SCHEDULE.

Lots 4,230, 4,231, and 4,240 in preliminary plan 182 of Kitulgala village, in Lower Bulatgama of the District of Kégalla of the Province of Sabaragamuwa.

REGULATIONS, under Section 36 of the Ordinance No. 10 of 1885, made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, for the management of the village forest in Lower Bulatgama above mentioned.

- 1. Rights of felling timber or collecting forest produce, or of pasturing cattle in a village forest, may be exercised only by the permanent residents of the village named in the Proclamation constituting such forest a village
- 2. The under-mentioned trees may not be cut without the permission of a Forest Officer empowered to grant such permission as provided in the Ordinance:—Buruta (satinwood), del, dun, hal, halmilla, hora, kalumediriya (calamander), kaluwara (ebony), kina (hill country), kos (jak), kumbuk, lunumidella, milla, na (ironwood), nedun,

sapu (hill country), suriyamara, tekka (teak).
3. No trees of any kind over one cubit in girth at four feet from the ground may be cut without a permit

from the Ratemahatmaya.

4. Dead or fallen timber for firewood, sticks for fences and tool handles, and canes and creepers may be cut without any permit.

5. No person may sell, barter, or give away any timber or forest produce taken from a village forest to persons

outside of the village community.

6. No person may cut any timber or collect any forest produce in excess of his actual personal requirements at any one time, except to sell, barter, or give away to other members of the village community.

7. No person shall depasture cattle in a village forest in excess of the number required for his own use or

that of his household.

And whereas by section 34 of the said Ordinance it is amongst other things enacted that for the purposes of creating a fund from which the expenses of the Police payable by each town not created a Municipality are to be defrayed, a tax shall be payable on the 31st day of March, on the 30th day of June, on the 30th day of September, and on the 31st day of December in every year for the quarter ending on the said days respectively on all houses and buildings of every description, and on all lands and tenements whatsoever within every such town, to an amount equal to such percentage on the bona fide annual value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements as the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, shall by Proclamation from time to time appoint, except in cases where such amount shall fall below the sum of sixpence per quarter, in all which excepted cases sixpence per quarter shall be assessed and payable:

And whereas the town of Trincomalee aforesaid has not been created a Municipality:

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and appoint that the tax payable on all houses and buildings of every description, and on all lands and tenements whatsoever in the town of Trincomalee aforesaid, within the limits specified in the schedule to the Proclamation dated the 8th day of December, 1894, aforesaid, shall, from and after the 1st day of January, 1895, be at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on the bond fide annual value of such houses and buildings, lands, and tenements aforesaid.

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

TOTICE is hereby given that an application has been received from Mr. G. R. Murray, of 8, Central Chambers, 11, Bothwell street, Glasgow, Scotland, on behalf of Crawford's Cutch Company, Limited, for the exclusive right of collecting, for the purposes of manufacture by the Company, the bark of the Mangrove (Kadol) growing on Crown land in a district of the Island to be hereafter determined, and is under the consideration of Government.

It is proposed to grant this concession on the following terms:-

The concession to be for fifteen years.

2. In consideration thereof, the Government to receive a royalty of ten shillings per ton of manufactured cutch exported from the Island: Provided that after twelve months from the date of the concession, the manufacturers must have begun work, and that a minimum of one hundred tons per annum be exported by the Company thereafter (i. e., in the second year of the concession), otherwise the concession to cease.

ABSTRACT OF SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH ENDED NOVEMBER 30, 1894.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

The maha paddy cultivations almost throughout the Colombo District have been more or less injuriously affected, first by the long dry hot weather and subsequently by the excess of rain and the consequent floods. Though the latter did not rise to a great height, they continued for a longer period than usual, and have not yet quite subsided, and so the extent of damage to the submerged paddy cultivations cannot be accurately determined as yet Above flood-level the paddy crop is in a fair condition.

In Alutkuru kóralé south there is a small intermediate cultivation of bála-wi, which will be reaped along with

the maha crop early next year.

Other Food Supplies.—Plantains are scarce and dear. As many of the vegetable gardens in Colombo have suffered from the floods, nearly all kinds of vegetables have become very scarce and dear. Murunga, sweet potato, and mannokka (which are grown on high land) are not abundant, but can be had at reasonable prices. On the other hand, the recent rains have benefited the yam cultivations in Salpiti kóralć, and the prospects of a moderate jak and mango crop appear at present to be good:

The drought prior to the recent rains did much harm to coconnut trees, and has, it is said, affected the crops

and sent up the price of nuts, which now ranges from Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 a thousand.

NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Hapitigam kóralé: the crops of the yala harvest have been reaped and removed; they are not good. Some of the fields are sown for maha; prospects not very good owing to drought soon after the sowing. There were heavy rains during the month. Jakfruit trees here and there and breadfruit trees now in bearing. Plantains are scarce and dear. Cocoanut crops not very good; prices high.

