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

The Scarborough Hospital accepts overflow from Mt. Sinai, delivers triplets

Special delivery showcases expertise of Maternal Newborn Department

The Maternal Newborn Department had an unexpected delivery recently when it was asked by doctors at Mt. Sinai to accept a patient in labour with premature triplets.

"This is a huge compliment for us," says Dr. Cramer, an obstetrician at The Scarborough Hospital who delivered the last set of triplets at the General campus in 1982.

The Mt. Sinai obstetrician "felt comfortable transferring here. He did not feel the care would be compromised," says Dr. Cramer, who delivers about 400 babies each year. "It is extremely rare for us to get asked to take overflow from Mt. Sinai ."

Although The Scarborough Hospital's Maternal Newborn Centre is one of the busiest in the city, delivering close to 6,000 babies annually, high-risk pregnancies - including a woman carrying triplets - are typically referred to hospitals that specialize in that kind of care.

Confident they could handle the delivery, the team in the Maternal Newborn Department at The Scarborough Hospital imme-

diately prepared for the delivery.

When soon-to-be mom Anita Shlymon arrived by ambulance, she was anxious, nervous and a bit worried about delivering in an unfamiliar hospital with a doctor who had not cared for her throughout her pregnancy.

"I asked my doctor at Mt. Sinai to come with me. I didn't want someone else delivering my babies. He knew my history. But he told me I didn't have to worry, that Dr. Cramer was a good doctor," says Anita. "I was worried but Dr. Cramer made me feel like everything would be ok. He was joking and that made me feel better. I received excellent care at The Scarborough Hospital and my three children continue to receive excellent care."

The three baby boys were delivered within minutes of each other and are all doing well. One was transferred to Sick Children's Hospital for specialized care. He returned to TSH a week later to be with his brothers; all three are healthy. "No we don't do this very often. But obstetrically you can't compare what we do here to any other hospital in the city," says Dr.




Cramer. "We have high volumes. We have a very different and difficult obstetric population. Many have had little or no prenatal care. There are nutritional issues. We do an excellent job with very trying circumstances."

Ilankai Tamil Sangam holds Annual General Meeting

The Ilankai Tamil Sangam's 32nd Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held on November 14, 2009 at Chutney Manor, Monmouth Junction, New Jersey, USA with about three hundred attendees.

The event started with a minute of silence observed in memory of all who were killed in the genocide in the Tamil homeland and then a song tribute remembering the events of May 2009. This song titled "eppadith thaanguvatho, eppadith thoonguvatho" (how shall we bear the pain, how can we go to sleep) written by Varna Rameswaran set the tone for the events to follow.

Many organizations and speakers took part in the event. Members of PEARL gave an update on the genocide convention in Washington DC that they had attended. United States Political Action Council (USTPAC) members updated on the advocacy efforts in the US and the ongoing boycott campaign. Tamils Against Genocide (TAG) then gave an update of their initiatives on Sri Lanka war crimes.

The morning program continued with many more discussions on topics such as "Aligning Tamil interests with the US's national interests" and "Harnessing India's support to the Tamils." The need for continued engagement with stake holders in Tamil Nadu and Delhi and engaging think tanks were emphasized during the discussion.

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Pan American games

Now that Toronto has been successful in its bid to host the 2015 PAN AM games, here is a brief history of how this sports program originated.

The Pan American Games bring together athletes from the countries of the Americas in a festival of sport and international friendship. The Games are held every four years in the year preceding the Olympic Games. The first Pan American Games took place in 1951 at Buenos Aires, Argentina, but they originated more than two decades earlier. At the Olympic Congress coinciding with the 1924 Olympic Games at Paris, France, the International Olympic Committee members from Cuba. Guatemala and Mexico proposed the establishment of regional games for the countries of Central America. These games became reality two years later when Mexico City hosted the first Central American Games

At the 1932 Los Angeles Olympic Games, representatives of the Latin American delegations proposed regional Games for all the Americas. This proposal eventually led to the first meeting of the Pan American Sports



Congress at Buenos Aires in August 1940. The Congress selected Buenos Aires to host the first Pan American Games in 1942, but World War II forced postponement of these games.

Although the 1942 Pan American Games never took place, at least one poster was created on their behalf. The image shows a male figure in the foreground holding a javelin. The background reveals a view of the globe showing the Americas. The globe is encircled with the flags of 21 Pan American countries. Countries from the British Commonwealth, did not participate in the early Pan American Sports Congress. The lithograph poster was designed by artist Falier Totaro in 1941.

A second Pan American Sports Congress met at the 1948 London Olympic Games where plans were revived. The first Pan American Games opened on February 25, 1951, at Buenos Aires. More than 2,500 athletes from 22 countries participated.

The organization governing the Games was renamed in 1955 as the Pan American Sports Organization (PASO). Currently, 42 nations of North, Central and South America and the Caribbean comprise the organization. The official languages are Spanish and English. PASO has headquarters in Mexico City and is presided over by Mario Vasquez Raña of Mexico, who also is a member of International Olympic the Committee.

The PASO emblem is a torch superimposed over five concentric circles of the colors green, yellow, white, red and blue. At least one of these colors appears on every national flag of the Americas. PASO's motto "America, Espirito, Sport, Fraternité" incorporates four of the languages in common use in the Americas: Spanish, Portuguese, English and French. The phrase loosely translates to English as "The American spirit of friendship through sports."



Amnesty International Chief Blasts Australia's 'Panic' **Over Asylum Seekers**

The head of Amnesty International, Irene Khan, says the Australian government should close its immigration detention center on Christmas Island. On a visit to Australia, Khan accuses the conservative opposition of exploiting voters' fears about asylum seekers for political gain.

Amnesty International Secretary-General Irene Khan says that holding asylum seekers at the Christmas Island processing center will not deter the flow of boat people heading to Australia.

On a visit to Canberra this week, Khan urged the government of Prime Minister Kevin Rudd to close the camp in the Indian Ocean, about 2,600 kilometers northwest of Perth.

The facility opened last year and houses asylum seekers recently picked up by the Australian navy.

A surge of unauthorized arrivals by boat has put the issue of immigration back in the public spotlight in Australia. Khan says the debate here has often been xenophobic.

The Amnesty International chief blames conservative politicians for whipping up public hysteria.

"I think it is unscrupulous politicians and populist media," Khan said. "There has been a lot of fuss being made about the boat arrivals when actually the numbers arriving by air are much higher. There seems to be a sense of panic when what is really needed here is to handle a humanitarian problem with regard to international standards."

She says the number of boat arrivals in Australia is small compared those arriving in Europe.

Khan, however, calls the Rudd government's immigration policies an improvement on those of the previous conservative administration. She points out Mr. Rudd's decision to grant permanent residency rather than temporary protection visas to those deemed to be genuine refugees and the closure of the outback Woomera detention center and offshore processing facilities in the South Pacific.

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What gain in stopping the boats?

Responding to a young journalism student, Prime Minister of Australia Kevin Rudd maintained that his Government's actions on the Oceanic Viking abided by the letter of the Refugee Convention. Perhaps. But what about its spirit?

Recently in Bambalapitya, a middle-class suburb in the heart of Colombo, a mentally ill Tamil boy was beaten to death in the sea by a group of men with wooden sticks. Hundreds of people watched. The boy had been throwing stones at a police station before he jumped into the sea. His agonising death was captured on video in what Sri Lanka's former ambassador to the UN in Geneva, Dayan Jayatilleka, described as "our Rodney King moment".

On the citizen journalism site www.Groundviews.org, Marisa de Silva made the crucial connections: "If cold-blooded murder can take place in the heart of Colombo in broad daylight, in front of a crowd, we can only wonder what happened on bloody battlefields in the Vanni, with no one left to tell the tale."

She describes Sri Lankans as living in a spectator state, a people so inured to and benumbed by brutality and violence that they contemplate in silence the spectacle of people being disappeared (the "white van syndrome" refers to people taken away in unmarked white vehicles and neither seen nor heard from again); the attacks on journalists, lawyers and academics of all ethnic groups who dare voice dissent; and the horrific fate of those ensnared in the refugee camps in the north-east of the country.

It is only a few months since Australian James Elder, UNICEF's chief of media and external relations, was expelled from Sri Lanka for his comments on the camps. Other human rights observers and independent journalists too have been turned away. This is the place to which Rudd dispatched Foreign Minister Stephen Smith to work out a collaborative arrangement to "stop the boats". Is there moral threshold our leaders are unwilling to cross to feed the manufactured panic they themselves have created? The Age reported last month that Australian funds will be used to install surveillance cameras at Colombo's international airport to deter asylum seekers. The measure suggests the extent of our Government's willingness to collude with a violent and vindictive regime. At the same time, it indicates a confused policy approach, as this is surely an encouragement for people who fear persecution to clamber onto a leaky boat.



The Rudd Government's declaration that new pathways for "unskilled migration" will be opened up further contributes to the possibility of persecution by sustaining the fiction that those on the Oceanic Viking and the Jaya Lestari are "economic migrants". In fact, many are highly skilled migrants and are, as we know, already UNHCR-certified refugees.

The streets of Bambalapitiya are very well known to me. For a short while my family lived not far from there. It was on Galle Road that a man I can only assume was a Tamil ultra-nationalist slapped me on the head one day for behaviour unbefitting a Tamil woman - I was dressed in jeans and a sleeveless T-shirt.

Perhaps he knew, too, that I was married to a Sinhala man. Anti-Tamil violence marked the week of our wedding. I left Sri Lanka later that year, first to live in the US as a student, and later to live in Australia.

Unlike the members of my extended family, I escaped the anti-Tamil pogroms of 1983. Some of my cousins and friends lost everything they owned and were lucky not to be burned along with their houses. During the long years of the war, I supported neither the murderous Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam nor the murderous Sri Lankan government: I had the prerogative of choice, a luxury many Tamils, especially in the war-torn north and east, could not afford.

That luxury to choose, perhaps the greatest of our prerogatives, is one that some Australians, too, are exercising in the face of the ethical dilemma that confronts us. The Maritime Union of Australia, whose members have worked on the frontline aboard the Oceanic Viking, collected a \$10,000 donation to be presented to the refugees, as a gesture of solidarity and empathy. With demonisation of asylum seekers once again a popular sport, this gesture sends a strong signal that counters the fearmongering of our official leaders and casts doubt on the claim made by Piers Ackerman on the ABC TV Insiders program that asylum seekers put the lives of Australian

sailors at risk.

As we celebrate the images of the dismantling of the Berlin Wall and the rush of East German refugees to freedom, what of the refugees at our borders, of the children still aboard the Jaya Lestari, a boat turned back by the Indonesian navy at our PM's request? The Refugee Convention of 1951 was agreed on by world leaders to prevent the situation all too common in the lead-up to World War II: boatloads of Jewish refugees from Germany, turned away from successive European and American ports.

