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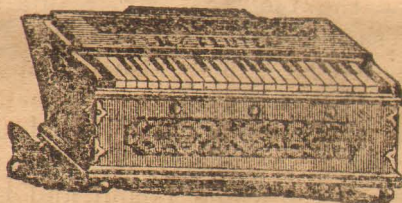

Queen's Birth-Day Honours For Jaffna.

Now that Iragnatha Mudaliyar is dead, we hope Mr. R. W. levers will recommend that the vacancy caused by his death in the ranks of the Mudaliyars of the Governor's Gate, be filled up by raising a deserving public servant in the North to that dignity. The late Maniagar of Valigamam West was the only Mudaliyar of the Gate in the North, though looking to the importance of Jaffna, more than one gentleman ought to have been raised to that posi-

tion. It is to be hoped that our Government Agent will secure for the North, not only the place rendered vacant, in the ranks of Mudaliyars of the Gate, by the demise of Iragnatha Mudaliyar, but also a due proportion of the total number of the Mudaliyarships and Mudaliyarships of the Gate at any rate, the Government Agent must endeavour, in the interests of the people committed to his charge, to secure for the Jaffna Tamils, at least the one Mudaliyarship of the Gate (which has been lost to them by the death of Iragnatha Mudaliyar) and two or three Mudaliyarships. If the titles are to be confined to Government servants, the Government Agent knows, better than we do, the relative merits of aspirants for the honours and others who are too bashful to press their claims. He is sure to hold the balance evenly between contending claims. If we are at liberty to make an effort to put forward the names of some gentlemen who deserve to be honoured, we think that the vacant Mudaliyarship of the Governor's Gate may be well conferred on the veteran Maniagar of Thenmaradchi, V. Saravanamuttu Mudaliyar, who we believe, obtained a gold medal on the occasion of the Queen's Jubilee. M. Tambapillai Mudaliyar, the Maniagar of Jaffna, as the premier headman of the Province, also deserves the honour. Both the Maniagars are popular and held in high esteem by the people. Going to Mudaliyarships, we may be permitted to mention Mr. R. Kantaiyah, Secretary of the District Court of Jaffna, the first Tamil gentleman who has ever held the appointment, and Mr S. Bastiampillai, the Chief Mudaliyar of the Jaffna Kachcherri, as fit and proper persons to be honoured. We think that these two gentlemen ought to have been long ago created Mudaliyars, so that they may be now ripe for Mudaliyarships of the Gate. Not to speak of the fact that Mr Kantaiyah is one of the ablest officers in the North, he officiated as Deputy Fiscal, Batticaloa, for some years with great acceptance. Mr. Bastiampillai is the Chief Mudaliyar of the third Kachcherri, in point of importance, in the whole Island, and his talents and abilities are well known to the Government Agent and the public. If we make too large an indent on Government, we run the risk of our request being refused. For this reason, we do not mention the names of others who deserve to be honoured. But nobody will gainsay the fact that Mr Kantaiyah and Mr Bastiampillai are, by virtue of the offices they hold, most entitled to the honour which we hope the Government Agent will recommend them for.

An Unfounded Charge.

Mr E. M. Byrde, Government Agent of the North-Central Province, states in his Administration Report for 1899, that the earth-work done on the tanks by the villagers, was not so satisfactory as during the previous year, which fact, the Government Agent says, was due to a feeling that prevailed among them that the world was to come to an end last year. The Government Agent deals with the Buddhist population of Anuradhapura and his remarks have no application whatever to the Hindu country in North Ceylon. As a matter of fact, the Hindus nowhere relaxed their exertions in cultivating the soil, nor in any manner neglected their duties and pursuits. But the Jaffna Catholic Guardian, in quoting the Government Agent's remarks as to the feeling which prevailed among the villagers of the North-Central Province, states that the end of the world was foretold by "Hindu busybodies." If the Hindus foretold the end of the world, how was it that the Hindu population of

India and Ceylon pursued their usual avocations unaffected by the prediction?

About the middle of last year—long before the month of November when, it was said, the world was to come to an end—one R. B. M. wrote in the columns of the Catholic Guardian that in consequence of alleged predictions made in the Hindu Calendars, the Chetties had ceased to order rice and paddy and that prices had risen. We disproved his statement at the time making quotations from the Hindu Calendars themselves, which controverted the views of a European Astrologer, who foretold the end of the world in November last. We called upon R. B. M. to substantiate his allegations about the Hindus which he failed to do. The Editor of the "Guardian" now returns to the charge without any ground whatever. The charge is nothing more than his *ipse dixit*.

