Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do hereby direct and appoint that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall commence to be holden at Badulla on Monday, the 8th day of January, 1894.

SIR,—I am desired to inform you that the Secretary of State has had under his consideration a representation made by the Governor as to the serious loss suffered by the Public Service of Ceylon through the diminished value of the rupee, and also the recent decision of the Indian Government with regard to the grant of compensation for fall in exchange to all Europeans and Eurasian Officers of that Government not domiciled in India. His Lordship observes that it may be urged that the permanent residents in and natives of Ceylon are becoming more and more accustomed to use imported articles, and that they are, therefore, more and more affected by the fall of exchange. Still His Lordship cannot admit that their position can be identified with that of European Officers domiciled outside Ceylon; nor can he, as at present advised, feel in any way justified in throwing upon the Colonial Treasury the additional burden which would be involved in extending the principle of compensation for loss of exchange to the whole Government service of the Island. The Indian Government has provided only for the case of Officers not domiciled in India. Similarly, the Secretary of State is of opinion that whatever decision may now be taken should apply only to Officers not domiciled in Ceylon. Confining then his suggestions to the case of Officers not domiciled in Ceylon, His Lordship has expressed his readiness to sanction the following proposals, if they are adopted by the Legislative Council, and accepted by the Officers to whom they are intended to apply, that—

(a) All Officers not domiciled in Ceylon who shall be appointed to the Public Service of the Colony from and after (say) the 1st of January, 1894, shall receive their leave salary and pension at 1s. 6d. the rupee, and shall be paid, while on service, up to half their salaries at the same rate, provided that the compensation allowance—i.e., the difference between half salary 1s. 6d. and half salary at the market rate of exchange—shall not be pensionable.

(b) All Officers at present in the Service who do not now enjoy the privilege of family remittance but who are entitled to leave salary and pension at 1s. 10½d. the rupee, shall in future continue to be entitled, to pension at 1s. 10½d. the rupee, but shall receive leave salary only at the rate of 1s. 6d. the rupee, and, on the other hand, shall be paid up to half salary, while on service, at the rate of 1s. 6d. the rupee; such compensation allowance not to be pensionable.

(c) All Officers who now enjoy remittance privileges for family purposes, and whose interests would therefore be injuriously affected by the proposed change, shall remain untouched.

2. I am therefore to request you to state, with as little delay as possible, and before the end of next month at latest, whether you consider yourself to be domiciled outside Ceylon; and, if so, whether you are disposed to accept the proposals now made by the Secretary of State.

PASSED ORDINANCES.

Ordinance enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof.

An Ordinance to amend "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinances, 1861 and 1888."

No. 3 of 1893.

A. E. HAVELOCK.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinances, 1861 and 1888": Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1893."

Ordinance to be construed as one with Ordinances No. 4 of 1861 and No. 6 of 1888.

2 The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1861, is hereafter referred to as "The principal Ordinance," and the principal Ordinance, "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1888," and this Ordinance shall be read as one Ordinance, and may be cited for all purposes as "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1861, 1888, and 1893"; and the expression "this Ordinance" in the principal Ordinance, and any expression referring to the principal Ordinance which occurs in any Ordinance or other document, shall be construed to mean the principal Ordinance as amended by "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1888," and this Ordinance.

Commencement of Ordinance.

3 This Ordinance shall come into force on the first day of January, 1894, which date is hereinafter referred to as the commencement of this Ordinance.

Section 8 amended.

4 In section 8 of the principal Ordinance for the words "such first-mentioned company may" shall be substituted the words "such first-mentioned company shall."

Power of Company to change name.

5 After section 8 of the principal Ordinance the following section shall be added and numbered 8 (a), namely:—

"Any company with the sanction of a special resolution of the company passed in manner hereinafter mentioned, and with the approval of the Governor, testified in writing under the hand of the Colonial Secretary or of one of the Assistant Colonial Secretaries, may change its name, and upon such change being made the registrar shall enter the new name in the register in the place of the former name, and shall issue a certificate of incorporation altered to meet the circumstances of the case; but no such alteration of name shall affect any rights or obligations of the company, or render defective any legal proceedings instituted or to be instituted by or against the company, and any legal proceedings may be continued or commenced against the company by its new name that might have been continued or commenced against the company by its former name."

Section 21 amended.

6 To section 21 of the principal Ordinance the following words shall be added, namely:—

"And every director or manager of the company who shall knowingly and wilfully authorise or permit a contravention of this section shall incur the like penalty."

Section 26 amended.

7 To section 26 of the principal Ordinance the following words shall be added, namely:—

"And every director and manager of the company who shall knowingly authorise or permit such refusal shall incur the like penalty."

Section 34
amended.

8 To section 34 of the principal Ordinance the following words shall be added, namely :—

“And if any company make default in forwarding a copy of the memorandum of association, if any, to a member in pursuance of this section, the company so making default shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding ten rupees.”

Section 47
amended

9 In section 47 of the principal Ordinance for the words “one month” shall be substituted the words “fourteen days,” and for the words “three months” shall be substituted the words “two months.”

Section 63
amended.

10 For section 63 of the principal Ordinance the following shall be substituted, namely :—

Service of notice
on company and
registrar.

“Any summons or notice requiring to be served upon the company may, except in cases where a particular mode of service is directed, be served by leaving the same with any director, secretary, or other principal officer of the company at their registered office, or by sending it through the post by letter addressed to such company, and any notice to the registrar may be served by sending it to him through the post by letter, or by delivering it to him, or by leaving it for him at his office.”

Wages and
salaries to be a
claim.