To what lengths are Australians willing to be led by a historical anxiety over invasion and the "natural right to secure borders" to which our leaders lay claim? Is it time to face this fear for what it is - a form of aggression against the most vulnerable to shore up our own sense of power? Unless we begin to question the imperative that we must stop the boats at any price, might we too be in danger of becoming our own kind of "spectator state"?

We sat under the lamp posts to study for the scholarship exam. In the camp every fifty to hundred meters interval a lamp post is found for security reasons. Though the voluntary organizations provided us with a kerosene lamp the cost of kerosene oil was Rs.200, we always went in search of lamp posts to study, so said Mr. Thavabalan Arivaan who sat for the grade five scholarship exams and secured the third place by scoring 164 marks. When he was recently released from the Vanni detention camp 'Uthayan' interviewed him.


He further mentioned; when we got displaced and moved we lost our father. After we came to the camp only we got the news that he had died. It is my mother's encouragement that inspired me to gain scholarship. Because there was constant fighting going on around us it was difficult to continue studies. Frequently we got displaced. Till grade four I studied at Killinochchi Mahaa vidyalayam. This year in the camp we were able to study only after

Rathan Master and Vimal master in the camp that inspired me to study and get this award. Even in those difficult times my mother paid Rs.200 and sent me for tuition. In the beginning at the camp they gave us food to eat, but it did not agree with us and developed diarrhea. Our teachers tell us, "we who have come with only the dressed clothes education will be the only wealth that cannot be taken away'. This advice gave us the impetus to with determination. studv Because of this I studied hard and scored 164 marks securing the third place in the Killinochchi district scholarship. I thank my mother and the teachers for the support and encouragement they gave me to achieve this scholarship he said.

The following provides a general overview of the symptoms related to whiplash and mild head injury. As each person's injury is unique, some of the information may not apply in a specific situation. Therefore, it is important that the individual involved ask questions of treating professionals to understand his or her own specific situation.

Where Do the Main Physical Symptoms Come From?

Whiplash injuries are common following motor vehicle accidents and involve sudden strain and injury to the muscles and other soft tissues of the neck, upper back and head. An injury to the neck or head in a car or workplace accident may or may not involve injury to the brain and to sensory organs such as the eyes, ears, and nose. Headaches are very common symptoms following neck and head injury and usually result from injury to the muscles surrounding the head and neck. Occasionally, migraine headaches, or headaches due to injury to nerves at the back of the head may occur. Dizziness is also very common and may be the result of injury to the inner ear, eyes, or neck or due to emotional distress resulting from the injury. In general, neck pain, headaches and dizziness (depending on the reason for them) often require weeks to months to fully improve, and very occasionally, headaches in particular may never completely go away. However, it is rare for these symptoms to prevent a person from living a meaningful and productive life in the long run. Ringing in the ears and hearing loss may also occur from damage to the inner/middle ear or nerves involved in hearing at the time of injury to the head. Poor balance may occur as a result of neck muscle injury, visual disturbances, or brain injury.

Loss of smell may result from certain types of skull fracture as small nerve fibres which connect the nose to the brain are torn. An evaluation by a neurologist is often best to investigate such concerns, which usually improve over a one to two year period . Concussion or brain injury most commonly affects an individual's concentration, memory, reaction time, and thinking speed, as well as planning, organizing, and problem solving abilities. Permanent and lasting injury to the brain is uncommon for anyone who has been unconscious and/or without awareness for less than several hours immediately after a head injury. Generally, traumatic

brain injury does not cause ongoing headaches nor dizziness directly but may result in changes in personality and behavior. Emotional problems (e.g. depression, nervousness, and irritability) are usually caused by other factors, but may be worsened by brain injury. Improvement in brain functioning generally occurs over a 1 to 2 year period, with the posmedications) can create side effects like dizziness, blurred vision, poor balance, memory or concentration problems. It is important to read the warning labels on medications and check with a pharmacist to see whether medications may be a contributing source.

Because of the relatively long healing time required by the main

physical symptoms, the person initially may be unable to work or do many of the activities that he or she enjoyed prior to the injury. As a result of stress, uncertainty over the future, lack of positive activities, and being out of the work force, the injury may begin to affect the person's emotions/personality, social life, and job situation. Anxiety, depres-

All of the above symptoms are expected to improve in the initial stages to some degree, with the possibility of worsening being very unlikely thereafter, unless the factors below become involved.

sion, irritability, memory problems, family stress and conflict, and the prospects of unemployment and shattered dreams also may be complicating factors. As new concerns are added to the situation, the main symptoms often worsen. The initial symptoms also tend to heal more slowly when other factors become serious problems. Over time, all of these factors add to, and may worsen one another unless the cycle is broken by using positive coping strategies.

Speeding Up Recovery

Here are some simple tips to speed recovery and that can also be helpful in recovery from other long term physical or psychological illnesses:

" Learn as much as you can about your symptoms by asking doctors and therapists lots of questions (keep a list of questions and concerns)

" Keep mentally, socially, and physically active as much as possible

Gradually build up your activity level

" Exercise daily according to a doctor's or therapist's directions

" Minimize medications (consult with your physician)

" Use relaxation techniques and coping strategies

" Keep your mind off your problems and focus on those things that you enjoy

" Don't bottle up your feelings " Do things that are fun and meaningful to you

" Maintain a positive attitude " Spend time around positive

and supportive people

" Set realistic goals for activities you'd like to do

If the individual is having difficulty coping, is not improving or is worsening, psychological treatment can go a long way towards promoting healing by helping the individual to cope more effectively and prevent the vicious cycle of interacting symptoms. If concentration or memory problems persist, especially as the other symptoms improve, neuropsychological evaluation should be sought to consider possible brain injury.



Interacting Factors That May Slow Recovery

A number of additional problems caused by the main injury symptoms may slow recovery, especially if they interact together. Disturbed sleep is usually the result of physical pain, discomfort, dizziness, emotional stress, worry, and/or inactivity. It normally improves with the passage of time and improved symptoms. The use of medications (especially certain pain, sleep and anxiety

Slipped disc

It can happen with the simplest of actions. You could bend down to pick up a toy from the living room floor. You could reach down to tie your shoelaces. In an instant you may feel sharp searing pain across your low back. You stand hunched over, frozen in agony. Within minutes you stumble your way to the closest chair or bed, where you are content to stay put until the pain diminishes. Your spouse or your neighbor will attempt to diagnose it best. You have suffered a "slipped disc"!

What does that mean? Can a disc "slip"? Will it ever go back? Is it serious?

To fully understand this condition, one really needs a quick lesson in anatomy. Our spine is made up of building blocks called vertebrae, bones that sit one on top of the other. In between each block is a disc that acts as a shock absorber while the spine moves. Each disc is made up of a thick cartilage-like layer on the outside, and a soft jelly like substance on the inside. The spinal cord runs through a tunnel within the spine, and from it nerves branch out, exit between each vertebrae and distribute themselves between organs and limbs. Sometimes,


the jelly-like substance bulges or bursts through the outer cartilage of the disc. Depending on the severity, it is called a herniation, prolapsed or ruptured disc. In reality, the term "slipped disc" is misleading and inaccurate.

Though a disc herniation can happen anywhere in the spine, it commonly occurs in the low back. It is more common in those between 30 and 40 years old. As we age, the spine becomes less flexible and more susceptible to injury. Degenerative changes occur both in the vertebrae and also within the material of the disc. You are more predisposed to this injury if you are overweight, lift heavy loads with improper body mechanics or if you suffer an injury like a fall.

Some people may never have symptoms with a herniated disc.

Sometimes, the jelly-like substances protrudes and touches or impinges on the spinal nerves. This can result in pain, numbness or pins and needles. Symptoms can either be localized or can radiate along the pathway of the spinal nerve. The severity of the symptoms can be related to the intensity of the pressure on the nerve. Most herniated discs in the low back can result in significant pain in both the low back and radiating down the leg. Besides the sensory symptoms of pain or numbness, one can also experience weakness in the extremity. If there is loss of bowel and bladder function, it is considered a medical emergency and you should get immediate medical attention.

Over 90% of herniated disc injuries will resolve in six weeks. Conservative treatment such as medication or physiotherapy will alleviate symptoms and promote recovery. The physician will initially assess the patient and may recommend anti-inflammatory medication or muscle relaxants.





Acupuncture or traction are possible treatment alternatives. If symptoms are significant enough or if conservative treatment does not relieve symptoms, surgery is sometimes used as a last option. The goal is to relieve the disc from impinging the nerve. Treatment options should be discussed primarily with your physician and not your neighbor.



and prevent reoccurrences of this injury, it is beneficial to strengthen your back and abdominal muscles. Having a strong core protects your spine from impact and injury. Maintaining good posture also equally distributes the forces and impact of vertebrae on vertebrae. This maintains the integrity of the disc. When lifting heavy loads always make sure you use good body mechanics. Bend with your legs and not your back. Hold the load close to your body when carrying it. Maintaining a healthy weight will maintain a healthy spine.

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
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

Electric Bikes Allowed on Ontario Roads

McGuinty Government Announces New Safety Requirements

E-bikes can share the road with cars, pedestrians and other traffic throughout Ontario --with new safe-ty requirements.

E-bikes reach a maximum speed of 32 kilometres per hour and offer another option for clean, green commuting and travel. Effective October 3, 2009, new requirements that will increase rider safety include:

-Limiting the maximum weight of an e-bike to 120 kilograms

-Requiring a maximum braking distance of nine metres

-Prohibiting modifications of the e-bike's motor to enable powerassisted speeds greater than 32 kilometres per hour.

All riders must be at least 16 years of age, wear approved bicycle or motorcycle helmets and follow the same traffic laws that apply to bicyclists such as keeping as close to the right edge of the road as possible.

Municipalities can determine where e-bikes may be ridden on their streets, bike lanes and trails.

"E-bikes provide an important transportation option to Ontarians. They are affordable, green and easy to use. The McGuinty government is pleased to welcome the e-bike to

on 400-series highways, the Queen Elizabeth Way, the Queensway in Ottawa, the Kitchener-Waterloo Expressway and other areas where bicycles are not permitted.

-An e-bike can be pedaled like a regular bicycle or, with the assistance of an electric motor, can be ridden at a maximum speed of 32 kilometres per hour.

-Riding an e-bike under the age of 16 or riding an e-bike without an approved helmet carries fines ranging from \$60 to \$500. For all other traffic offences, e-bike riders will be subject to the same penalties as cyclists.

