DRAFT ORDINANCES.

MINUTE.

The following Draft of a proposed Ordinance is published for general information :—

An Ordinance relating to Arrack, Rum, and Toddy.

Preamble. WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Law relating to Arrack, Rum, and Toddy : Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

To be read as one with Ordinance No. 10 of 1844.

Commencement.

1 This Ordinance shall be read as one with the Ordinance No. 10 of 1844, hereinafter referred to as the principal Ordinance, and shall come into operation from and after such date as the Governor shall appoint by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*.

Repealing clause.

2 There shall be repealed as from the commencement of this Ordinance the Ordinances specified in schedule I. hereto. Provided that the repeal shall not affect—

- (a) the past operation of any enactment hereby repealed, nor anything duly done or suffered under any enactment hereby repealed ; nor
- (b) any right, liability, or obligation acquired, accrued, or incurred under any enactment hereby repealed ; nor
- (c) any penalty, forfeiture, or punishment incurred in respect of any offence committed against any enactment hereby repealed ; nor
- (d) any legal proceedings or remedy in respect of any such right, liability, obligation, penalty, forfeiture, or punishment as aforesaid.

When any unrepealed Ordinance incorporates or refers to any provisions of any Ordinance hereby repealed, such unrepealed Ordinance shall be deemed to incorporate or refer to the corresponding provisions of this Ordinance.

Interpretation.

3 In this Ordinance “district” means any one of the sub-divisions into which a government agent shall from time to time divide a province for the purpose of selling or assigning to any person the monopoly of retailing arrack and toddy, or either of them, within such sub-division.

“Licensed retail dealer” means the person who may have purchased the monopoly of retailing arrack and toddy, or either of them, in any district.

Government agent may withdraw distiller's license.

4 (1) If a licensed distiller, rectifier, or compounder shall be convicted of any offence mentioned in schedule II. hereto, or if any person be convicted of having committed any offence mentioned in schedule III. hereto in any building or premises used by any such distiller, rectifier, or compounder for distilling, rectifying, compounding, or storing spirits, it shall be lawful for the government agent, if he shall see fit so to do, to require the licensee by notice in writing to give up the license which shall have been issued to him, and upon such notice being personally served on such licensee or affixed to any part of the premises to which such license applies, such license shall be deemed and taken to be withdrawn, and shall be of no further force and effect.

(2) It shall be open to any person whose license shall be withdrawn by a government agent to apply to the Governor, who may confirm or reverse such withdrawal as to him, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall seem fit.

Section 11, as to

5 For section 11 of the principal Ordinance the following section shall be substituted, namely :—

(1) Every license for the distillation of spirits which shall be granted under this Ordinance shall be as near as is material in the form A in schedule IV. hereto, and shall be in force for the period specified therein, and shall bear a stamp, to be furnished by the licensee to the government agent before the issue of any such license, of one hundred rupees for each year or portion of a year during which such license is to run.

(2) Every such license shall ordinarily be issued for the period not exceeding twelve months specified therein, but it shall be in the discretion of the government agent to issue a license under this section for a period to be specified in the license exceeding twelve months but not exceeding years.

Section 14.
Distiller not to
sell less than
thirty-five
gallons of spirits,

6 For section 14 of the principal Ordinance the following section shall be substituted, namely :—

(1) Every licensed distiller, rectifier, or compounder, and every person in the management or superintendence of the trade or business of any licensed distiller, rectifier, or compounder, who shall sell or dispose of, or knowingly cause or permit to be sold or disposed of on his account, any spirits in a less quantity than thirty-five gallons at any one time, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall upon a first conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees, and upon every subsequent conviction to a fine not exceeding two hundred rupees, or to simple or rigorous imprisonment not exceeding six months, or to both.

(2) If the offender is a licensed distiller, rectifier, or compounder, the court before which he is convicted a second time shall, in addition to awarding any penalty or penalties authorised by this section, declare and adjudge any still, vessel, or utensil, together with any spirit or toddy found at the date of the offence on the premises in which he carried on his business, to be forfeited. All forfeitures may be sold or otherwise disposed of in such manner as the court may direct.

Section 20, as to
license to deal
wholesale in
spirits.

7 For section 20 of the principal Ordinance the following section shall be substituted, namely :—

(1) Every person who desires to obtain a license to deal by wholesale in spirits distilled from the produce of the cocconut or other description of palm or sugar-cane shall make an application in writing to that effect to the government agent of the province within which such wholesale dealing is to be carried on, containing a true and full description of the name and residence of the person making the same, and of the place, in which his storehouse or storehouses shall be situate.

(2) Such government agent shall within ten days after the receipt of such application, and of the stamp to be furnished by the licensee as hereinafter mentioned, issue to the applicant a license to deal in such spirits by wholesale as near as is material according to the form B in schedule IV. hereto. Provided that if any government agent shall have any just and reasonable grounds for so doing, it shall be lawful for him to refuse to issue such license. Every such refusal, together with the government agent's reasons therefor, shall be reported forthwith to the Governor, by whom such refusal shall and may be confirmed or reversed.

(3) Every license issued under the provisions of this section shall be in force for the period specified therein, and shall bear a stamp, to be furnished by the licensee to the government agent before the issue of any such license, of one hundred rupees for each year or portion of a year during which such license is to run, and shall entitle the licensee to have in his possession any quantity of such spirits lawfully purchased or distilled either for exportation or for sale by wholesale.

(4) Every such license shall ordinarily be issued for the period not exceeding twelve months specified therein, but it

shall be in the discretion of the government agent to issue a license under this section for a period to be specified in the license exceeding twelve months but not exceeding years.

Section 22
amended.

8 Section 22 of the principal Ordinance shall be taken and read as though the words "distiller, rectifier, compounder or" were inserted before the words "wholesale dealer," wherever the latter words occur in the said section.

Section 26, as to
retail of arrack
and rum.

9 For section 26 of the principal Ordinance the following shall be substituted, viz. :—

(1) No person shall sell or dispose of by retail, that is to say, in less quantity at any one time than thirty-five gallons, any spirit distilled from the produce of the cocoanut or other description of palm or of the sugar-cane, without having first obtained a license as near as is material according to the form C in schedule IV. hereto for that purpose from the government agent of the province in which such sale by retail is intended to be carried on, or unless he be acting for and by the authority and for the benefit of, and in conformity with the license granted to, such licensed retail dealer.

(2) It shall be lawful for the government agent of the province in which a license has been issued under the preceding sub-section, if he shall see fit so to do, to require the licensee, by notice in writing, to give up the license which shall have been issued to him, and upon such notice being personally served on such licensee, or affixed to the tavern in respect of which the license was granted, such license shall be deemed and taken to be withdrawn, and shall be of no further force or effect.

(3) Every person who shall sell or dispose of, or cause or permit to be sold or disposed of, on his account, by retail any such spirits without such license, or contrary to the tenor thereof, shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, and to rigorous or simple imprisonment not exceeding three months, or to either of such punishments at the discretion of the court before which such offender is convicted.

Section 29

10 Any person convicted of an offence under the 29th section of the principal Ordinance shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, and to either rigorous or simple imprisonment for any period not exceeding three months, or to either of such punishments at the discretion of the court before which such offender is convicted.

Section 33, as to
removal of
arrack.

11 For section 33 of the principal Ordinance the following section shall be substituted, namely :—

"No spirit distilled from the produce of the cocoanut or other description of palm or of the sugar cane, in any quantity exceeding two quarts, shall be removed from any place within a district to any other place within the same district, and no such spirit in any quantity exceeding an imperial pint shall be removed from any place within a district to any place outside such district without a permit accompanying the same as near as is material in the form D in schedule IV. hereto, which permit shall specify the date thereof, the names of the person removing such spirit and of the person on whose behalf it is removed, the quantity to be removed, the period within which it is to be removed, the places from and to which it is to be removed, and the mode in which it is to be removed. And such permits shall be granted by the government agent of the province or by any other person duly authorised in writing under the hand of the government agent. Provided that if the quantity of such spirit shall not exceed thirty-five gallons, such permit may be issued by any licensed retail dealer for the removal of the same only within the limits of his district."

12 In case of default of payment of any fine imposed under section 46 of the principal Ordinance, the court inflicting the fine may at its discretion sentence the offender

to rigorous imprisonment for any period not exceeding three months, anything in the Criminal Procedure Code, 1883, or Ordinance No. 22 of 1890 to the contrary notwithstanding.

13 For section 47 of the principal Ordinance the following shall be substituted, namely :—

KUSHIRO-SAKI LIGHTHOUSE, HOKKAIDO.

Notice is hereby given that a lighthouse has been erected at Kushiro-saki, east coast of Hokkaido, the light of which will be exhibited on the night of September 1, 1891, and every night thereafter from sunset until sunrise.

Every person desirous of being registered as a Medical Student shall apply to the Principal of the Ceylon Medical College, and shall produce a certificate of general education recognised by the General Medical Council of Great Britain, or a Degree in Arts, and shall pay a matriculation fee of Rs. 10.50.

The Preliminary Examination in General Education required to be passed previous to registration as a Medical Student shall be as follows:—

(a) English language, including Grammar and Composition.

- (b) Latin, including Grammar, translation from specified authors, and translation of easy passages not taken from such authors.
- (c) Mathematics, comprising (a) Arithmetic; (b) Algebra, as far as simple equations, inclusive; (c) Geometry, the subject matter of Euclid, Books I, II, and III., with easy deductions.
- (d) One of the following subjects:—
(a) Greek; (b) French; (c) German; (d) Italian; (e) Any other modern language; (f) Logic.

Exception may be made in the case of a student from any Indian, Colonial, or Foreign University or College, who shall have passed the Matriculation or other equivalent examination of his University or College, provided such examination fairly represents a standard of general education equivalent to that required in this country.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, July 10, 1891.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated July 3, 1891.

Present.—Mr. H. H. Cameron, Mayor and Chairman; Hon. J. J. Grinlinton; Mr. R. K. MacBride, C.M.G.; Dr. W. R. Kynsey, C.M.G.; Mr. J. S. Driberg; Captain F. Bayley; Mr. E. Walker; Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna; Mr. M. I. M. Haniffa; Mr. C. Perera; Mr. H. van Cuylenburg; Mr. P. Coomaraswamy; Mr. C. P. Dias; Mr. Walter Pereira; Mr. D. F. Browne; and Mr. B. H. Morgan (who attended while item No. 9 was under discussion).

1. The Minutes of June 12 and 16, 1891, having been printed and a copy sent to each Member of the Council, were taken as read.

Mr. Coomaraswamy moved "that in the Minutes of June 12, 1891, as circulated among Members, the paragraph commencing 'The Sanitary Officer's report being first taken up for consideration,' &c., and the two following ones: also the one commencing 'Dr. Kynsey admitted that the statement made by Dr. Aserappa,' &c., down to the one commencing 'Dr. Kynsey next proceeded to give his reasons for the spread of smallpox,' &c., and the paragraph commencing 'Dr. Kynsey considered that the legal procedure to be adopted,' &c., be deleted, as only actual resolutions adopted by the Council should be recorded."

Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna seconded.—Carried.

Mr. Charles Perera moved "that in the Minutes of June 16, 1891, as circulated among Members, the following words be added after 'Mr. Skelton' in the Hon. J. J. Grinlinton's motion recorded in paragraph 2, viz., 'for his explanation in writing,' as those words formed part of the motion as presented to the Council."

Mr. D. F. Browne seconded.—Carried.

Resolved,—That the Minutes of June 12 and 16, 1891, be confirmed with the above amendments.

2. Before proceeding to the Order of the Day, Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna presented a memorial dated June 8, 1891, from Mr. D. Dawapuratne and other householders of Kotahena street, and moved that it be read.

Mr. Coomaraswamy seconded.—Carried.

The memorial was then read, complaining of damage done by the Superintendent of Works to the verandahs of the memorialists' houses, and of the removal of the steps built over the side drains leading to their houses, and requesting that the damage be repaired and the steps rebuilt.

Resolved,—That the memorial be referred to the Superintendent of Works for report against the next General Meeting of Council.

Mr. Walter Pereira presented a petition from residents of New Bazaar, St. Sebastian, 1st Division Maradana, and St. Paul's (Mr. W. W. Beling and others), requesting that the Volunteer Band be allowed to play at the court-house square.

The Chairman stated that he had received a similar petition, and that he had informed the petitioners that their request would be considered by the Council with other similar applications.

Mr. Walter Pereira, by leave of Council, withdrew the following motions of which he had given notice, viz. :—

(1) "That in the opinion of this Council the decoration of public streets within the Municipality on occasions of religious festivals should on no account be permitted."

(2) "That the Council do invite the attention of Government to the danger and inconvenience to the public arising from religious processions as at present conducted in public streets within the Municipality, and to the necessity of withholding permission for such processions except on the condition that no music of any sort is used by the processionists during the continuance of the processions."

3. Pursuant to notice Mr. Walter Pereira asked the Chairman why he had not convened since March last a meeting of the Special Committee appointed to revise the Municipal Councils' Ordinance of 1887.

In reply, the Chairman stated that he had not convened a meeting of this Committee since March last, because he understood at the last meeting that the other Members had no more proposals to make, and because his own proposals with regard to new building regulations were not yet ready. If any Member of the Committee desired that a meeting should be held, he (the Chairman) was quite ready to convene one.

4. Pursuant to notice Mr. Walter Pereira asked the Chairman whether he has received an application addressed to himself and Members of the Council for the office of Superintendent of Works from an Engineer at Calcutta, and if so, when such application was received.

The Chairman explained that he had received a letter from Mr. T. B. Byers, of Calcutta, on July 7, three days after the receipt of Mr. Pereira's question, which was dated July 4, but that he had not received the previous letter which Mr. Pereira had been informed had been despatched from Calcutta.

5. Pursuant to notice Mr. C. Perera, for Mr. B. H. Morgan, asked whether a petition addressed to the Chairman and Members of the Municipal Council has been received from certain residents of Kollupitiya and Bambalapitiya regarding licenses to sell fish in that part of the town.

The Chairman stated that an application for a special license to sell fish at No. 80, Kollupitiya road, had been received from the occupant of the premises, which was under the consideration of the Standing Committee, but no petition had been received from the residents of Kollupitiya and Bambalapitiya.

6. A statement of Receipts and Disbursements from January to June, 1891, and a Progress Report of work done for the same period, were submitted.

Resolved,—That the Statement and Progress Report be referred to the Standing Committee.

7. A letter No. 373, dated July 6, 1891, from the Superintendent of Works, submitting an estimate of Rs. 130 for the improvement of the footpath referred to in the petition from residents of Fishers' Hill presented on June 12, 1891, was read.

The Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna moved "that the road referred to be repaired, and that the Council do undertake the work at the cost estimated by the Superintendent of Works, viz., Rs. 130."

Mr. Coomaraswamy seconded.—Carried.

8. A letter No. 368 dated July 1, 1891, from the Superintendent of Works, was submitted, with reference to the improvements suggested by the Sanitary Officer to be carried out at Kehelwatta.