Alutkúru kóralé north: fields sown for maha partly abandoned owing to drought; rest are thriving well.

Breadfruit and plantains are scarce and dear. Cocoanut crops very poor; prices good.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

The maha cultivation has suffered considerably from floods. Vegetables are plentiful and cheap in Rayigam kóralé, but scarce in Pasdun korale and the Totamunes. The price of cocoanut ranges from Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 a thousand

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Udunuwara and Yatinuwara: maha paddy being transplanted; fair prospect, but slightly damaged by excess

of rain. Dry grain growing and in ear; fair prospect.

Tumpane, Harispattu, and Pata Dumbura: yala paddy being harvested, fair crop; maha cultivation in progress; some fields being transplanted, prospects generally good. Yala kurakkan harvested; good crop. Maha hill paddy damaged by flies.

Uda Dumbara: maha cultivation in progress. Godakumburu not cultivated for want of rain. Kurakkan being sown, and growing.

Pata Hewaheta: yala paddy harvested, good crop; maha cultivation in progress; kurakkan yala harvested, bad

crop; maha being sown.

Udapalata and Uda Bulatgama: maha paddy cultivation in progress; prospects fair.

MATALÉ DISTRICT.

In Matale north there was fair rain from the 5th to the 11th, which half-filled several tanks in Kandapola and In massare north there was tair rain from the 5th to the 11th, which nan-fined several tanks in Kandapoia and Inamalawa; some of them were filled. Since then there has been no rain, and paddy cultivation is not as general as could be wished. The chenas are getting on well, but in Wagapanaha Pallesiyapattu a plague of grasshoppers ("polongeti") is reported to be doing much damage to kurakkan.

In Matalé south the rainfall has registered 9.06 inches for the month, and the cultivation is getting on fairly.

In Matale east there has been plenty of rain, and cultivation is good.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Kotmale: paddy plants are five months old, and their general appearance is good. A good crop of kurakkan is being reaped. Walapane: half of the usual yala was gathered owing to absence of rain for about eight months; kurakkan chenas were sown. Uda Hewaheta: paddy for yala harvest is in ear; poor crop expected, owing to drought; kurakkan, young plants.

NORTHERN PROVINCE.

JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather: there were partial showers of rain almost every day throughout the month, and some heavy rains throughout the district on the 6th, 7th, 11th, 12th, 14th, 15th, 16th, and 28th. The weather was unsettled till about the 14th, when the north-east monsoon set in.

Paddy: the paddy plants are in general looking well; weeding and transplanting were general throughout the district. Rains sufficient to flood the fields is much wanted.

Dry grains: kurakkan is in ear and plants; prospects fair. Varaku and samy in plants; prospects very good. Payaru, ulunthu, and kollu are in tender plants in some divisions and being sown in others.

MANNAR DISTRICT.

Dry grain sown in Mannar island good. The paddy sown in the maritime villages of Mantaipattu so far doing well, but weeds are troublesome. Paddy in the interior villages requires rain. In Muchali and Nanadanpattus dry grain chenas are good. The paddy sown in the beds of some of the tanks is in plant, and requires rain. Fields sown only in a very few villages also in plant, and rain urgently wanted. No mud caltivation commenced as yet for want of sufficient rain.

MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

[Report not received.]

VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

The paddy sown in tank beds and dry grain crops generally have been attacked by caterpillars, and fully half the crop has been destroyed.

The tanks in Cheddikulam and Panankamam have collected a fair amount of water, and prospects are good. In

Kilakkumulai there have been frequent light showers, but tanks have not filled.

Ploughing and sowing have been carried on generally, but kalapokam prospects depend on rain in December. There has been a good deal of fever in Metkumalai and Kilakkumulai. An outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease occurred at Mamadu.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Four Gravets and Akmimama: the extent sown for the present maha is neither less nor more than that sown during the corresponding season of the last year. But the paddy plants on the whole look healthier, weather being favourable, and promise a plentiful harvest.

Talpe pattu: as usual for the maha seasons in the district, a large extent of land cultivated. But considerable damage has been done to crop in low-lying lands. Such lands, however, are few, and a good harvest is looked

forward to.

Hinidum pattu: the crop in all but low-lying fields, the cultivation of which was retarded owing to heavy rains, presents a healthy appearance and promises a good harvest.

Gangaboda pattu: for want of rain smaller extents of land were cultivated for the present maha, and considerable damage has been done to the crop by recent rain.

Bentota-Walallawiti korale: heavy rain and consequent floods prevented a good many fields being cultivated for the present maha. The paddy plants in some of the fields cultivated are yet under water, and it is not likely that the harvest will be a plentiful one.

Wellaboda pattu: a large extent of land has been cultivated for the present maha, and the present condition

of the crop is satisfactory.

MÁTARA DISTRICT.