One hopes that Pakistan listens to the sane advice emanating from the Washington declaration. It has gained nothing by building up and patronising anti-India terrorist outfits in its Punjab province and the occupied territory. Instead, these groups have joined hands with the Taliban and thereby become a threat to peace and security of Pakistan itself. It is for Pakistan to find a way out of the maze of its own making. The old adage "as you sow so shall you reap" has eventually come true in the case of Islamabad. Musharraf and the ISI under him had trained and armed the Jihadis well in the art and craft of running covert wars that even regular armies found difficult to counter. It didn't really take the Pakistani military and the ISI long to divert some of the jihadis to bleed India by inflicting "wounds" not just in Kashmir but also in other vulnerable parts of India. The civilian governments in between the Zia and Musharraf regimes too played their part by allowing groups like the ones headed by Hafiz Saeed to flourish- run madrassas in places as far away as Karachi, Lahore, Peshwar, not to mention Azad Kashmir and Balochistan. Simply Pakistan had largely put. unleashed forces over which it seems now has very little control. It was just the ISI which continued to be the mentor of all these groups.

Mr I.A. Rehman, Pakistani columnist and a leading human rights activist, has cautioned his country: ""...the roots of terrorism in Pakistan are indigenous; they



lie in the enormous work the state has done, by its acts of omission and commission, to eradicate the ideas of liberal Islam and facilitate the rise of obscurantists...Pakistan will not be safe from terrorists' depredations unless a crash programme to build a tolerant, pluralist society is seriously executed.

Unfortunately, that seems unlikely at a time when the country is being treated to a dirty political intrigue and a mad jockeying for power. Nobody should take offence on being told that the roots of terrorism lie in Pakistan's political culture." Is there any hope for Peshawar till Islamabad mends its ways?

It is sad indeed that Peshawar has become a blood-stained name. The Capital city of Pakistan's North-West Frontier Province (NWFP) touches many a sentimental chord in India. One, therefore, dreads to compare it with Lebanon, Baghdad or Jerusalem in terms of frequency of bomb blasts. The fact nevertheless is that the historic city is reeling under a wave of violence triggered by terrorists. Hardly a fortnight passes when it does not suffer the tragic loss of innocent citizens in some measure.

As you sow so shall you reap

They have snuffed the lives out of some of State's distinguished sons of the soil, attacked religious congregations and defiled places of worship. Their moves are born of desperation to make their presence felt. In Pakistan, however, the experts are not quite sure how bad the situation will be before it becomes better.

The Taliban had wrought virtual havoc in several Pakistani towns, including major Military establishments, in Punjab, Islamabad and Peshawar. If anything, every Pakistani must have dreaded the very thought of a lone cycle-borne suicide bomber coming so close to the place where nuclear warheads etc were probably stored. Not that assembling a nuclear weapon is as simple task as making the bombs which the Taliban and other terror

aroups do in next to no time. The Americans who played a special role by carrying out drone attacks in the vicinity of Kotakai in Waziristan before the Pakistan Army captured it must have wondered and indeed they did, to go by Secretary of State Hillary Clinton's reaction to the suicide bomber having virtually come within a whisker of the nuclear material. How vulnerable can Pakistan be, she seemed to suggest. Incidentally Hillary Clinton is the first to question that it is hard to believe that no body in Pakistan's government knew where Al Qaeda leaders are hiding.

A former head of the American CIA in Asia described the attack on the aeronautical facility near Islamabad as a "nuclear nightmare". Add to this the brazen manner in which a former Deputy Director of Pakistan Military operations was shot dead in broad daylight. Not that it surprises us when we think of the preceding attacks on the Army headquarters in town of Rawalpindi or at Federal Intelligence office and the police academy (the latter for the second time in recent months) in Lahore.

What should cause concern to India and other countries in the region is the fear of the Taliban or



other terror outfits based in Punjab gaining access to the country's nuclear assets. For the record we know that Pakistan like most nuclear powered countries has a "proper" command system before a nuclear weapon or warhead is unleashed. But the problem with Pakistan today is that it continues to be ruled by a civilian administration which, apart from the divisions it is riven with, must think ten times over before taking a decision which normally falls in civilian domain.


It could be said that it's ultimately the civilian government which controls the nuclear button. But not so in Pakistan. The army continues to rule supreme even as Zardari and Gilani, the Prime Minister, may claim to be the men in-charge.

Dalai Lama in Tawang

Millions must have been pleased with Dalai Lama, Dharmshala (Himachal Pradesh)based spiritual and temporal of Tibet, reaching leader Arunachal Pradesh especially Tawang in this country's highly picturesque north-eastern state. According to on-the-spot reports he has got a rousing reception. Both New Delhi and Dalai Lama have thus proved a point. The former has maintained that Dalai Lama is "an honoured guest of India and is free to go anywhere in the country."

There is hardly anything surprising about it considering that it has looked askance even at the Prime Minister's visit to the same area. Of late it has stepped up its verbal offensive against India as well as incursions into its border areas particularly in Leh district in this State and Arunachal. If any country thus has to protest it is India. It is to be appreciated that New Delhi has never been found wanting in calling the Chinese bluff. We have always to be conscious of the historic fact that we have been stabbed in the back by China in 1962.

It is China's headache if it thinks that Dalai Lama is an irritant. So far as we are concerned he has emerged as one of our best ambassadors. He has used his unique position to tell the world about our basic faith in human decency, universal brotherhood, democracy and communal amity apart from, of course, the help extended to his Tibetan community in rediscovering itself. The way China follows his itinerary clearly shows that it is wary of his global acceptance as an exceptional personality fighting for a just cause. Incidentally it is through Tawang that Dalai Lama had entered India

That the entire population of Tawang has been out on streets to greet him shows the reverence in which he is held. Fort Hood security - "the mission goes on"

Viewed from a country in on there were relocated, with the which I was born (India) where its security guards (Sikh) have shot a Prime Minister (Indira Gandhi) at her residence everything around the world looks possible

As many of us were applauding the United States for not allowing a repeat of the 9/11, 2001 there is a shocker from the world's most powerful country. By now it is well known that an officer of the rank of Major, who happens to be a Muslim and a psychiatrist, has killed 13 of his colleagues and inflicted injuries on 30 others. Sixteen victims remained hospitalized with gunshot wounds, and seven were in intensive care.

Even as the community took time to mourn the victims at worship services on and off the post Sunday, Fort Hood spokesman Col. John Rossi said the country's largest military installation was moving forward with the business of soldiering. The processing center where major Hasan allegedly opened fire remains a crime scene, but the activities that went goal of soon reopening the center.

What is little known is that it has shattered the reputation of invincibility of one of the safest places inside a strong nation.

The incident has taken place at Fort Hood which has the following features: (a) the largest active duty armoured post and the only two-division post in the US, (b) 544 square kilometres of training and support facilities, homes and schools; (c) a virtual city for about 65000 military personnel and more than one hundred thousand family members and civilian support staff; and, (d) a major centre for troops focussed on American operations in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The website of the Fort Hood mentions that it is "nicknamed as The Great Place because of the quality of life the post and area offers soldiers and their families. These qualities are important, especially with home-basing initiatives, frequent deployments and family stability and support." For the time being at least the Fort Hood will be diffident to claim

any such halo.

The initial reports indicate that 39-year old Maj Nidal Malik Hasan had gone on a shooting spree because he was opposed to his deployment in Afghanistan. There is a version that he had pre-planned his gruesome act. It is based on two pieces of evidence: (1) carrying of two handguns in an area where there is no use of them, and (2) the quantity of ammunition to shoot at 43 people. It is one of the worst killings reported on a US military base. Army Chief of Staff George Casey warned against reaching conclusions about the suspected shooter's motives until investigators have fully explored the attack. "I think the speculation (on Hasan's Islamic roots) could potentially heighten backlash against some of our Muslim soldiers."

The US security forces have been taken aback. On the social plane it is feared that there may be some upheaval. That explains why President Barack Obama has called upon his countrymen not to jump to conclusions on the motive behind the shooting. He

has pleaded: "We don't know all the answers vet, and I would caution against jumping to conclusions until we have all of the facts."

He has said that he has met officials of concerned agencies "to discuss their ongoing investigation into what caused one individual to turn his gun on fellow servicemen and women."

American Muslim organisations are in the forefront of condemning the "heinous incident." The Muslim Public Affairs Council. working for the civil rights of American Muslims, has extended "its heartfelt condolences to the families of those killed as well as those wounded and their loved ones."

Sen. Joe Lieberman said Sunday he would begin an investigation into what the Army should have known about Hasan. A day earlier, classmates who participated in a 2007-2008 master's program at a military college said they complained to faculty about what they considered to be Hasan's anti-American views, which included his giving a pres-



entation that justified suicide bombing and telling classmates that Islamic law trumped the U.S. Constitution.

"If Hasan was showing signs, saying to people that he had become an Islamist extremist, the U.S. Army has to have zero tolerance," Lieberman, an independent from Connecticut, said on "Fox News Sunday." "He should have been gone."

The Council on American-Islamic relations, said to be America's largest "Islamic civil liberties" group, too has asserted: "The attack was particularly heinous in that it targeted the allvolunteer army that protects our nation." At the same time it has called upon Muslims to take "appropriate precautions" to protect themselves from "a possible backlash."

Similar patterns of celebrations are seen among the members of the Srilankan community in Toronto. Some alumni associations have special carol services starting as early as November.

The Nativity of Jesus, refers to the accounts of the birth of Jesus of Nazareth in the Gospels and in various apocryphal texts.

The remembrance and reenactment of the Nativity in the Christian celebration of Christmas signifies their belief that Jesus is the "Christ" or Messiah promised by the Old Testament. The main religious celebration among members of the Catholic Church and other Christian groups is the Church service at midnight on Christmas Eve or on the morning of Christmas Day. During the forty days leading up to Christmas, the Eastern Orthodox Church practices the Nativity Fast, while the majority of Christian congregations (including the Catholic Church, the Anglican Communion, many Mainline churches, and Baptists) begin observing the liturgical season of Advent four Sundays before Christmas-both are seen as times of spiritual cleansing, recollection and renewal to prepare for the celebration of the birth of Jesus.

Nativity of Jesus

In the account of the Gospel of Luke, Mary learns from the angel Gabriel that she will conceive and bear a child called Jesus. When she asks how this can be, since she is a virgin, he tells her that the Holy Spirit would "come upon her" and that "nothing will be impossible with God". She responds: "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word".

At the time that Mary is due to give birth, she and her husband Joseph travel from their home in Nazareth to Joseph's ancestral home in Bethlehem to register in the census of Quirinius. Having found no place for them selves in the inn, when Mary gives birth to Jesus she places the newborn in a manger

An angel of the Lord visits the shepherds guarding their flocks in nearby fields and brings them "good news of great joy": "to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord." The angel tells them they will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger. The angel is joined by a "heavenly host" who say "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" The shepherds hurry to the manger in Bethlehem where they find Jesus with Mary and Joseph. They repeat what they have been told by the angel, and then return to their flocks. Mary and Joseph take Jesus to Jerusalem to be ciradvisers where the Messiah was to be born. They answer Bethlehem, the birthplace of King David, and quote the prophet Micah: "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage," a deceitful Herod tells the magi.