Resolved,—That the papers be circulated among Members, together with a letter No. 379 of July 8, 1891, received from the Superintendent of Works on the improvement of Hulftsdorp street.

9. With reference to the question of the permanent appointment of Superintendent of Works, the Chairman moved that the permanent appointment of Superintendent of Works be offered to Mr. R. Skelton.

Mr. MacBride seconded.

Mr. C. Perera moved as an amendment "that as the order of Council of June 16, 1891, requiring a written explanation from Mr. Skelton in reply to the remarks put in writing by him (Mr. Perera) and forwarded to the Chairman, in accordance with Hon. J. J. Grinlinton's motion, had not yet been complied with, the question of the permanent appointment of Superintendent of Works be deferred until such explanation is received."

Mr. Walter Pereira seconded.

Mr. MacBride moved as an amendment "that the streets and roads on which tramways are to be laid should be kept in repair under one management, which can be best secured by the Tramway Company being obliged to repair the whole road in such manner as may be specified, receiving from Government or the Municipal Council, as the case may be, an annual sum, to be fixed by contract, sufficient to keep the whole surface in thorough repair."

And further "that the advertisements which it is now proposed to send to the local and other newspapers inviting proposals for the construction and working of tramways in Colombo be submitted in the first instance to the Members of the Tramways Committee, by circulation of the papers, and subsequently to the Council for consideration and approval. And that the advertisement shall announce the intention and desire of the Chairman to give the fullest statistical information regarding the traffic and population of Colombo, the licenses granted to passenger-carrying conveyances, and upon any other question sought in this connection by those purposing to tender."

Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna seconded.—Carried.

Mr. MacBride moved further that the word "it" in clause 3, line 3, of the Concessions be deleted, and the words "the tramcars" substituted therefor.

Hon. J. J. Grinlinton seconded.—Carried.

Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna moved as a further amendment that the following words be added to clause 1 of the Concessions :—

"4. Northern route—from Maradana terminus *via* Skinner's road and Armour street to Mattacooly, with a branch line to Grandpass."

Mr. Drieberg seconded.

The Council divided on the amendment :—

Whereupon the amendment was carried.

Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna moved further "that clause 7 in the Concessions be amended so as to provide for the duration of the periods during which lines 3, 4, and 5 are to be completed."

The Chairman seconded.—Carried.

Mr. MacBride moved "that clause 8 of the Concessions be amended, so that the grantees shall not have power to refuse to construct unspecified tramways or that a penalty for refusal be imposed."

Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna seconded.

This motion was, by leave of Council, withdrawn.

Hon. A. de A. Seneviratna moved "that the Concessions as now amended be referred to the Tramways Committee for further report"

Dr. Kynsey seconded.—Carried.

11. Dr. Kynsey undertook to have the memorandum, with reference to the causes of the recent outbreak of smallpox and the best means of preventing future outbreaks, ready by the next General Meeting.

12. The letters dated July 1 and 10, 1891, from the Sanitary Officer, with reference to the remarks made by Dr. Kynsey on the Sanitary Officer's report for the first quarter of 1891, were submitted.

Resolved,—That the letters be circulated among Members.

13. A letter No. 79 dated June 30 and No. 86/07269 dated July 18, 1891, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, and connected correspondence, relating to the proposed loan to the Municipality, were laid on the table.

Resolved,—That the papers be circulated, including an advertisement dated January 11, 1882, issued by the Municipality of Madras, and placed at the Chairman's disposal by the Agent, Bank of Madras, together with statement from the Chairman showing how it is intended to provide for the payment of the proposed loan and interest, and also an estimate of probable revenue and expenditure for 1892.

14. A letter No. 76 dated June 17, 1891, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, forwarding a copy of one from the Acting Solicitor-General, suggesting the introduction of one general Ordinance with respect to the by-laws of the three Municipalities, was submitted.

Resolved,—That the letter be referred to the Special Committee appointed on January 16, 1891, to suggest alterations and amendments in the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, and that the Committee be authorised to communicate with the Kandy and Galle Municipalities on the subject.

15. A further letter dated May 29, 1891, from the International Congress of Hygiene and Demography was submitted.

Resolved,—That the matter be left in the hands of the Chairman.

16. A letter No. 357 dated June 29, 1891, from the Superintendent of Works, with reference to the question of effecting departmentally a survey of the Fort for purposes of drainage, was submitted.

Resolved,—That the consideration of the letter be deferred in the absence of Mr. Coomaraswamy, upon whose motion, on the 16th ultimo, the information was called for; and that meanwhile the letter be circulated among Members.

17. An application dated June 15, 1891, from the Sanitary Officer for three months' leave of absence from the 16th ultimo was submitted.

Resolved,—That the leave be granted for 16 days on full pay and for the remaining period on half pay, in accordance with the rules, and that Dr. J. B. Drieberg be appointed to act as Sanitary Officer for three months on half the salary of the Sanitary Officer and a horse allowance of Rs. 40 per mensem.

18. Resolved that special licenses to sell fish in the private market in St. John's road be issued for the 3rd and 4th quarters of 1891.

19. The City Analyst's report dated July 2, 1891, on the town water for June, 1891, was submitted.

20. A letter dated July 2, 1891, from Mr. J. W. de Rooy, late Municipal Inspector, applying for a gratuity, was submitted.

Mr. Morgan moved "that the matter be left in the hands of the Chairman."

Mr. Dias seconded.—Carried.

21. A petition dated June 25, 1891, from Mr. A. E. Roberts and other taxpayers of the Municipality of Colombo, with reference to the dismissal of Mr. B. D. C. Dias, late Clerk, Sanitary Department, was submitted.

Dr. Kynsey moved "that the petition be circulated."

Mr. Drieberg seconded.—Carried.

22. A letter dated June 6, 1891, from Mr. Vincent E. Loos and other residents of Dematagoda, Base Line road, &c., with reference to the new road from the Maradana Junction to the Base Line, was submitted.

Resolved,—That the letter be circulated among Members.

23. Resolved,—That the opening of the new mutton market at Gintupitiya street be notified in the *Government Gazette* and in one or more of the local newspapers, in terms of rule 1, chapter XIX., of the by-laws in Ordinance 16 of 1881.

Resolved,—That a rent of Rs. 20 per mensem be charged for each stall in the new mutton market at Gintupitiya street.

24. An application dated July 4, 1891, from the Head Clerk, Mr. J. W. Ebert, for six weeks' leave of absence, was submitted.

Hon. J. J. GRINLINTON'S DISSENT.

I BEG to record my dissent from the opinion of the majority in the resolution passed by the Municipal Council on July 24, to compel the Tramway Company (whose proposals may be accepted by the Council) to lay down a tramway along Skinner's road South from its junction with Maradana (*via* Armour street) to the low-lying road skirting the swamps to Mattakkuli, a distance of about 2½ miles.

To induce Companies to send in tenders, it should be shown that the lines selected are likely to be successful financially. To meet this necessary requirement, the main lines should pass along well-known thoroughfares where passengers can be picked up and set down frequently. No one will, I presume, say that the line from Skinner's road to Mattakkuli meets such conditions.

The main lines selected as compulsory routes are now four in number, viz. :—

The Kollupitiya route.

The Borella route.

The Norris road route to Dean's road in Maradana.

The Mattakkuli route.

The three first routes mainly pass along thoroughfares where the traffic ought to be sufficient to pay a Tramway Company, if certain parts of the roads on each route were of a sufficient width to meet requirements, and the roads ready for the tramway (which they are not, and I fear won't be) by the time a Company is ready to start operations.

The fourth route to Mattakkuli selected by a majority of the Council on July 24 also requires widening in places, but it does not meet the conditions which I think a Company would be justified in requiring before laying down a main line of tramway. *Vide* my remarks above.

Some connecting lines there may—yes, and must be—which do not meet the conditions, but I do not think a main line should be selected where the traffic is insignificant and the cost of laying down and working the line, beyond all question, unremunerative.

I estimate that out of the lines selected—even if all were at present in a condition on which to lay down tramways—there are $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles out of a total of 12 (more than one-fourth) which will prove unremunerative, and I look upon this as a very large proportion of tramway to lay down and work at a loss.

I have already in my place in Council and in Committee stated my desire to see tramways laid down on the great thoroughfares to Grandpass and Mutwal, when improvements and deviations have been made to admit of it. Indeed, I think, that a line to Grandpass by the crowded thoroughfares through which it would pass would probably be the most paying line of all, if the roads were made suitable for tramway traffic in accordance with the very proper rule laid down by Council in the 3rd paragraph of the draft Concessions; but my contention is that there is not one of the routes at present fit *throughout* for a tramway, and that it will take time to make them so.

I am of opinion that the three first-named main routes in the Concessions should be improved (to meet the conditions in the 3rd clause) by the time the Company selected from amongst those who tender (if there be any) is ready to begin work, and that the Mattakkuli route should not be insisted on as a compulsory line, but that it remain in abeyance until the two great thoroughfares to Grandpass and Mutwal are in a condition on which to lay tramways.

Were a Tramway Company to begin a line and to have to stop work because the Council had not met the requirements of the 3rd clause of the Concessions or contract, the consequences to this Council might be serious.

The Council, I presume, wishes to attract capitalists to the Island to undertake this work of laying down and working tramways, and that being my assumption, I think it undesirable to insist on conditions which might preclude people from investing their money in Colombo tramways.

MR. CHARLES PERERA'S DISSSENT.

THE grounds of my dissent from the opinion of the majority in reference to the motion of the Chairman, that the permanent appointment of Superintendent of Works be offered to Mr. R. Skelton, are as follows:—

1. According to the instructions laid down in the resolution of the Council of August 20, 1873, "it is the duty of the Superintendent to devote each morning to the inspection of works in hand. He should on all such occasions examine the check-rolls to satisfy himself that the men are present, and thus render it impossible for the overseers to charge for labour not performed. He should note in the check-rolls any irregularity that he finds. He should so arrange his visits, that every work shall be inspected, twice at least in the week, taking in on each occasion all the works within a given district or ward"; and by the resolution of the Standing Committee of July 26, 1889, "he is required, whenever he checks the correctness of an overseer's check-roll on visiting a working party, to initial the check-roll marking the date." But from the Superintendent's diary it will be seen that he has not visited working parties as required, except very infrequently, and it nowhere appears that he has ever inspected every work twice in the week as required. Further, no check-roll whatever appears to have ever been initialled by him, thus showing that the Superintendent has not only violated the rules laid down for his guidance, but by such violation has given room for the irregularities which it was the intention of the Council to guard against.

2. Payments ought all to be completed before the 10th of the month, and the accounts and unexpended balance rendered by the 15th. With the accounts (vouchers, &c.) should be rendered a cash statement. So far from this rule being carried out it is a matter of notoriety, and has been the cause of complaint both in Council and in public, that Municipal workmen are not paid till very late in the month, and have suffered great hardship thereby. No accounts have been rendered by the 15th of the month as required at all.

3. When about to pay a working party the Superintendent should see that all tools, &c., entrusted to the overseers are forthcoming, and at once stop the value of those missing from the responsible person—the cooly who may have lost them, if the loss can be brought home to him, or otherwise the kangany or overseer; and to prevent overseers from borrowing tools for the occasion, all tools used by the several working parties should be paraded and counted at the same time and place. This has never been done, and I have reason to believe that by such omission the Council have from time to time lost various tools and implements. There were in fact some time ago certain thefts of tools which were detected by the police, and for which the police prosecuted certain coolies. On this head see my letter to the Chairman of 20th June, 1890, and other communications. I requested the Chairman to call for a report on these prosecutions from the Superintendent, but so far as I am aware no report has ever been made.

4. When furnishing his accounts at the end of each month the Superintendent should give in a return of all tools lost and paid for. This rule has never been carried out, and no return has been made by the Superintendent as required.

The cost of tools for roadworks alone averages yearly about Rs. 2,000, and for the last three years about Rs. 6,000 worth of tools must have been purchased and issued to overseers.

There is no record, however, of what quantity was issued to each overseer, nor is there a single return of tools received by the overseers and in their charge. A large quantity of tools becomes from time to time unserviceable and is replaced by new tools. But there is no return whatever of such unserviceable articles, and it is interesting to know what has become of the old tools for the last three years. In view of the quantity of tools thus put away the value of them must be considerable. This is in addition to tools purchased under other than road estimates.

5. The Superintendent should keep a full diary of his proceedings, setting forth what works he may have inspected each day, and the distance travelled, and including mention of any other facts (not opinions) which may be of interest to the Council or of use to the Superintendent himself. The diary which is submitted does not, however, appear to be kept by the Superintendent at all, but by some clerk, and I do not know what value can be attached to it. But, as it is, the diary does not contain any mention of what works have been inspected by the Superintendent each day. This omission has often been commented upon by me, but the irregularity has always continued in spite of prominent attention having been drawn to it so often.

6. The Superintendent having the charge of all stores and tools belonging to the Municipality should keep a set of store books to show, by a system of double entry, when the articles are or for what works they have been received and issued. These books should be regularly and frequently inspected by the Superintendent to prove the correctness of the entries, and the fact of such inspection should be certified by him on each occasion in the books themselves. The

actual entries of receipt and issue to be made by the storekeeper, who should produce as his voucher for the issue the overseer's receipt for the articles.

These requirements have been systematically set at nought. Mr. C. Grenier, who was appointed by Council to report on the accounts and the duties that should attach to each officer of the Council, in his report of September, 1890, remarked as follows:—

"The system of account-keeping in this (Stores) Department, if any exists, is, to say the least of it, *scandalous*. I had no opportunity of meeting the storekeeper during my several visits to the stores. There is a book kept, in which all articles received into the store are entered, and another book where all the issues are entered, and these items are posted to the debit and credit side of a ledger respectively, but the book appears to have never been balanced and the stock verified. There appears to have *been no check in regard to receipts and deliveries* also for several years past, and the books are consequently utterly valueless."

The Consulting Engineer, Mr. Ormsby, writes: "*I quite agree with Mr. Grenier's remarks on the store accounts.*"

On this neglect the Special Committee of the Council appointed to report on the Administration Report of the Chairman for 1889, in their report of October, 1890, unanimously adopted by Council, remarked as follows:—

"The Committee note with surprise that there has been *no verification of stores* of the Public Works Department since 1886, nor have the *quarterly store returns been furnished* until the present year.* On reference to the store book, which is kept in a very unsatisfactory manner, the Committee find that it *has not been checked by the responsible officer.*"

The consequences of this neglect may be easily conceived, and are revealed from circumstances disclosed in the proceedings of the Police Court, Colombo, case No. 6,403, where the police charged one Saibu, an overseer, and two others with theft of two barrels of cement, and wherein the storekeeper gave the following evidence:—

"I am the storekeeper of the Municipal Council. On August 19 I received order marked A to issue 20 barrels of cement to first accused. I issued the full number as shown by endorsement on back; the last four were issued last Saturday to first accused's coolies (*I don't know who they are*). *First accused was not present*. He asked me to issue the four barrels. *I did not get the first accused's acknowledgement of receipt of last four barrels*. I gave the barrels to coolies whom I believed to be first accused's coolies," and upon this evidence the accused were discharged.