The Hindu Calendars always give the position of the planets throughout the year, and the effects caused on the earth by such position. So, for the month of November last, they gave the position of the planets, most of which were in one and the same sign of the Zodiac. This position according to the Hindu Calendars, indicated war, pestilence, and famine in certain countries. How far the calculations have proved true the world will judge. But not a single Hindu Astrologer foretold the end of the world. The queer notion originated in the fertile brain of a German Astronomer or Astrologer. How could the Hindus have predicted the end of the world in 1899, while according to Hindu cosmogony and cosmology, thousands of years will have to elapse before the present cycle (Kali-Yuga) comes to an end? We are now only in the year 5002 of Kali-Yuga. Mr P. Velupillai of Point Pedro, in controverting the view of the German Astrologer, stated in his Calendar for the year Vikari that "it is contrary to the views expressed in leading works on Astronomy and Astrology to say that the world would come to an end" as predicted by a European Astronomer. So far from the authors of the Hindu Calendars having predicted the end of the world, it was they that dispelled the false notions borrowed by the people from Europe in that respect. The Editor of the "Guardian" is a Tamil gentleman and understands Tamil. We challenge him to show from any of the four Calendars published in or for Jaffna (not to go to India) that Hindus foretold the end of the world. Instead of according thanks to the authors of the Hindu Calendars for dispelling, or minimising the effects of, false ideas which gained ground among the people in consequence of predictions made by a European, our contemporary charges them with causing the very evil which they were at great pains to remove. Not to speak of Tamil Calendars, a reference to a pamphlet published in English entitled *The year Vikari and its prospects* by Mr. Suryanarain Row of Bellary must convince the Editor that the charge preferred by him against the Hindus is both undeserved and unfounded.

Christians who have no knowledge of the religion, literature, and shastras of the Hindus, and who have not come in contact with publications containing or dealing with the researches made by Western and Native savants into them, think, from sheer ignorance, that Hindus are an ignorant and superstitious set of people, and no good can come out of them. Such cavillers are intoxicated with the idea that Christians are the only depositaries of truth in the world in all matters profane and religious. This self sufficiency leads them to think that they are entitled to attack with impunity non-Christians and non-Christian institutions and teachings. We wait to see whether our contemporary

will be generous enough to withdraw the charge, if he does not succeed in proving it, which as representing the Hindu community we have a right to ask him to do. If it is a canon of Christianity that a Christian need not care for accuracy in speaking of non-Christians, and that too after the inaccuracy was once pointed out, we congratulate ourselves on the fact that we do not belong to the Christian camp.

THE POLICE MAGISTRATE OF POINT PEDRO AND CHAVAKACHCHERRI.

We continue to receive very good accounts of the efficiency and energy displayed by Mr. R. W. Allagakoon, in the detection and punishment of crime. He has proved a terror to those headmen who foster crime and who, being actuated by a spirit of partisanship, espouse the cause of one side or the other in criminal cases, instead of speaking the plain, unvarnished truth. We hear he has struck terror into the minds of headmen who utter and are prone to utter falsehoods. Seldom, if ever, we are told, a headman goes before him prepared to give false evidence. In making these observations we should not be understood to draw an invidious distinction between Mr. Allagakoon and the other native Magistrates who are also popular and energetic. Our object is to point out that Mr. A. Allagakoon has effectually surmounted the difficulties which, generally speaking, non-professional Magistrates experience in the discharge of their official duties, and that his services are highly valued and appreciated by the public. We hope that Mr. A. Allagakoon, whose appointment as a Magistrate by Sir West Ridgeway he has amply justified, will win still greater laurels in the Public Service, and prove an ornament to the Tamil community of which he is a distinguished member.

THE F. N. S. HOSPITAL.

