The co-operative effort of the residents of Moolai deserves the support of all who love this country.



A HOSPITAL is a Service Station and Repair House for human beings. Today a car or, for a matter of that, any machine is taken by people to such service stations and serviced and repaired regularly to be kept always in trim condition. But our people are not very careful nor do they take the trouble to pay prompt attention at the proper time to their bodies. Hence tragedy befalls this all important human machine which has discovered and employs all other machines for its use, ease and comfort. "Taken to Hospital too late," "Too late for medical attention," "He must have had a warning of this cardiac attack," all these phrases are common and add poignancy to the tragedy. Yet we do not care to go in time for a check up in a hospital.

My message to the Moolai Hospital is that it should speedily develop into a model institution with all the specialised branches of medical science, so that its members can and will be regularly and even compulsorily given a check up at periodical intervals. The personal files of each member should reveal at a glance his progress and decline. In lising agency, but also a determining force in extending the life's span receive preventive attention.

The History of the Co-operative Hospital

When the economic conditions of most of the countries are in the melting pot, co-operative movement is the only answer. In various countries, co-operative societies for several activities have been formed, but the unique distinction of ever forming a co-operative hospital in the East befell the noble founders from Moolai, Tholpuram, Chulipuram and Pannagam,

In February 1935, these pioneers held their first meeting to discuss the essential needs to start a private dispensary. Their genuine motives were rewarded when the late Dr. K. Kanagarayer volunteered to do free service to establish a Dispensary on a progressive expansion into a Co-operative Hospital. On 24th October, 1935, the out-door dispensary was opened in a rented private building at Tholpuram.

In 1936, the founders with the far sighted policy of expanding it into a hospital, had the dispensary registered under the Co operative Societies Ordinance. At this stage, the members on the roll were 119 and the capital in shares was Rs. 1250.

The steady progress of the institution during the couple of years that followed was entirely due to the selfless and wise directions of the Original Committee, Firstly, the

members were given certain privileges such as three free visits by the Medical Officer and a nominal fee of Rs. 2 for each of the subsequent visits. Secondly, the membership was opened to all, rich and poor, Thirdly, the members enjoyed free consultations at the Hospital and 20% of the profits on medicines dispensed. Fourthly, the life membership fee is only Rs. 12. Lastly, the admirable superiority this institution commanded over other similar societies is that no members received any cash profits, whatever little profit that was made went into the reserve fund for the improvement of the Institution and for the treatment of the poor.

As the Institution progressed, it instilled brilliant ideas into the minds of the Founders and impelled two of them, one Muhandiram P. Narayanar and the other Mr. K. Sabapathipillai to sail over to Malaya on a mission to reap the generosity of the Ceylonese over there. Within an year, they returned with a substantial collection of about Rs. 18,000, This was supplemented by local collections amounting to Rs. 1400.





In December, 1943, when the Hospital was commencing to progress, with the initiative of the late Dr. C. Chelliah who was then President, the Committee engaged the services of Dr. M O Chacko, M. B., L. R. C. P. & S., D. T. M., a Senior Physician and Surgeon who connected with the Manipay Mission Hospital for over 20 years. The popularity of Dr. M O. Chacko spread throughout the Peninsula and on to the mainland to such an extent that more than 50% of the out - door patients are from distant areas.

The progress of the Institution was so rapid that the Committee again succeeded in securing the services of Dr. N. T. Sampanthan, M. B., B. S. (Ceylon) a promising young Surgeon. Dr. Sampanthan didn't take much time to get through the F. R. C. S. (Edin.) and F. R. F. P. & S. (Glas.) He too has established his fame as a specialist both in Surgery and Medicine.

Dr. G. Chelvadoray, L. R. C. P. & S. (Edin.); L. R. F. P. & S. (Glas.) who was previously rendering honorary services in time of need was persuaded by Dr. Chelliah to give up his lucrative post in the Ceylon Medical Corps and join the Hospital. This he did in 1946.

In 1945, Foundation Stones for the Maternity Ward and the D. M. O.'s quarters were laid by the

Governor of Ceylon, In 1950, Cottage Ward 5 was put up. About this time, Dr. Chelliah left for Malava, and Mr. K. Kanagaratnam became the President for the next five years. During his period Mr. Kanagaratnam who was also a member of the Parliament spared no pains in getting increased annual grant Rs. 15,000 and further obtained a special grant of one lac of rupees for building the Operation Theatre and the Nurses' Quarters, Just prior to Dr. Chelliah's return to Malaya, he requested Mr. S. Mahadeva of Moolai, a prominent business - man of Colombo to errect a Labour room which he gifted at a cost of Rs. 55,000.


At present, the staff consists of 4 Medical Officers, 7 Apothecaries, 1 Laboratory Assistant, 1 Matron and an Assistant Matron, 22 Nurses, 17 Orderlies, 8 Latrine Labourers, 1 Secretary 1 Accountant, 2 Clerks, 1 Storekeeper, 1 Cashier, 2 Peons, 1 Canteen Manager, 3 Canteen Salesmen, 2 Engine Drivers, 2 Watchers, 1 Mason and 2 Gardeners.