An advertisement having appeared in the *Gazette* of January 10, 1890, the Superintendent seems to have claimed and obtained the cement as belonging to the Council, but no investigation has ever been made into this matter, nor has any report been made by the Superintendent and submitted to the Standing Committee or the Council. Owing to the loose way of doing business great deficiencies are shown to arise in materials in the stores. For an example, see the Superintendent's own letter No. 258 to the Chairman of May 15, 1891, and his remarks on the subject on May 18, 1891.

7. Every estimate should have its ledger to show the expenditure and balance on each item at the end of the month. For each estimate on which stone is blasted and broken there must be a statement to show, at the end of each month, the quantity of each kind of materials used and the balance in store. During the time of Mr. Edge this rule was carried out, and it will be found that *every item in the ledger bears Mr. Edge's initials*. But since the appointment of the present Superintendent these rules have been entirely neglected, though many additional hands have been placed in the Superintendent's Department for the better conducting of business.

The amounts under each estimate have not even been totalled up. For example, the scavenging estimate for 1889 has not up to this date been totalled. Under estimate No. 205 for 1890 the total amount voted in the Budget and Supplemental Budget was Rs. 2,932. The Chairman's statement of Receipts and Disbursements for 1890 shows the amount spent under this estimate as Rs. 2,848-11, leaving a balance of Rs. 83-89, whereas from the ledger of the Public Works Department under the same estimate the work appears to have cost Rs. 3,037-76, showing an over-expenditure of Rs. 105-76.

8. The Superintendent of Works should on every occasion of passing one of the latrines examine into the state of repair, cleanliness, and proper conservancy, &c., and report accordingly in his diary, in order that immediate measures may be adopted by the Council (see resolution of September 5, 1873). This has never been done up to date.

9. Commenting further on the neglect of rules and want of due inspection, I have to point out various instances in which the Council have been defrauded by Municipal employes and others.

In overseer A. Fernando's check and pay-roll of September, 1890, I find on the 11th of that month this overseer, who is paid at Rs. 2 a day, charging himself twice—once under estimate No. 3 and again under estimate No. 59, and receiving his pay. In the daily distribution roll,† and I presume in the daily report also, it is recorded that he worked only under estimate No. 3 on that day. On the 19th of the same month the same overseer has charged twice—once under estimate No. 3 and again under estimate No. 171, and received his salary accordingly. In daily distribution roll, and I presume in the daily report, he is stated as having done work only under estimate No. 3 on that day. When A. Fernando's check and pay-roll of September is compared with the distribution roll for that month, I find they disagree in the particulars appearing in the table given below. The one states that he worked under one estimate, and the other states that he on the same day worked under a wholly different estimate. These discrepancies show either that deliberately false entries were made, or that the check and pay-roll were not entered up daily. In either case, the irregularity should have been detected and checked by the Superintendent if he did his duty:—

† The daily distribution roll is a transcript of daily reports of all the overseers for each day, and contains particulars as to the estimate under which work is done, number of labourers, description of work, and materials, &c.

This check-roll was taken up by me at random, and I have not had time to examine further into the check-rolls of overseers. But I have no reason to doubt that this is not an unique case. In the same check-roll he has put down in the column "Total" that one Manuel Appu worked five days under estimate No. 3, whereas he appears to have worked only four days.

In the same check and pay-roll under estimate No. 182, Aron Singho, a carpenter, is put down in the column "Total" as having worked three days, whereas he appears, if at all, to have worked only two days, viz., September 20 and 23. Further, neither in the daily report nor the daily distribution roll of A. Fernando for the two days in question does it appear that either the overseer or any man under him worked at all under the above estimate No. 182, so that this employé has been paid for three days on which he never worked—a loss to the Council which would have been avoided if the Superintendent had exercised more care in paying men.

In the same month in the check-roll of overseer Titus I find he has put down and received his salary at Rs. 2 per day under estimate No. 175, whereas the rate provided in the estimate is Re. 1.

In the same month I find in Saibu Dorey's check-roll coolies charged at 38 cents per day for work under estimate No. 197, whereas the estimate rate is only 34 cents.

In the same month I find in Amala Markar's check-roll under estimate No. 178, he has charged coolies at Rs. 2.50, Re. 1.25, Re. 1.12½, Re. 1, and 38 cents per day, whereas the estimate rate is only 34 cents. It is important to add that the work upon which these coolies at such high rates of salary are represented to have been engaged was the breaking up of an old dam at the Base Line road bridge, which is merely cooly work, and it is extraordinary that such high wages as Rs. 2.50 should have been paid.

In the same month I find in K. L. G. Silva's check-roll for repair of Police Station road under estimate No. 1, coolies charged at 38 cents per day when the rate is 34 cents. This work has cost Rs. 78.53 besides cost of metal. I do not see any reason why a special estimate was not submitted for this work, the cost having exceeded Rs. 50.

In the same month I find in B. Abdul overseer's check-roll he charges himself Re. 1.80 per day for work under estimate No. 3, when the rate is Re. 1.50, and 10 coolies are charged at 34 cents per day when the rate is 30 cents.

I have also to call attention to the state of Amala Markar's check-roll, especially his work under estimate No. 205, for Lock-gate repairs, and also to Casie Chetty's check-roll for work done under estimate (no number, but marked St. Sebastian canal) both which bear a suspicious appearance, containing as they do numerous alterations and erasures.

In the check-roll of overseer Saibu Dorey for April, 1890, he charges coolies at 38 cents per day, under estimate No. 1, when the rate is 34 cents, and similarly under estimate No. 173.

In May, I find Saibu Dorey has under estimate No. 1 charged for repairing a drain with cement Rs. 108.32, when there is no provision for such work in that estimate; besides he has charged coolies at 38 cents per day, whereas the rate is only 34 cents.

In the same month (May) in A. Fernando's check-roll, I find one Singho Appu charged for 22 days, whereas he appears to have worked only 21 days.

In the same month in Amala Markar's check-roll I find one John Singho, who is described to be a mason, charged at 75 cents for 36½ days under estimate No. 178, and coolies at 50, 38, and 30 cents, when the rate is only 34 cents.

In check-rolls of December, 1890, overseer Titus charges Rs. 2 per day under estimate No. 175, when the estimate rate is only Re. 1, and boys are charged at 25 cents when the rate is only 12 cents.

Abdul overseer charges Re. 1.80 as overseer under estimate No. 3, when the rate is Re. 1.50.

A. Fernando overseer charges Rs. 2 when the rate is Re. 1.50.

A. A. Anthony overseer charges coolies at 38 cents under estimate No. 175, when the rate is 34 cents. V. de Silva, A. de Silva overseer, and Casie Chetty overseer charge similarly.

Overseer Saibu charges coolies at 38 cents per day under estimate No. 197, when the rate is 34 cents, and under estimate No. 248, 75 and 62 cents per day when the rate is 38 cents. Amala Markar charges coolies at 38 cents under estimate No. 183, when the rate is 34 cents.

This is what I have found as I hurriedly went over these estimates and the check-rolls of the above overseers for April, May, September, and December, 1890, but there may be other frauds and irregularities which may have escaped my attention in these very months.

It is very probable that the check-rolls of the whole period of 1889, 1890, and 1891, if examined, will reveal similar irregularities as in the case of A. Fernando's check-roll for September, 1890.

The amount of loss to the Council may be conjectured when it is remembered that there are at least 10 overseers working daily on an average.

10. Considering the importance of checking the receipt and issue of materials, I in my memorandum of February 4, 1890, on the scavenging estimate for that year, suggested the appointment of supervisors, remarking as follows:—

"We ought to make them (supervisors) do the work of reporting upon the general condition of roads, buildings, drains, bridges, culverts, &c., and receive materials supplied by contractors and others for Municipal roads, building works, &c., and check the cartage, number of workmen employed by masons, their balance materials," &c.

On this Mr. MacBride on February 6, 1890, recorded his dissent, stating—"The Superintendent should, I think, do all this," but what I wish to point out is that the Superintendent has not done and does not do this, and the result, I am afraid, is much loss to the Council in respect of materials, cartage, &c.

11. The smallest attention to the instructions of the Council would have enabled the Superintendent to avoid these irregularities. In addition to the rules above-mentioned, a resolution of the Standing Committee was passed on July 9, 1890, at the instance of Mr. MacBride himself, to the effect "That the Superintendent be requested to record on the back of each check-roll, in addition to the specification of work, the amount to be spent, and also that a separate check-roll should be issued for each estimate—the specification or programme to be written by the Superintendent in his own handwriting."

But this has been almost entirely disregarded, and it seems useless for the Council to lay down rules for guidance if plain instructions issued at the instance of such an experienced person as the Government Director of Public Works are so lightly set at naught.

The laxity of supervision on the part of the Superintendent affords the greatest facilities to speculation on the part of his subordinates. What Mr. Henderson, the Auditor appointed by the Council, says in his report of May 10, 1886, applies with double force at the present time, and it would appear that the disregard of plain instructions laid down by resolutions of the Standing Committee, &c., is calculated to pave the way to dishonesty on the part of the Superintendent's subordinates. Mr. Henderson said:—"I cannot too strongly impress upon the Council the temptation put in an overseer's way, who is only receiving a small pay, to pilfer with coolies' names, materials, &c., and should there be a syndicate among the overseers by relationship or otherwise, how absolutely necessary responsible supervision is combined with a thoroughly efficient check upon everything by proper accounts and returns. In the Public Works Department, I believe, the Superintending Officer has to see to and measure all work done, all materials received and issued, and certify on honour accordingly; nothing is left to an overseer."

12. There is no record whatever to show that the Superintendent has carried out the instructions contained in Minutes of Standing Committee of July 8, 1890, and adopted at the instance of the Director of Public Works, by personally satisfying himself by measurement or otherwise of the receipt of materials, and that the materials charged for have been received and entered in the material ledger. The store books are not verified, nor is there any record of the quantity of metal broken by the military prisoners and received by the Public Works Department; also no return is ever made of balances of materials, tools, &c., under each estimate, or of amount of materials obtained from the breaking down of buildings, bridges, &c. I pointed out this neglect in my letter of June 26, 1890. For instance, it does not appear what became of the materials, &c., of the old bridge at Base Line road or of the old latrine at Bankshall street, &c.

13. The practice seems to be for the head overseer to receive the metal and gravel bought by the Council, but on looking at his journal for January, 1890, I find that head overseer notes in his journal that he received on March 24, 1890, 63 cubes of gravel for the use of the Panchikawatta road; whereas that road, which was repaired under estimate No. 119, was completed on March 20, 1890. See Progress Report for March, 1890. This material has not been brought to credit, nor does it appear that it was used for any other purpose.

I also find in head overseer's journal that he notes gravel was being piled on February 6, 1890, and that the road was being gravelled on February 22, 24, 26, and March 27. Yet he states that he measured and received gravel only on March 24. If the head overseer is right, the statement of the Superintendent in the Progress Report as to the date of completion of this work is wrong. Curiously enough this very road appears in head overseer's journal as having been patched on August 21, 1890, although Standing Committee or Council was not so informed. When and at what cost was this road patched?

It must be noticed this road was patched in January, 1890, also the labour being paid for under estimate No. 1, and 3 cubes of gravel was taken for the purpose from estimate No. 119—an irregularity which renders any system of estimates perfectly valueless as a check.

Head overseer notes in his journal on March 8, 1890, that he received 136.56 cubes of gravel for Blomendahl street, whereas the work (which was performed under estimate No. 95) was completed on March 8. See Progress Report for March.

I find this road also having been repaired under estimate No. 1 on November 8, 10, 13, 14, 17, 19, 25, 26, 28, and 29, 1890. Why was it not reported to Standing Committee in terms of the resolution of Standing Committee and Council? What was the cost of the work?

It is remarkable that such extensive repairs should have been required after the road had been so recently gravelled.

In connection with Blomendahl street I have to point out what appears to me to be a most extraordinary circumstance. According to Progress Report the work was finished in March, 1890, under estimate No. 95. But in September, 1890, the Superintendent submitted a supplementary estimate No. 215 for Rs. 102, stating that it was for expenditure incurred in excess of the original estimate No. 95. This was sanctioned, but it would appear this money has never been drawn up to date. Now, if the sum of Rs. 102 was due for the work, why was not the money drawn? Or, if it was not due, why was the supplementary estimate made? The wonder increases when I look to the statement of Receipts and Disbursements for 1890, which shows that there was even a balance of 59 cents out of the original estimate No. 95. All this discloses a rotten state of things in the Department.

I find in head overseer's journal that gravel was transported to this street on January 27, 1890, that on February 22 gravel was being piled, and that the road was being gravelled on February 28 and March 1, 3, 4, 7, 12, 18, 25, and 26. And yet, according to Progress Reports for March, the work was completed on March 8.

Head overseer records in his journal on April 30 receipt of 3,060 bushels of metal for Dam street, whereas the repair of it, under estimate No. 23, commenced on March 13, and repairs were completed on May 3. See Progress Report for April and May respectively. I also find in head overseer's journal metalling of this road on April 21, 23, 24, 26, and 30. How could the work have commenced on March 13 when metal was received only on April 30?

Head overseer records in his journal on March 11 receipt of 28.04 cubes of gravel for Daniel's road, whereas the repair of it, under estimate No. 112, commenced on March 3, and the repairs were completed on March 18. See Progress Report for March.

Head overseer records in his journal on April 29 receipt of 85½ cubes of gravel for Temple road, when the gravel was piled in February, and the repair of that road, under estimate No. 29, commenced on March 25 (that is, one month and four days before the receipt of materials), and 250 yards were consolidated in April and work was completed on May 14. See Progress Report for February, March, April, and May respectively.

Head overseer records in his journal on March 10 receipt of gravel for Second Turning, whereas the repair of that road was commenced on March 4 under estimate 149 and completed on March 18.

Head overseer records also it was being gravelled on March 6 (that is, four days before the receipt of gravel). See Progress report for March.

Head overseer records in his journal on March 6 receipt of 3,170 bushels of gravel for Edinburgh crescent, whereas the repair of that road under estimate No. 89 was completed on March 6 (that is, on the very day the material was received). See Progress Report for March. Head overseer notes also in his journal that he observed it being gravelled on February 20.

Head overseer records in his journal on May 28 receipt of 23.67 cubes of metal for Madampitiya road, whereas the repair of that road under estimate No. 40 commenced on May 19, and the work was completed on May 30. See Progress report for May.

Head overseer also notes on July 31 that it required patching. Has it been patched? When and at what cost?

In the case of other roads and works I find the receipt of material precedes the commencement or completion of the work, as one might expect, but in the above cases and others which I have not noted the order is reversed. The fact appears to be that pure carelessness, if not worse, prevails in this business to the great loss and prejudice of Municipal funds.