11 (1) In the distribution of the assets of any company being wound up under the principal Ordinance, there shall be paid in priority to other debts—

(a) all wages or salary of any clerk or servant in respect of service rendered to the company during four months before the commencement of the winding up, not exceeding five hundred rupees ; and

(b) all wages of any labourers or workmen in respect of service rendered to the company during two months before the commencement of the winding up.

Such claims to
rank equally.

(2) The foregoing debts shall rank equally among themselves, and shall be paid in full, unless the assets of the company are insufficient to meet them, in which case they shall abate in equal proportions between themselves.

Liquidators to
discharge same
upon receipt of
sufficient assets.

(3) Subject to the retention of such sums as may be necessary for the cost of administration or otherwise the liquidator or liquidators or official liquidator shall discharge the foregoing debts forthwith, so far as the assets of the company are and will be sufficient to meet them, as and when such assets come into the hands of such liquidator or liquidators or official liquidator.

Prospectus, &c.,
to specify dates
and names of
parties to any
contract made
prior to issue of
such prospectus,
&c.

12 Every prospectus of a company, and every notice inviting persons to subscribe for shares in any joint stock company, shall specify the dates and the names of the parties to any contract entered into by the company, or the promoters, directors, or trustees thereof before the issue of such prospectus or notice, whether subject to adoption by the directors, or the company, or otherwise, and any prospectus or notice not specifying the same shall be deemed fraudulent on the part of the promoters, directors, and officers of the company knowingly issuing the same, as regards any person taking shares in the company on the faith of such prospectus unless he shall have had notice of such contract. And any promoter, director, or officer of a company who shall issue any such prospectus or notice contrary to the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an offence, and be punished with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to twelve months, and with a fine not exceeding five thousand rupees.

Penalty for
breach.

Register of
mortgages.

13 Every limited company under the principal Ordinance shall keep a register of all mortgages and charges specifically affecting property of the company, and shall enter in such register in respect of each mortgage, or charge, a short descrip-

tion of the property mortgaged or charged, the amount of charge created, and the names of the mortgagees or persons entitled to such charge; if any property of the company is mortgaged or charged without such entry as aforesaid being made every director, manager, or other officer of the company who knowingly and wilfully authorises or permits the omission of such entry shall incur a penalty not exceeding five hundred rupees. The register of mortgages required by this section shall be open to inspection by any creditor or member of the company at all reasonable times, and if such inspection is refused, any officer of the company refusing the same, and every director and manager of the company authorising or knowingly and wilfully permitting such refusal, shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty rupees, and a further penalty not exceeding twenty rupees for every day during which such refusal continues, and in addition to the above penalty any district judge, in the case of companies subject to his jurisdiction, may by order compel an immediate inspection of the register.

Power of
company to alter
objects subject
to confirmation
by court.

14 (1) Subject to the provisions hereinafter mentioned a company registered under the principal Ordinance may, by special resolution, alter the provisions of its memorandum of association with respect to the objects of the company, but in no case shall any such alteration take effect until confirmed on petition by the court which has jurisdiction to make an order for winding up the company.

(2) Before confirming any such alteration the court must be satisfied—

(a) That sufficient notice has been given to every holder of debentures or debenture stock of the company, and any person or class of persons whose interests will, in the opinion of the court, be affected by the alteration; and

(b) That with respect to every creditor who, in the opinion of the court is entitled to object, and who signifies his objection in manner directed by the court, either his consent to the alteration has been obtained or his debt or claim has been discharged, or has determined, or has been secured to the satisfaction of the court. Provided that the court may, in the case of any person or class of persons, for special reasons dispense with the notice required by this section.

(3) An order confirming any such alteration may be made on such terms and subject to such conditions as to the court seems fit, and the court may make such orders as to costs as it deems proper.

(4) The court shall, in exercising its discretion under this Ordinance, have regard to the rights and interests of the members of the company, or of any class of those members, as well as to the rights and interests of the creditors, and may, if it thinks fit, adjourn the proceedings in order that an arrangement may be made to the satisfaction of the court for the purchase of the interests of dissentient members; and the court may give such directions and make such orders as it may think expedient for the purpose of facilitating any such arrangement or carrying the same into effect: Provided always that it shall not be lawful to expend any part of the capital of the company in any such purchase.

(5) The court may confirm, either wholly or in part, any such alteration as aforesaid with respect to the objects of the company if it appears that the alteration is required in order to enable the company—

- (a) To carry on its business more economically or more efficiently; or
- (b) To attain its main purpose by new or improved means; or
- (c) To enlarge or change the local area of its operations; or

- (d) To carry on some business or businesses which under existing circumstances may conveniently or advantageously be combined with the business of the company ; or
- (e) To restrict or abandon any of the objects specified in the memorandum of association.

Registration of order together with memorandum as altered, and consequences thereof.

15 (1) Where a company has altered the provisions of its memorandum of association with respect to the objects of the company, and such alteration has been confirmed by the court, an office copy of the order confirming such alteration, together with a printed copy of the memorandum of association, shall be delivered by the company to the registrar of joint stock companies within fifteen days from the date of the order, and the registrar shall register the same and shall certify under his hand the registration thereof, and his certificate shall be conclusive evidence that all the requisitions of this Ordinance, with respect to such alteration and the confirmation thereof, have been complied with, and thenceforth (but subject to the provisions of this Ordinance) the memorandum so altered shall be the memorandum of association, and shall apply to the company in the same manner as if the company were a company registered under the principal Ordinance with such memorandum.

(2) If a company makes default in delivering to the registrar any document required by this section to be delivered to him, the company shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred rupees for every day during which it is in default.

Penalties to be recoverable at the suit of the registrar in the court of requests, Colombo.