As the wise men travel to Bethlehem, the star "goes before" them and leads them to a house where they find and adore Jesus. They present Jesus with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. In a dream, the magi receive a divine warning of Herod's intent to kill the child, whom he sees as a rival. Consequently, they return to their own country without telling Herod the result of their mission. An angel tells Joseph to flee with his family to Egypt. Meanwhile, Herod orders that all male children of Bethlehem under the age of two be killed, the socalled "Massacre of the Innocents".

After Herod's death, the family return from Egypt, but, instead of going back to live in Bethlehem, fears concerning Herod's Judean successor Archelaus cause them to move to Galilee and settle in Nazareth, fulfilling a prophecy: "He will be called a Nazorean".

The prophecy is primarily sourced from Judges 13:5, 7, which say, "the boy shall be a Nazirite"; The author of Matthew explained the move to Nazareth sus; the birth in a manger, and the choir of angels; none of these is mentioned in Matthew. They explain the birth in Bethlehem in different ways (Luke says they lived in Nazareth and only moved to Bethlehem briefly for the census, Matthew implies that they lived in Bethlehem and only moved to Nazareth on their return from Egypt)

Date of birth

The nativity accounts in the New Testament gospels of Matthew and Luke do not mention a date or time of year for the birth of Jesus. In Western Christianity, it has been traditionally celebrated on December 25 as Christmas, a date that can be traced as early as the year 330 among Roman Christians.

Before then, and still today in Eastern Christianity, Jesus' birth was generally celebrated on January 6/7 (late at night on January 6) as part of the feast of Theophany, also known as Epiphany, which commemorated not only Jesus' birth but also his baptism by John in the Jordan River and possibly additional events in his life. Some scholars note that Luke's descriptions of shepherds' activities at the time of Jesus' birth suggest a spring or summer date

The Gospel of Matthew places Jesus' birth under the reign of Herod the Great, who died in 4 BC. The author of Matthew also recorded that Herod had all the The Gospel of Luke account states that Mary gave birth to Jesus and laid him in a manger "because there was no place for them in the inn," but does not say exactly where Jesus was born.

Three Wise men

The Magi bear gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Though traditionally described as wise men or kings, the Matthew Gospel account actually refers to magoi, or astrologers.

Neither the names of the magi nor their number are specified, but - because the gifts described are three in number - a tradition arose that there were three magi: Balthasar, Melchior, and Caspar. Balthasar is a Greek version of the Babylonian name Belshazzar, meaning "May Bel protect his life." Melchior means "The king is my light" in Aramaic. Caspar is a Latinized version of Gondophares, a Parthian (i.e. Persian) name. In free retellings of the Nativity events, the magi are sometimes called "kings" because of prophecies that kings will pay homage to Jerusalem and a king.

The Magi were said to be following a mysterious star, commonly known as the Star of Bethlehem, which had suddenly appeared in the sky, believing it to announce the birth of the king of the Jews.

On the other hand, the Gospel of Luke's account does not mention the Magi, instead having Jesus being visited by local shepherds, who had been informed in the night by an angel who said "Do not be afraid; for see-I am bringing you good news of great

male children in Bethlehem two years old and younger executed, based on a prophecy relayed to him by the magi that a new King of the Jews had been born in the town. The order's instruction of "two and under", along with the inference that it took Herod time to realize that the magi were not about to deliver the child to him, implies a birth no later than 6-4 BC.

The Gospel of Luke dates the birth ten years after Herod's

The New Testament provides two accounts of the birth of Jesus: one in the Gospel of Matthew and the other in the Gospel of Luke. The birth narratives of Matthew and Luke have some elements in common. They both relate that Jesus of Nazareth was the child of Mary, who was betrothed to Joseph, a descendant of the Biblical King David. The narratives also present the conception, preceded by an angelic annunciation, by the power of the Holy Spirit

cumcised, before returning to their home in Nazareth.

Gospel of Matthew

In the Gospel of Matthew, the impending birth is announced to Joseph in a dream, in which he is instructed to name the child Jesus. A star reveals the birth of Jesus to three "wise men" (magi) who travel to Jerusalem from an unspecified country "in the east". Joseph is warned by an angel in a dream to flee Bethlehem. Herod understands the phrase "King of the Jews" as a reference to the Messiah and he asked his as the fulfillment of the prophecy, "for he will be called a Nazorean."

The Nativity description in Gospel of Mathew and Luke

These two Gospels present two very different accounts: the Gospel of Matthew relates the appearance of an angel, in a dream, to Joseph; the wise men from the east; the massacre of the innocents; and the flight to Egypt. The Gospel of Luke mentions none of these but describes the conception and birth of John the Baptist; the appearance of an angel to Mary; the worldwide cen-

death during the census of Quirinius.

Location

The Gospels of both Matthew and Luke place the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. The Gospel of Matthew account implies that the family already lived in Bethlehem when Jesus was born. According to the Gospel of Luke, Joseph and Mary (who lived in Nazareth) had traveled to Bethlehem to register for the census of Quirinius, because it was the town of Joseph's ancestors, the birthplace of David.

Emmanuel

In Matthew, "an angel of the Lord" appears to Mary's betrothed husband Joseph in a dream and tells him: "she will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins". The text continues with the comment: "All this happened to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: 'Behold the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and his name shall be called Emmanuel, which being interpreted is God with us'.

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

A Balancing Rod for Life

If life is like a tightrope, says Maharaji, then people need a balancing rod to keep from stumbling. One could compare life to walking a tightrope, he says, because "it goes from here to there. But what's here? What's there? It has to do with our nature."

Recognized around the world for his unwavering commitment to spreading the possibility of peace and contentment, Maharaji is well-versed in the subject of human nature-a necessity, he says, for anyone who wants to understand what this life is all about.

"A person who finds himself in doubt yearns for clarity," he says. "A person who finds herself in pain yearns for joy. This is wisdom-that you suffer and you want to come out of the suffering. If you feel that you're in darkness, you want to come out of darkness into light. If you feel sorrow, you want to go towards joy. This is your nature.

"Your nature is not the same as a fish. Take a fish out of water, and it wants to go back into it. Take a drowning human being out of the water, and it feels good. We are all bound by these laws. For the first human being who walked the face of this earth, it was no different: Our nature is to want to get to a place where we can be content."

In order to get to the contentment on the other side of pain or confusion or doubt, Maharaji says, "We must walk this tightrope. We have no choice. When you walk a tightrope, what is involved? Well, you can't lose your focus. First thing, you need a balancing rod, because you're going to need to keep your balance. You need a balancing rod to stabilize you, because you will make mistakes. When you start to lose your balance, this balancing rod will help restore it."

The secret to maintaining balance in life, Maharaji says, is simple: it's to experience the peace

That is the reality that you see today. There is no clarity in him. Nor any will or vision. Most people in the world live their lives without even understanding what is it that they really want for themselves. Or even if they know what they want, they neither have the will nor the vision to create what they want in their lives. Most of the time just anything to do with our present situation. If we enslave our visions to current situations, then it is once again settling for what is attainable, what is easy, what you think is possible. It is not in terms of thinking what is possible or not possible. It is just in terms of seeing what is your vision, what is the highest that you can seek in your life.

If man has a vision of what he wishes to do with himself and the world around him, it is not beyond man's capacity to create it. It may happen in this lifetime, it may take a couple of lifetimes but what we want will definitely come. For that person, for whom his vision of life is clear to him and he just seeks it every moment of his life, for him, the highest things will come and fall at his feet. It is only because man is a bundle of confusion, it is only because man is most of the time seeking what he doesn't want - things that he really wants never come to him. This lack of vision and will in his life is fundamentally because of a distorted understanding of the world around us. What you know as the highest, you just seek that. It doesn't matter whether it is going to happen or not going to happen, simply living with the vision itself is very elevating, is itself very liberating, is itself a very joyous process for any person. Whether it is going to happen tomorrow or after hundred years is not the point.

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and contentment that all human beings seek. That contentment, he says, already exists within the human heart-and he can help with discovering it.

"When I speak about fulfillment, I'm not talking about a hypothesis," he says. "It's a reality. It's possible. In this day and age, a human being can be content."

Maharaji often answers questions from those interested in his message.

Q: Can you explain more about what you mean by getting to the other side of suffering?

A: Say there's a monkey on this side of the river. The monkey sees a tree full of mangoes on the each step precisely, you have been given consciousness.

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If something is easily attainable, people go for it. Not really seeing whether they really need it in their lives or not. Not really seeing whether that is what they really want in their lives. It is easily attainable, that is the whole thing. And at any given moment in life if we go by the experience of our past or in other words if you trust your mind – trust your logical mind to decide what is possible, what is not possible, what is attainable,

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
Is Art help?

"Fine art is that in which the hand, the head, and the heart of man go together"

Art is creativity; therefore no one form of art could really be more creative than another form of art. Creative way of expressing a modified view of the world and its objects by simplifying or complicating the use of colour, shape and form. It encompasses a diverse range of human activities, creations, and modes of expression, including music, literature, film, sculpture, and paintings. The meaning of art is explored in a branch of philosophy known as aesthetics. The nature of art has been described as "one of the most elusive of the traditional problems of human culture".

It has been defined as a vehicle for the expression or communication of emotions and ideas, a means for exploring and appreciating formal elements for their own sake, and as mimesis or representation. Realistic, naturalistic art had dissembled the medium, using art to conceal art; modernism used art to call attention to art.

A good step for foreign workers

The federal government's new credential policy for foreigntrained workers should be good for both those professionals and Canada. It is intended to deal with a problem that has plagued this country as well as frustrated newcomers who believe they have the skill and education to perform sophisticated jobs in Canada.

Human Resources Minister Diane Finley outlined the new, streamlined policy this week. Under the framework, the federal government and the provinces have agreed to inform foreigntrained workers to within a year of submitting an application if their credentials will be accepted. who came to Canada hoping to advance their careers only to find that the appropriate Canadian agency did not recognize their credentials. No one gains when well-qualified immigrants cannot work in their field.

To be sure, this is not a simple matter. Canadian organizations responsible for certifying professional credentials cannot merely accept the word of the applicant. Checking qualifications is not always easy, particularly if the applicant cites a remote university with an unknown reputation. Not every foreign university is at the same standard as Cambridge, Oxford, Harvard or Yale. Furthermore, in the case of universities in countries that do not use English or French, language may be a barrier to determining the level at which an academic institution trains its students. The advantage of the framework reached between Ottawa and the provincial governments is that it means both levels of government will be putting resources behind this initiative. There is no other way it could possibly succeed. The provinces, in many cases, have jurisdiction over the boards that grant certification. Of



The new policy will apply as of Dec. 31, 2010, to foreign-trained architects, engineers, pharmacists, physio and occupational therapists and registered nurses. The framework will apply to doctors and some other professionals by the end of 2012.

