Freedom Day Festivities Without A Feeling

Fourth Of February A Feeble Occasion ?

Contrast the Independence day celebrations of neighbouring India with those of Lanka and you will find that there is a marked difference in content, context and coherence. Why? Though the granting of freedom to these countries was made possible by the same circumstances of a post war plan of the Britishers yet Bharat acquired its independence by a sustained and substantial heroic struggle led by the most distinguished patriots of the world. In India the people directly participated in the freedom movement and to them Independence Day means everything.

But in Lanka the campaign for freedom was of a different character. It was conducted and concluded in the legislature of the country by means of academic discussion. The leaders of this movement were intellectually great men in whose wisdom the people had ample faith. There was no opportunity created for any direct action and the people could not participate in any movement for freedom.

This assessment of a great occasion after two decades of independence may seem to be a

wanton criticism of the method of struggle. But that does not take away the value of the survey. For twenty long years the Fourth of February has come and gone, officially announced and celebrated as the most important occasion for the country. But the people have however not identified themselves with the event in a spirit of patriotic attachment merely because there has been lacking a spirit of spontaneity in the feeling that normally governs such festivities.

Administrative Authorities Approve Of Inflated Price?

Soon after the release of the news of the sudden step of devaluation of the Rupee by the Government of Lanka, the Black Market and the Open Market vied with each other to suck the blood of the rice buying population and kept on increasing the price of rice to the ridiculous maximum point. After several weeks of unchecked opportunities for the traders to stuff their bottomless purses with filthy lucre, Administrative Authorities appeared on the scene in a mood of awakened activity, summoned a series of conferences and finally announced that a marvellous decision had been reached and that from January 1968 rice could be made available at Rs. 1/20 per measure. January 1968 had run its course and the run of the luck of the trader has not been affected even infinitesimally.

To Meet Threat Of Malaria

One newspaper refers to the efforts of Ayurvedic Medical Practitioners to put in their weight in the national campaign against a threatened recurrence of the deadly disease — malaria. It is surprising to note that Ayurvedic Physicians have not brought their mind to this all-important subject all these years. Even if the theory that the eradication of the disease — malaria depended on the annihilation of the mosquito that carried with it the source of the disease is absolutely correct Ayurveda should have been availed of for the cure of those who have been afflicted with malaria.

Western Medical Science has certainly found specific remedies for particular diseases and also the means of rooting out the causes of such diseases. But Ayurvedha too has sure cures for dangerous diseases though the discovery of such cures has not been patented and published for the sake of propaganda. Infectious diseases and some other diseases like Jaundice have been known to have been successfully countered by Ayurvedic medical aid.

Whereas medical practitioners of the West devote a considerable part of their time, energy and money to research work and successfully discover more and more medical mysteries the Ayurvedha practitioners seldom meet even in casual contact, let alone by arrangement. The pooling of knowledge in the pursuit of acquiring greater knowledge is necessary in every branch of education. Meetings and conferences for the specified object of obtaining greater recognition and better prospects of professional progress may be necessary but they cannot be said to be in the interest of preserving the Ayurvedic Science of

AN APPRECIATION THE LATE S. KANAGASABAI, J. P.

(1904 — 1968)

The death of Mr. S. Kanagasabai, Shroff, Jaffna Mutual Benefit Fund Ltd., for over 3 decades, is an irreparable loss to the Tamil world in general and to the Hindus in particular. The Saiva Paripalana Sabha, which he served for well nigh 3 years as a prominent member of the Committee has lost one of its chief pillars.

Born at Illavalai he came to Vannarponnai in 1926, and settled there at "Kanagasabai Lane" off K. K. S. Road which has been named after him.

Kanagasabai — The Philanthropist

He was a Banker who dispensed charities to every noble cause be it Hindu or Christian. He was a generous man who gifted his wealth to further religious ends. He was a firm believer in Saiva Siddhanta. His practice of religion included daily prayers to "S. Kti" in the Shrine at his house and worship at the Nallur Kandaswamy temple every Friday. His wife who is a great devotee of Lord Muruga as her husband always joined him in these prayers.