16 All penalties imposed by and recoverable under this or the principal Ordinance shall be deemed and taken to be a debt to Her Majesty of the party, parties, or company liable to pay the same, and shall and may, whatever may be the amount claimed, be sued for and recovered by the registrar on behalf of Her Majesty in the court of requests, Colombo.

An Ordinance to ensure the supervision and safe transit of Goods, Produce, and Merchandise from one part of this Island to another.

No. 4 of 1893.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make further provision for the supervision and safe transit of goods, produce, and merchandise from one part of this Island to another: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

To provide for security of goods, &c., in transit, Governor and Executive Council may authorize fees to be levied at certain places.

1 Whenever it shall be deemed advisable by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, that along any particular public road, river, or canal of this Island, goods, produce, or merchandise conveyed in carts or boats should be supervised and protected, the Governor, with the advice of such Council, may by Proclamation authorize at any particular place or places, along such road, river, or canal, the levy of a fee for the purposes of defraying the expenses

of the protection and supervision of goods, produce, and merchandise as aforesaid, and may fix the amount of the fee to be so levied; provided that the same shall not exceed 50 cents for each cart, and provided that whenever a fee shall be authorized to be so levied the same shall be notified in the *Government Gazette* not less than fourteen days previously to the date on which such fee shall become leviable.

Fees so paid to be expended on cost of supervision on road, &c., where levied.

2 All moneys which may be collected under this Ordinance shall be expended in defraying the cost of the police and other incidental expenses along the road, river, or canal on which such fee or fees may be levied, but for no other purpose whatsoever.

Term "cart" only to include carts plying for hire, and not coaches, carriages, and hackeries.

3 The term "cart" in this Ordinance means a cart conveying goods, produce, or merchandise, but shall not include a carriage, coach, or hackery.

Powers of the Governor in Executive Council to revoke and amend any Proclamation issued under section 1.

4 (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*—

(a) to revoke any Proclamation issued under section 1, and upon such revocation this Ordinance shall cease to have any effect along such road, river, or canal described in such Proclamation; or

(b) to exempt from the operation of this Ordinance any portion or portions of any road, river, or canal described in any Proclamation issued under section 1;

(c) to alter the particular place or places or the fee fixed by any Proclamation issued under section 1.

(2) The Governor, with the like advice, may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* re-issue any Proclamation revoked under sub-section (a) or alter, modify, or revoke any exemptions or alterations made under sub-section (b) or (c).

Preamble.

WHEREAS the Bishop of Colombo, the Colonial Secretary, and the Government Agent of the Western Province are the trustees of the Episcopal Church situated in St. Paul's road, Colombo, and commonly known as the Church of St. Paul:

And whereas the said church and surrounding ground belonging thereto are vested in the said Bishop of Colombo, Colonial Secretary, and Government Agent of the Western Province, and their successors in office as trustees of the said church:

And whereas a portion of land surrounding the said church is required by the municipal council of Colombo for the improvement and alteration of the roads and drains near the said church, and it is necessary and expedient that the trustees aforesaid should be empowered to transfer to the said municipal council a portion of the said ground: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Trustees

Colombo.

1 It shall be lawful for the Bishop of Colombo, the Colonial Secretary, and the Government Agent of the Western Province, as trustees of the said church of St. Paul, Colombo, or their successors as such trustees, by writing under their hands or under the hands of any two of them, of which two the Bishop of Colombo shall be one, to transfer to the municipal council of Colombo, either by sale or exchange, any portion of the land surrounding the said church as to such trustees may seem fit, and to apply to the purposes of their trust, and to no other purpose, any land, money, or other property which may come into their hands as the proceeds of such sale or exchange.

Short title.

2 This Ordinance may be cited as "The St. Paul's Church Land Ordinance, 1893."

DRAFT ORDINANCES.

MINUTE.

The following Draft of a proposed Ordinance is published for general information :—

An Ordinance relating to the wearing and carrying of Knives.

Preamble.

WHEREAS the practice of wearing and carrying knives upon the person affords facilities for the infliction of dangerous wounds upon any sudden quarrel or provocation, and it has been established that a large proportion of the homicidal crime which has occurred in the Island within recent years has been committed by the use of the knife : And whereas it is expedient, for the prevention of such crime, to restrict the practice aforesaid : Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

Commencement.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “The Prevention of Crime Ordinance, 189 ”; and it shall come into operation in such provinces, districts, or places, and at such time as the Governor in Executive Council shall appoint by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*. Provided that at least one month’s notice of such time shall be given in the province, district, or place described in such Proclamation, in such manner as the Governor shall in each case determine.

Definition.

2 In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Knife ” shall mean any knife with which a stabbing wound can be inflicted, but shall not include a knife which is commonly known as a penknife.

Powers of the Governor in Executive Council.

3 (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor, in Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*—

- (a) to revoke any Proclamation issued under section 1, and upon such revocation this Ordinance shall cease to have any effect in the province, district, or place described in such revoked Proclamation; or
- (b) to exempt from the operation of this Ordinance any portion or portions (to be defined) of any province, district, or place to which this Ordinance applies; or
- (c) to exempt, with or without conditions, any particular class or classes of persons residing in any province, district, or place to which this Ordinance applies; or
- (d) to exempt, with or without conditions, any person or class of persons carrying on, engaged in, or employed in any profession, trade, business, manufacture, or occupation, whether agricultural or otherwise, from the provisions of this Ordinance.

(2) The Governor in Executive Council may, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, reissue any Proclamation revoked under sub-section (a), or alter, modify, or revoke any exemptions made under sub-sections (b), (c), or (d).