Crop prospects are excellent throughout the district, and a very large extent of land is under cultivation for Chena cultivation on Crown lands prohibited.

HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

West Giruwa pattu: crops middling. East Giruwa pattu: maha cultivation commenced. Magam pattu: cultivation commenced.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Sowing of four and six-month paddy on about 30,000 acres for early munmari on ploughing system is over; crop in good condition. Preparations are going on for cultivation of 20,000 acres more under trampling system with three-month paddy. Indian corn is good and ripe.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Trincomalee and Kaddukkulam west: the condition of the crop is fair. Koddiyar pattu, Tampalagam pattu, and Kaddukulam east: the condition of the crop is good.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNÉGALA DISTRICT.

The occurrence of rain stimulated cultivation everywhere. Tanks in Wanni have filled. Paddy area on the whole below average, but outturn probably good. Chenas throve. Health of people and cattle satisfactory.

CHILAW DISTRICT.

In the Northern division of the district, bala-wi is being sown. The tanks are all full, some of which were breached, but have been repaired.

In the Central division, the portion of ma-wi cultivation which survived the drought is very good. Bala-wi

cultivation is progressing favourably, and the prospects are good. The tanks are full.

In the Southern division the existing paddy crops are promising, and a fair harvest is expected if rain continues. The sowing of paddy for the maha harvest is over, and fine grain cultivation is still continued. The tobacco crop has been collected, and is being cured.

PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy and fine grain sown for the maha crop; prospects middling in Kalpitiya division, moderate and good in Demala Hatpattu; in the latter, Uswewa and many of the minor tanks are full.

NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

. Nuwarakalawiya: the rainfall at Anuradhapura during the month has been 11.40 inches. There has been very local rainfall in all parts. Some tanks are full, others only half or quarter full. Tavalu crops are of tender growth. Crops of fields cultivated are of tender growth and healthy. Kurakkan crops are about to blossom; and those of late cultivation are in leaf.

Tamankaduwa: rain deficient, tanks are only quarter full. Paddy crop of last harvest has been reaped. Kurakkan crops are tender. No damage has been reported.

PROVINCE OF UVA.

Extensive chena cultivation throughout the Province. Both indian corn and kurakkan crops promising, Ploughing and sowing for the maha paddy harvest proceeding in all the divisions.

PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the yala harvest is over except in Kolonna korale, where some crops are still being reaped and threshed The crop of some of the fields in Maduanwala, Omalpe, and Kolonna have withered from drought.

Maha prospects: Kuruviti korale fair. In the Palle pattu of Nawadun korale serious damage to crops has been caused by the recent floods, which submerged fields entirely for seven or eight days; and preparations are being made for re-sowing some of the fields. In Meda and Uda pattu prospects good. Atakalan korale middling. In Kukulu korale crops on many of the fields have been damaged by flood. In Kadawatu and Meda korales the promise

of the peramas cultivation is good.

Chenas: maha crops beginning to flower, and prospects fair. Kurakkan crops in Kadawatu, Meda, and Atakalan korales are growing well. In Kolonna korale locusts are reported to have destroyed tender plants, and cultivators are sowing afresh. In Kukulu korale amu chenas are growing well.

KÉGALLA DISTRICT.

Yala paddy: Galboda and Kinigoda korales and Paranakuru korale, harvest over; yield poor owing to want of Yala paddy: Galboda and Kinigoda korales and Paranakuru korale, harvest over; yield poor owing to want of water. Maha: Galboda and Kinigoda korales and Paranakuru korale, prospects fair; Beligal korale, Three Korales, and Lower Bulatgama, good. Sowing for late maha in progress in Beligal korale.

Dry grain: hill paddy and iringu thriving well throughout the district; kurakkan and meneri sown in Beligal korale growing well; mun sown in Beligal korale, prospects middling. Amu prospects in Galboda and Kinigoda korales and Paranakuru korale fair; Beligal korale, Three Korales, and Lower Bulatgama, good.

Health: foot-and-mouth disease in parts of Dehigampal korale and Atulugam korale of Three Korales and

Examinations for the Civil Service of India.

An open Competitive Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India will be held in London, under the subjoined Regulations, commencing on August 1, 1895.

The number of persons to be selected at this Examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before May 31, 1895, an application on the prescribed form, accompanied by evidence on the points mentioned in Regulation 2, and by a list of the subjects in which the Candidate desires to be examined. Evidence of health and character must bear date not earlier than May 1, 1895.

The Order for admission to the Examination will be posted on July 18, 1895, to the address given on the Form of Application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates will be required to attend, and as to the manner in which the fee (the amount of which is at present under consideration) is to be paid.

REGULATIONS.

- o The following Regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year.
- 1. An Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year. The date of the Examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners —

i.) That he is a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.