To the Nallur Kandaswamy temple he presented the "Kailasa Vahanam" in 1950, a bell imported from Glasgow in 1953 and a Gold Vel-studded with gems in 1958.

His religious donations included a hall in granite at the Maviddapuram Kandaswamy temple —

He renovated the Panri Kaddu Pillayar temple in 1951, providing it with a bell and a tower in 1962. There are many other temples to which he had given donations, too numerous to mention.

Kanagasabai — A Patron of Education

In 1956, Shroff Kanagasabai established the Meibandan Tamil School which is now run by the Government and in 1958 the Kanagasabai Vidyalaya at Illavalai which is now taken over by the Department of Education. By providing these schools and maintaining them for a fairly long period of time, Shroff Kanagasabai helped the cause of Hindu education of these villages.

Justice of the Peace

In July 1965, Shroff Kanagasabai was made a Justice of the Peace for Jaffna. Receptions were given to him, in Vannarponnai and Illavalai, and in many parts of Jaffna. The numbers that were present on these occasions proved his popularity. The writer was present at one of the functions given in his honour at Vaidyeshwara Vidyalayam, Vannarponnai.

D. M. K'S. DARING

We may be said to be commenting on a subject that is purely outside the scope of our immediate interest when we attempt here to analyse the implications of the decision of the D. M. K. Government in Madras to exclude Hindi from the curriculum of studies of the schools in that State. In the present interpretation of political decisions there is a common agreement of acceptance of the fact that no country can say that it is unconcerned with the happenings in other countries. No doubt when the Marxists of Lanka work up their emotions over the events in far away Cuba, no happening anywhere can be ignored as irrelevant to all others.

The D. M. K. Government seem to have gone giddy at the achievement of assembling several thousands of spectators at the World Tamil Conference interpreting the feat as a declaration of the Tamil speaking people of South India in favour of establishing a Tamil kingdom. Even before the post-Conference enthusiasm of the participants could ebb the Chief Minister has taken the unilateral decision to announce a dramatic step in the administrative affairs of the Madras State. The backing of the legislature is there as it ought to be by reason of the preponderating majority the D M K has in Tamil Nad. Merely because a State Legislature has swept the polls it cannot defy the Constitution of the Union of India by resolving to do things in

contravention of the Constitution. Kerala for instance by virtue of Communist ascendancy could easily herald in the Totalitarian rule and disrupt the democratic structure of India. The oath of allegiance to the Constitution was well and truly taken by every single member of the D. M. K. in the Legislature of India, at the Centre and in the States. Any act that will tend to discredit the sovereignty of the Indian Constitution will not be in keeping with the sanctity of the oath of allegiance. Shri C. N. Annadurai himself had earlier stated that the D. M. K. did not stand for separation. Now that the echo of the shouting and the clapping at the massive assembly of the World Tamil Conference has died away, Chief Minister Annadurai would do well to review the decision of the 'Two languages only' scheme for schools in South India in the light of practicability, prudence and above all political implications. India has acquired a place in the sun by dint of the patriotic endeavours and democratic ideal of its political leaders. Despite the fact that Bharat is not a military might yet the importance of this great country in the comity of nations cannot be under-estimated. United India alone can survive not merely the infiltrations of undemocratic ideas but also the onslaughts of outsiders with territorial ambitions. Humanity needs a composite India for its own progress and preservation. Surely the D. M. K. Leader must know these irrefutable facts. Nationalism must not be mistaken for crude sectionalism. Dravida areas belong to India and India belongs to Dravida Nad. We are confident that the World Tamil Leaders who swear by the glory of Tamil would see reason and withdraw all steps that tend to disintegrate India and isolate Tamil Nad.

WHY THIS WOBBLING?

The sudden degrading of the Colombo Vivekananda Maha Vidyalaya is inexplicable. The Ministry of Education continues to make matters more and more confused by proposing new schemes of Education and later becoming incompetent to put them into practice. The result has been the utter confusion that is prevailing all

over the Island in the matter of educational activities.