Offence.

4 From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance in any province, district, or place, it shall not be lawful for any person therein to wear or carry upon his person a knife elsewhere than in a dwelling-house or the curtilage thereof.

Provided always that this section shall not apply—

- (a) to any public servant as defined in section 19 of the Ceylon Penal Code; or
- (b) to any person in the naval, military, or volunteer service of Her Majesty.

Penalty.	5 (1) Whoever, in contravention of the last preceding section, shall wear or carry upon his person a knife, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall, upon a first conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding ten rupees, and upon every subsequent conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, or to simple or rigorous imprisonment not exceeding three months.
Forfeiture.	(2) The police magistrate who convicts the offender shall declare the knife in respect of which the offence has been committed to be forfeited, and shall cause such knife to be destroyed.
Share of fine to informer.	(3) A police magistrate imposing a fine under this Ordinance may award to an informer any portion, not exceeding a moiety thereof, which may be actually recovered.
Arrest of offender and seizure of knife worn or carried.	6 It shall be lawful for every police officer or headman, and they are hereby required, to arrest, with or without a warrant, any person committing an offence under this Ordinance, and to seize any knife which such person, in contravention of this Ordinance, shall be wearing or carrying upon his person, and to produce such person and knife before the nearest police magistrate to be dealt with according to law.
Security to keep the peace.	7 (1) If a person is convicted of a breach of section 4, the police magistrate may, in lieu of or in addition to any penalty which he may impose under this Ordinance, order the offender to execute a bond, with or without sureties, for a sum fixed with due regard to the circumstances of the case, and not being excessive, for keeping the peace during a period not exceeding six months.
Proviso.	Provided that where the offender is a minor, the bond shall be executed only by his sureties.
Proviso.	Provided also that if the conviction is set aside, on appeal or otherwise, the bond so executed shall become void.
Certain provisions of the Criminal Procedure Code to apply.	(2) The provisions of the Criminal Procedure Code, 1883, relating to proceedings subsequent to an order to furnish security to keep the peace, and to the procedure on forfeiture of bonds, shall, <i>mutatis mutandis</i> , apply to every order made and every bond executed under this section.
Onus of proof.	8 In any prosecution for a breach of section 4, it shall lie upon the defendant to prove that he is a person not incurring a penalty for such breach by virtue of the proviso to the said section, or by virtue of any exemption proclaimed under sub-sections (c) or (d) of section 3.
Village tribunals may try cases of first offence.	9 In the case of a first offence against the provisions of this Ordinance, it shall be lawful for any village tribunal, within the limits of whose jurisdiction such offence is committed, to try the offender, and to exercise each and every of the powers which a police magistrate may in the like case exercise, anything in "The Village Communities Ordinance, 1889," to the contrary notwithstanding.
Proviso.	Provided that in no case shall a village tribunal order any offender to execute a bond for keeping the peace.
Repealing Ordinance No. 19 of 1890.	10 From and after the passing of this Ordinance the Ordinance No. 19 of 1890, intituled "An Ordinance relating to the wearing and carrying of Knives," shall be and the same is hereby repealed.

An Ordinance to amend "The Ceylon Court of Admiralty Ordinance, 1891."

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend "The Ceylon Court of Admiralty Ordinance, 1891," hereinafter referred to as the principal Ordinance: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

To be read with principal Ordinance No. 2 of 1891.
Short title.

1 This Ordinance shall be read as one with the principal Ordinance, and may be cited as "The Ceylon Court of Admiralty Ordinance, 1893," and this Ordinance and the principal Ordinance may be cited collectively as "The Ceylon Court of Admiralty Ordinances, 1891 and 1893."

Section 22 of Ordinance No. 2 of 1891 amended.

2 For section 22 of the principal Ordinance the following section shall be substituted, namely :—

Rules of court.

(1) Rules of court for regulating the procedure and practice (including fees and costs) in the colonial court of admiralty and district courts in the exercise of the jurisdiction conferred by this Ordinance, whether original or appellate, may be made by the judges of the Supreme Court or any two of them, of whom the chief justice shall be one, and in the same manner as general rules and orders may be made under the provisions of section 53 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889."

Provided that the rules under this section shall not extend to matters relating to the slave trade, and shall not (unless otherwise ordered by Her Majesty in Council) come into operation until they have been approved by Her Majesty in Council, but on coming into operation shall have full effect as if enacted in this Ordinance; and any enactment inconsistent therewith shall, so far as it is so inconsistent, be repealed.

(2) The rules made under this section may provide for the exercise of any jurisdiction conferred by this Ordinance on the colonial court of admiralty by the full court or by any judge or judges thereof, and subject to any rules any judge of the Supreme Court may exercise in all actions, causes, and matters which come before such court sitting as a court of first instance, and not as a court of appeal, all or any part of the jurisdiction by this Ordinance conferred or intended to be conferred on the Supreme Court.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held at the Municipal Office on August 26, 1893, at 1.45 p.m.

Present.—The Chairman; Dr. W. Dias; W. E. de Vos, Esq.; W. Abeyesundara, Esq.; and N. Dias Abeyesinha, Esq.

1. Read and confirmed Minutes of last Meeting.
2. Submitted the following letters and petitions complaining of the quality of the water supplied from the Bikke reservoir and objecting to the levying of the water-rate from July 1, 1893 :—

The Chairman informed the meeting that he had acknowledged receipt of letter from Government stating that he was unable to report on the petition, the question of the Galle water supply being again before Mr. Ewart, the Chief Engineer, Colombo Waterworks, and that the recovery of the water-rate has been suspended until a reply is received from Mr. Ewart and a decision come to by the Council.

