The Late Mr. Sam A. Sabapathy, Proctor

A Tribute from Muhandiram E. P. Rasiah, J. P.

Mr. Sam A. Sabapathy passed away in hospital on the evening of 12th inst. surrounded by his kith and kin. His unexpected demise in the heyday of life, of Coronary Thrombosis—a fell disease that has laid low many a son of Jaffna in recent times—remind us of the impermanency of the human body, however strong it may seem externally. He was of medium height and possessed sharp features, poise and personality with an unbending head. Time had dealt gently with his cherubic countenance and athletic body, having been the fastest sprinter in his College. Slightly greying hair alone betrayed the fact that he was past the meridian. He had always a winsome smile and a ringing laughter which invited confidence and friendship.

Friend

As a friend he was warm-hearted and witty, frank and forth-right. Possessed of charming and elegant manners, he could put even a stranger at ease with his re-assuring words. He loved mercy but boldly rebuked wrongdoing in whatever quarters he saw it. To do good, to fight hard and to render service to those in distress have been the working philosophy of his life. His word was as sound as a bond and he never failed a friend. He was a dependable practical man. The words of Kipling aptly portray his nature:—

"Though I lied about, he didn't deal in lies,
Though I hated he didn't give way to hating,
He trusted himself, when all men doubted him
And made allowances for their doubting too.
He talked with crowds and kept his virtues,
He walked with kings and never lost the common touch
Neither foes nor loving friends could hurt him
All men counted with him, but none too much."

Mayor

Despite the fact, he was blue-blooded by birth, he

became the elected representative of the Bazaar Ward and later became the first Citizen of Jaffna. The Municipality was fortunate, at its critical period of trial and transition from the old order to the new, that it should have had the services of a dynamic person like him—ready, trained and tested in the Temple of Justice—as its first Mayor. He won for himself a reputation as one who did to perfection whatever work he undertook. He lent light and lustre to the Council conserving its finances, by spending judiciously and avoiding audit queries and surcharges—a rare achievement. His Municipal administration was marked by justice and fair-play. Responsibility, power and the challenges of big problems and criticisms from colleagues and councillors had served as meat and drink to him. Before he gave up politics, he had seen to it that Jaffna was placed prominently in the All-Ceylon

map of Local Self-governing Bodies.

Lawyer

No compilation of a list of Ceylon's Legal luminaries of 20th century would be complete without prominent mention of Sam as Proctor and defending lawyer, who had always stood up for the liberty of the citizen. I had come in personal contact with him—as complainant, prosecuting officer, witness and even as accused—for about a dozen years, having been pitted against him in many a legal battle in Excise and connected criminal cases.

Outside the court house he had treated me most cordially, but the moment I stepped into the witness box, I became the target of his forensic thrusts and searching cross-examinations. In the course of the day, he changed places, from friend to foe and from admirer to adversary. As an Excise Inspector and later as acting Supdt. of Excise I had had occasion to conduct prosecutions in many a Provincial Court in the Island and also figure as witness in the criminal

WHY NOT TWO OFFICIAL LANGUAGES?

Sir,—At the prize giving of Trinity College at which Lord Soulbury (who is responsible for the present political ills of the Tamils) was the chief guest, the principal of the College in the course of his report said as follows: "official policy seems to lean towards segregation. There are, of course, arguments of economy and administrative convenience in support of this policy, but the saving in money—bill will be comparatively negligible and administrative inconvenience will be a small sacrifice to make for national unity. What seems to be lacking is the will to achieve that unity. If

our people had a will they would find the way". No greater or profounder truth could have been uttered by this noble-hearted and wise principal of Trinity. A greater man than he, the Prime Minister of India Shri Jawaharlal Nehru had said many a time in the most clear and emphatic terms that while Hindi may remain the official Language of the country, regional languages would be granted equal status and that Hindi officers going to South India as officers of State would be compelled to learn the language of the State to which

An Analysis of the TIRUMANTIRAM

(By A Science Graduate)

(Continued from last issue)

SEVENTH TANTIRAM

As we said before, the Fifth Tantiram gave us a general idea of the tenets of the Saiva System of religion and philosophy. The Sixth Tantiram spoke of the advent of the Gnanaguru, the instruction imparted by him, the fitness or otherwise of the disciple that is instructed, &c. The present chapter proceeds to speak of practical religion, the sequel to the instruction received from the Guru, Sivarchanai சிவார்ச்சனை or worship of God, the resulting Siva Dharsanam சிவதரிசனம் or vision of God and allied matters.