The practice appears to be that metal and gravel alone are received by the head overseer, but other materials are issued by the storekeeper or received by the overseers direct from the contractors.

When, therefore, in the case of head overseer's record of the receipt of metal and gravel such gross instances of irregularities are apparent, it can well be imagined what the state of affairs would be in the case of other overseers, who are allowed to receive materials from the storekeeper or direct from the contractors, but are not required to keep any record whatever either of the date of the receipt of material, the quantity received, and quantity expended on the work in hand, and the balance left after the completion thereof, or any note whatever of their receipt and disbursement which could be construed even into a perfunctory attempt at guarding against speculation on the part of the overseers, by their acting in collusion either with the storekeeper or with the contractors.

The fact appears to be, that whilst the Superintendent ought himself to have attended personally to the receipt of materials, he has left the whole matter in the hands of his subordinates without making the faintest attempt at introducing a shadow of a system which even could be taken as intended to operate as a check on his subordinates, thereby throwing in their way the strongest temptations to fraud and dishonesty.

14. Finding that in the Progress Report that two separate streets, viz., St. Lucia's lane, 110 yards long, and Brassfounder street, 222 yards long, were being repaired under one estimate No. 107, I brought the matter to the notice of the Chairman in July, 1890, who referred to the Superintendent, when the Superintendent by letter No. 303 of July 9, 1890, explained as follows:—

"Repairs to Brassfounder street had to be undertaken as the road was in exceedingly bad order. By some error the estimate appears in my office copy of roads submitted for sanction, and it was not until the work was commenced that I discovered the error. In consequence, pending the sanction of funds for these repairs, I have charged the estimate No. 107 for St. Lucia's lane, which is in excess of the requirements of that lane, with the cost of this work.

"I regret that I did not avail myself of an earlier occasion for this report, and I now request that the expenditure may be approved, and the temporary arrangement which has been made may stand until a proper vote is passed for this work. This is an exceptional case, where some allowance should be made for the apparent irregularity. In view of the urgency of this work and the fact that I had intended to have included this in the estimate submitted, I request that you will overlook the irregularity and approve the expenditure."

• By memorandum of August 7, 1890, I insisted on a more satisfactory explanation of the matter, and the papers having been again referred to the Superintendent, he, by letter of August 14, stated as follows:—

"Estimate No. 107 provides for the repair of St. Lucia's lane, which is 110 yards long and 8 feet wide, for which 5 cubes of gravel is quite sufficient. I find that in making the estimate, by error 30.93 cubes were provided, a quantity far in excess of the requirements. The actual cost of repairs of St. Lucia's lane is:—

Thus leaving a balance of Rs. 162 not required for the repair of this road out of a vote of Rs. 198."

But, as a matter of fact, only 3.09 cubes of gravel (and not 5 as the Superintendent states just above) was used, as the mistake in the estimate was merely putting the decimal point after the nought instead of before, and this is also borne out by the fact that for Lillie street, Slave Island, which is of the same length and breadth as St. Lucia's lane, the Superintendent's own estimate No. 140 was 3.09 cubes of gravel, so that the following irregularities appear in this transaction:—

- (1) That the estimate for St. Lucia's lane was made with gross carelessness.
- (2) That with that estimate another street was repaired without the sanction of the Standing Committee or Council, and without any report being made on the subject; and
- (3) That in the explanation the Superintendent stated 5 cubes of gravel to have been used for St. Lucia's lane, when he ought to have known that only 3.09 cubes were used, and this I apprehend he was obliged to do because the overseer in his daily report had so reported, and the Superintendent himself had put it so in the daily distribution roll, and the overseer and coolies had by that time been paid accordingly.

It was only when the matter was brought to my notice and I had moved in the case that any explanation was forthcoming. As I stated the explanation as regards St. Lucia's lane is incorrect. Further, as regards Brassfounder street, the Superintendent after the matter was referred to him and the repairs had been effected, sent in an estimate for the work already done which it is significant is not in the form in which usually road estimates were submitted by him in respect of length and breadth of street, &c., and this I shall show is of importance. This estimate stated the amount of gravel at 25.50 cubes as having been used, and the cost of repairing at Rs. 155.88. But in an estimate he had himself made for Brassfounder street, but which had been struck out and not considered by Standing Committee, the gravel required is stated at 15.68 cubes, and the cost of the whole work at Rs. 100. For the sake of comparison I append a copy of the estimate for St. Lucia's lane, the estimates for Brassfounder street as originally made and as subsequently submitted, and a copy of the estimate of Lillie street, Slave Island.

Again, there is an important discrepancy between the overseer's daily report and the estimate sent in by the Superintendent after the work was completed, for whereas the estimate states 25.50 cubes of gravel to have been used, the overseer's daily report shows 23.50 cubes of gravel to have been used, and the same overseer's check-roll shows 15.62 cubes of gravel to have been used. This is a serious discrepancy. But this latter figure, 15.62 cubes of gravel, is significant, as it fully agrees with the quantity stated as required in the original estimate of the Superintendent in the estimate book. Further, St. Lucia's lane, which is said to have consumed only 5 cubes of gravel, is stated to have cost Rs. 12 in labour, but Brassfounder street, which consumed so much as 25.50 cubes, is stated to have cost only Rs. 33.48 in labour, whereas it should, according to proportion, have cost something more than Rs. 60 in labour. The conclusion I draw from all this is that the Superintendent, having committed a gross blunder in regard to St. Lucia's lane, and having without sanction repaired Brassfounder street under the same estimate, and having already paid the overseer and coolies more than he should have done, has submitted an estimate wholly incorrect, and intended merely to cover the irregularity.

The question remains, what has become of the balance quantity of gravel purchased under estimate No. 107? For 30.50 cubes were received and paid for (see voucher No. 474), St. Lucia's lane consumed 3.06 cubes, or, according to Superintendent, 5 cubes; and Brassfounder street, as I have shown, required and consumed only 15.62 cubes, making together at the most 20 cubes. What has become of the balance 10 cubes? Either more material was paid for than was received, or the balance material has disappeared. In either case the Council has suffered a loss.

15. The Edinburgh meat market boutiques were to be repaired with hora planks, and the estimate of the Superintendent was all for hora timber, but on inspection it will be found that a good deal of it is not hora timber at all, but of a very inferior quality. The old timber which was utilised is hora, but of the new timber a great portion is common wood. Also, as far as I know, the old timber that was not used has never been accounted for, and is apparently not forthcoming.

The work of fling up Dean's road canal was not done according to specification. See my letter of No explanation has been given yet.

The work of whitewashing latrines when proposed to be given on contract, the Superintendent submitted certain specifications, and as the tenders were in excess of the amount of estimate the Superintendent was required to see that the work was carried out departmentally, strictly according to the Superintendent's own specifications, but the work was not so performed, and was very imperfect. See my letter of ; and no explanation has been given yet.

16. There was an estimate No. 205 in 1890 for the repair of Lock-gate, but the amount was exhausted, and even over-expenditure was incurred, and the estimate was closed at the end of 1890. But it would appear from the daily report of Amala Marcar for January, 1891, that he did some work at Lock-gate from January 10 to 18 under the same estimate, which, as above stated, had been exhausted. How was that paid for? From the daily distribution for these days the work appears originally entered but subsequently erased, and the amount is added to

the work for Prince street footway under estimate No. 183 (1890) as for "pointing with cement," hacking off old cement; whereas no such work was done in Prince street at all. This appears to be a manipulation of accounts, and a transference of work from one estimate to another without the cognizance of the Council. The method adopted is calculated to keep from the Council the true state of facts.

On 19th and 20th January, 1891, the Daily Report and Daily Distribution charge the Prince street footway, under the estimate No. 183, with a certain amount for bricks and mortar for "building side drains," "plastering side drain with cement," and "plastering side wall with chunam," and "pointing side drain with chunam," but no such work was done in Prince street at all, and I know there is no side wall or a drain to be plastered at all or built with bricks and mortar in Prince street. This discloses an extraordinary irregularity and requires full explanation, for the funds of the Council would appear to have been drawn for work which was never done. And this perhaps accounts for the fact that both in this case, where the work was done under estimate No. 183, as well as in the case of the estimate for Lock-gate (No. 205), the work has covered the whole of the estimate amounts, and in the latter case has even exceeded it. I apprehend that in both these cases a charge has been made, as the cost of labour, by far exceeding the cost of material; and it would be interesting to know whether my apprehension is not borne out by the facts of the case. While the above footway under estimate No. 183 cost Rs. 2,200, and every cent of the estimate amount was exhausted on it, the footway on the other side of the same street was made at a cost of Rs. 1,724.65, under estimate No. 175, during the course of last year. In the latter case the reduced amount at which the work was done is perhaps traceable to the fact that it was done by an overseer not long enough in the employ of the Superintendent's Department to enable him to gain an insight into the tactics employed to work up estimates to the very last cent of the estimate amount.

The possibility of any irregularity occurring by way of the Council's funds being drawn for work which was never done, as in the case of the Prince street footway pointed out above, would have been partially avoided if the Superintendent made "Completion Reports" according to the practice of the Government Public Works Department. In July, 1890, Mr. MacBride suggested the adoption of this form of reports, himself giving a form, and I gave notice of a motion in Council on the subject, but the Chairman, by letter No. 192 of the 5th August, 1890, stated that instructions had been sent to the Superintendent by the Chairman to make and submit completion reports, and that therefore my motion was not put in the agenda paper. But such instructions, whether given or not, have not been carried out, and up to this date no completion reports have been submitted.

17. -On the 11th March, 1890, it was resolved in Standing Committee that tenders for materials should be advertised for 1891 in September, 1890, as tenders were not called for till late in the previous years and contracts were entered into only for a short period of the year. Yet the tenders for 1891, referred to the Superintendent for report, were not returned by him till the end of May last, and tenders for gravel have not been considered and settled yet, although a large number of road estimates were pushed through this month.

The Floral Hall was directed to be assessed by the Superintendent in order that the Council might take it over from the proprietors. The Superintendent valued it at Rs. 3,100 on. On this valuation the agreement to purchase was concluded. But on , after Superintendent had been instructed to take charge of the Hall, he reported to the effect that the Hall was in very bad repair and would tumble down unless the work of repairing was taken in hand at once. The Council was thereupon obliged to vote a sum of Rs. 532 for repairs. From this it is shown that the original valuation was imperfectly and negligently made, in consequence of which the Council suffered a loss of Rs. 532.

The above irregularities could only occur either from want of administrative capacity in the Head of the Department, or from lack of such supervision as would prevent misconduct on the part of subordinates. But in any case the result has been that public moneys have been considerably wasted through the Public Works Department, and taxpayers have been defrauded.

The expenditure incurred on (1) the upkeep of roads and on (2) scavenging will fully illustrate the conclusion I have stated.

Under the former head, the expenditure incurred in the year 1888—that immediately preceding Mr. Skelton's appointment—amounted to Rs. 40,510, but in 1889 the present Superintendent has spent a sum of Rs. 76,148 over this work, exceeding the previous year by Rs. 35,638.

The same with scavenging. The sum of Rs. 41,604 spent in 1888 rose to Rs. 57,136 in 1889.

It does not follow, as one would have expected, that with the increase of expenditure under these heads the roads have been kept in a better condition of repair, and that the town has been kept in a better state of cleanliness than before.

On the contrary, it was a matter of complaint both in Council and in public that the roads were starved, and were not certainly maintained in a proper state of repair.

With regard to scavenging, the Council have emphatically laid down their opinion in the following words occurring in the Report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the Chairman's Administration Report for 1889, which former was unanimously adopted at a General Meeting of the Council. The report says: "The Committee note that the cost of scavenging has never been so high as in the last year and in the current year, and are of opinion that it is very imperfectly performed and not at all commensurate with its cost. Practically no reliable supervision is exercised over the working of the Scavenging Department. In past years, the cost of water and disinfectants had to be provided for—water is now free and disinfectants are not used; the cost of some latrine carts have been saved and only two urine carts are used; but the cost of scavenging has nevertheless increased from Rs. 39,949 in 1885 to Rs. 54,775 (Rs. 57,136) in 1889."

It is important to note that an expenditure larger than in 1888 was incurred under these two heads without any appreciable benefit resulting from such an increase, when such expenditure, as a matter of fact, could, and ought to, have been materially reduced, and at the reduced rate the roads ought to have been better maintained and the scavenging done more satisfactorily than before.

The conditions under which road repairs are to be executed are materially altered, affording a very appreciable advantage under which to carry on the work at a reduced expenditure in 1889 than before.

For instance, metal or gravel (as the case may require) ceased to be laid over the whole width of the road, but was laid only on the middle portion thereof, thus saving a large item on material. The introduction of the water supply which permitted of the use of the water for such purposes, save the expenditure on water, water carts, and transport of water. Consolidation by stamping gave place to consolidation by the use of the road-roller, thus reducing the necessity of employing a force of labour so numerous as before. And generally the introduction of the MacBride system, which has been so successfully tried on Government roads, with the result of saving large sums on road repairs, ought to have facilitated the reduction of expenditure.

With regard to scavenging, the expenditure ought to have been reduced instead of there being such a material increase over the previous year, for the following reasons:—

In the Chairman's Administration Report for 1889 he says that five latrines during that year were closed to the public during the time they were undergoing repairs, each for nearly two months. Such being the case, the expenditure for conservancy, whitewashing, labour, &c. (all of which are included under the head of Scavenging)

ought of necessity to have been saved during such time as they were closed to the public, and such saving could not have been a very inconsiderable item. In 1889 the urinals attached to all latrines (save in two cases) were discontinued. Only two urine carts were therefore employed during the year. The necessity for employing water-carts for flushing drains, latrines, &c., ceased by the use of water being allowed from such purposes from the standpipes. Water was laid to latrines, latrine-carts were built for that purpose on the Council's own account, and thus a large item for hire of carts ought to have been saved. Of recent years an important ally to the Scavenging Department has risen up in the force of coolies attached to grass gardens which cover no small a portion of the Cinnamon Gardens. These coolies at early morning go about the town with their carts and scavenge the town collecting sweepings for the purpose of being used for manuring grass-lands.

With all these causes operating to reduce the expenditure, there was spent out of the vote for scavenging no less a sum than Rs. 57,136.82 in 1889 against Rs. 41,604 in 1888. The highest figure previously on record was Rs. 52,088, which was the sum spent on scavenging in 1878, but which was exceeded by that spent in 1889. And yet, as stated above, complaints have been frequently and justly made as to the bad state of the drains, streets, &c. The conclusion that forces itself upon one is that owing to the want of proper supervision and control much of the money has been ill-spent and mis-spent.

Finding that with all the advantages on his side of reducing the expenditure on both maintenance of roads and scavenging, the Superintendent had in 1889, when he was left to his own discretion by the Standing Committee untrammelled as to details, incurred such large increases without the work being done any better than before, the Standing Committee of the Council in 1890 required from the Superintendent particulars of works, gave portions thereof on contract, and insisted on the enforcement of different checks on the details of work, and so controlled the expenditure that from Rs. 76,148 for maintenance of roads in 1889 it was reduced to the still not very satisfactory amount of Rs. 61,220 in 1890, and scavenging from Rs. 57,136.82 to Rs. 56,538 (Rs. 55,432).