The intent of the new policy is admirable. "We want a system that is fair, that's consistent, that's efficient and that's accessible," Human Resources Minister Diane Finley said. She's right. Anecdotal evidence abounds about doctors problems. A board might regard a doctor as being an appropriate applicant to practice in Canada. That board, however, does not control the amount of money available for intern positions in hospitals. Now Washington is calling on Colombo to carry out an investigation of its own crimes with a view of satisfying its own officials critical of Sri Lanka and to boost at international level that it has taken a serious action on the matter. They know very well this would be a whitewash. All of this is well known to the Obama administration, which has crafted the call for an internal Sri Lankan inquiry as a means for burying the issue of war crimes and opening the door to mending ties with the Rajapakse government. After Rajapakse accepted the overture, Washington announced another \$US6.6 million in US aid, on top of \$84 million already handed over for "welfare work" to maintain the government's internment camps for Tamil civilians. Its purpose, however, is not to bring war criminals to justice, but to boost US influence in Colombo and strengthen relations with the Sri Lankan government.

A South Asian political analyst has mentioned 'The US and European powers certainly have "vested interests" in Sri Lanka, but this has nothing to do with reviving the LTTE, or defending the democratic rights of the Tamil minority. As in other parts of the globe, the US and its allies are cynically exploiting the issue of "human rights" to boost their influence in Colombo at the expense of their rivals. Washington is particularly concerned that China exploited the Sri Lankan government's need for arms and military aid to establish a significant economic and strategic foothold on the island.'

European Union's Report as Weapon

The EU has threatened to withdraw preferential trade rights for Sri Lanka, known as the GSP (Generalized System of facility-if Preferences) Plus Colombo does not agree to its demands. But, Sri Lanka defiantly refused to allow a European Union (EU) investigation into rights abuses call it an "infringement of Sri Lanka's sovereignty, self respect and dignity'. If the GSP+ facility were withdrawn, Sri Lankan imports, which currently enter the EU free of tariffs, would attract tariffs of 5 to 18 percent. The Sri Lankan garment industry, a major export earner, would be hard hit as nearly 60 percent of its output goes to Europe. After making a big show of the non-compliance of Sri Lanka for this facility, now the European powers are conducting a similar maneuver as the USA used its report the EU had given Sri Lanka until November 6, 2009 to submit a response and postponed any final decision to next January. That allows another two months of closed-door discussions for the EU and Sri Lanka to patch up relations. According to EU Bernard Savage,



Head of Delegation to Sri Lanka and the Maldives from the European Commission the facility would continue unhindered. He has further mentioned 'Relations between Sri Lanka and Europe are much bigger than the GSP (Generalized System of Preferences) Plus issue... In fact a few weeks back, I inaugurated a new European Commission (EC)funded school in eastern Sri Lanka in the presence of the President Mahinda Rajapaksa. That's the extent of our relationship' Then mentioned of the bottom line intentions 'We are about to start several projects in the north and the east' he added.

IMF Releases Second Tranche of the Stand-by Credit despite Sri Lanka's Failure in Meeting Fiscal Targets

On November 07, 2009 The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has approved a 413.4 million US dollar tranche under its standby loan, despite the government failing to meet a key budget constraint. Sri Lanka has a bloated deficit spending state, which runs a large gap on the current account of the budget, taking away the savings of the people through high interest rates, leaving little for people to invest in businesses, buy homes or for other activities. "The financing from the IMF has helped avert a sharp economic slowdown that would have hurt all the people of Sri Lanka, but particularly the most vulnerable, and compounded the suffering caused by the war," said Brian Aitken, head of the IMF's mission to Sri Lanka. Although Sri Lanka's excessive spending is epitomized by war expenditure the IMF has never mentioned about it as the major contributor of the spending.

Likewise the USA and the EU countries on the GSP+ issue IMF will continue to fund the Sri Lankan agenda whatever happens to the minority Tamils there and irrespective of not fulfilling its own conditionalities for the funding. They keep revising the targets upwards in order to accommodate Sri Lanka anyway.

Sharing the Island Cake with War Partners

Sri Lanka has obligations to fulfill its gratefulness to the 20 countries which contributed to the war against LTTE. A gricult ure Breaks Down Communication Barriers Courses connect Guelph students with Indian counterparts in Tamil Nadu

Agriculture was the language U of G graduate students spoke this summer to overcome communication barriers during a three-week study program in India. The students, all members of the School of Rural Extension Studies, discovered they didn't actually have to speak Tamil to establish relation ships with students in Tamil Nadu.

"Agriculture was a unifying topic," says student Cecilia Fernandez. It opened up discussion to many other related topics such as women's roles in agriculture, technology transfer, market forces and poverty alleviation, she says.

Fernandez was one of eight students who travelled to India to work with counterparts at Tamil Nadu Agricultural University, a research-based institution with five campuses and 2,000 students. Profs. Jana Janakiram and Doug Pletsch, who accompanied the group, say the Guelph students took the initiative for organizing and funding the trip to provide a more meaningful environment for two courses offered by the School of Rural Extension Studies - communication and interpersonal relations, and international extension studies.

INDIA'S ECONOMY GROWS AT FASTEST PACE SINCE GLOBAL FINANCIAL CRISIS

India's economy grew by 7.9 percent in the three months through September - its fastest pace since last year's global financial crisis. India, along with several other Asian economies, is recovering from the global slowdown.

Officials say the latest numbers show that the Indian economy is beating forecasts to grow at a faster-than-expected rate. The growth in the July to September quarter is the highest since April, last year.

Finance Minister Pranab Mukherjee says the recovery has been helped by government stimulus spending and a surge in manufacturing. "One point is quite clear [is] that the initiatives taken by the government by providing stimulus and helping the generation of demand domestically has paid dividend," he noted. "And, corporate sector is also responding. The industrial growth is taking place. Negative growth of exports has come down. And, I do hope things will be okay."


The good news cheered stock markets. The benchmark Sensex index was up by about one-and-a-half percent, on Nov 30th, after the government released the new data.

But, as the economy picks up, the focus is now on how the government will handle inflation, which has been rising in recent months. Food prices have climbed by more than 12 percent, recently, adversely affecting millions of poor people in the country.

Most policy makers expect the government to raise interest rates in the coming months.

However, a top policy adviser to the government, Montek Singh Ahluwalia, says the government is unlikely to tighten monetary policy in the near future.

"At the moment, the main concern on the inflationary front, I think, is food prices and you know food prices are not something that is going to be affected by introducing a monetary squeeze," he said.

Renault-Nissan Says Ultra Low-Cost Car Will Be Built by India's Bajaj



The boss of the automakers Renault and Nissan has announced the companies will team with an Indian partner to launch the most affordable car in the country.

It appears the world's cheapest car, the Tata Nano, launched this year in India, will soon get

some competition.

Speaking to reporters recently, Carlos Ghosn, the chief executive of Renault and Nissan, revealed the French and Japanese automakers have agreed to work with Bajaj Auto to introduce a new ultra low-cost fourwheeled passenger vehicle in 2012.

"I am practically sure that the cost of this car will be lower than any other car made today in India," Ghosn said.

Ghosn also says the new car will have the best performance on the market for a production conventional engine in terms of kilometers per liters of fuel consumed.

Bajaj, a maker of motorcycles and threewheeled taxis, known as auto rickshaws, is to design and build the new car with assistance from the French company, which is to market and sell the vehicle in India and abroad under the Renault/Nissan brands.

The car, not yet named, will compete with Tata's Nano, which hit Indian roads this year and sells for little more than \$2,000. General Motors of the United States and Toyota of Japan have also previously announced plans to launch, within the next couple of years, small passenger cars in India.

Renault-Nissan next year is to open a passenger car factory in the southern Indian city of Chennai with a capacity to make 400,000 vehicles a year. But the new joint venture small car is to be made at a Bajaj plant near Pune, in western India.

The French-Japanese automaker ranks

in the top four globally, accounting for a 10 percent market share. But its success in India has been more modest, trailing most competitors.

Ghosn calls sales here of its Logan brand mid-sized sedan, a money-losing joint venture with domestic automaker Mahindra, not up to expectations.

"We cannot just accept a situation where in India we represent less than one percent market share," he explained. "That is absolutely out of question. We have to adapt to the Indian market. We have to adapt to the product that the Indian people want. We need to bring what the people want exactly in the kind of performance that they are looking for, both in terms of product, in terms of technology and in price and in term of [fuel consumption]."

Ghosn is bullish on the future of India's automotive sector, with a population of more than one billion people, but where annual new car sales are around two million vehicles. The Renault Nissan top executives predict the number of autos sold in India will triple in 10 years as more of India's 50 million motorcycle owners move from two wheels to four. *[voa news]*

Asian Countries Take Fresh Look at Economic Mode

The contraction in global trade in the past year has led many governments in Asia, including Thailand, to take a fresh look at an economic model that has led growth over recent decades. Economists and business analysts say Asia is shifting focus to regional trade to cut its dependence on the United States and European markets.

Asia's economic fortunes over the past several decades rested on exports, especially of manufactured consumer goods, electronics and textiles.

The strategy has raised living standards and reduced poverty from Japan to Indonesia.

But this year, the World Trade Organization says global trade has contracted at rates not seen in almost 80 years. Export earnings among the world's poorest countries sank by over 40 percent, erasing millions of jobs, as the financial crisis that started in the United the proportion of exports to the country's gross domestic product increased from 25 percent to 70 percent.

Its top exports include textiles, footwear, fishery products, rice, rubber, jewelry, automobiles, computers and electrical appliances.

The United States buys more than 10 percent of Thai exports and is the country's leading trading partner. Its key Asian markets are Japan, China, and Singapore.

Ravi Ratnayake is an economist and director at United Nations Economic and Social Commission for the Asia Pacific. He says the slump has highlighted the country's vulnerability to sharp swings in global trade.

"The region is too much dependent on external markets like the U.S.A. and Europe and without giving attention to domestic demand as well as regional demand," Ratnayake siad. "So what we are saying is that we need to have a balance from sources of growth. If the region does not depend so much on external markets we are saying the impact of the crisis on the region could have been minimized." Over recent years Thailand has opened new markets through regional free trade agreements. These include deals with India, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka, Australia and New Zealand, and within Southeast Asia. UNESCAP economist Shamika Sirimanne says the trade deals make a differ-"They are diversifying away from the European Union and U.S. markets toward regional markets," Sirimanne siad. "There's a lot of intentions, not just Thailand, but also across the region to diversify. They have seen the repercussions of being dependent on big markets and then being burned. But let's see how we move forward how much

The Thai economy is a leading example of the export model. The United States and Europe account for more than a quarter of its exports; but this year shipments to those markets are down about 17 percent.