In our article on the F. N. S. Hospital in the last issue of the *Hindu Organ*, we stated as follows:—"If not for the retrograde step now taken in regard to the withdrawal of qualified professional aid from the Hospital, the arrangement would satisfy all parties—those who would like to retain the Hospital as a people's hospital and also those who agitated for the establishment of a Government Hospital." Our remarks as regards the withdrawal of qualified professional aid apply to the abolition of the office of Visiting Surgeon only. We listen to make this explanation so that we might not be understood to have impugned the professional status and efficiency of the Resident Surgeon, on whom personal attacks have been outpoured in certain quarters. We have taken part in the agitation against the mismanagement, by the Committee, of the F. N. S. Hospital ever since its inception by the late Mr. Nagalingam and others in 1884, but have never called in question the competency of Dr. Paul. The agitators of 1884 stated in their memorial to Government that Dr. Paul was the only "competent" medical officer in the Hospital and that there was no efficient medical officer to attend to his duties when he was away on private practice. They had no personal ends to serve, and generously admitted Dr. Paul's competency. Our contention is and has always been that, however experienced and competent Dr. Paul might be, a large and important Hospital as the F. N. S. Hospital should have an additional medical officer of the same status and efficiency of the Visiting Surgeon already withdrawn, to attend to the growing wants of the patients. While sticking to the policy which we have always pursued with consistency and moderation as regards the Hospital question, we disavow any sympathy with those who hurl personal attacks on the Resident Surgeon and the Managing Committee. Strong language never serves any good purpose.

RACE ANTAGONISM.

A brochure entitled "Race Antagonism in Christian Missions" by S. O. K. Rutnam, M. A., 1899, Colombo, Ceylon, has been put into our hands by a friend. It affords very interesting reading, and proves the correctness of the views which we have always held, and now and then expressed in the columns of this paper, that the Christianity of the day is a Christless creed. Most of Christ's teachings were admirably conceived and expressed, and educated Hindus regard him as a great teacher, but the Christianity which has been brought from America and England does not, in most respects, partake of the nature of the religion founded and taught by Christ. This view of ours is amply endorsed by Mr. Rutnam's narratives in the brochure. Mr. Rutnam says in the very first chapter of his book that the facts relating to his international marriage "reveal an alarming state of affairs in Mission Circles, a revelation of which ought to lead all lovers of truth to unite in prayer and work for a great revolution of

Missionary Policy in the east." (The italics are ours). In the *Morning Star* and other missionary publications, we often read accounts, given by Missionaries, of persons converted even yesterday flying into the arms of Jesus when dying. But when these very Missionaries want that Dr. Mary Irvin (Now Dr. Mrs. Rutnam) should not marry a native, they write as follows:—"Mr. Rutnam is only one remove from Hinduism. His father and mother are converted Hindoos. Blood does tell, and you cannot eliminate the traces of heathenism in one generation, nor in several....." For the edification of our readers we have to announce that the father of Mr. Rutnam is the Rev. J. S. Christmas of Thellipallai, who, we believe, is a pious Christian. If the son is only one remove from Hinduism, the father must be half remove or no remove at all. Then have not the American Missionaries committed a sin in approving the appointment of the "Hindoo" Mr. Christmas as a Christian Pastor? The inconsistency is astounding. (To be continued)

LOCAL & GENERAL.

Weather and Monsoon—Heat is not intense, being very much allayed by the South-West wind. The blowing is now and then strong, but does not raise up much dust owing to the ground being moist.

Public Health—Since the rains and bursting of the Monsoon, the health of Jaffna has considerably improved.

Acquisition of Lands—The Government Agent was busy last week making arrangements for the payments to be made for the Northern Railway for the lands to be acquired at Arialai, Chiviaterra, and Chaudicully.

Dr. A. Rajasinh M. B. C. M.—This popular and energetic Doctor who was the Visiting Surgeon of the Jaffna F. N. S. Hospital, left Jaffna on the 11th instant for Kuruwagalla where he is to be stationed. Before his departure a farewell entertainment was given to him by the residents of the Town and others at Mr. J. N. Sandrasegura's house. The entertainment was largely attended.

Departures—Mrs. Eardley Wilmot, the wife of the District Judge of Jaffna, and Mrs. Trimmer wife of the Rev. G. J. Trimmer of the Wesleyan Mission, have left for Europe. Mr. and Mrs. Ievers will be leaving for Europe on the 10th proximo. They will be in Jaffna till about the end of May, when they leave here to be present at the Queen's Birth day festivities in Colombo, from where they will embark for Europe.

A Jubilee—The Catholics of the Diocese of Jaffna will celebrate on the 22nd instant the Silver Jubilee of the ordination of the Right Rev. Dr. J. J. J. to the Priesthood.

The Rev. Father C. H. Lytton O. M. I.—The Catholics of Colombo have decided to celebrate in a suitable manner the 25th anniversary of Father Lytton's elevation to the Priesthood. The Rev. Father Lytton is a popular Priest and is well-known in Jaffna as one of the chief promoters of the agitation for railway extension to the North. As a citizen the Rev. Father's services deserve ample recognition at the hands of both Catholics and non-Catholics, and the promoters of the movement in Colombo would have done better if they had extended it to non-Catholics, unless there was some religious objection to it.