With a view to expanding the Hospital and providing more facilities in the special branches of medicine and surgery, the present Fresident Mr. P. M. Sangarapillai, J. P. has embarked on an improvement scheme and has with the Board of Management issued an appeal for funds from all Well-Wishers of the Institution,



Pioneer Efforts in Co-operative Hospital Service

A Radio Talk by K Kanagaratnam, Esq.

(A Past President)

HE Co-operative movement today is a vital force in the re-adjustment of living relations in every part of the World. The primitive sense of living for one's self has largely given place to community living and this has been greatly influenced by the economic factors of human life. Greed for wealth brought in its trails the exploitation of the unprivileged man in Society and its curse was more evident in the villages where more than 80% of the people of a country live and are exposed to the machinations of seemingly benevolent but really unscrupulous grabbers of wealth, at the expense of the simple and unsuspecting peasantry, the real backbone of the village.

In Ceylon, the movement came into active existence with the introduction of the Co operative Credit Societies Ordinance No. 7 of 1911 and as the name suggests, it was chiefly concerned in the early days with rural credit and assistance given to the petty farmer and trader to carry on his cultivation and trade on easy loans and moderate terms of repayments. The Co-operative motto laid special emphasis on character and integrity and the movement may be said to have in a great way raised the standard of Credit and moral values in the lives of those who were drawn into it.

With the general progress, which the country has made after the inauguration of the Donoughmore Constitution, the Co-operative movement too has developed and spread itself into various activities and forms of livelihoods and according to last administration report of Registrar of Co-operative Societies. Ceylon has today 77 distinct types of Societies originating with limited and unlimited Credit Societies and ending with provincial Banks and a Co-operative Federal Bank which is a full-fledged Commercial Bank under the monetary Act No. 58 of 1949 and including in between such novel Societies as School Co operatives. Women's Guilds and Societies for better Living and for Community and Welfare Services. These different types of Societies fall within a total of 8239 Societies in the Country and the variety is most conspicuous considering the fact that in the whole sub-continent of India, there are only 40 different types out of such a large total of 250000 Socie ties. It is evident that such a large variety in Ceylon has brought almost every section and stratum of Society within the Co-operative membership. The greatest experiment in harnessing the movement to the solution of the Country's acute food situation was made during the last War period when consumer

Societies enabled the Government to introduce the rationing system of food articles in short supply to the best advantage of the people. This experiment proved a great success and today 5 million ration books are attached to these stores out of a total issue of 7½ millions strength of the movement in Cevlon was such that the Adviser to the Secretary of State for the Colonies on Co-operation who visited Ceylon in 1950 stated, that, out of the 16 Co-operative Departments inaugurated in the colonies, after the last War, as many as 12 had their Registrars sent to Ceylon for special training.

With all these tributes to the Government Organisation of Cooperation in Cevlon, it was left to the inventive brain of the Jaffna man to try the first experiment of an organised community effort to provide medical facilities on a Cooperative basis. A high official of the Department of Co-operative Societies once stated that the Jaffna Peninsula was the veritable home of reputed Co-operators and that Cooperation in the Peninsula had assumed a diversity of forms and had touched every aspect of human life. A former Minister for Co-operative Undertakings paid the highest compliment to the Jaffna man as the best Co-operator in the Island. Ever since the Co operative movement was introduced in Ceylon, Jaffna became the centre of many Co-operative activities. In these activities, the villages of Tholpuram, Moolai and Chulipuram, all contiguously situated on the Western side of the Jaffna Peninsula played a very important

When the idea of a Cooperative Society to provide medical facilities first originated with some pensioners who returned from Malaya and some local men, there were as many as 35 other Co-operative Societies of various types in these villages with a credit union to coordinate the activities of all these Societies. In February, 1935, a handtul of these men met together to discuss the idea and resolved provisionally to start first a Dispensary and run it with the services of an eminent Doctor who had just then retired from the Malayan Medical service and was willing to give his services free for some time. Two Anothecaries who returned from the Malayan Service also volunteered to give free services. In June, 1935, 31 gentlemen from the above villages and the village of Pannagam assembled at a General Meeting and confirmed the original decision provisionally made at the informal meeting of February, 1935. A house was rented for the purpose and a loan of Rs. 750 | - was raised. The Dispensary was opened at an auspicious time on the 24th October, 1935, in the village of Tholpuram and the Society was registered on the 4th April, 1936.