The Vivekananda Maha Vidyalaya occupies a significant position by its location and its need in the educational affairs of the Northern Sector of the Metropolis. This Vidyalaya has been growing from stage to stage and attracting several hundreds of students from the immediate vicinity. Moreover this Institution has been catering for the educational needs of the pupils who are predominantly Hindu Tamils. And it was in the fitness of the professions of the National Government that this Establishment should have been able to supply full educational facilities to the Hindu Tamil children of that area. Any step that is being taken to take away the facilities that have been already granted to this Maha Vidyalaya and to reduce its scope of activities will be only betraying the incompetence of the Ministry of Education to honour the fundamental principles of the national character of the present Government. It is to be hoped that the Ministry of Education will revise its decisions on this subject and allow the Maha Vidyalaya to grow as it should and satisfy the legitimate demands of the parents of the pupils of this institution.

That Is Not All!

The reassuring statement has been issued by responsible quarters that the rates obtaining in the C. T. B. for fares of passengers will not be increased in the near future. Though the Common man may be able to draw a sigh of relief at this generous gesture of the authorities yet he cannot get over the misgivings in his mind about the utter insufficiency and inadequacy of the facilities that are available now for travel by road.

Most of the newly imported Double decker Buses adorn the Big Depots as show pieces of unworthiness. The overhanging branches of the trees on the routes swiftly and systematically damage the hoods of buses. At this rate the buses will before long begin to be leaking transports! That is not all.

Austerity And Cinemas

Sir,—

The Prime Minister and other responsible persons have suggested ways and means of practising austerity and preventing money going out of the Island.

Millions of rupees are going out of the Island.

Millions of rupees are going out of the Island every year to obtain pictures, projectors, cameras and other paraphernalia necessary for the cinema halls.

I grant that cinemas are of educative value and some sort of entertainment is necessary for the people.

Like mushroom garages of the present era, cinema halls are also appearing in large numbers even in small towns. This shows that cinema business is a paying concern anyday anywhere.

Films are expensive and there is keen competition in getting the best pictures and for this purpose, many a proprietor has to have agents in other countries and even make advance payments. Finally it is the poor customer, popularly called the patron who pockets out the money.

Pictures have become so very attractive for several reasons, even to the poor man, woman and child, that many people wish to see pictures with every change of programme.

To effect a quick change of programme, shows are arranged sometimes four times a day and the patrons wait anxiously for the next picture, whether it is good, bad or indifferent. There are sufficient advertisements both in the press and outside to tempt anyone.

People go to the pictures, even if they have nothing to eat after seeing the picture. Very often the whole family goes to the cinema, although the wife knows where it will lead them.

Exorbitant amounts are sent out of the country to obtain pictures. These pictures cost such fancy figures, because cinema stars are paid more than princely amounts for every picture. Men and women who are nobodies today,

suddenly bloom into stars tomorrow and they become sterling spinners of four figures and even five, depending on the fancy of the producer once they become stars, twinkling or otherwise. They enjoy all the pleasures, irrespective of public opinion. As a matter of fact, all lapses in their lives are considered as virtues by younger folks and by other folks who feel young and they spend hard earned money to see their favourite stars.

I suggest that:-

1. No more cinema halls should be built enlarged or opened;
2. There should be only one show a day in any theatre. Two shows may be allowed on pre-pya days only.

If this system is followed, patrons will have to wait pretty long for a change of programme but they will practise austerity. Picture going does not mean the ticket fare alone. It has several other attendant expenses.

The number of pictures that will be imported will be greatly reduced. This will effect great saving of Ceylon money and help the people to practice austerity and improve their morals.

If people can exist without milkcods, chillies and coriander, they can surely live without going to the Cinema hall.

Stage-managed shows of national joy cannot count in the political sphere. The flying of the National Flag on such occasions must be a reflection of the burning patriotism for the nation. Do the people of Lanka have such a feeling?

The Tamil speaking people may have not identified themselves with these Celebrations all along for the simple reason that their demands were ignored by the Soulbery Commission.
