educationalists who have influence, is that every person should have the right to education up to the advanced level, and not up to the degree level. Because, they fear that educated youth would rise against the society and challenge the set up if we do not give them job opportunities and so on. Well who are we to judge that?. As far as possible the freedom for education should be there. Open the doors of the Universities. Of course the state is reluctant to spend further on education. Sri Lanka is one of the countries which spends a very small percentage of the G. N. P. on higher education. It is true that we have the free education at school level, but the amount we spend on higher education is minimal. We should open the doors for higher education. I hope that Jaffna College has funds to establish University level courses once again and help in educating the masses in these areas.

The State is not keen on preparing graduates who are not employable. In other words, the country is not keen on giving education for the sake of education, like in Arts, Humanities etc. We are thinking of a materialistic world. We want to produce doctors, engineers, etc, who are employable. Let us have more people with degrees in Liberal Arts and so on. I must tell you that you should not be discouraged by the plight of the Colombo Private Medical College. It was the first college recognised as a degree awarding Institution which was set up entirely as a private enterprise. Money was put in by private individuals. The State had nothing to do with it. I am refering to the Institute of Technological Studies I. T. S., and I was in the Committee to evaluate this, We recommended to the Government that this could be an Institution for preparing students for Bachelors degree in Computer Science. If some opportunities can

be provided for some education in this part of the Country where assistance from Government is limited, it will be a great service.

Importance of English:

While I am here I want to stress We have the importance of English. neglected English for a long time. Without English the people we produce will not be capable since everything is done mostly in English, though we cheat ourselves by saying we are teaching in Tamil and in Sinhala. They will not be capable men who will be able to think and write freely. Therefore the importance of English should The Government of the be realised. North-East province may allow us to do at least the Advanced Level classes in English. At least in the University we must think of providing more English. In the schools, we must stress the importance of English to our students.

Jaffna College:

One thing I want to tell you here is that Jaffna College is a leading College. It has lots of influence when I see things in North America or in Colombo. Universities in the South remain closed for a long time. The people who are making use of this closure is again the privileged group. Many of them have gone to North America because only they are aware of the ways one can get grants to follow the courses in an American College. So it is the duty of people like Dr. Robert Porter and others who are here, to help the poor students to gain admission to American Colleges.

Tell our students the ways and means of getting grants in these Colleges. I already find that you are conducting courses in TOFEL. Some of the Assistant Lecturers in the Open University have not been able to score well in the TOFEL. Without that we will not be able to get them admitted to the Universities in America.

The other thing is the Sat or the Scholarstic Aptitude Test. In Colombo they all know about this. They sit for this Examination and then they apply for admission to Colleges in North America. In North America you find these students the children of well to do parents. Poor people in the South are unable to enter the Universities., like our engineering students who are unable to go to Peradeniya.

What schools should do is to puplicise ways and means of getting into American Universities where grants can be obtained, they have to sit for the TOFEL and Sat examinations. I am not telling them to go and stay in those countries, but at least let them go there and get educated, get their degrees and come back, so that we will have an educated, society in the North.

National Development:

Talking of development, we think of the Natural Resources we have. I am



going to talk of the North - East, Due to the unfortunate events no development had taken place during the past ten years. One of the projects in which I am personally interested is the ground-water problems in the North. Even last year, ie, 1988, a sum of US \$700,000 was voted for this project. Not a single cent was spent on this project. The reason given was that "things are not normal". What are the resources we have?. We and for agriculture, clay, salt, and lime for industries the country can develop lime salt and clay - based Industries agro - based industry. industries based on Agriculture. In the Eastern province we have a very long coast - line. It has an enormous scope for fisheries. Though I am an Engineer I am personally interested in fisheries and aqua culture. In the North American Universities they are cultivating shrimps, oysters and they have become very important industry. I am interested in teaching subjects for the development these of the North - Eastern Province. In the State of Missiscipi with 21 million population, 90,000 acres have been set apart for fish - farming, i. e. inland fish, cat fish, is produced in large numbers They produce 10,000 pounds of fish a vear in one acre. Nowadays countries are doing that, I don't know why we cannot do this. I hope that the Faculty of Agriculture will have a department of fisheries or aqua culture. Initally it can be a department later it can develop in to a The coast - line of the North - Eastern province also affords much opportunity

for naval architecture marine engineering and so on. Courses in Engineering in the Jaffna University have been drawn up to cater for that.

We have forests, but we have been destroying the forests. We must learn to manage the forests and make use of the timber. We may have to develop courses in forestry.

Our Youth :

Now what has happened to us? Many of our youth have left our country and gone abroad for various reasons. Many of our young people in foreign countries are engaged in dirty and menial work. Earlier West Indians and Pakistanees were doing this work, and now Sri Lanka Tamils are doing that in many parts of the world. Drug trafficing is something in which some of our boys are involved.

As a Tamil Nation we would not like to see these. Money, is not everything. At least those of us who are here must make our country attractive to our people abroad so that they can return to the country and be with us. We ought to start this in schools and so on. Among our youth we have to calculate some sort of dedication to the nation. I know much has happened, through various movements But that is not enough. Through the schools a dedication to the land-saying that this is your land and you should work for it. See the State of Israel. Destructions for them caused inspiration. Hitler killed six million Jews. We have faced similar

tragedies. This is one reason that can motivate our people, and we can encourage our people to move towards that direction. What is happening in the developed world?. Family ties are breaking up: problems with the youth: violence with drugs and so on, have become a materialistic society. Husband and wife have to earn, each one must own a car, so on. Otherwise they will not reach that level expected in North America. But kids left alone in the house take up to other things. This is the state in North America. I hope this will not happen here. Family ties are strong in our country. A house is still managed by the woman. When Brazil wanted to cut its forest America, said do not do that. So Brazil replied "vou have developed, so we also wish to cut our forest and develop". Burning of forests and fossil fuels release various gases forming an impervious layer which, causes depletion of the Ozone layer gives the. green house effect. It is said that within period of 30 to 40 years the temperature of this earth will go up at least by about 10% - 14%. is going to be the result? The ice cap is going to melt. When the ice-cap melts the level of the sea will go up by about a metre. Maldhives will go under water, and so will our coastline. They tell people they should at least to reduce the green-house effect, and this has an development. impact on It lead to floods and drought as you re d in the Bible. which never occured in the present times.

Now I wish to add some thoughts on the development of the region. We owe something not only to our schools and universities, but also to the society, I think all of us should volunteer to take some part in the development of

the region. Whatever has been destroyed we have to build. We cannot expect the State to build everything. Tamil knows how much money funded by various Organizations reach the various part of the Tamii areas. Certain Organizations are participating in some development of our region. We must get involved in income generating projects and increase the income level of our people. I happen to be a member of such an NGO - namely. The Ootru Organization. I am the Chairman of the U. S A I. O Organization which is doing some Village Self - Reliance Growth Programme in certain areas through the US Aid. I find that the US and Canadian Governments have a feeling that these allocations do not reach the masses. They prefer these to be administered by NGOS. If People can volunteer, money would be available. They can N. G. O. S. for specific purpose development and obtain money from outside for development. This will upgrade the standard of our poor masses. We have to think far ahead: we must know what is happening in other countries, we must entertain new ideas.

The world we have made as a result of the level of thinking we have done so far created problems we cannot solve at the same level of thinking at which we created them. To solve these problems we must have a break through in thinking, and in thinking far ahead. There must be dedication to accomplish this goal.

Thank you very much for your patient hearing. I wish to express my gratitude to the Jaffna College authorities for giving me this honour.