The reply of Mr. Ewart, dated August 9, 1893, was laid on the table.

Resolved,—That the question of levying the water rate be deferred consideration to next meeting.

3. Submitted letter from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, dated July 1, 1893, No. 19, with previous correspondence on the subject, relative to the interest due on the Waterworks loan.

The Chairman informed the meeting that he had replied to this letter, setting forth in detail the present depressed state of the Council's finances, and the utter inability of the Council to meet the demand for payment of interest before the levying of the water-rate, and requesting that the demand be suspended to the end of the year.

The reply of Government to this application, dated August 8, 1893, letter No. 26, was laid on the table.

Resolved,—That consideration of the correspondence be deferred to next meeting.

4. Submitted a letter from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary (No. 27 of August 9, 1893), transmitting for the information of the Municipal Council, and for any remarks they may wish to offer, copy of a draft Ordinance entitled "The Municipal Cemeteries Ordinance."

Resolved,—That Government be reminded, with reference to clause 2 of the Ordinance, that the Government has already promised to provide land for a general cemetery and to enclose it with a wall.

5. Read letter No. 24 of July 15, 1893, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, intimating that His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor has been pleased, with the advice of the Executive Council, to approve of the rules relating to pensions to officers of the Colombo Municipality being applied to the Municipality of Galle.

6. Submitted copy of a letter from the Colonial Secretary to the Government Agent, Southern Province, forwarded to the Chairman for his information, directing that official to take order for the acquisition of the land at Pettigalawatta, required for opening a road between the Matara and Talapitiya roads.

The Chairman informed the meeting that he had written to the Government Agent requesting him to defer the acquisition of the land, the funds of the Municipality not admitting payment being made just now for it.

Resolved,—That the action of the Chairman be approved.

7. Submitted letter from the Council's Proctor reporting that cases instituted on behalf of the Council against persons who occupied the green market after 9 P.M. were dismissed by the Magistrate.

Resolved,—That the by-law, chapter XVIII., section 22, sub-section 6, be amended by the introduction of the words "sleep in or otherwise occupy" after the word "use" in the first line.

8. The Chairman submitted the following by-law for the approval of Council :—

Chapter XVII., 17.—No person shall slaughter any pig the flesh of which is intended for sale, unless he shall have obtained a special license from the Council, which license shall not be granted until the animal to be slaughtered shall have been inspected by an officer of the Council authorized to do so, and approved by him. Any person obtaining such special license shall not slaughter except at the time and place named in such license and under the conditions therein set forth. It shall be lawful to the Council to levy a fee of 25 cents on every such special license issued by them.

Resolved,—That the by-law be approved and forwarded for confirmation by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

9. Submitted the following recommendations of the Standing Committee :—

"Recommended,—That to meet the existing deficiency in the vote for scavenging, the following transfers be made : from Working Latrines to Scavenging Rs. 80, and from Lighting to Scavenging Rs. 200.

"Recommended,—That the vote of Rs. 100 under head Refund be transferred to the head Contingencies."

Resolved,—That the recommendations be approved.

10. Submitted accounts for the month of July, 1893.

11. Submitted Superintendent's reports for July, 1893.

12. Submitted Sanitary Officer's report for second quarter, 1893.

Sanitary Officer's Report for the Quarter ended June 30, 1893.

General Health.—The epidemic of smallpox mentioned in the last report continued in different parts during April, amounting to about ten cases during the month. Chickenpox was prevailing in the different wards throughout the quarter. Influenza made its appearance early in April and continued its ravages in every ward, whole families being laid up at once, and resulting in many deaths from its commonest complication, pneumonia. There were three cases of fever of a typho-malarial type in one house in Pedlar street, and a few other cases in other parts of the Fort, due to emanations from foul cesspits and bad drainage. There were some cases of malarial and typhoid fever in Magalla, in the neighbourhood of the canals, which are a constant danger to the public health. There have been some cases of dysentery in the Fort, China Garden, Kaluwella, and Minuangoda, most of which were due to the ingestion of unripe fruits and other indigestible matter.

Ward No. 1.—I cannot too strongly urge on the importance of improving the drainage of the Fort, which is at present in a very unsatisfactory state. The drains should be cemented ones of an oval shape and with a proper fall (at least $\frac{1}{4}$ in. to a foot), communicating at each junction with the main drain, which should be a cemented one with a proper fall to ensure efficient flushing. Brick drains and those with an earthy bottom have the following defects:—

- (1) A tendency to deposition of putrescible matter and liability to choking.
- (2) A retarding of the current of water—hence the necessity of a greater fall—wastage of water, and insufficiency of drainage.
- (3) Impregnation of the surrounding soil with water charged with putrescible animal and vegetable matter and germs of disease. This renders the ground foul and damp and pollutes the atmosphere. This is the cause of dampness and sickness in most houses.

The house drains carrying slop waters discharge into the side drains, and in some houses there is a drain from the privy communicating with the side drain to carry away the urine and slop waters. The condition of the side drains with earthy bottoms, which are saturated with putrescible organic matter, will be rendered intolerable with the constant flow of water from the standpipes.

The main sewers require regular flushing, and this is easily effected if they are cemented with a proper fall (about half an inch or more to a foot), having an oval shape, and communicating at each street junction with the side drains. The line of junction should be that of a curve or an obtuse angle, as a perpendicular junction is apt to produce a deposit. Then the water used for flushing the side drains will suffice to keep the central drain also clean, and with each shower the sewers will be efficiently flushed.