Marriages in High Life—The marriage of Mr. Rajathurai Sandrasegura, the Maniagar of Poonakari, with Miss Nagarathnam Velupillai, the daughter of the late Mr. S. Velupillai merchant and landed proprietor, and niece of Mr. Assipillai, the well-known proprietor of mail coaches, landed proprietor, and merchant, took place with much eclat on the night of the 9th instant at the residence of Mr. Assipillai. The friends of the parties visited them on the 9th instant and the three following days and congratulated them on the happy event. The bridegroom is a member of the well-known Sandrasegura family. We wish Mr. and Mrs. Sandrasegura long life, health, wealth, and prosperity. The Marriage of Mr. K. Thambyah of Thellipallai with Miss Pavalasalai Thiagarajah, sister of Mr. T. T. Chomaraswamy of Thellipallai, was celebrated on the 10th instant. The bride and bridegroom belong to leading families at Thellipallai, and, as was to be expected, the attendance was large and respectable. We offer our congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Thambyah and wish them a long and successful career in life. Both the marriages were celebrated according to Hindu rites.

Two Intended Marriages—Mr. and Mrs. Marugesapillai of Sandirupai have sent out invitations for the marriage, which is to take place tomorrow, of their son Mr. Mattukumarasamy with Balambal daughter of Mr. V. Subramaniapillai, and for the marriage of their

daughter Jagathambal which is appointed to take place on the same date, with Mr. Vaithilingam son of Mr. A. Mailvag-nampillai.

A New Notary—Mr. S. Sivaprakasapillai, one of the masters of the Hindu College, who was admitted a Notary Public recently, has commenced to practise his profession. His office is at Vannarponnai on the Kangesanturai Road. Mr. Sivaprakasapillai is authorised and empowered to practise in English and Tamil. Mr. Sivaprakasapillai is a well-educated and intelligent gentleman, and is bound to come to the forefront as a Notary Public. We understand that he contemplates the opening of an office at Jaffna Town also.

Mr. M. Kanagasabai—This gentleman, who is one of the Landing Waiters of the Colombo Customs, was on a visit to Jaffna last week. He is a brother of Mr. M. Supapathy, the well-known and energetic Interpreter Mudaliyar of the Minor Courts at Jaffna. Mr. Kanagasabai returned to Colombo on the 12th instant.

A Son of Mr. John Rudd—We learn from a contemporary that a son of the energetic Assistant Superintendent of Police, Jaffna, has left to take part in the South African campaign.

A Hindu High School for Karative—Mr. Arunasalam who was for many years a teacher under the Mission (American) and then under Mr. Supramaniapillai, of Karative is now collecting funds to establish a Hindu Tamil High school for higher education in the vernacular. It is a laudable project if carried on; he has received some pecuniary support. A few Jaffnese have each of them undertaken to support a teacher. It would be better if the intended High school be placed under the supervision of the Tamil *Samadhi* which is headed by Mr. Kilasapillai of Vannarponnai, the nephew of the late Mr. Arumuga Navalar. —*The Morning Star*.

An Editor on the late Iranganatha Mudaliyar—The Tamil Editor of the *Jaffna Catholic Guardian* in noticing the death of the late lamented Iranganatha Mudaliyar, expresses himself as follows:—"Iranganatha Mudaliyar, Maniagar of Valigamam West, died on the night of the 27th April last. Besides being a Mudaliyar of the Governor's Gate, he was awarded a gold medal on the occasion of the Queen's Jubilee. He was the oldest of the Maniagars. He remained in the belief that there were horoscopes calculations which gave him another twenty years' lease of life. Man does not know the day when God will summon him before Himself. It is useless to try to ascertain it by means of astrology." Our readers will note the taste of the above production. Is an obituary notice the place to attack one's religious belief or astrology? Or does the Editor mean that the veteran Mudaliyar was unprepared for death? Why do certain Christians take pleasure in pursuing Hindus even unto the grave? We have not the slightest doubt that all enlightened Christians, Catholic and Protestant, will agree with us in the view that the occasion did not call for any observation on the Maniagar's belief in horoscopy.