Kiat Sittheeamorn, president of the Thailand Trade Representative Office, says the global downturn led many Asian governments to question their dependence on exports.

"There are lots of talks about rebalancing growth, a new growth model," Kiat siad. "The crisis has shown to us that being totally dependent on exports - it can pose problems and some fragility to the economy."

Kiat says governments should pay more attention at promoting local technology and skills to add value to manufactured goods.

Thailand's central bank, the Bank of Thailand, recently said that from 1985 to 2007 cracy.

"With the neighboring countries there's a lot more forms to be filled, lot more barriers to be jumped just to trade across borders," Sirimanne siad. "These internal barriers need to be lifted if you need to rely more and more on the region for your exports to grow.

Thailand's automobile sector exports to 190 countries, but sales shrank by up to 40 percent over the past year.

Vallop Tiasiri, president of Thailand's Automotive Industry Institute, says the industry remains well placed to benefits from a shift toward Asia.

"We are the alternative production hub in this region. So we still keep competitiveness in Asia. ... There are only five places in Asia with a production capacity of more than one million (units) a year," Vallop siad.

Other business analysts say there is too little debate in looking to ways to ensure stable growth. alternative model for growth, with more focus on the domestic economy.

"We have been trying to promote a more diverse model of development beyond the export oriented one," Chomphongdi siad. "And using the case of Thailand it has been going in the direction for the last several decades. It shows many dangerous areas that can occur by relying on external factors as the main engine of economic growth."

Chomphongdi says he wants to see governments be more courageous in presenting alternative models of growth.

The Bank of Thailand says the existing model will continue to drive the economy. It says the small domestic market will not replace exports as the "superior engine" of growth for several years.

Thailand's exports are expected to rise by 15 percent next year. But attention will be on how much trade shifts away from the U.S. and Europe toward Asia. *By VOA news*




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The Tamil Genocide by Sri Lanka


The engagement of Professor Francis A. Boyle, an eminent American expert in international law at the University of Illinois College of Law, during the last years of Sri Lanka's conflict is traced in a forthcoming book published by Clarity Press of Atlanta. Titled "The Tamil Genocide by Sri Lanka: The Global Failure to Protect Tamil Rights Under International Law," it is the first book to develop an authoritative case for genocide against the Government of Sri Lanka under international law.

Such charges by an expert like Boyle should not be taken lightly: In 1993, Boyle took the remarkably similar case of Bosnia and Herzegovina to the International Court of Justice, setting a historical precedent by winning not one, but two Orders from the Court against the rump Yugoslavia, represented by Shabtai Rosenne of Israel, on the basis of the 1948 Genocide Convention. Prior to Boyle, no government had won two Orders for Provisional Measures of Protection-the international equivalent of an injunction-in one case in the history of the World Court going back to its foundation in 1921. Professor Boyle was among the very few to address the international legal implications of the Sri Lankan Government's grave and systematic violations of Tamil human rights while the conflict was actually taking place, and to excoriate the UN and those significant states and actors in the global community whose failure




to prevent it, Boyle charges, amounted to complicity in genocide.

One seminal lecture in the book outlines the legal basis for the Tamils in Sri Lanka to exercise their right under international law to proclaim a Unilateral Declaration of Independence and establish а Provisional Government for Tamil Eelam if that is their desire. Here Boyle draws upon his experience as the Legal Advisor to the Palestine Liberation Organization on their 15 November 1988 Declaration of Independence and their establishment of the State of Palestine, which recently announced the intention to petition for membership in the United Nations Organization.

Obama Hosts India's Prime Minister for State Visit

President Barack Obama says the U.S. partnership with India will be one of the defining relationships of the 21st century. The statement came as Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh made the first state visit of the Obama presidency.

The leaders of the world's oldest democracy and the world's largest pledged to work together to strengthen the global economy, curb climate change, limit the spread of nuclear weapons and fight terrorism.

After a two-hour meeting with Mr. Obama, Prime Minister Singh told reporters he has invited the president and his family to visit him in India next year.

"I have invited President Obama to visit India. A very warm welcome awaits him, his gracious wife and his two daughters," said Mr. Singh.

Mr. Obama praised his visitor as an honest and wise man, and accepted his offer.

"I have happily accepted his gracious invitation to visit India next year," he said.

After their meeting, Mr. Obama said he and the Indian leader had agreed to "work even closer" to share information between their law enforcement and intelligence agencies in the fight against terrorism.

Mr. Singh promised to cooperate more closely with the U.S. to defeat terrorists.

"The forces of terrorism in our region pose a grave threat to the entire civilized world, and have to be defeated," he said.

When questioned about the long-standing rivalry between India and Pakistan, Mr. Obama said it is not Washington's role to try to resolve the conflict from the outside. But he said the U.S. can find ways to help.

"On the other hand, we want to be encouraging of ways in which both India and Pakistan can feel secure and focus on the development of their own countries and their people," Mr. Obama said.

The U.S. is India's largest trading partner, and the president paid tribute to India's large and growing economic role in Asia and throughout the world.

The United States and India have disagreed on their commitments to reducing greenhouse gases, with the climate change summit taking place in Copenhagen, Denmark next month. But Mr. Obama said the two leaders had moved a step closer to bridging the gap.

The day ended with the Obama administration's first state dinner. The president honored Mr. Singh with a toast in which he celebrated a "great and growing partnership" between the two countries.

"To the future that beckons all of us," he said. "Let us answer its call and let our two great nations realize all the triumphs and achievements that await us."

Prime Minister Singh told the president he was overwhelmed by the Obamas' hospitality, and he called Mr. Obama an inspiration.

"Mr. President, your journey to the White House has captured the imagination

of millions and millions of people in India," he said.

More than 330 guests attended the dinner,

arking the first anniversary of "26/11" Marking the first anti-verse J Pankaj Mishra, author of "Temptations of the West: How to Be Modern in India, Pakistan, Tibet and Beyond." Wrote the following OPED in The New York Times of Nov 28th, 2009 from Mashobra, India:

ON the evening of Sept. 11, 2001, I hurried through a dark apple orchard to the nearest television in this Himalayan village. My landlord opened his door reluctantly, and then appeared unmoved by the news I had just received by phone. I struggled to explain the enormity of what was happening, the significance of New York, the iconic status of the World Trade Center - to no avail. It was time for his evening prayers; the television could not be turned on.

I did not witness the horrific sights of 9/11 until three days later. Since then, cable television and even broadband Internet have arrived in Mashobra and in my own home. Now the world's manifold atrocities are always available for brisk inspection on India's many 24-hour news channels. Indeed, the brutal terrorist assault on Mumbai that killed 163 people a year ago was immediately proclaimed as India's own 9/11 by the country's young TV anchors, who seem to model themselves on Sean Hannity and Bill O'Reilly. Yet, on the first anniversary of "26/11," it seems as remote as 9/11 to the inhabitants of this village. There is no great mystery behind this indifference, which is distinct from callousness. India, where most people still depend on agriculture for a living, has just suffered one of its most serious droughts in decades. The outlook for winter crops is bleak; many farmers have committed suicide in recent months, adding to the epidemic of rural suicides over the last few years. Politically, too, India has lurched from one crisis to another in the last year. Prudent financial regulation saved India from the worst effects of the worldwide economic recession. But the rage of people who feel themselves not only left behind but victimized by corporate-driven and urban-oriented economic growth has erupted into violence; the Indian government has called for an all-out war against the Maoist insurgent groups that now administer large parts of central India. Anti-India insurgencies in Kashmir and the northeast continue to simmer, exacting a littlereported but high daily toll.

Geopolitically, India's room to maneuver has shrunk since the Mumbai attacks. Last November, middle-class nationalist fury, though initially directed at inept Indian authorities, 9/11 New York Attack settled on Pakistan, where the attacks

were partly planned and financed. The writer Shashi Tharoor described "India's leaders and strategic thinkers" as watching Israel's assault on Gaza last winter with "empathy," and wondering "why can't we do the same?" One hopes Mr. Tharoor, who has since become India's junior foreign minister, is today more aware of why India can't do a Gaza or Lebanon on its nuclear-armed neighbor.

As Western anxiety about nuclear-armed Pakistan's stability deepens, India can barely afford aggressive rhetoric, let alone military retaliation, against its longtime foe. Pakistan remains vital to Western campaigns against Al

Qaeda and the Taliban. Aware of its strategic importance, Pakistan has been in no hurry to accede to India's demands to prosecute those it holds responsible for the Mumbai massacre. (One hopes the charges filed against seven radicals on Wednesday mark a real change.) Islamabad has also upped the rhetorical ante by accusing India of backing the violent secessionist movement in Baluchistan, in western Pakistan. India's seeming impotence enrages those in the new right-wing news media who are eager to commemorate 26/11, and to make that ersatz shorthand signify India's unavenged humiliation and shame. Prabhu Chawla, the editor of India Today, the country's leading newsmagazine, expressed the frustration of many middle-class nationalists: "India, divided by politics, doesn't know what to do with its enemy or with its much-mauled nationalist soul. We are as clueless as we were on that dreadful November night one year ago."

where 400 million live without electricity, it isn't easy to manufacture, or sustain, a national consensus. In any case, things are not as bad as the pundits make out. The lone surviving Mumbai killer is already on trial; his accomplices are being gradually apprehended. There have been no major retaliatory attacks against Muslims. There are stirrings of a civic, even political, consciousness among rich Indians who, until the Mumbai massacre, were largely unaffected by our frequent terrorist bombings.

India may have been passive after the Mumbai attacks. But India has not launched wars against either abstract nouns or actual countries that it has no hope of winning or even disengaging from. Another major terrorist assault on our large and chaotic cities is very probable, but it is unlikely to have the sort of effect that 9/11 had on America.

This is largely because many Indians still live with a sense of permanent crisis, of a world out of joint, where violence can be contained but never fully prevented, and where human action quickly reveals its tragic limits. The fatalism I sense in my village may be the consolation of the weak, of those powerless to shape the world to their ends. But it also provides a built-in check against the arrogance of power — and the hubris that has made America's response to 9/11 so disastrously counterproductive.

Michelin to set up tire factory in Tamil Nadu

Sri Lanka's Centre for Policy Alternatives (CPA) recently reported in a study that over 6,000 internally displaced people (IDPs) are still living in transit camps in Batticaloa and Trincomalee districts for more than 2 years away from areas they were living in the East province.

Sri Lanka government announced capturing all areas held by the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) in the east in July 2007.

And now Sampur, Muttur east, is selected by the government for a coal power plant. It has led to au-

thorities establishing a high security zone (HSZ) in their ancestral lands, IDPs representatives say.

Tamil parliamentarian K. Thurairetnasingam representing the area said that nearly 7,000 people have lost their ancestral lands as a result of government establishing the HSZ. CPA points out that the government action amounts to "relocating the IDPs according to UN definitions."