This arrangement of sewers and drains will prevent (1) the impregnation of the surrounding soil, basements of houses, and neighbouring wells with animal and vegetable organic matter and germs of disease; (2) the escape of noxious gases and germs of disease into bedrooms, &c., through communications established by rats which always abound in these dirty sewers.

The dangers from foul cesspits are much greater than those from the present drainage system. The Fort soil is impregnated with human excreta, and if one considers the present condition of these cesspits (some of them being without cemented bottoms, and those cemented, too, having cracks, &c., through which there is a constant leakage, having received from time to time discharges from patients suffering from typhoid fever, dysentery, and other communicable diseases, without proper disinfection, and with no disinfection whatever in the majority of cases) he will be surprised that things are not much worse than they really are at present. These cesspits pollute not only the soil, but the air and water also; each of these is a sufficient source for the propagation of disease.

The sea breeze with which the Fort is blessed dilutes and renders inert most of the impurities which pollute the atmosphere, but the dangers from the other two sources will be on the increase. In houses with back doors, where it is practicable, the dry-earth system should be enforced, and those abominable cesspits closed up. The more intelligent classes should be too glad to adopt this system when they understand the risks they put up with.

Where the dry-earth system cannot be adopted the periodical removal of cesspit contents should be enforced, and the Municipal Inspector should in each case satisfy himself that the cesspit is properly cemented and free from cracks. The periodical examination of cesspits, which is one of the most important duties of a Sanitary Inspector, I am sorry to remark, is very much neglected. I have seen several cases of typhoid and malarial fever due to emanations from these foul cesspits, which contain the germs of various communicable diseases.

In Parawa, Chando, Moderbay, and other small streets the drains are used as latrines by children, and big folks as well under cover of night. This, I suppose, is owing to want of latrine accommodation. Such huts, which are generally examples of overcrowding, should be pulled down. The Inspector should in such cases keep watch and bring the offenders to justice.

The market requires some repairs.

Ward No. 2.—There are some waste lands in Cotton Garden, Walawwe Godella, Talbot Town, China Garden, and below the Roman Catholic Church, which are overgrown with low jungle and noisome vegetation. These lands are used by the people as latrines, and they are in a condition very injurious to the public health. The jungle and vegetation should be cleared from these lands, and a constable should be kept to detect the offenders. There are some stagnant pools of foul water in Cotton Garden and Walawwe Godella, which should be drained and filled up.

The latrine system in this as well as other wards is not at all satisfactory. I have invariably found the latrines emitting an intolerable smell, and I often wondered how people who use these latrines bear up the smell even for a few minutes. Surely this cannot be an attraction or inducement for the people to use them, and I have no doubt that if these latrines can be kept in a better state the people will take to them very soon without committing a nuisance elsewhere.

The chief cause of the stench from these latrines is the want of a proper cemented drain round the latrine to receive and carry away the washings, which, highly impregnated with urine and faecal matter, percolate into the surrounding soil and pollute the atmosphere.

The neighbourhood of these latrines is generally found covered with human excreta in different stages of decomposition and giving off foul smells. This is a proof of insufficiency of latrine accommodation, as otherwise people would not take the trouble to come so far.

The smell is, to a great extent, due to the carelessness or ignorance of those using them. Instead of using dry-earth to keep off the smell they wash into the tubs, and that, together with the careless habit of dirtying the floor and seats, creates an intolerable smell. The coolies, I believe, do not wash the seats and floor properly.

To prevent this nuisance from latrines and waste land I have to suggest—

- (1) To put up notices in each of these waste lands warning the people who commit the nuisances.
- (2) To employ a constable to detect the offenders.
- (3) To clear the jungle which affords a shelter for the offenders to commit a nuisance.
- (4) To have the stagnant pools in Cotton Garden, &c., filled up.
- (5) To put up a notice at each latrine entrance warning those who wilfully dirty the seat, the floor, and the surroundings; a few hints to observe cleanliness and the proper use of the latrine; and order the latrine coolly to watch any such transgression.
- (6) To provide cemented drains for the latrines.
- (7) To order the overseer and Inspector to see that the latrines are washed properly every night so as to be free from smells.
- (8) To construct another latrine on the dry-earth system in Cotton Garden near the cemetery, as I believe that insufficiency of latrine accommodation compels people to use the ground, and besides it is proper to have separate latrines for men and women. The latrine in Cotton Garden is used by women only.
- (9) To order the Inspector to make a list of houses with and without room for latrine accommodation, and to serve notices on the owners to build latrines where there is room. When a list of houses without room for latrine accommodation is submitted, it can be determined where a latrine for the common use of the inmates of a group of houses can be put up.

Most of the drains in China Garden are used as latrines, and the only remedy is to see that every house or group of houses has a latrine.

The drainage of this ward is not at all satisfactory, and most of the drains are built without a proper fall.

The China Garden large drain has no proper fall, and after a heavy shower the whole place gets inundated. This requires attention. China Garden road drains require repairs in some places.

The Bope walk drains require repairs very badly. These drains should be cemented.

The Wakwella road drain from the police station to the cattle pound is very much neglected. A cemented drain here will greatly help the drainage of this part.

The new ice-house road drains require repairs, and the one opposite the ice-house should be continued to the cemetery corner at least with cement, as it is the road that acts as a drain for this part.

The meat market deep drain between the Matara and Seabeach roads is in a very bad state, and always stinks from the lodgment of putrescible matter. It should be well cemented.

The drain round the green market requires cementing in some places.

The new street (behind the green market) drains require repairs very badly. They should be cemented, as they cannot be kept clean otherwise.

The Kaluwella side drains require repairs. This should be done by the Public Works Department.

The drain from the Kaluwella Chetty Kittangi to the sea requires regular flushing, as it stinks badly at times.