Mr. G. Koch—We are glad to announce that Mr. Koch, who has passed the Final Examination for Advocate students, is likely to practise his profession in Jaffna the home of his parents and grand parents. The Jaffna Bar is now confined entirely to Tamils, if we except Mr. C. Strantenbergh, the veteran and popular Proctor, whom old age will compel soon to retire. We think that the infusion of fresh blood will be in the interests of the profession, though the bar, it must be admitted, is overcrowded. When different nationalities mix up there are always mutual advantages to be gained, and there will be no engendering of the spirit of exclusiveness. Mr. Ellis Koch, the father of the new Advocate, was a well-known figure in Jaffna in the seventies and eighties. He is now employed in the Railway Department we believe. We hope that when the railway extension becomes a fact accomplished, Mr. Ellis Koch will secure an important berth and return to his native country.

The Supreme Court—Mr. Justice Lawrie will proceed home on leave of absence on the 24th instant; Mr. Browne, District Judge of Colombo, acting for him. His leave will last for five months. On his return, the Chief Justice will go on leave. So Mr. Browne's acting tenure of office on the Supreme Court Bench will extend to a year or so. Who will act as District Judge is not known. The appointment lies between Mr. Cooke, Mr. Walter Pereira, and Mr. Joseph Grenier.

The Educational Conference—It is not definitely known what transpired at the conference of the Director of Public Instruction the Inspectors of Schools. It is believed

the revision of the educational code and other matters engaged their attention.

Medical Officers—We learn that Dr. Malavarayar, Medical Officer at Batticaloa has been transferred to Peralai and that Dr. N. L. Joshua has been appointed to Batticaloa. Dr. Malavarayar was very popular at Batticaloa.

The Muhammadan M. L. C.—The Hon'ble Mr. A. L. M. Sheriff has sent in his resignation of his seat in Council.

An Inspector of Mines—A new Office has been created in Ceylon under the designation of "Inspector of the Mines", and Mr. J. G. Hunter has been appointed to the post on a salary of Rs 7200 per annum.

Colombo Court of Requests—We are glad to understand that Mr. B. G. Patrick of the Court of Requests, Colombo, has been appointed to act as Tamil Interpreter of that Court.

Arrivals—Mr. Robert and Mr. Emmanuel of Jaffna, who were away in the Straits, are now on a visit to their friends and relations.

Obituary—Died at Vannarponnai on the 2nd Instant Mr. D. V. Sabapathippillai, Medical Officer, Mantotte. He was a close relation of Dr. A. Pararajasinghe Mudaliyar. We express our condolences with the bereaved widow and children.

Death by Drowning—We have to record the sad death by drowning of Dr. and Mrs. Bartholomew of Anuradhapura. It is said that the Doctor was a nephew of the late lamented Mr. Lorenz.

Paddy Crops in Batticaloa—We learn from the *Dravida Kokila* that the paddy crops of Batticaloa for this year are good. As the surplus paddy of Batticaloa is brought to Point Pedro, the Jaffna District will benefit by the Batticaloa crops.

Arrack Rents—Notice is hereby given that a Board appointed by His Excellency the Governor will sit on the 6th June 1900 at the Council Chamber for the purpose of opening and considering tenders for the purchase of the Arrack Rents for the District of Jaffna for a period of one or two years from the 1st January 1901, and for the District of Batticaloa for the period of one or two years from the 1st January 1900.

Examinations of the Ceylon Medical College—From the lists published elsewhere, it will appear that several Tamil students have passed the examinations of the Medical College. Mr. R. S. Santiago who passed the Final examination and has become a Licentiate is, we believe, a son of Mr. B. Santiappillai, the well-known Jaffna Proctor. We congratulate Mr. R. S. Santiago on his admission to the medical profession.

Law Examinations—Elsewhere we give the results of the Advocates' Preliminary, Intermediate, and Final Examinations. Five of the successful candidates are Tamils. Mr. E. R. Tambimuttu, who passed the Preliminary Examination, probably belongs to the Eastern Province. Mr. Navaratna Rajah is a nephew of the Hon. Dr. Rockwood; Mr. Balasingam is a son of Mr. C. W. Kathiravelupillai the retired Police Magistrate of Kayts; Mr. Kanagasabai is a brother-in-law of Mr. Kanagasabai, the well known Advocate; and Mr. Duraisamy is a son of Mr. Ford of Anai. We congratulate these gentlemen on their success.

A Band of Astrologers—We are indebted to the Tamil Editor of the "Dravida Kokila" for a thorough exposure of the deception practised by a gang of so-called Astrologers hailing from India, who pretend to foretell events by palmistry and by the aid of a well-known treatise on Astrology called "Sapta-Rishi-Vakiam".