- (ii.) That his age will be above twenty-one years and under twenty-three years on April 1 in the year in which the Examination is to be held.
- [N.B.—In the case of natives of India it will be necessary for a Candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the Division within which his family resides, or should he reside in a Native State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.]

 (iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit

him, for the Civil Service of India.

(iv.) That he is of good moral character.

3. Should the evidence upon the above points be primâ facie satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the Examination. The Commissioners may however in their discretion at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries, in the case of any candidate, should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and if already selected, will be removed from the position of a Probationer.

The Open Competitive Examination will take place only in the following branches of knowledge:-

6. The marks assigned to Candidates in each branch will be subject to such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary, † in order to secure that "a Candidate be allowed no credit at all for taking up a subject in which he is a mere smatterer."

The Examination will be conducted on paper and viva voce, as may be deemed necessary.

The marks obtained by each Candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several Candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above-mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining Candidates, will be set forth in order of merit, and such Candidates shall be deemed to be selected Candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the selected Candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the Candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected Candidate. A Candidate entitled to be deemed a selected Candidate, but declining to accept the nomination as such, which may be offered to him, will be disqualified for any subsequent competition

9. Selected Candidates before proceeding to India will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time

In this Examination, as in the open competition, the merit of the Candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the open competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The Examination will be conducted on paper and vivâ voc", as may be deemed necessary. This Examination will be held at the close of the year of probation, and will be called the Final Examination.

10. The selected Candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in riding.

The examinations in riding will be held as follows:-

(1) Shortly after the result of the Open Competitive Examination has been declared, or at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.

(2) Again, at the time of the Final Examination, Candidates who may fully satisfy the Commissioners of their ability to ride well and to perform journeys on horseback, shall receive a Certificate which shall entitle them to be credited with 200 marks to be added to their marks in the Final Examination.

(3) Candidates who fail to obtain this Certificate, but who gain a Certificate of minimum proficiency in riding, will be allowed to proceed to India, but will be subjected on their arrival to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Government, and shall receive no increase to their initial salary until they have passed such tests to the satisfaction of that Government. A Candidate who fails at the end of the year of probation to gain at least the Certificate of minimum proficiency in riding, will be liable to have his name removed from the list of Selected Candidates.

11. The selected Candidates who, at the Final Examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force at the time for the Service.

12. Persons desirous to be admitted as Candidates must apply on Forms, which may be obtained from "The Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W.," at any time after December 1 in the year previous to that in which the Examination is to be held. The Forms must be returned so as to be received at the office of the Civil

Service Commissioners on or before May 31 in the year in which the Examination is to be held.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the

following announcements:-

(i.) Selected Candidates will be allotted to the various Provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the Public Service will rank before every other consideration.

An allowance amounting to £100 will be given to all Candidates who pass their probation at one of an allowance amounting to £100 will be given to all Candidates who pass their probation at one of the Universities or Colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State, viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrew's, and Aberdeen; Victoria University. Manchester; University College, London; and King's College, London; provided such Candidates shall have passed the Final Examination to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners, and shall have conducted themselves well and complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of Selected Candidates. The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same Institution. Migration will not be permitted except for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State

(iii.) The allowance of £100 will not be paid to any Selected Candidate until he has been certified by the Civil Service Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India; and every Certificated Candidate must, before receiving his allowance, give a written undertaking to refund

the amount in the event of his failing to proceed to India.

(iv.) All Candidates obtaining Certificates will be also required to enter into covenants, by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force they may be required to make towards their own pensions or for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on these covenants amount to £1.

(v.) The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the Selected Candidates will be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the combined marks of the Open

Competitive and Final Examinations.

(vi.) Selected Candidates will be required to report their arrival in India within such period after the

grant of their Certificate of Qualification as the Secretary of State may in each case direct.

(vii.) Candidates rejected at the Final Examination held in any year will in no case be allowed to present themselves for re-examination.

Prose—Bacon, Sir Thomas Browne, Milton, Cowley, Bunyan, Dryden, Swift, Defoe, Addison, Johnson Burke, Scott, Macaulay (Essays and Biographies).

minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not be looked for in this part of the Examination which will, however, test how far the Candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers in themselves, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English literature. Candidates will also be expected to show that they have studied in these authors the history of the English language in respect of its vocabulary, syntax, and prosody.

The other part of the Examination will relate to one of the periods named below, which will follow each other

Every Candidate born in the United Kingdom should produce a certificate from the Registrar-General of Births, Marriages, and Deaths, or from one of his provincial officers. This certificate may be obtained from the Registrar-General in London, Dublin, or Edinburgh, or from the Superintendent Registrar of the District in which the birth took place.

II. A candidate born of European parents in India may produce a certificate of baptism from the district in which he was baptised. If this does not also mention the date of birth it should be accompanied by a statutory declaration by one of the candidate's parents, stating the date and place of birth.