Ward No. 3.—The greatest nuisance in this ward is the Pettigala-ela. It receives discharges from the large cemented drain running past the latrine, and another large drain from Hirimbure road, which is not a cemented one. Both these drains are used as latrines, and are in a most objectionable state, which only those who happen to pass that road and peep into these drains can realize. It is more appropriate to call them open sewers. I have also seen human excreta being washed from the house drains into these, and the water closets communicate with these drains. One can now easily imagine what will be the conditions of these drains and the ela. This is the most insidious part in this ward, and requires immediate attention. In cases of typhoid fever, dysentery, and other communicable diseases the discharge will, in the usual manner, be thrown into these drains, and what will be the consequence? The germs of various communicable diseases multiply with greater vigour than in any artificial preparation for the cultivation of these germs, and, combined with the generation of noxious gases which saturate the atmosphere, places the lives of those unfortunate people who pass by in great jeopardy. The effects are not only local, but remote too. This germ-impregnated water in its passage through the canal pollutes the atmosphere, the soil, and the wells in the neighbourhood, and propagate disease along its whole extent. To add to the mischief the water is invariably stagnant.

To mitigate this nuisance I shall suggest—

- (1) To keep a constable on watch to detect the offenders who commit the nuisance.
- (2) To shut up communication between the closets and the drains.
- (3) To put up notices warning those who commit the nuisance.
- (4) To cement the drain from Hirimbure road.
- (5) To build another large cemented drain along the other side of Pettigala road (from Matara road to the ela). This will improve the drainage of this part, which is at present very unsatisfactory.
- (6) And finally, to improve the drainage of the ela so as to prevent stagnation of the germ-impregnated water.

The drain opposite the cattle shed, at the junction of Matara and Pettigala-ela roads, is in a very objectionable state, on account of water stagnating and giving off an offensive smell. This part of the drain should be repaired by bringing the drain up to the proper level to prevent stagnation of the water and lodgment of putrescible matter. The cemented drain on this side of the Matara road, built by the Public Works Department, should be continued at least up to the second cattle shed, as I have invariably found the drain opposite this cattle shed in a very objectionable state, on account of the water from the well within this cattle shed being constantly discharged into the drain. The side drains along Matara road are kept very badly. Most of the lands in this ward are kept in a very bad state, the overgrowths of jungle and noisome vegetation not being removed; and the lands are used as latrines. There is plenty of room in all these places for latrine accommodation, and the owners should be served notice to build cesspit latrines with cemented bottoms. These owners are reluctant to clear the jungle, as it affords them a shelter to commit the nuisance.

Ward No. 4.—The swamps in Minuangoda, on either side of the road, are in a very objectionable state. This road is much patronized by ladies and gentlemen for evening drives, &c., and the atmosphere in the neighbourhood must be charged with noxious gases emanating from the stagnant water in the swamps. Some delicate constitutions that are used to better surroundings may be easily affected by a few inhalations of these noxious gases. These swamps being in a condition injurious to the public health, notices should be served on the owners to have them filled up, but no sweepings or other rubbish should be used for the purpose.

The drains in this road are very much neglected. They ought to be cleaned regularly at fixed intervals. In most places the drains are overgrown with jungle, &c., which form an obstruction to proper drainage, with the consequences that roads and lands are inundated during rainy weather. Most of the lands in this ward are in an unhealthy state, being overgrown with jungle and noisome vegetation. House refuse is thrown about in most gardens, instead of being burnt.

Ward No. 5.—In this ward also the drains require attention and regular cleansing. The lands are very much neglected; jungle and noisome vegetation and house refuse are left unremoved; and these lands are in a state injurious to public health. Most of the lands are used as latrines. Notices should be served on the owners to provide cesspit latrines with cemented bottoms.

Street sweeping was on the whole satisfactory. Scavenging was satisfactory. In Ward No. 3 the scavenging cart, I was given to understand, goes as far as Kachiwatta bridge only. Between this and the junction of Mátara with the Circular road the road side is thickly populated, and I think that the scavenging cart should go as far as the Circular road junction.

Slaughtering of Cattle.—The quality of the cattle in the pound was much better than during the last quarter. The custom of slaughtering pigs and selling pork without subjecting them to an examination is very objectionable. As a rule, every Saturday pigs are slaughtered in different wards. These animals are generally fed on human excreta and other unwholesome rubbish, and their flesh is in most instances diseased and unwholesome. They are more capable of communicating disease than cattle or goats. I received intimation by letter No. 133, dated April 17, 1893, to exercise a general supervision on the slaughtering of pigs, but hitherto I did not get a single opportunity to examine the pigs or the pork. Those who slaughter pigs do not give information to the Inspector. I believe on two or three occasions the Inspector of Ward No. 2 told me on a Friday that a pig would be slaughtered on Saturday morning, but on every occasion, the Inspector told me, that the pig was slaughtered early in the morning and the pork also sold before we could have gone at the arranged hour after passing cattle.

Those who slaughter pigs ought to take a license, and the Municipality should provide a separate pound and stalls. Otherwise, as pigs are slaughtered on the same day in different parts, they might show us a good pig and slaughter a bad one, as the Inspector cannot be present in several places at the same time. So our examination will do no good.

The Water Supply.—As desired by the Chairman, I visited the Bikke reservoir and inspected the surroundings. I have to make the following remarks and make some suggestions to meet the real and possible sources of pollution of the water.