Although it has been shown above that the Superintendent does not practically carry out the instructions conveyed to him by resolution of the Standing Committee, it does not appear that he does so from any want of appreciation of their practical value. He says in his report No. 468 of the 26th September, 1890:—

"To you, Sir, and Members of the Standing Committee, the estimate is all important. I need hardly refer to the great trouble that has been taken during the past six months to make the estimates so complete and clear, not only to the technical but also to the non-technical mind, and for what purpose? Simply to permit the accounts of expenditure being readily placed side by side with proper items of estimates, so that there may be no doubt as to the work executed being that estimated for.

"I may add that the system that has grown up under the pressure of the Standing Committee when thoroughly stated is capable of connecting together the whole of the various stages from the order for materials to the complete statement of a perfected estimate in such a manner that the accounts can, if need be, be audited or examined and tested by Members of the Council.

"In conclusion, I trust that the Council will not permit the result of so much hard work and thought upon the part of the Standing Committee being set aside for a scheme which is not clear from the reports and may hereafter be found useless."

The establishment of the Superintendent contains an efficient and well-paid staff which during his tenure of office has been strengthened by the addition of several hands, so much so that the cost of the establishment has partly exceeded the limit laid down by the Municipal Commission of 1886. For in their report they set the limit at Rs. 8,360 a year, including the salary of the head overseer. This formed the part of the basis upon which the Secretary of State approved of the new Ordinance 7 of 1877, especially noting the scheme of the Commission by which the whole establishment of the Municipality would cost only Rs. 1,663 more than under the Old Ordinance. But, as I stated, the limit Rs. 8,280 for the Public Works Department has been greatly exceeded; for in 1889 the staff (excluding the head overseer, who is paid Rs. 1,368.75) cost Rs. 10,132.50, and in 1890 Rs. 13,027. In 1891 it would be much more, as Rs. 500 has been added to his salary, and an additional messenger named Hamid has, I learn, been taken on without sanction of Council.

It must be remembered that by far the largest amount of Municipal expenditure is incurred through this Department, which will appear on reference to the table marked C hereto annexed. For example, the total expenditure in 1889 was Rs. 514,463. Deducting from this the contributions for Waterworks, Police, and Gas expenses, which are merely paid in lump sums, the expenditure of the Municipality was Rs. 289,503, of which Rs. 203,965 was spent for and by the Public Works Department alone. In 1890, out of Rs. 256,457, the Public Works Department alone spent Rs. 194,928. It cannot help being acknowledged that the spending of such a large sum of money, and the controlling of so many different works should be done with the greatest care, thorough systematic accounts being imperatively necessary to show every item expended, even of the smallest amount, and the most strict supervision given to both outside and office work. It will be then seen how necessary it is that this Department should be properly supervised and controlled; and it is because I am convinced that this supervision and control is not exercised in the manner required, that I consider myself justified in opposing the confirmation of Mr. Skelton in the office of Superintendent.

With regard to the figures I give above as amounts incurred on the upkeep of roads, it is desirable to note that they do not tally with those given by the Superintendent in the diagram showing details of expenditure on upkeep of roads attached to the Chairman's Administration Report for 1890. In his figures the Superintendent has omitted to take into account certain items of expenditure under particular heads which were before taken into calculation in arriving at the actual expenditure under the general head of Upkeep of Roads. See paper marked B hereto annexed. The figures in the diagram cannot therefore be taken as comparative with other years, nor are they in themselves accurate. The particular items of expenditure which have hitherto entered into the calculation of the expenditure on upkeep of roads are detailed in the schedules annexed hereto, marked B.

Of these items the Superintendent has omitted items Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of the schedule in his calculation, which cannot therefore be accepted in a comparative statement of expenditure under the head of Upkeep of Roads.

THE grounds of my dissent from the opinion of the majority in reference to the motion of the Chairman, that Mr. Skelton be offered the appointment of Superintendent of Roads on his present salary of Rs. 4,500, with biennial increments of Rs. 500, commencing from January 1, 1893, until it reaches a maximum of Rs. 8,000, he being bound to give the Council not less than six months' notice of his intention to terminate his service, are as follows:—

- (1) That no notice of this motion had been previously given as required.
- (2) That the amount of salary involved in the said motion is not consistent with the scheme recommended by the Municipal Commission of 1886, which was taken by the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies as one of the grounds for confirmation of the Ordinance No. 7 of 1887, under which Municipal Councils now exist.

B.—General Upkeep of Roads.

Estimate No. 1.

This estimate provides for the simple repair of the surface of the portion of the Municipal roads not otherwise provided for by the special estimates about miles. It does not provide for any other work which ought to be made on a special estimate. It does not provide for the repair of side or other drains for which special estimates have been prepared.

If the estimate for permanent repairs for the work of metalled and gravelled roads are not sanctioned and carried out early in the year, save during the first quarter, then the amount of the estimate must be increased to provide for the upkeep of the latter roads. It also provides for the following works, viz. :—

- For bringing daily reports from Overseer to the Town Hall.
- Watching and taking care of tools and stores.
- Transporting gravel from pits and depôts.
- Repairing enclosures round shade and ornamental plants.
- Covering the same and the stems of the plants with thorns.
- Clearing the grounds round the plants.
- Planting trees.
- Transporting cabook earth and manure from the Dematagoda and other gravel pits for plants.
- Watering Main street from Front street to and round the Town Hall and the Edinburgh markets and Galle Face seaside road occasionally.
- Opening and clearing side drains.
- Removing the earth, removing the accumulation from the sides of the roads, to enable the rain water to run off them.
- Cutting up and removing fallen trees.
- Cutting down dangerous trees and removing overhanging branches interfering with the gas lamps all over the town.
- Clearing the sides of the roads from weeds and overhanging fences.
- Protecting the abandoned stone quarries and clearing them of jungle and noisome vegetation.
- Repairing all the bridges and rails and tarring the same.
- Renewing wooden planking on cross drains.
- Supplying blocks of stones to military prisoners.
- Repairing tools for military prisoners.
- Repairing the iron fence round the Fort esplanade.
- Making, repairing, and planting benches on the Galle Face footpath and in Circular walks.
- Repairing and putting up fences round the slaughter-houses at Dematagoda and Madampitiya.
- Oiling screws and watching and opening the various sluices on the Colombo lake and St. Sebastian canal during the day and night during floods and heavy rains.
- Repairing pump in lotus-pond.
- Repairing the lock-gate at St. Sebastian.
- Pay of Provost Sergeant in charge of Military prisoners and for pay of the Head Overseer.
- Breaking down and removing encroachments.
- Repair of ferry boat at Hendala and all urgent works for which the other estimates do not provide.

MR. WALTER PEREIRA'S DISSSENT.

The Chairman's motion "that the permanent appointment of Superintendent of Works be offered to Mr. R. Skelton."

The reason of my Dissent.

Mr. Skelton is, I think, a fit and proper person to be appointed Superintendent of Works, provided, of course, the Council has the power to make such an appointment. He has, as far as my experience goes, shown admirable aptitude for the duties of the office in which he has hitherto acted, but I dissent from the opinion of the majority because I think it imprudent to offer him this appointment before the Council has heard his explanation of certain complaints against him which Mr. Charles Perera has, in terms of a resolution of a previous meeting of the Council, formulated: That the Council should resolve that Mr. Charles Perera should "put his remarks against Mr. Skelton into writing to be referred to Mr. Skelton for his explanation in writing," and before the Members have seen the remarks so reduced into writing (to say nothing of Mr. Skelton's explanation), that it should offer to Mr. Skelton the permanent appointment, seems to me a proceeding not only irregular and injudicious, but discourteous to a member of this Council.

The Chairman's motion "that Mr. Skelton be offered the appointment of Superintendent of Roads," &c.

The reason of my Dissent.

The same as that of my dissent from the opinion of the majority on the previous motion, with this addition—That no notice of this motion had been given as required by the 92nd section of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887. When the motion was made I objected to it on this ground, but the mover (the Chairman) ruled that he was in order. The 92nd section of the Ordinance however enacts—"No business shall be brought before or transacted at any meeting, general or special, other than the business specified in the notices given under sections 89 and 91, unless notice has been given by the Councillor who intends to bring any other business forward," &c. The words are plain, and in my opinion the Chairman cannot by a mere ruling "drive a coach and pair through a statute."

Quære—Cannot individual members refuse, in these circumstances, to recognise the appointment of Mr. Skelton?

MUNICIPALITY OF GALLE.

Minutes of Proceedings of the Municipal Council of Galle, held at the Municipal Office on July 11, 1891, at 2 p.m.

Present:—The Chairman; T. S. Clark, Esq.; W. E. de Vos, Esq.; W. Abeyasundera, Esq.; N. Dias Abeyesinhe, Esq.; and E. R. Anthonisz, Esq.

1. Read and confirmed Minutes of the last meeting.
2. Submitted a letter No. 19 of June 17, 1891, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, forwarding for any observation or remarks an extract from a report by the Acting Solicitor-General suggesting the introduction of a General Ordinance with respect to the by-laws of the three Municipalities.
Resolved,—That the Government be informed that this Council accepts the suggestion of the Acting Solicitor-General, and will be prepared to act in the matter in concert with the other Municipalities.
Resolved further,—That an interchange of Draft By-laws between this Council and the Municipalities of Colombo and Kandy be proposed to those bodies.
3. Submitted a letter No. 20, dated June 17, 1891, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, transmitting copies of reports from the Attorney-General and Solicitor-General on the proposed new by-laws.
4. Submitted a letter No. 24 of the 10th instant, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, stating that His Excellency the Governor prefers not to fill the seat of member of this Council for the Galupiyadda Ward by a Government nominee.
Resolved,—That in the opinion of the Council it is desirable that His Excellency the Governor be requested to nominate an additional member to the Council under section 10 of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887, and that if possible the Moorish community should be represented in it.
5. Submitted a letter No. 357 of the 2nd instant, from the Police Magistrate, Galle, asking the Council to submit for the consideration of Government the amount of the allowance which it recommends should be granted to him as Municipal Magistrate.
Resolved,—That the Police Magistrate be informed that the Council is prepared to vote a sum of Rs. 500 as an allowance to him as Municipal Magistrate for the year 1891 in terms of section 56 of the Ordinance No. 7 of 1887.
6. Submitted application from O. L. M. Makan Markar for compensation for damage done to his property, house No. 2, Lighthouse street, by the Council taking up a portion of the outer-verandah of his house to widen the street.
Agreed that the matter lie over for next meeting.
7. Submitted an application from the Municipal Inspectors for remuneration for the extra services rendered by them during the late epidemic of cholera.
Resolved,—That the sum of Rs. 200 be distributed among the Inspectors in the proportions given below in recognition of the useful services rendered by them during the epidemic: Mr. Wittensleger, Rs. 60; Mr. Johannes de Silva, Rs. 50; Mr. Nagahawatta, Rs. 50; Mr. Bogaars, Rs. 20; Mr. Wijsekara Rs. 20.
8. In pursuance of a resolution of Council at the last meeting, the subject of the lease of the markets generally in accordance with section 231 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance was brought up for consideration, when it was
Resolved,—The Council is not prepared to make any change of system in working the markets, the experience of the past proving that the existing plan is the one least liable to abuse.

2. *Power to alter the Regulations.*—The Company may, by special resolution, alter and make provisions instead of, or in addition to, any of the regulations of the Company, whether contained and comprised in these Articles or not.

INTERPRETATION.

3. *Interpretation Clause.*—In the interpretation of these presents the following words and expressions shall have the following meanings, unless such meanings be inconsistent with, or repugnant to, the subject or context, viz. :—

Company.—The word "Company" means "The Bristol Hotel Company, Limited," incorporated or established by or under the Memorandum of Association to which these Articles are attached.

The Ordinance.—"The Ordinance" means and includes "The Joint Stock Companies' Ordinance, 1861," and every other Ordinance from time to time in force concerning Joint Stock Companies which may apply to the Company.

These Presents.—"These presents" means and includes the Memorandum of Association and the Articles of Association of the Company from time to time in force.

Capital.—"Capital" means the capital for the time being raised or authorised to be raised for the purposes of the Company.

Shares.—"Shares" means the shares from time to time into which the capital of the Company may be divided.

Shareholder.—"Shareholder" means a Shareholder of the Company.

Presence or Present.—"Presence or present" at a meeting means presence or present personally or by proxy.

Directors.—"Directors" means the Directors for the time being of the Company or (as the case may be) the Directors assembled at a Board.

Board.—"Board" means a meeting of the Directors or (as the context may require) the Directors assembled at a Board meeting, acting through at least a quorum of their body in the exercise of authority duly given to them.

Persons.—"Persons" means partnerships, associations, corporations, companies, unincorporated or corporated by Ordinance and registration, as well as individuals.

Office.—"Office" means the registered office for the time being of the Company.

Seal.—"Seal" means the common seal for the time being of the Company.

Month.—"Month" means a calendar month.

Writing.—"Writing" means printed matter or print as well as writing.

Singular and Plural Number.—Words importing the singular number only include the plural, and *vice versa*.

Masculine and Feminine Gender.—Words importing the masculine gender only include the feminine, and *vice versa*.

PRELIMINARY.

The Company shall forthwith purchase and acquire from Frances Elizabeth Dunlop the site now occupied by the Bristol Hotel and adjoining buildings for the sum of Rs. 200,000, and shall forthwith execute a mortgage of the same to secure the repayment of the sum of Rs. 150,000 with interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum.

4. *Commencement of Business.*—The Company may proceed to carry on business and to employ and apply its capital as soon after the registration of the Company as the Directors in their discretion shall think fit. And notwithstanding that the whole of the shares shall not have been subscribed or applied for or allotted, they shall do so as soon in the judgment of the Directors a sufficient number of shares shall have been subscribed or applied for.

5. *Business to be carried on by Directors.*—The business of the Company shall be carried on by or under the management or direction of the Directors, and subject only to the control of General Meetings, in accordance with these presents.

CAPITAL.

6. *Arrangement on issue of Shares.*—The Company may make arrangements on the issue of shares for a difference between the holders of such shares in the amount of calls to be paid and the time of payment of such calls.

7. *Payment of Amount of Shares by Instalments.*—If by the conditions of allotment of any share the whole or part of the amount thereof shall be payable by instalments, every such instalment shall, when due, be paid to the Company by the holder of the share.

8. *Increase or Reduction of Capital.*—The Company in General Meeting may, from time to time, increase the capital by creation of new shares of such amount as may be deemed expedient, or may reduce the capital.

9. *New Shares.*—The new shares shall be issued upon such terms and conditions, and with such rights and privileges annexed thereto, as the General Meeting resolving on the creation thereof, or any other General Meeting of the Company shall direct; and if no direction be given as the Directors shall determine, and in particular such shares may be issued with a preferential or qualified right to the dividends and in the distribution of assets of the Company, and with a special or without any right to voting.

