


A word to the teacher

They represented different backgrounds in the school system. Every effort, therefore, was made to utilize these differences in a positive way. This is especially important in a situation where there is a single text for the entire country. Experience has shown the difficulty of producing a single textbook for the entire country, especially for the teaching of English language with the differences that exist between the language requirements of the affluent urban students and the rural. Thus the English teacher is aware of the value of the textbook for the student. It is sometimes the only resource for vocabulary, structure and use, in many schools:

It is imperative, therefore that teachers make themselves familiar with the text book. The text gives flexibility to the teacher in the choice of materials and activities. Group work and pair work can be made use of in ways most convenient to the individual teacher. The presentation of the material is done in order to create an interest in the child, make the engagement with material challenging and interesting so as to ensure that learning takes place.

Teachers are-required to build appropriate learning situations within the students' experience to facilitate the internalization of language. Teachers should also realize that a language syllabus does not and could not have watertight compartments from one year to the next; what 'a new text can do and does is to supply a different context to provide for novelty and innovation. The experience of the previous year's language text therefore, should be considered in continuity.

The texts are mostly 'home grown', drawing on the wealth of traditions, folklore and even the literature of-the country. This should certainly enable the students to feel at home and exercise their imagination in a foreign language-learning situation.

The workbook is based on the language learning activities presented in the textbook. The teachers are required to be familiar with the activities in the workbook too, so that they can see the relationship between the two books. Activities in the workbook will facilitate assessment. We trust that both leaners and teachers will find these books helpful.



The Principal, Teachers and the members of the Nature club, I must first appreciate you as **one of the few** schools that has a Nature Club.

Some people do not care for animals and do not think of the rights of animals. That is why we have so many stray dogs in and around the towns and in public places like the temples and the schools. People use dogs as watchers but when they have puppies they dump them in public places or on the streets. That is one of the main reasons why rabies has raised its head in certain areas. What we are trying to do is to vaccinate and sterilize stray dogs. We do it free of charge.

* Excuse me madam. I am sorry to interrupt you. Why should people vaccinate the dogs?

That's a good question. People should vaccinate them so that they will not get diseases like Pavo. We sterilize them so that they will not have puppies.



*Was it easy to look after stray dogs?

When the numbers increased looking after and feeding them became a big problem. Then we had to ask for donations. The dogs suffered as they did not have enough food and space.

* What did you do to them?

We treated them and **put them back** where they used to live. The benefit is that the dogs are familiar with their surroundings and can look after themselves. In time to come there will be no puppies. The number of stray dogs will decrease and finally there will be none at all.

We have one or two voluntary workers in every area. There are people who help us without a payment like Mrs.Perera. They help us to organize programmes in villages.

* How can we help?

This is where you will have to **play a part**. Help us to get everyone to bring their dogs for treatment. Then the stray dog menace will **soon be over**.



* Who has been helping you?

The Grama Sevakas and the chief priests in this area have been helping us a lot. The chief priest has included this topic in his sermons and people think twice before they dump unwanted puppies now.

Thank you for giving me this opportunity to talk about our programme. I am sure you all will help us to **get rid of** stray dogs in Kengalle.



IRISH COINS SET FEATURES OF ANIMALS

This set of seven Irish coins includes a 1 Punt (pound) showing an Irish Red Deer, a seven-sided 50 Pence picturing a Woodcock, a 20 Pence showing a horse, a 10 Pence showing a salmon, a 5 Pence showing a bull, and the 2 and 1 Pence showing ancient Celtic designs of birds. An Irish harp is on the obverse of each of the coins. With the introduction of the Euro, these coins are no longer used.



ANIMALS ON STAMPS



Many countries have the pictures of animals on their stamps. Here are some stamps of endemic animals of Australia. Many different species of the Kokkubara are seen in Australia. The Koala bear, Kangaroo and the Wallaby are seen in the wild. The aquatic animals are the Platypus and the Royal Penguin. The Wombat, the short beaked Echinda the dingo and the Tasmanian Devil are some of the threatened species in Australia.

Philately



Collecting postage stamps is called Philately. It is a popular hobby among the school children.



Sir Rowland Hill in Engalnd introduced the first postage stamp in 1840. He was a British school teacher and a social reformer. Later he served as a Government Postal Officer. He was born in Blackwell street in England on 3rd



December 1795. He died in Hampstead, London on 27th August 1879. He is credited for the invention of the postage stamp and introducing the concept of the modern postal service.



On 6th May in 1840 the **first stamp of the world** was introduced. It showed the head of Queen Victoria in black and had a value of one penny. It did not carry the name of the country because no other nation then used stamps.

The first Postage stamp of Sri Lanka was issued on 1st April,1857. It showed the head of Queen Victoria. This stamp was printed in light brown and purple on a special type of paper light blue in colour. The value of this

stamp was 6 pence. In addition to this postage stamp, six other postage stamps were issued in 1875, in various denominations. i.e. on July 2nd: three postage stamps of 5 pence, 10 pence, and 1 shilling; on August 24th: two postage stamps of 1 penny and 2 pence. All these stamps have the portrait of Queen Victoria. Scissors was used for separating the stamps, because no perforation was used at the time.