Some political groups had objected to the title of his film 'Sandiyar' which had to be rechristened and released as Virumaandi.


Kamal's 'Dasavatharam' also had to pass the legal test before hitting the screen as some religious groups raised objections against the title as well as some scenes.

British actress Emily Watson has been chosen to play Margaret Thatcher and Albert Finney is expected to take the role of Peter Ustinov, who was in New Delhi waiting to meet Gandhi when she was killed.

The film, seen as a major collaboration between Hollywood and Bollywood, will have a budget of 40 million pounds, and are due to begin filming in April in India, UK, Russia and the

Recently a group of us got very rare access to some of the resettled areas in Mannar and Killinochchi. I also visited the different zones in Manik Farm (used to be called Manikkam Pannai). As we get to Vavuniya something that strikes me was the number of vehicles (buses and lorries) moving about with IOM stickers. IOM is the only agency that is allowed to shuttle the IDPs from Manik Farm to either to Vavuniya Urban Council (UC) ground or to the resettlement areas or to yet another transit center for further screening.

We reached Vavuniya around 10.30 pm on Saturday. It was raining heavily and we witnessed IDPs, who have been brought from Manik Farm to be sent to their homes, taking shelter in Vavuniya UC ground (a transitional centre) under the stadium roof. My Vavuniya colleague got excited every time he saw either Ceylon transport services buses with IOM stickers or some bundled up stuff or gunny bags on the road side. He was anxious to introduce us to newly released IDPs. But it was not easy for us to talk

to any of them since they were heavily guarded by the military. We could only talk to the ones who were released sometime back and are living with their relatives (host families) in Vavuniya.

I met about 13 released IDPs mostly women and they have all had at least one family member either killed during the war (or before) or have disappeared in various screening process. Only two women were able to lodge complaints with ICRC. One woman had seen her sister (a former LTTE combatant) only once in Vavuniya Pambai Madhu rehabilitation centre and when she visited the centre a second time she was told that her sister had been transferred and the officer in charge there did not give her any details. Another women's husband was taken when she was in Zone 04 in Manik Farm and she is five months pregnant and has three kids. At the time of our meeting she wanted to move to her original home which is Vattakachchi (Killinochchi) but since she has come to live with her relations in Vavuniya on her own will, she fears that she will not be able to go back home through the government resettlement program that now considers only IDPs living in Manik Farm. In Thunukkai (Mullaitheevu) one of the positive aspects I noticed was that people still have a standing house. Many returnees appreciated the fact that they have come back to their original homes from the barbed wire camp. However their freedom of movement is still in question. IDPs living in Manik Farm are given special ID cards and their movement, even after the return, has been carefully moni-

tored. When we visited Thunukkai there were 1,200 families that have been resettled and they have been given Rs. 5,000 cash and dry ration for a few months. We were told that Rs. 20,000 will be deposited to their bank account by the divisional secretariat office.

When we further probed the government assistance given to these returnees we were told that this relief of Rs. 25,000 comes through UNHCR rehabilitation program through resettlement ministry and the dry ration is provided by World Food Program through Divisional Secretariat. It is vital here to highlight that this Rs. 25,000 bench-mark of resettlement allowance was fixed in 2001 as the resettlement incentive by the North East Community Organization for Restoration Development (NECORD) program funded by Asian Development Bank to put up a temporary huts for returning IDPs when there was a little relaxation of war in the north. Despite inflation eight years later same amount was given to IDPs. From the information we gathered it is clear that all the direct assistances to the IDPs so far have come either from UN agencies or IOM. We were also told by Mannar NGOs that they are not allowed to do any resettlement and relief work until they get special approval from the Presidential Task Force. However we noticed that the local NGOs are undertaking relief work in Manik Farm.

IDPs we met in Zone 4, 6 and 7 said that they will not leave the camps unless they are taken to their original homes and that they have heard a lot about sufferings of people who have opted to go and live with their relatives. I have visited Manik Farm twice before but this time I felt people approached us boldly irrespective of being watched. I also noticed it was women who most often narrated their stories and they repeatedly told us that the only thing they want is to go back to their original homes and do not want to live in any transitional shelters. For them it is either Manik Farm or their homes.

There were many complaints of inmates (mostly young men) being taken away for investigation and not returned back. A group of women wrote down the names of men who went missing and told us to check in

my work in the north and east. All our national identity cards were taken at the police check point at the entrance of Mannar Island and a temporary pass (laminated ones!) were given to us. Apparently this is applicable only to non-resident of Mannar Island and the pass indicates the number of days one wants to stay in the Island . We were asked the address of our stay there and the reason for coming to the island.

At the check point we witnessed people trying to explain reason for their stay in Mannar Island and the military not understanding it properly. We witnessed a woman who overstayed and was unable obtained her ID card back due to her pass being connected to the number of days that was given by her at the time of entry. A colleague of mine had to intervene and sort out the problem. The officers knew few Tamil words but when it came to things that are not so routine they could not understand the cases and the reasons. A woman was shouted at in Sinhala in front of us for not checking her pass promptly even though it was the officer's mistake of issuing her the wrong pass.

When we reached our contact in Mannar we were told none of the government officers would want to talk to us since there has been some recent incident that has created tension between the civil administrators and the military man in command. We were given a copy of a letter (dated 28th July 2009) sent by Mannar Government Agent (GA) to all the NGOs and INGOs including the UN. The summery of the letter is that any organization that is involved in resettlement and development work in the north has to get approval from the Presidential Task Force (PTF), any ongoing programs of development and resettlement should be stopped with immediate effect, proper approval should be sought and the approval copy has to be sent to the GA with the program plan and report. We were told that there were some instances where this rule was not strictly adhered and the competent authority (the military commander in charge of resettlement in Mannar) has warned the government officers of favoring the NGOs and INGOs. This came as a major issue when we met with many local NGO representatives and they looked absolutely puzzled and expressed their hopeless position of not being able to assist IDPs who are in desperate need of basic assistance. Even though they have the resource to help these returnees and IDPs who are living with relatives, local NGOs are barred from helping them. A pregnant woman walked into the church premises where we were having the meeting and told us "when we were in Manik Farm at least we got something to eat and now we are forced to starve here". She asked us how long

we thought that their relations can feed them and why no one is helping them. We spoke informally to some south-based organizations and UN staff members who have obtained PTF approval to work in Mannar with IDPs. They told us that there is no statistics on IDPs who are living with host families therefore they don't know the whereabouts of these IDPs and are unable undertake any relief activities targeting them. Local NGOs and religious bodies have some resources and much needed expertise while the IDPs and host families are approaching them. However they are unable to undertake any visible or systematic

steps to provide assistance yet to these neglected but released IDPs.

We also visited Musali (south of Mannar Main land) and Adamban (north of Mannr main land) where resettlements have been taking place. In Musali 651 Tamil families and over 700 Muslim families have returned. We visited the villages of Veppenkulum, Pariya Pottkurny, Musali village and Manakkulum, Bandaraweli, Kulangkulum mostly inhabited by Muslims who have returned mainly from Puttalum. We saw people putting up 16x12 square feet temporary huts using the 15 tin sheets, some logs and a building toolkit provided by IOM. They have to cut tree branches and use the logs to erect these huts and then Rs. 5000 and 5 bags of cement will be given to lay the floor. We saw bags of cement in front of few huts. These huts don't have any walls around and we noticed old cloths, palmyrah leaves and sarees being used to create some private

about 6km but all of a sudden it stops. Then the road gets bad to worse and muddy at the end we give up our three-wheeler and walked. Apparently the road was constructed when the first model resettlement was done in Saveriyarpuram on 30th April 2009. Government official web site (http://www.priu.gov.lk/) claims 90% of the Musali population being resettled and Rs. 800 million being allocated.

On our way back to Mannar we saw a group of IDPs being screened in the Kallimodai camp (one of the first internment camp that was set up to detain fleeing Vanni Tamil youth from LTTE recruitment but other Vanni IDPs were also placed there by the authorities). We stopped at a nearby shop in Kallimodai and had an opportunity to talk to someone connected to the buses that were stationed opposite to Kallimodai camp. What we heard was appalling. We were told that there were two Tamil speaking persons in civilian cloths screening the people.

We asked whether any of the IOM officers were present at the scene since the convoy of buses and lorries had IOM stickers. With a funny grin on his face the guy replied "No". Latter we saw a young woman refusing to get on to the bus and others consoling her and helping her to get in. The guy turned and told us "you know why IOM officers are not here!" When I narrated this story to a local NGO worker she said that IDPs have been screened at different points and they have got complaints that people are being abducted or detained at these points.

Adampan is yet another new resettlement area in the north of mainland Mannar. But unlike Thunukkai these places (south and north of mainland Mannar) have been not inhabited by people for a very long time and we hardly saw any inhabitable buildings. People were put in public buildings which too were surrounded by jungle and did not have proper roof. Few of them were in tents and others were taking shelter under the trees (during our four day stay in Mannar there was heavy rain in the evenings). There were landmine sign along the Uyilankulum Road that took us to Adampan and we saw de-miners from MAG and SSD in action. We also saw children walking to Karukkakulum School which has been renovated to a functional level

Once again we saw IOM tinsheets and building toolkits and returnees trying to erect their 16x12 huts. We saw many single women with infants on their hand and few kids running around. They looked lost as to what was happening around them. There was one mother who was standing on top of these piled up tinsheets and trying to tie a knot onto the near by tree branch with a long piece of cloth to make a cradle for her baby so that she can venture into the

the rehabilitation centres in Vavuniya. They also told us that there are 14 such centres in the vicinity. A local NGO representative told me not to take the list since we will get into trouble at the exit point of the camp. When I inquired about complaining the disappearance and arbitrary arrest cases to international agencies I was told that even ICRC did not have access to Manik Farm and the detention (rehabilitation) centres since July.

On our entry to Mannar we experienced a unique security system that I have not seen in the past 12 years of space.

Musali resettlement officially started in April 2009 and these IDPs have returned in July and August and they are still living in these open huts. Women complained that since they don't have a toilet or private place to bath they have to go to the jungle in the night despite the fear of being harmed by snakes and elephants. The only solid concrete structure one could see is the new military barracks built in between these villages. Children have to walk many miles to get to school and we did not see any hospital in the vicinity. We were told that they have to go to Murungan hospital which is an hour drive from the resettlement villages we visited. A good road has been constructed for

jungle to gather some materials for her hut.

With many families not having their able men and women who have being either killed during the war (or before), or being forcibly taken and detained, return to these IDPs is not as pleasant as one would want to see. We also witnessed many families reduced to women, very young children and old people. Without any basic facilities (proper shelter, hospitals, transport, schools, drinking water, electricity and access to any form of livelihood activities) and basic right to freedom of movement, one has to wonder what it means to these IDPs to come back home.