10. *How carried into effect.*—Subject to any direction to the contrary that may be given by the meeting that sanctions the increase of capital, all new shares shall be offered to the Shareholders in proportion to the existing shares held by them, and such offer shall be made by notice specifying the number of shares to which the Shareholder is entitled, and limiting a time within which the offer, if not accepted, will be deemed to be declined, and after the expiration of such time, or on the receipt of an intimation from the Shareholder to whom such notice is given, that he declines to accept the shares offered, the same shall be disposed of in such manner as the Directors may determine.

11. *Same as Original Capital.*—Except so far as otherwise provided by the conditions of issue or by these presents, any capital raised by the creation of new shares shall be considered part of the original capital, and shall be subject to the provisions herein contained with reference to the payments of calls and instalments, transfer and transmission, forfeiture, lien, surrender, and otherwise.

SHARES.

12. *Shares held by a Firm.*—Shares may be registered in the name of a firm, and any partner of the firm or agent duly authorised to sign the name of the firm shall be entitled to vote and to give proxies.

13. *One of Joint Holders, other than a Firm, may give Receipts; the first-named of Joint Holders only entitled to vote.*—Any one of the joint holders of a share other than a firm may give effectual receipts for any dividends payable in respect of such share; but the Shareholder whose name stands first on the register, and no other, shall be entitled to the right of voting and of giving proxies and all other advantages conferred on a sole Shareholder.

14. *Survivor of Joint Holder, other than a Firm, only recognised.*—In case of the death of any one or more of the joint holders of any shares, the survivor or survivors shall be the only person or persons recognised by the Company as having any title to, or interest in, such shares.

15. *Company not bound to recognise any interest in Share other than that of registered Holder or of any Person under Clause Twenty-nine.*—The Company shall not be bound to recognize (even though having notice of) any contingent, future, partial, or equitable interest in the nature of a trust or otherwise in any share, or any other right in respect of any share, except any absolute right thereto in the person from time to time registered as the holder thereof, and except also the right of any person under clause twenty-nine to become a Shareholder in respect of any share.

16. *Certificates.*—The certificates of shares shall be issued under the seal of the Company, and signed by two Directors and the Secretary.

17. *How issued.*—Every Shareholder shall be entitled to one certificate for all the shares, or to several certificates, each for a part of such shares. Every certificate shall specify the number of the shares in respect of which it is issued.

18. *Renewal of Certificate.*—If any certificate be worn out or lost, it may be renewed or replaced after due advertisement by the owner in the *Gazette* and local papers, and on proof of the fact to the satisfaction of the Directors and on such indemnity as they shall require being given, and on payment of Rs. 2.50 for every new certificate.

19. *Certificate to be delivered to the first-named of Joint Holders, not a Firm.*—The certificate of shares registered in the names of two or more persons, not a firm, shall be delivered to the person first-named on the register.

TRANSFER OF SHARES.

20. *Transfer of Shares.*—Subject to the restriction of these Articles, any Shareholder may transfer all or any of his shares by instrument in writing.

21. *No transfer to Infant or Person of Unsound Mind.*—No transfer of shares shall be made to an infant or person of unsound mind.

22. *Register of Transfers.*—The Company shall keep a book or books to be called "The Register of Transfers," in which shall be entered the particulars of every transfer or transmission of any share.

23. *Board may decline to register Transfers.*—The Board may, at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion, decline to register any transfer of shares by a Shareholder who is indebted to the Company, or upon whose shares the Company have a lien or otherwise; or in case of shares not fully paid up, to any person not approved by them.

24. *Not bound to state Reason.*—In no case shall a Shareholder or proposed transferee be entitled to require the Directors to state the reason of their refusal to register, but their declination shall be absolute.

25. *Registration of Transfers.*—Every instrument of transfer must be left at the office of the Company to be registered, accompanied by such evidence as the Directors may reasonably require to prove the title of the transfer, and a fee of rupees two and cents fifty, or such other sum as the Directors shall from time to time determine, must be paid; and thereupon the Directors, subject to the powers vested in them by Articles twenty-three, twenty-four, and twenty-six, shall register the transferee as a Shareholder, and retain the instrument of transfer.

26. The Directors may, by such means as they shall deem expedient, authorise the registration of transferees as Shareholders without the necessity of any meeting of the Directors for that purpose.

27. *Directors not bound to inquire as to validity of Transfer.*—In no case shall the Directors be bound to inquire into the validity, legal effect, or genuineness of any instrument of transfer produced by a person claiming as transferee of any share in accordance with these articles; and whether they abstain from so inquiring, or do so inquire and are misled, the transferor shall have no claim whatsoever upon the Company in respect of the share, except for the dividends previously declared in respect thereof, but only, if at all, upon the transferee.

28. *Transfer Books when to be closed.*—The transfer books may be closed during the fourteen days immediately preceding each Ordinary General Meeting, including the first General Meeting; also, when a dividend is declared, for the three next days ensuing the meeting.

TRANSMISSION OF SHARES.

29. *Title to Shares of deceased Holder.*—The executors or administrators of a deceased Shareholder shall be the only persons recognised by the Company as having any title to the shares of such Shareholder.

30. *Registration of Persons entitled to Shares otherwise than by Transfer.*—Any guardian of any infant Shareholder or any committee of a lunatic Shareholder, or any person becoming entitled to shares in consequence of the death, bankruptcy, or liquidation of any Shareholder, or the marriage of any female Shareholder, or in any other way than by transfer, shall, upon securing such evidence that he sustains the character in respect of which he proposes to act under this clause, or of his title, as the Company think sufficient, be forthwith entitled, subject to the provisions herein contained, to be registered as a Shareholder in respect of such shares; or may, subject to the regulations as to transfers hereinbefore contained, transfer the same to some other person.

31. *Failing such registration Shares may be sold by the Company.*—If any person who shall become entitled to be registered in respect of any share under clause thirtieth shall not, from any cause whatever, within twelve calendar months after the event on the happening of which his title shall accrue, be registered in respect of such share; or if in the case of the death of any Shareholder no person shall within twelve calendar months after such death be registered as a Shareholder in respect of the shares of such deceased Shareholder, the Company may sell such shares, either by public auction or private contract, and give a receipt for the purchase money, and the purchaser shall be entitled to be registered in respect of such share, and shall not be bound to inquire whether the events have happened which entitled the Company to sell the same, and the net proceeds of such sale, after deducting all expenses and all moneys in respect of which the Company is entitled to a lien on the shares so sold, shall be paid to the person entitled thereto.

SHARES (SURRENDER AND FORFEITURE).

32. *The Directors may accept surrender of Shares.*—The Directors may accept, in the name and for the benefit of the Company, and upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed, a surrender of the shares of Shareholders who may be desirous of retiring from the Company.

33. *If Call or Instalment be not paid, notice to be given to Shareholder.*—If any Shareholder fail to pay any call or instalment on or before the day appointed for the payment of the same, the Directors may, at any time thereafter, during such time as the call or instalment remains unpaid, serve a notice on such Shareholder, requiring him to pay the same, together with any interest that may have accrued, and all expenses that may have been incurred by the Company by reason of such non-payment.

Terms of Notice.—The notice shall name a day (not being less than one month from the date of the notice) and a place or places at which such call or instalment and such interest and expenses as aforesaid are to be paid. The notice shall also state that, in the event of non-payment at or before the time and at the place appointed, the shares in respect of which the call was made or instalment is payable will be liable to be forfeited.

In default of payment Shares to be forfeited.—If the requisition of such notice as aforesaid be not complied with, every or any share or shares in respect of which such notice has been given may at any time thereafter, before payment of calls or instalments, interest, and expenses due in respect thereof, be declared forfeited by a resolution of the Board to that effect.

Shareholder still liable to Pay Money owing at time of Forfeiture.—Any Shareholder whose shares have been so declared forfeited shall, notwithstanding, be liable to pay, and shall forthwith pay to the Company all calls, instalments, interest, and expenses owing upon or in respect of such shares at the time of the forfeiture, together with interest thereon from the time of forfeiture, until payment at nine per cent. per annum; and the Directors may enforce the payment thereof if they think fit.

34. *Surrendered or Forfeited Shares to be Property of Company, and may be sold, &c.*—Every share surrendered or so declared forfeited shall be deemed to be the property of the Company, and may be sold, re-allotted, or otherwise disposed of upon such terms and in such manner as the Board shall think fit.

•35. *Effect of Surrender or Forfeiture.*—The surrender or forfeiture of a share shall involve the extinction of all interest in, and also of all claims and demands against, the Company in respect of the share and the proceeds thereof, and all other rights incident to the share, except only such of those rights (if any) as by these presents are expressly saved.

36. *Certificate of Surrender or Forfeiture.*—A certificate in writing under the hands of two of the Directors and of the Secretary, that a share has been duly surrendered or forfeited, stating the time when it was surrendered or forfeited, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated as against all persons who would have been entitled to the share but for such surrender or forfeiture; and such certificate and the receipt of the Company for the price of such share shall constitute a good title to such share, and a certificate of proprietorship shall be delivered to any person who may purchase the same from the Company, and thereupon such purchaser shall be deemed the holder of such share, discharged from all calls due prior to such purchase; and he shall not be bound to see to the application of the purchase money, nor shall his title to such share be affected by any irregularity in the proceedings in reference to such forfeiture or sale.

Forfeiture may be remitted.—The Directors may in their discretion remit or annul the forfeiture of any share within six months from the date thereof upon the payment of all moneys due to the Company from the late holder or holders of such share or shares, and all expenses incurred in relation to such forfeiture, together with such further sum of money by way of redemption money, for the deficit, as they shall think fit, not being less than nine per cent. on the amount of the sums wherein default in payment had been made, but no share, bona fide sold or re-allotted, or otherwise disposed of under Article 34 hereof shall be redeemable after sale or disposal.

37. *Company's Lien on Shares.*—The Company shall have a first charge or paramount lien upon all the shares of any holder or joint holders, for all moneys for the time being due to the Company by such holder, or by all or any of such joint holders respectively, either in respect of such shares or of other shares held by such holder or joint holders, or otherwise, and whether due from any such holder individually or jointly with others, including all calls resolutions for which shall have been passed by the Directors, although the times appointed for the payment thereof shall not have arrived; and where any share is held by more persons than one, the Company shall be entitled to the said charge or lien in respect of any money due to the Company from any of such person. And the Directors may decline to register any transfer of shares subject to such charge or lien.

38. *Lien how made available.*—Such charge or lien may be made available by a sale of all or any of the shares subject to it, provided that no such sale shall be made except under a resolution of the Directors, and until notice in writing shall have been given to the indebted Shareholder or his executors or administrators, or the assignee or trustee in his bankruptcy, requiring him or them to pay the amount for the time being due to the Company, and default shall have been made for twenty-eight days from such notice in paying the sum thereby required to be paid. Should the Shareholder over whose share the lien exists be in England or elsewhere abroad, sixty days' notice shall be allowed him.

39. *Proceeds how applied.*—The net proceeds of any such sale shall be applied in or towards satisfaction of such debts, liabilities, or engagements, and the residue (if any) paid to such Shareholder or his representatives.

40. *Certificate of Sale.*—A certificate in writing under the hands of two of the Directors and of the Secretary, that the power of sale given by clause 38 has arisen, and is exercisable by the Company under these presents, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated.

41. *Transfer on Sale how executed.*—Upon any such sale, two of the Directors may execute a transfer of such share to the purchaser thereof, and such transfer, with the certificate last aforesaid, shall confer on the purchaser a complete title to such shares.

CALLS.

42. *Directors may make Calls.*—The Directors may from time to time make such calls as they think fit upon the holders of registered shares in respect of moneys unpaid thereon, and not by the conditions of allotment made payable at fixed times; and each Shareholder shall pay the amount of every call so made on him to the persons and at the times and places appointed by the Directors, provided that two months' notice at least shall be given to the Shareholders of the time and place appointed for payment of each call. If any Shareholder fail to pay any call due from him on the day appointed for payment thereof, he shall be liable to pay interest for the same at the rate of nine per cent. per annum from the day appointed for the payment thereof to the time of actual payment.

Calls, time when made.—A call shall be deemed to have been made at the time when the resolution authorising the call was passed at a Board meeting of the Directors.

Extension of time for payment of Call.—The Directors shall have power in their absolute discretion to give time to any one or more Shareholder or Shareholders, exclusive of the others, for payment of any call or part thereof, on such terms as the Directors may determine. But no Shareholder shall be entitled to any such extension except as a matter of grace or favour.

43. *Payments in anticipation of Calls at Interest.*—The Directors may at their discretion receive from any Shareholder willing to advance the same, and upon such terms as they think fit, all or any part of the amount of his shares beyond the sum actually called up, and upon the moneys so paid in advance, or upon so much thereof from time to time and at any time thereafter, as exceeds the amount of the calls then made upon, and due in respect of, the shares on account of which such advances are made, the Board may pay or allow interest at such rate as the Shareholder and the Directors may agree upon, not exceeding, however, six per cent. per annum.

BORROWING POWERS.

44. *Power to Borrow.*—The Directors may from time to time, at their discretion, borrow any sum or sums of money for the purposes of the Company, and may raise or secure the re-payment of such moneys in such manner and upon such terms and conditions in all respects as they think fit, and may issue debentures of the Company charged upon all or any part of the property of the company (both present and future) including its uncalled capital for the time being.

MEETINGS.

45. *Ordinary General Meeting.*—An Ordinary General Meeting of the Company shall be held at least once a year after the incorporation of the Company and oftener whenever the Directors shall so determine. The General Meeting shall take place at such time and place as the Directors shall appoint, provided, nevertheless, that a General Meeting of the Company shall be held within six months after the date of the registration of the Company, but such General Meeting shall not (unless otherwise determined at such meeting) be considered to have been in lieu of that hereby appointed to be held in the first year after the incorporation of the Company.

46. *Extraordinary General Meeting.*—The Directors may, whenever they think fit, call an Extraordinary General Meeting, and the Directors shall do so upon a requisition made in writing by not less than one-eighth of the number of Shareholders holding not less than one-eighth of the issued capital, and entitled to vote.

47. *Requisition of Shareholders to state object of Meeting; on receipt of Requisition Directors to call Meeting, and in default Shareholders may do so.*—Any requisition so made shall express the object of the meeting proposed to be called, shall be addressed to the Directors, and shall be sent to the Registered Office of the Company. Upon the receipt of such requisition the Directors shall forthwith proceed to convene an Extraordinary General Meeting to be held at such time and place as they shall determine. If they do not proceed to convene the same within seven days from the delivery of the requisition, the requisitionists may themselves convene an Extraordinary General Meeting to be held at such place and at such time as the Shareholders convening the meeting may themselves fix.