The analyses of the water show a large quantity of organic matter in excess of what is generally considered safe. From the absence of nitrates and nitrites, and the small quantity of chlorides, it must be inferred that the organic matter is of vegetable origin and not derived from sewage contamination. Having a big forest all round, one can easily imagine the quantity of dead leaves and other vegetable matter that may be washed down the sides of the hill and ultimately lodge in the reservoir undergoing decomposition. This will account for the large excess of organic matter of vegetable origin. Besides the vegetable matter there is dangerous pollution from animals too. A forest of this size generally affords shelter for animals of various descriptions and birds. Their excreta, which collect about the place, will be washed down into the reservoir with the rain water. The carcasses of animals that die in the forest, in various stages of putrefaction, will taint the water, and these animals might die of communicable diseases, and the germs of such diseases might seriously pollute the water.

There has been a diversity of opinion as regards the quality of the water.

Dr. Fernando condemns the water of the ground that the amount of organic matter is over three times the amount generally considered safe in potable water.

Mr. Burnett says that the water is just within the limit of possible purity, but should be regarded with suspicion. If the water is an upland surface water, and the source chiefly vegetable, this will account for the large amount of ammonia and oxidisable organic matter. If the presence of the above can be thus accounted for, he considers the water fit for drinking purposes.

This water cannot be condemned solely on account of the excess of organic matter, which, however, is not due to sewage contamination, nor can it be passed as safe for drinking purposes on the assumption that the organic matter, although in excess, is of vegetable origin, and that the water is an upland surface water. Considering all these circumstances, as well as the sources of pollution, the water must be regarded with suspicion. Those who are used to drinking bad water may take this water without any ill-effects, but it might prove injurious to those who are used to good water and to those in a delicate state of health. There can be no question that impure water, like impure air, affects the health of individuals.

I have no doubt if the following suggestions are carried out the quality of the water will improve and the Municipality will be able to supply water safe for drinking purposes next year.

The forest, which is the source of pollution of the water, as explained above, should be cut down and cleared. This must be a thorough clearing, and weeding should be kept up regularly for a few months, when nothing but grass should be allowed to grow. This grass will not be a source of pollution, but will, on the other hand, act as a filtering and purifying medium for the water that flows towards the reservoir. With the forest we remove the sources of animal contamination as well.

The next step would be to prevent access to the catchment area by putting up a fence, or, preferably, a wall.

Thus we practically remove all sources of pollution of the water.

Unfortunately, in the temple we have a possible source of pollution. At present there is a drain along the boundary to carry away the surface water from the temple premises, thus minimizing the dangers from that source. This drain should however be a cemented one, and it is necessary to have a wall along the drain to entirely shut off communication with the temple, otherwise on festival days, when large numbers of people gather, a guard will be quite helpless in keeping off the trespassers who might commit a nuisance if they only get a chance. There ought to be a special guard to see that everything is right within the catchment area. The two cesspits in the temple should be properly cemented. There should be a special urinal on the opposite slope to be used on festival days.

The water in the reservoir should be let off to have the pipes well washed out. Before doing this, the Fort drains should be cemented. With this water the drains and sewers can be flushed.

Any water below the sluice should be pumped out and the bottom of the reservoir well cleared of all mud, dead leaves, &c. In the course of this cleansing, if it is a little deepened, some natural springs may be exposed.

Petitioner has reduced into possession, and has in his hands considerable assets amounting to Rs. 327,623.36 more or less belonging to the said firm of Alstons, Scott and Company, and further assets remain to be reduced into possession, and nearly all the creditors of the said firm have proved their claims in Ceylon in this matter.

11. By a deed No. 137 dated 17th and 19th August and 21st October, 1879, hereto annexed, marked C, entered into between said Hector Cross Buchanan and Frederic William Bois therein described as trading under the style or firm of Alstons, Scott and Company of the first part, and the said John Patrick Alston, Robert Findlay Alston, George Alston, and James Brown Alston therein described as the whole partners of the firm of Campbell, Rivers and Company of the second part, it was declared that the lands and securities mentioned and described in the said deed and held by the first party belonged to and were vested in the second party jointly with them in the shares and proportions which the said parties had under their respective deeds of partnership in the business of the said firms of Alstons, Scott and Com-

The said deed has not been registered, and certain of the assets reduced into possession by the petitioner as in paragraph ten thereof mentioned comprise the proceeds of the sales of certain of the lands mentioned and described in the aforesaid deed of the 17th and 19th August, and 21st October, 1879.

12. The petitioner believes that the respondents or some one or more of them claim to have an interest in the assets ingathered by the petitioner as aforesaid, and all other the assets in Ceylon of the firm of Alstons, Scott and Company.

13. Petitioner and all the creditors who have proved their claims as aforesaid in this matter are desirous of a distribution of the said assets, but petitioner is unable to declare any dividend owing to the absence of the respondents, and the difficulty of obtaining their consents thereto.

14. This state of things is detrimental to the interests of the creditors of the said firm of Alstons, Scott and Company, and embarrassing to the petitioner.

The petitioner therefore prays for an order of this court authorizing him to distribute in manner provided by the Ordinance No. 7 of 1853 the assets now in his hands and hereafter to be received by him and belonging to the said firm of Alstons Scott and Company, including all moneys received and to be received by the sale and realization of the lands and securities mentioned in the deed bearing No. 1877 dated 17th and 19th August and 21st October, 1879, amongst such of the creditors of the said firm as have proved debts in this matter in proportion to their respective debts, and that to such end an interlocutory order under section 377 of the Civil Procedure Code, 1889, be made appointing a day for the determination of the matter of this petition, and intimating that the respondents above-named will be heard in opposition to the petition if they appear before the court for that purpose on the day so appointed; and the petitioner further prays for his costs incurred in this behalf and for such further and other relief in the premises as to this court shall seem meet.