Election for President in Sri Lanka Rajapakse vs. Fonseka: "The unspeakable going after the uneatable"

The results of the national elections are now by no means certain. There is a contest and as a consequence, there is the possibility that the presidency could change hands, which in turn will have its impact on the general elections. This is attributable to the Fonseka presidential candidacy and it depriving the incumbent of claiming sole credit for the defeat of the LTTE.

Contests in themselves are good. Elections being the principal mechanism for choice and change in a functioning democracy, the lack of a contest could breed a lack of interest in elections on the part of the electorate, which in turn is not healthy for participatory and representative democracy. The Fonseka candidacy ensures that the Rajapaksa dynasty is not assured. They will have to fight and fight they will, to turn appreciation and gratitude for the defeat of the LTTE under their watch into a mandate for government into the next decade. Yet, challenging the Rajapaksas or indeed defeating them is not a guarantee for a functioning democracy in Sri Lanka, anymore than defeating the LTTE in the way in which it was done is a guarantee for lasting democratic peace, reconciliation and national unity

The Fonseka candidacy on the face of it is in the nature of the curate's egg - some part good in ensuring a contest and other parts bad given the stink the general brings with him on human rights protection and the essential pluralism of the peoples he wants to be president of. Moreover, what is the Sri Lanka that can be expected to emerge and evolve out of this contest, which some may characterize as one between war heroes and others as a pan Sinhala majoritarian fight fuelled by personal animosity between two individuals who should be held accountable for military excesses at least, war crimes at worst? As it stands it is not unreasonable to assume that the minority communities in the country and what remains of liberal opinion are left effectively stranded by this choice before them between the devil and the deep blue sea or between the frying pan and the fire are some of the remarks that this choice has elicited from these constituencies. Oscar Wilde's remarks about fox hunting - the unspeakable going after the uneatable - have also been used to describe this contest

court the minorities and liberals to win the election - a pan Sinhala nationalist fight within the pan Sinhala nationalist community being insufficient to produce a clear winner. Already, there is ostensible relief for the IDPs screening and demining notwithstanding - and the general in some public pronouncements is sounding like a determined and enthusiastic aspirant for a human rights award! Yet the ethnic conflict and bad governance in this country were not produced by promises made and kept, but by broken promises and the widening gap between promise, performance and delivery. The minorities and liberals will be voting if they do, in an act of desperation, with hope trumping experience. Can either candidate be reincarnated into being the president of all Sri Lankans?

There are those who have steadfastly maintained that Mahinda Rajapaksa in a second term would be the model of national unity and reconciliation and the architect of a new and truly plural Sri Lanka in terms of constitutional design and political culture. Pragmatist that he is, he will forge a new coalition of forces to embrace and institutionalize unity in diversity. To this is now added the argument that he is the only bulwark against the militarization of our politics.

This is yet another leap of faith and trumping of hope over experience. One need only look at the north and east, to identify the number of appointments in civilian governance that have gone to ex-military personnel. And as for embracing unity in diversity, need one look beyond the protracted farce of the APRC, the absence of proposals from the regime for a political settlement and the cunning focus of debate in this respect on the Thirteenth Amendment, thereby making Thirteenth Amendment Minus a higher probability than Plus?

And General Fonseka?

The immediate political arguments for his candidacy are that it will stop the Rajapaksas in their dynastic tracks and deliver political reform as per the agenda set out by the opposition. Fonseka is to stand as the common candidate of the opposition because they cannot field anyone from within their ranks with a ghost of a chance of defeating Rajapaksa and once elected to the executive presidency, Fonseka is to abolish that office and turn over government to the opposition, staying on however as minister of defence! Truth is stranger than fiction and even more the case in politics. Will the general agree to this? Would you?



conditions and priorities of the joint opposition. In any event, were he to be elected the executive president, the opposition will have no hold over him.

It is surely highly unlikely that General Fonseka will agree to be the presidential candidate who in effect will be campaigning to make Mr Wickremesinghe the Prime Minister and chief executive of the country? Even if he agrees to do so, will the electorate accept this candidacy by proxy?

In either event - on his own or on behalf of - General Fonseka, like the incumbent owes the country honest and clear explanations on the culture of impunity in respect of human rights violations and the allegations of actions that could be tantamount to war crimes.

General Fonseka in particular, needs to, if he sincerely thinks it warranted, explain his remarks to

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the Canadian National Post and in his Ambalangoda speech, which is cited in the US State Department Report to the US Senate Appropriations Committee. We must know what is on offer; we must know what we are getting or indeed getting into. And we must know the real difference between the two candidates.

Is there any difference between them on a vision for a future Sri Lanka, on governance, the economy, the 13th and 17th Amendments, corruption, media freedom and human rights?

It looks like the choice is increasingly going to be between the incumbent and the general. Bar some unforeseen, fortuitous and pleasant surprises, what if anything recommends this contest is the contest itself.

As such, it is important that we the peoples of this country ensure that there is a debate about the future of the country and that the result we deliver will facilitate a continuing dialogue on this most crucial of subjects beyond the contest.

However daunting the task may be, there are especially compelling arguments for effective checks and balances on the exercise of executive power in the event of either of these candidates winning the presidency.

Kuru Aravinthan's Book Release Neer Moozhhi.... Neeril Moozhhi

The 7th of November, 2009, has been Kuru Aravinthan's day; he is seen dedicating his newly written stories titled "Neer Moozhhi Neeril Moozhhi.....", a collection of two stories in one compact book in commemoration of his Alma mater, Mahajana Maatha's Centenary; this event has been taking place in the presence of a distinguished and representative group of Mahajanans and friends gathered together in the Commemorative Building of the Mahajana Investment Group in Toronto, Canada; And Kuru Aravinthan gains one more accolade, thereby, reinforcing his position as a short story writer and novelist of international recognition.

Hailing from the township of Kankesanturai, Kuru Aravinthan comes of a distinguished family held in high esteem by one and all. Several activists who visited Jaffna recently have spoken to BBC Sinhala service on the difficult conditions that continue prevail in Sri Lanka's predominantly Tamil city of Jaffna in the Northern Province.

Full report by Saroj Pathirana of BBC as follows:

Groups of former Tamil residents and media activists recently visited Jaffna.

It was an emotional and nostalgic journey for Nirmala Rajasingham - the first woman to be detained under Sri Lanka's anti-terror laws in 1982 - when she visited her home town after nearly three decades.

The former senior LTTE (Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam) member used to be known as Nirmala Nithyanandan.

She escaped from prison in 1983 to India and then made it to UK where she has been living since.

Ms Rajasingham, whose sister Rajani Thiranagama was shot dead by the Tigers, says there are still many concerns over human rights violations despite the end of the conflict with the rebels.

extremely happy that the LTTE is defeated," she told BBC Sinhala upon her return to London from Jaffna.

"But many say their friends and relatives who were with them the previous day suddenly disappeared the next. Many people behave like deaf and blind as they no longer have a voice."

After years of changing hands between the security forces and the LTTE, the government re-captured Jaffna in 1995.

Mostly Tamil Jaffna has a small Muslim minority and virtually no members of Sri Lanka's majority Sinhalese community as a result of years of war.

Historically, it is a place that has produced men and women who have achieved distinction in art, literature and other aspects of life.

But that active society is no longer seen. Ms says Rajasingham.

"People in Jaffna plan for the future - trying to send their children for higher education, getting their children married or trying to build a house. Jaffna people go about it with such vigour, but I couldn't see that happening any more.

"In fact, people look like they

are living day by day, as if there is no future for them."

Her comments were echoed by a group of 25 Sinhala, Tamil and Muslim journalists and activists who visited Jaffna last week.

"It was like visiting another country," says Ananda Jayasekara, who works for Transparency International Sri Lanka.

"You need a special permit, it is like getting a visa, to enter Jaffna and it is only valid for a month."

The unusually high cost of transport makes one suspicious over the motives of the authorities, he says.

The return air ticket costs 19,500 Sri Lankan rupees (\$170), a price most Sri Lankans cannot afford.

Mr Jayasekara says it appears that Tamil and Muslim communities are yet to make any serious attempts at reconciliation, although it has been more than a decade since Jaffna was recaptured by government forces.

Ms Baiasingham's husband. Rajesh Kumar, had also not seen Jaffna for 30 years until he travelled to his home town recently.

Rajesh Kumar, also known as

Raghavan, was among the first five founding members of the LTTE, then known as the Tamil New Tigers, together with Velupillai Prabhakaran in 1974.

Although initially part of the rebel movement, the couple were later staunch opponents of the LTTE

"While travelling to Jaffna, all I saw was huge destruction," Rajesh Kumar said.

He accuses the Sri Lankan government of behaving in the same authoritarian way as the Tamil Tigers in his former home

'You need to wait at least three hours to board the plane. And all the buses only leave once a day, so that security officials could check the buses at once and relax for the rest of the day," Mr Kumar savs.

"The biggest mistake of the Tamil Tigers was not to allow any other Tamil voice to operate in their territory.

"But the irony is that the government is now behaving in the same way as the Tamil Tigers, and I could not see any attempt at reconciliation or to create a vibrant democratic society in Jaffna," he said.

Another former Tamil militant

from Jaffna currently living in the UK also went back recently. He did not want to be identified.

"I arrived in Jaffna and took a bus to Nelliadi, my home town, and then walked about a kilometre to my village, Vadiri. A few cyclists passed by, but I did not recognise any of them."

His ancestral house - once home to 11 brothers, a sister and his parents - is currently being used as timber storage.

"The house legally belongs to my younger sister, who is currently living in the UK. She is no longer interested in claiming it back, and neither am I."

All former Jaffna residents have been highly critical of what they say is a lack of any genuine effort to reconcile the area's communities after decades of civil war.

The Sri Lankan government, however, says that it has launched a major redevelopment project called the "Northern Spring" in the area.

Projects to build new housing, roads and bridges will create jobs as part of plans to regenerate the north, the authorities say.

Whether you're a snowboarder, skier, snowmobiler, jogger or skater, you need to know how to take care of your back in winter conditions. Otherwise, the sudden twists and bumps from winter sports can sideline you with painful muscle strains and tears. Some winter sports, like snowmobiling, skiing, tobogganing, and snowboarding, can be especially hard on your back. Check with your chiropractor before starting any new winter sport.



This gem unites the estranged lovers, render conjugal bliss among the couple, ensures heirs and thus is considered as the most pious gem world over. The best quality of yellow sapphire is that it increases the lifetime of the native.

Yellow sapphire is found in the regions of Mahanadi, Brahmputra, Himalaya, Orissa and Bengal in India. In other countries where Yellow Sapphire is found can be named: Burma, Sri Lanka, Brazil, Russia, Japan, Scotland, Mexico etc

We should not wear Diamond or Blue Sapphire with Yellow Sapphire. On the contrary there are some gems which help other gems and their joint power multiplies their benefits.