48. *Seven days' notice of Meeting to be given.*—Seven days' notice at least of every General Meeting, ordinary or extraordinary, and by whomsoever convened, specifying the place, day, hour of meeting, and the objects and business of the meeting, shall be given to the Shareholders entitled to be present at such meeting in manner hereinafter mentioned, but an accidental omission to give such notice to any Shareholder shall not invalidate the proceedings at any General Meeting.

49. *Business requiring and not requiring Notification.*—Every Ordinary General Meeting shall be competent without special notice having been given of the purposes for which it is convened, or of the business to be transacted thereat, to receive and discuss any report and any accounts presented thereto by the Directors, and to pass resolutions in approval or disapproval thereof, and to declare dividends, and to elect Directors and Auditors retiring in rotation, and to fix the remuneration of the Auditors, and shall also be competent to enter upon, discuss, and transact any business whatever, of which special mention shall have been given in the notice or notices upon which the meeting was convened.

50. *Notice of other business to be given.*—With the exceptions mentioned in the foregoing articles as to the business which may be transacted at Ordinary General Meetings without notice, no General Meeting, ordinary or extraordinary, shall be competent to enter upon, discuss, or transact any business which has not been specially mentioned in the notice or notices upon which it was convened.

51. *Quorum to be present.*—No business shall be transacted at any General Meeting, except the declaration of a dividend recommended by a report of the Directors or election of a Chairman, unless there shall be present in person at the commencement of the business seven or more Shareholders entitled to vote.

52. *If quorum not present Meeting to be dissolved or adjourned; adjourned Meeting to transact business.*—If at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting the required number of Shareholders shall not be present at the meeting, the meeting, if convened by or upon the requisition of Shareholders, shall be dissolved; but in any other case it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place. And if at such adjourned meeting a quorum is not present, those Shareholders who are present shall be a quorum, and may transact the business for which the meeting was called.

53. *Chairman of Directors or a Director to be Chairman of General Meeting; in case of their absence or refusal a Shareholder may act.*—The Chairman (if any) of the Directors shall be entitled to take the chair at every General Meeting, whether ordinary or extraordinary; or if there be no chairman, or if at any meeting he shall not be present within fifteen minutes after the time appointed for holding such meeting, or if he shall refuse to take the chair, the Shareholders shall choose another Director as Chairman; and if no Directors be present, or if all the Directors present decline to take the chair, then the Shareholders present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman.

54. *Business confined to election of Chairman while chair vacant.*—No business shall be discussed at any General Meeting except the election of a Chairman whilst the chair is vacant.

55. *Chairman with consent may adjourn Meeting.*—The Chairman, with the consent of the meeting, may adjourn any meeting from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place, unless due notice shall be given.

56. *Minutes of General Meeting.*—Minutes of the proceedings of every General Meeting, whether ordinary or extraordinary, shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall, when so entered, be signed as soon as practicable by the Chairman of the same meeting or by the Chairman of the succeeding meeting, and the same when so entered and signed shall be evidence of all such proceedings and of the proper election of the Chairman.

VOTING AT MEETINGS.

57. *Votes.*—At any meeting every resolution shall be decided by the votes of the Shareholders present in person or by proxy, and in case there shall be an equality of votes, the Chairman at such meeting shall be entitled to give a

casting vote in addition to the vote to which he may be entitled as a Shareholder, and unless a poll be immediately demanded in writing by at least three members present and entitled to vote, a declaration by the Chairman that a resolution has been carried, and an entry to that effect in the minute book of the Company, shall be sufficient evidence of the fact, without proof of the number of votes recorded in favour of or against such resolution.

58. *Poll.*—If a poll be duly demanded, the same shall be taken in such manner and at such time, and place as the Chairman shall direct, and the result of the poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the meeting at which the poll was demanded. The demand of a poll shall not prevent the continuance of a meeting for the transaction of any business other than the question on which a poll has been demanded.

59. *Poll how taken.*—If at any meeting a poll be demanded by notice in writing, signed by three Shareholders present at the meeting and entitled to vote, which notice shall be delivered during the meeting to the Chairman, the meeting shall, if necessary, be adjourned, and the poll shall be taken at such time and in such manner as the Chairman shall direct; and in such case every Shareholder shall have the number of votes to which he may be entitled as hereinafter provided; and in case at any such poll there shall be an equality of votes, the Chairman of the meeting at which such poll shall have been demanded shall be entitled to a casting vote in addition to any votes to which he may be entitled as a Shareholder and proxy, and the result of such poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the Company in such meeting.

60. *No Poll on election of Chairman or on question of Adjournment.*—No poll shall be demanded on the election of a Chairman of the meeting, or on any question of adjournment.

61. *Number of Votes to which Shareholder entitled.*—Every Shareholder shall have one vote for every share up to ten, an additional vote for every five shares beyond the first ten up to one hundred, and an additional vote for every ten shares beyond the first hundred up to four hundred, beyond which shares will not carry votes.

62. *Guardian of Infant, &c., when not entitled to Vote.*—The parent or guardian of an infant Shareholder, the committee or other legal guardian of any lunatic Shareholder, the husband of any female Shareholder, not entitled to her shares as separate estate, and the executor or administrator of any deceased Shareholder, or any one of such persons as aforesaid, if more than one, shall not be entitled to vote in the place of such infant, lunatic, female, or deceased person, unless such person shall have been registered as a Shareholder.

63. *Voting in Person or by Proxy.*—Votes may be given either personally or by proxy.

64. *Non-shareholder not to be appointed Proxy.*—No person shall be entitled a proxy who is not a Shareholder of the Company.

65. *Shareholder in Arrear not to Vote.*—No Shareholder shall be entitled to vote or speak at any General Meeting unless all calls due from him on his shares, or any of them, shall have been paid.

66. *Proxy to be printed or in Writing.*—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be printed or written; and shall be signed by the appointor, or if such appointor be a corporation, it shall be by the common seal of such corporation.

67. *When Proxy to be deposited.*—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be deposited at the Registered Office of the Company not less than twenty-four hours before the time appointed for holding the meeting at which the person named in such instrument proposes to vote.

68. *Form of Proxy.*—Any instrument appointing a proxy may be in the following form:—

The Bristol Hotel Company, Limited.

I, _____, of _____, appoint _____, of _____ (a Shareholder in the Company) as my proxy to represent me and to vote for me and on my behalf at the Ordinary (or Extraordinary, as the case may be) General Meeting of the Company to be held on the _____ day of _____, One thousand Eight hundred and _____, and at any adjournment thereof, and at every poll which may be taken in consequence thereof.

69. *Objection to Validity of Vote to be made at the Meeting or Poll.*—No objection shall be made to the validity of any vote (whether given personally or by proxy) except at the meeting or poll at which such vote shall be tendered and every vote (whether given personally or by proxy) to which no objection shall be made at such meeting or poll shall be deemed valid for all purposes of such meeting or poll whatsoever.

70. *No Shareholder to be prevented from voting by being Personally interested in result.*—No Shareholder shall be prevented from voting by reason of his being personally interested in the result of the voting.

71. *Shareholder should be registered for three months previous to Meeting before he can vote.*—Every Shareholder not disqualified by the preceding Articles, who has been duly registered for three months previous to the General Meeting, shall be entitled to be present, and to speak and vote at all meetings.

DIRECTORS.

72. *Number of Directors.*—The number of Directors shall never be less than four nor more than eight.

73. *Their qualification and Remuneration.*—The qualification of a Director shall be his holding in his own right at least fifteen shares, and this qualification shall apply as well to the first Directors as to all future Directors. As a remuneration for their services, the Directors shall be entitled to appropriate a sum not exceeding rupees two thousand (Rs. 2,000) annually, to be divided between them in such manner as they may determine, but the Company, in General Meeting may at any time alter the amount of such remuneration for the future; and such remuneration shall not be considered as including any remuneration for special or extra services hereinafter referred to, nor any extra remuneration to the Managing Directors of the Company.

74. *Appointment of first Directors and duration of their Office.*—The first Directors shall be the Hon. L. H. Kelly, M.L.C.; A. E. Scovell, Esq.; H. Drummond Deane, Esq.; W. B. Paterson, Esq.; C. E. H. Symons, Esq.; S. Bois, Esq.; D. Edwards, Esq., who shall hold office till the first Ordinary Meeting, when they shall all retire, but shall be eligible for re-election.

75. *Directors may appoint Managing Director or Directors; his or their Remuneration.*—One or more of the Directors may be appointed by the Directors to act as Managing Director or Managing Directors of the Company for such time and on such terms as the Directors may determine or fix by agreement with the person or persons appointed to the office, and they may, from time to time, revoke such appointment and appoint another or other Managing Director, or Managing Directors, and the Directors may devolve on the Managing Director or Managing Directors all or any duties and powers that might be devolved on any Manager of the Company. If any Director shall be called upon to perform any extra services, the Directors may arrange with such Director for such special remuneration for such services, either by way of salary, commission, or the payment of a lump sum of money, as they shall think fit.

76. *Appointment of Successors to Directors.*—The General Meeting at which Directors retire or ought to retire by rotation shall appoint successors to them, and in default thereof such successors may be appointed at a subsequent General Meeting.

77. *Board may fill up Vacancies and add to their Number.*—The Board shall have power at any time and from time to time before the first Ordinary Meeting to supply any vacancies in their number arising from death, resignation, or otherwise.

78. *Duration of Office of Directors appointed to Vacancy.*—Any casual vacancy occurring in the number of Directors subsequent to first Ordinary Meeting may be filled up by the Directors, but any person so chosen shall retain his office so long only as the vacating Director would have retained the same if no vacancy had occurred.

79. *Two to retire Annually.*—At the second Ordinary General Meeting and at the Ordinary General Meeting in every subsequent year two of the Directors for the time being shall retire from office as provided in clause

80. *Retiring Directors how determined.*—The Directors to retire from office at the second and third Ordinary General Meeting shall, unless the Directors otherwise arrange among themselves, be determined by ballot; in every subsequent year the Directors to retire shall be those who have been longest in office.

81. *Retiring Directors eligible for Re-election.*—Retiring Directors shall be eligible for re-election.

82. *Decision of question as to retirement.*—In case any question shall arise as to which of the Directors who have been the same time in office shall retire, the same shall be decided by the Directors by ballot.

83. *Number of Directors how increased or reduced.*—The Directors, subject to the approval of a General Meeting, may from time to time, at any time subsequent to the second Ordinary Meeting, increase or reduce the number of Directors, and may also, subject to the like approval, determine in what rotation such increased or reduced number is to go out of office.

84. *If election not made, retiring Directors to continue until next Meeting.*—If at any meeting at which an election of a Director ought to take place, the place of the retiring Director is not filled up, the retiring Director may continue in office until the first Ordinary Meeting in the next year, and so on from meeting to meeting until his place is filled up, unless it shall be determined at such meeting to reduce the number of Directors.

85. *Resignation of Directors.*—A Director may at any time give notice in writing of his intention to resign by delivering such notice to the Secretary, or by leaving the same at the office, or by tendering his written resignation at a meeting of the Directors, and on the acceptance of his resignation by the Directors, but not before, his office shall become vacant.

86. *When Office of Director to be vacated.*—The office of Director shall be vacated—

- (a) If he accepts or holds any office or place of profit other than Managing Director or Secretary under the Company.
- (b) If he becomes bankrupt or insolvent, or suspends payment, or files a petition for the liquidation of his affairs, or compounds with his creditors.
- (c) If by reason of mental or bodily infirmity he becomes incapable of acting.
- (d) If he ceases to hold the required number of shares to qualify him for the office.
- (e) If he is concerned or participates in the profits of any contract with, or work done for, the Company.

Exceptions.—But the above rules shall be subject to the following exceptions:—That no Director shall vacate his office by reason of his being a member of any corporation, company, or firm which has entered into any contract with or done any work for, the Company of which he is a Director, or by his being agent, or secretary, or solicitor, or by his being a member of a firm who are agents, or secretaries, or solicitors of the Company: nevertheless he shall not vote in respect of any contract, work, or business in which he may be personally interested.

87. *How Directors removed and Successors appointed.*—The Company may, by a special resolution, remove any Director before the expiration of his period of office, and may by an ordinary resolution appoint another person in his stead, and the Director so appointed shall hold office only during such time as the Director in whose place he is appointed would have held the same if he had not been removed.

88. *Indemnity to Directors and others for their own acts and for the acts of others.*—Every Director or officer and his heirs, executors, and administrators shall be indemnified by the Company from all losses and expenses incurred by him respectively in or about the discharge of his respective duties, except such as happen from his respective wilful acts or defaults; and no Director or officer, nor the heirs, executors, or administrators of any Director or officer, shall be liable for any other Director or officer, or for joining in any receipt or other acts of conformity, or for any loss or expense happening to the Company by the insufficiency or deficiency of title to any property acquired for or on behalf of the Company, or for the insufficiency or deficiency of any security in or upon which any of the moneys of the Company shall be invested, or for any loss or damage arising from the bankruptcy, insolvency, or tortuous act of any person with whom any moneys, securities, or effects shall be deposited, or for any other loss, damage, or misfortune whatsoever which shall happen in the execution of the duties of his respective office, or in relation thereto, unless the same happen through his own wilful act or default.

89. *No Contribution to be required from Directors beyond Amount, if any, unpaid on their Shares.*—No contribution shall be required from any present or past Director or Manager, exceeding the amount, if any, unpaid on the shares in respect of which he is liable as a present or past Shareholder.

POWERS OF DIRECTORS.

90. *Powers of Directors.*—The business of the Company shall be managed by the Directors either by themselves or through the Managing Director, or by an agent or agents, secretary or secretaries of the Company, in such manner as the Directors shall determine; and the Directors shall pay out of the funds of the Company all costs and expenses as well preliminary as otherwise, paid or incurred in and about the formation and the registration of the Company, and in connection with the placing of the shares of the Company.

91. The Directors shall carry on the business of the Company in such manner as they may think most expedient; and in addition to the powers and authorities by any Ordinance or by these presents expressly conferred on them, they may exercise all such powers, give all such consents, make all such arrangements, appoint all such agents, managers, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, and other officers, clerks, assistants, artisans, and workers, and generally do all such acts and things as are or shall be by any Ordinance and by these presents directed and authorised to be exercised, given, made, or done by the Company, and are not by any Ordinance or by these presents required to be exercised or done by the Company in General Meeting; subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of any such Ordinance and of these presents, and to such regulations and provisions (if any) as may from time to time be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting; but no regulation made by the Company in General Meeting shall invalidate any prior act of the Board which would have been valid if such regulation had not been made.

The generality of the powers conferred by any clause in these presents on the Directors shall not be taken to be limited by any clause conferring any special or expressed power.

92. The Directors shall have power to make and may make, such regulations for the management of the business and property of the Company as they may from time to time think proper, and for that purpose may appoint such managers, agents, secretaries, officers, clerks, and servants for such period or periods, and with such remuneration, and at such salaries, and upon such terms and conditions as they may consider advisable, and may pay the expenses occasioned thereby out of the funds of the Company, and may from time to time remove or suspend all or any of the managers, agents, officers, clerks, or servants for such reasons as they may think proper and advisable, and without assigning any cause.