There are 418 verses in the Seventh Tantiram, verses Nos. 1704 to 2121, divided into thirty sections. After referring in Section I to the six Atharas ஆறு தாரங்கள் or resting places in the human body through which the soul passes in the course of Yoga practice, the Sruti proceeds in Sections II to VII to mention six kinds of Lingam in which God can be worshipped, to wit: Anda-Lingam அண்டலிங்கம் or world-form, Pinda-Lingam பிண்டலிங்கம் or body-form, Sadasiva-Lingam சதாசிவலிங்கம் or manifested God-form, Atma-Lingam ஆன்மலிங்கம் or soul-form, Gnanan-Lingam ஞானலிங்கம் or knowledge-form and Siva-Lingam சிவலிங்கம் or unmanifested God-form. The word Lingam literally means குறி or அடையாளம், mark or symbol or emblem or form. The world, all creation which God pervades, is to be regarded as emblematic of God and worshipped as such. This is Anda lingam. The human body too forms a temple of God and this is Pinda-lingam. We read:

1712 இலிங்கம் தாவது யாரும் அறியார்,
இலிங்கம் தாவது எண்ணிசை எல்லாம்,
இலிங்கம் தாவது எண்ணென் கலையும்
இலிங்கம் தாக எடுத்த உலகமே.

People know not what the Lingam is. All the eight directions, all the eight times eight branches of learning, all the created world is emblematic (of God).

1722 அது உணர்ந்தோன் ஒரு தன்மையை நாடி,
எது உணராவதை நின்றவன் ஈசன்,
புது உணர்வான புனங்களை எட்டும் [சே.
இது உணர்ந்த, என் உடல் கோயில்கொண்டா

He (the soul) realizes That (Sivam) by understanding with his new-found knowledge (Pati-Gnanam) that It (manifests itself in) the eight worlds or locations. Taking this similarity of nature or oneness (Adwaitam) into consideration, the Lord not knowable (objectively) by any means whatsoever, takes my body as His temple or dwelling place.

This verse recalls to our mind many a Sruti and sacred utterance of holy sages. The simple word அது or 'That' refers to God. It is the 'Tat' or 'That' of the Upanishads, as witness the great Maha Vakyam 'Tat twam Asi' or 'That you are' of the Chandogya Upanishad, the பன்மை மறைகளும் அது நான் ஆனேன் என்று பயிர்விக்கச் சொல்லுவது இப்பாவகத்தை of Siddhiyar, it is this Sadana or mode of contemplation which is prescribed in the hoary Vedas in the words 'I am that'. The words ஒரு தன்மை, literally one nature or oneness refers to the

SPIRIT OF SERVICE

When at a recently held public meeting of the Thiruketheswaram Restoration Society names were being proposed for a Committee to collect funds for the re-construction of the Main Temple, it was suggested by a member that it was not in keeping with the spirit of self-less service for workers in the cause of religious activities to be invited to do so and that the offer of active participation in such movements must be spontaneously forthcoming. This suggestion is in other words a reminder to workers in good causes that service must be willing and not imposed. Membership in Action Committees where spade work such as collection of funds and the energetic carrying out of dedicated duties are concerned must be confined to those who are enthusiastic about it and are willing to work before being invited to do so. It has been a practice to flatter persons by proposing their names to committees. But this method of selection should be avoided for more than one reason. The purpose of pure dedicated service will be lost and the wrong conception of membership in Committees being a recognition of honour and importance will gain ground. Several committees do not function in the proper and desired manner because unwilling members man them. The urge of spontaneous service must be there for success to be achieved. It may be that workers who fully dedicate themselves to the cause are a few. But the quality of service will be high and valued.

DOCTORS IN DANGER MOVE

Trade Union action by members of a learned profession even as a last resort to obtain redress of genuine grievances is unthinkable. Doctors, particularly those whose services are indispensable by reason of their specialized knowledge, owe a great duty to the sick and cannot, therefore, resort to any coercive action that will directly jeopardize patients. The members of the Medical Profession, as those of the other noble professions, law and teaching, have a scientific and learned pursuit which is directly concerned with the promotion of human welfare. Strikes, fasts unto suicide or (homicide,) and all other allied coercive acts that do violence to conscience, must be abhorrent to these professions.

The public must now take up the cause of the 'striking' Doctors with the Government and persuade the authorities to be fair by the Medical men. But the strike must be called off without a moment's further delay.

Re-construction of Thiruketheswaram Temple

A public meeting of those connected with and interested in the reconstruction of the Thiruketheswaram Temple was held at the Vaidheswara Vidyalyaya Hall on Monday.

Sir Kandiah Vaithianathan who occupied the chair explained at length the progress of the work done at Thiruketheswaram by the Restoration Society and detailed the work that remains to be completed. He said that the abiding interest taken by the Saiva Public in the great Restoration work was commendable and added that if the same spirit of service was maintained the completion of the entire work could be achieved. The question was posed whether the re-construction of the main temple (the Athimoolam) should be undertaken immediately or whether the work in the rest of the premises should be attended to first. In this connection he referred to the enthusiasm of the Saiva Public of Malaysia and their repeated offer of immediate help.

The members who were present at the meeting were unanimously of the view that the reconstruction of the Main Shrine should be commenced without delay. A committee in furtherance of this decision was appointed to collect funds in Jaffna with Malayan Pensioner Mr. Chinniah of Karaveddy as Chairman and Mr. T. Sivalingam of Chunnakam as Secretary.