93. The Directors shall have power to open from time to time, on behalf of the Company, any account or accounts with such bank or banks as they may select or appoint; and also, by such signatures as they may appoint, to draw, accept, make, endorse, and sign cheques, bills of exchange and promissory notes, bills of lading, receipts, contracts, and agreements, and other documents on behalf and for the purposes of the Company, also proxy or proxies to any proctor or proctors.

94. The Directors shall also have power to appoint an agent or secretary, or agents or secretaries, and to enter into agreements in connection therewith; also to appoint a proctor or proctors, attorney or attorneys, and whatever other officers they may consider necessary to assist in carrying on the business of the Company, and from time to time to revoke such appointments. They shall from time to time determine as they shall see fit the duties of the agent or secretary or agents or secretaries and of the Managing Director and other officers; and may delegate to him or them all or any of the powers hereby made exercisable by the Directors, except those relating to shares and any others as to which special provisions, inconsistent with such delegation, are herein contained; and they shall have power to fix the remuneration of such agent or secretary, or agents or secretaries, and Managing Director and other officers. They shall not, however, be entitled to delegate any powers of borrowing or charging the property of the Company to any agent of the Company or other person, except by instrument in writing, which shall specifically state the extent to which such powers may be used by the person or persons to whom they are so delegated, and the conditions under which they may be so used; and such limitations and conditions shall be an essential part of the powers so delegated, and compliance therewith shall be a condition precedent to the exercise of these powers. The Directors shall also have the power to bring or defend any action, suit, prosecution, or other legal proceedings in the name of the Company.

95. It shall be lawful for the Directors, if authorised so to do by the Shareholders in General Meeting, to arrange terms for the amalgamation of the Company with any other Company or individual or individuals, or for the sale or disposal of the business, estate, and effects of the Company, or any part thereof, respectively, to any Company or person, upon such terms and in such manner as the Directors shall think fit; and the Directors shall have power to do all such things as may be necessary for carrying such amalgamation, sale, or other disposition into effect, so far as a resolution or special resolution of the Company is not by law necessary for such purpose; and in case any terms so arranged by the Directors include or make necessary the dissolution of the Company, the Company shall thereupon be dissolved.

96. The Directors shall exercise in the name and on behalf of the Company all such powers of the Company as are not expressly required to be exercised by the Company in General Meeting.

PROCEEDINGS OF DIRECTORS.

97. *Meeting of Directors.*—The Directors may meet for the despatch of business, adjourn, and otherwise regulate their meetings as they may think fit, and determine the quorum necessary for the transaction of business. Until otherwise determined, two Directors shall be a quorum.

98. *A Director may summon Meetings of Directors.*—A Director may at any time summon a meeting of Directors.

99. *Who is to preside at Meetings of Board.*—The Board may elect a Chairman of their meetings and determine the period for which he is to hold office, and all meetings of the Directors shall be presided over by the Chairman, if one has been elected, and if present; but if there be a vacancy in the office of Chairman, or if at any meeting of Directors the Chairman be not present at the time appointed for holding the same, then and in that case the Directors present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting.

100. *Questions at Meetings how decided.*—Any question which shall arise at any meeting of the Directors shall be decided by a majority of votes; and in case of an equality of votes the Chairman thereat shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a Director.

101. *Board may appoint Committees.*—The Board may delegate any of their powers to Committees consisting of such member or members of their body as the Board think fit, and they may from time to time revoke and discharge any such Committee, either wholly or in part, and either as to persons or purposes; but every Committee so formed shall, in exercise of the powers delegated to it, conform to all such regulations as may be prescribed by the Board; all acts done by any such Committee in conformity with such regulations and in the fulfilment of the purposes of their appointment, but not otherwise, shall have the like force and effect as if done by the Board.

102. *Acts of Board or Committees valid notwithstanding informal Appointment.*—The acts of the Board and of any Committees appointed by the Board shall, notwithstanding any vacancy in the Board or Committee or defect in the appointment of any Director or of any member of the Committee, be as valid as if no such vacancy or defect had existed, and as if every person had been duly appointed, provided the same be done before the discovery of the defect.

103. *Regulation of Proceedings of Committees.*—The meetings and proceedings of such Committees shall be governed by the provisions herein contained for regulating the meetings and proceedings of Directors, so far as the same are applicable thereto, and be not superseded by the express terms of the appointment of such Committees respectively, or any regulation imposed by the Board.

104. *Resolution in Writing by all the Directors as valid as if passed at a Meeting of Directors.*—A resolution in writing signed by all the Directors shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the Directors duly called and constituted.

105. *Minutes of Proceedings of the Company and the Directors to be recorded.*—The Directors shall cause minutes to be made in books to be provided for the purpose of the following matters, *videlicet* :—

- (a) Of all appointments of officers and committees made by the Directors.
- (b) Of the names of the Directors present at each meeting of the Directors and of the members of the committee appointed by the Board present at each meeting of the committee.
- (c) Of the proceedings of all General Meetings.
- (d) Of the proceedings of all meetings of the Directors and of the committees appointed by the Board.

106. *Signature of Minutes of Proceedings and effect thereof.*—All such minutes shall be signed by the person or one of the persons who shall have presided as Chairman at the General Meeting, the Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, at which the business minuted shall have been transacted, or by the person or one of the persons who shall preside as Chairman at the next ensuing General Meeting, or Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, respectively; and all minutes purporting to have been signed by any Chairman of any General Meeting, Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, respectively, shall, for all purposes whatsoever, be *prima facie* evidence of the actual and regular passing of the resolutions, and the actual and regular transaction or occurrence of the proceedings and other matters purporting to be so recorded, and of the regularity of the meeting at which the same shall appear to have taken place, and of the Chairmanship and signature of the person appearing to have signed as Chairman.

107. *When the Business of the Company shall commence.*—The Directors shall be at liberty to carry on the business of the Company as soon as they shall think fit, notwithstanding the whole capital may not have been subscribed for or taken.

108. *The use of the Seal.*—The seal of the Company shall not be used or affixed to any deed or instrument except in the presence of two or more of the Directors, who shall attest the sealing thereof.

ACCOUNTS.

109. *What Accounts to be kept.*—The Agent or Secretary or the Agents or Secretaries for the time being, or, if there be no Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries, the Directors shall cause true accounts to be kept of the paid up capital for the time being of the Company, and of all sums of money received and expended by the Company, and of the matters in respect of which such receipts and expenditure take place, and of the assets, credits, and liabilities of the Company, and generally of all its commercial, financial, and other affairs, transactions, and engagements, and of all other matters necessary for showing the true financial state and condition of the Company, and the accounts shall be kept in such books and in such a manner at the Registered Office of the Company as the Directors think fit.

110. *Accounts how and when open to Inspection.*—The Directors shall from time to time determine whether, and to what extent, and at what times and places, and under what conditions or regulations, the accounts and books of the Company or of any of them shall be open to the inspection of the Shareholders; and no Shareholder shall have any right of inspecting any account, or book, or document of the Company except as conferred by the statutes, or authorised by the Directors, or by a resolution of the Company in General Meeting.

111. *Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet to be furnished to General Meetings.*—At the Ordinary General Meeting in every year the Directors shall lay before the Company a statement of the income and expenditure, and a balance sheet containing a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company made up to the end of the previous year.

112. *Report to accompany Statement.*—Every such statement shall be accompanied by a report as to the state and condition of the Company, and as to the amount which they recommend to be paid out of the profits by way of dividend or bonus to the Shareholders, and the statement, report, and balance sheet shall be signed by the Directors.

113. *Copy of Balance Sheet to be sent to Shareholders.*—A printed copy of such balance sheet shall at least seven days previous to such meeting be delivered at, or posted to, the registered address of every Shareholder.

DIVIDENDS, BONUS, AND RESERVE FUND.

114. *Declaration of Dividend.*—The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting from time to time declare a dividend to be paid to the Shareholders in proportion to their shares; but no dividend shall be payable except out of net profits.

115. *Interim Dividend.*—The Directors may, if they think fit, determine on and declare an interim dividend to be paid to the Shareholders on account and in anticipation of the dividend on the then current year.

116. *Reserve Fund.*—Previously to the Directors recommending any dividend, they may set aside, out of the profits of the Company, such a sum as they think proper as a reserve fund, and shall invest the same in such securities as they shall think fit, or place the same in fixed deposit in any bank or banks.

117. *Application thereof.*—The Directors may from time to time apply such portion as they think fit of the reserve fund to meet contingencies, or for equalising dividends, or for working the business of the Company, or for repairing, or maintaining, or extending the buildings and premises, or for the repair, or renewal, or extension of the property or plant connected with the business of the Company, or any part thereof, or for any other purpose of the Company which they from time to time deem expedient.

118. *Unpaid Interest or Dividend not to bear Interest.*—No unpaid interest or dividend shall ever bear interest against the Company.

119. *No Shareholder to receive Dividend while Debt due to Company.*—No Shareholder shall be entitled to receive payment of any dividend in respect of his share or shares whilst any moneys may be due or owing from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company in respect of such share or shares, or otherwise howsoever.

120. *Directors may deduct Debt from the Dividends.*—The Directors may deduct from the dividend payable to any Shareholder all sums of money due from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company, and notwithstanding such sums shall not be payable until after the date when such dividend is payable.

121. *Notice of Dividend: Forfeiture of Unclaimed Dividend.*—Notice of all interest or dividends to become payable shall be given to each Shareholder entitled thereto; and all interests or dividends unclaimed by any Shareholder for three years after notice thereof is given may be forfeited by a resolution of the Board of Directors for the benefit of the Company, and if the Directors think fit, may be applied in augmentation of the reserve fund.

122. *Shares held by a Firm.*—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by a firm may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any partner of such firm, or agent duly authorised to sign the name of the firm.

123. *Joint Holders other than a Firm.*—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by several persons jointly, other than a firm, may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any one of such persons.

AUDIT.

124. *Accounts to be Audited.*—The accounts of the Company shall from time to time be examined, and the correctness of the balance sheet ascertained by one or more Auditor or Auditors.

125. *Qualification of Auditors.*—No person shall be eligible as an Auditor who is interested otherwise than as a Shareholder in any transaction of the Company, but it shall not be a necessary qualification for an Auditor that he be a Shareholder of the Company, and no Director or officer of the Company shall, during his continuance in office, be eligible as an Auditor.

126. *Appointment and Retirement of Auditors.*—The Directors shall appoint the first Auditors of the Company and fix their remuneration; and all future Auditors, except as is hereinafter mentioned, shall be appointed at the first Ordinary General Meeting of the Company in each year by the Shareholders present thereat, and shall hold their office only until the first Ordinary General Meeting after their respective appointment, or until otherwise ordered by a General Meeting.

127. *Retiring Auditors eligible for Re-election.*—Retiring Auditors shall be eligible for re-election.

128. *Remuneration of Auditors.*—The remuneration of the Auditors other than the first shall be fixed by the Company in General Meeting, and this remuneration may from time to time be varied by a General Meeting.

129. *Casual Vacancy in Number of Auditors how filled up.*—If any vacancy that may occur in the office of Auditor shall not be supplied at any Ordinary General Meeting, or if any casual vacancy shall occur, the Directors shall (subject to the approval of the next Ordinary General Meeting) fill up the vacancy by the appointment of a person who shall hold the office until such meeting.

130. *Duty of Auditors.*—Every Auditor shall be supplied with a copy of the balance sheet intended to be laid before the next Ordinary General Meeting, and it shall be his duty to examine the same with the accounts and vouchers relating thereto, and to report thereon to the meeting generally or specially, as he may think fit.

131. *Company's Accounts to be open to Auditors for Audit.*—All accounts, books, and documents whatsoever of the Company shall at all times be open to the Auditors for the purpose of audit.

NOTICES.

132. *Notices how authenticated.*—Notices from the Company may be authenticated by the signature (printed or written) of the Agent or Secretary, Agents or Secretaries, or other persons appointed by the Board to do so.

133. *Shareholders to register Address.*—Every Shareholder shall give an address in Ceylon, which shall be deemed to be his place of abode, and shall be registered as such in the books of the Company.

Service of Notices.—A notice may be served by the Company upon any Shareholder, either personally or by sending through post in a prepaid letter, addressed to such Shareholder at his registered address or place of abode; and any notice so served shall be deemed to be well served for all purposes, notwithstanding that the Shareholder to whom such notice is addressed be dead, unless and until his executors or administrators shall have given to the Directors, or to the Agent or Secretary, or Agents or Secretaries of the Company, their own or some other address.

134. *Notice to Joint Holders of Shares other than a Firm.*—All notices directed to be given to Shareholders shall, with respect to any share to which persons are jointly entitled other than a firm, be given to whichever of such persons is named first in the register of Shareholders; and notice so given shall be sufficient notice to all the holders of such shares.

135. *Date and Proof of Service.*—Any notice if served by post shall be deemed to have been served on the day on which the letter containing the same would in ordinary course of post have been delivered at its address; and in proving such service it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter containing the notice was properly addressed and put into a post office or post box; and the entry in the Company's books of the leaving or sending by post of any notice at or to such address shall be sufficient evidence thereof, and no further evidence shall be necessary.

136. *Non-resident Shareholders must Register Addresses in Ceylon.*—Every Shareholder residing out of Ceylon shall name and register in the books of the Company an address within Ceylon at which all notices shall be served upon him, and all notices served at such address shall be deemed to be well served. If he shall not have named and registered such an address, he shall not be entitled to any notices.

ARBITRATION.

137. *Directors may refer Disputes to Arbitration.*—Whenever any question or other matter whatsoever arises in dispute between the Company and any other Company or person, the same may be referred by the Directors to arbitration.

EVIDENCE.

138. *Evidence in Action by Company against Shareholders.*—On the trial or hearing of any action or suit brought or instituted by the Company against any Shareholder or his representatives to recover any debt or money claimed to be due to the Company in respect of his shares, it shall be sufficient to prove that the name of the defendant is or was when the claim arose on the register of Shareholders of the Company as a holder of the number of shares in respect of which such claim is made, and that the amount claimed is not entered as paid in the books of the Company; and it shall not be necessary to prove the registration of the Company nor the appointment of the Directors who made any call, nor that a quorum of Directors was present at the Board at which any call was made, nor that the meeting at which any call was made was duly convened or constituted, nor any other matter whatsoever; but the proof of the matters aforesaid shall be conclusive evidence of the debt.

PROVISION RELATIVE TO WINDING UP OR DISSOLUTION OF THE COMPANY.

139. *Purchase of Company's Property by Shareholders.*—Any shareholder, whether a Director or not, or whether alone or jointly with any other Shareholder or Director, and any person not a Shareholder, may become the purchaser of the property of the Company, or any part thereof, in the event of a winding up or a dissolution; or at any other time when a sale of the Company's property or effects, or any part thereof, shall be made by the Directors under the powers hereby, or under the Ordinance, conferred upon them.