The pioneers of the movement little dreamt at that time that they were making history by establishing the first Co-operative dispensary, the first of its kind in the East and as a member of the Soulbury Commission said on his visit in 1945, probably, the only one of its kind in the world. This was later confirmed by the Expert on Co-operative Adult Education attached to the Internation-

al Labour Organisation who visited the Hospital in 1952 and made an entry in the Visitors' Book that to him, it was a great inspiration to see a Hospital organised on the basis of a Co-operative Society and that it has been one of the most interesting Co-operative experiments he has ever seen. The number of Members enrolled at the first meeting in 1935 was 32 and this number increased to 119 at the date of registration in 1936. The number of members today is 1453

The Dispensary grew both in popularity and the number of patients treated The members received free medical advice and paid only the cost plus 10% on the medicines supplied. They also received 3 free visits to their homes from the Medical Officer and paid only Rs. 2 for each subsequent visits. The experiment was so successful that the members resolved to put up a permanent building for the Dispensary. A piece of land a little over an acre in extent was purchased at Moolai on the Jaffna-Chulipuram-Kayts Road in October, 1935 for a sum of Rs. 1435, and the foundation was laid in August, 1937, for the first block of buildings to house the Dispensary and the Administration offices. This building was completed at a cost of Rs. 5911 and opened in August, 1938. For the year ending April, 1937, the register showed that 5321 prescriptions had been dispensed and 295 visits paid by the Doctor to member-patients in their homes. On the financial side, a net profit of Rs. 1024, had been earned. This encouraged the Committee to launch on their main objective of providing an up - to - date Hospital with adequate provision for treatment of in-door patients.

A scheme for collecting donations from members and well-wishers in Cevlon and Malaya was undertaken. With these collections the second stage of buildings consisting of a Cottage Ward of 4 rooms, each of which was donated by individual members in memory of their beloved ones. Medical Officer's Quarters and some ancillary buildings were completed in 1940 at a cost Rs. 10.416. Patients from neighbouring villages began to come in large numbers and it became necessary to extend the area of operation to three other villages and today the Hospital covers 10 villages with a total population of 50,000.

At this time, a prominent retired planter from Malaya, a resident of Vaddukoddai became the President of the Hospital Society and he built at his own expense an open Ward for the treatment of poor patients in addition to donating one of the rooms in the first Cottage Ward.

In 1942, another prominent retired Medical Officer from Malaya, a son of Moolai, who came here just before the declaration of the Japanese War leaving behind his children in Malava and was compulsorily detained here during the war became the President of the Hospital and it may be said with pride that the Hospital made phenomenal progress during the period he was its head. He secured the services of a very distinguished doctor who had just severed his connection with a private medical institution in Jaffna after a period of 23 years' service to take charge of the Hospital


and he also helped the Hospital to grow both in medical efficiency and adequate buildings and other amenities. Two distinguished sons from the villages served by the Hospital who had attained high positions in the medical profession with good prospects in the Government Medical service joined the Hospital, solely motivated by the spirit of service to their people in these remote villages of Jaffna. One of them who was sent to England for higher Medical training has obtained the F. R. C. S. degree specialising in Surgery.


The second Cottage Ward consisting of 6 rooms, four of which were donated by individual members was completed in July, 1944 at a cost of Rs. 15057. Other buildings followed and by April, 1950, buildings to the value of Rs. 104727 have been put up including a Maternity Ward, Assistant Medical Officer's Quarters, an Electricity Power House etc., all out of public donations and profits made out of the Hospital Collections.

In 1943, the Hospital which has been from its very inception run on public subscriptions and its own earnings sought the assistance of Government for increasing its free treament of poor patients which would have legitimately fallen on Government and the then Minister for Health obtained from Government an annual grant of Rs. 500 in 1944 which was increased to Rs, 2500 in the years 1945, 1946 and 1947. I became the President of the Hospital in 1946 and the Member of Parliament for Vaddukoddai in 1947. The


Minister for Health was good enough to visit the institution at my request in 1947 and 1948 and seeing its useful work obtained an increased annual grant of Rs. 15,000, in addition to a special building grant of one lac of rupees with which an Operation Theatre and Nurses' Quarters costing Rs. 132400 were built At the request of the previous President, a distinguished son of Moolai who is a prominent and leading business man in Colombo built a modern Labour Room at a cost of Rs. 55,000 Today, the assets of the Hospital. in land, buildings, furniture, Surgical instruments, Electricity Plant and other equipments amount to nearly 5 lacs of rupees. It has on its Medical staff 4 Medical Officers including a Lady Medical Officer, 3 of them British qualified, 7 Apothecaries, one Laboratory Assistant, 1 Matron, 1 Asst. Matron, 22 Nurses, 17 Orderlies and on the Administrative side 1 Secretary, 1 Accountant, 2 Clerks, 1 Store-keeper, 1 Cashier in addittion to a number of minor employees. The Hospital has accommodation for 100 beds distributed in 50 rooms and 4 open wards.

The Hospital, though intended to serve the members of the Society, had to extend its services to a large number of non-members who by-pass all Government Hospitals in Jaffna and come to it for its efficient service. Its popularity can be gauged from the fact that out of the 15094 outdoor patients and 3679 in-door patients treated in 1952, 12426 and 3243 respectively were non-members. The members receive 20% discount on medicines supplied and a reduction

of -/50 cts on room rent in the Paying Wards. Even without these concessions, the charges are the lowest in Jaffna. There were 389 maternity cases, 63 major operations and 1239 minor operations performed during the year. The mortality rates were 5'9% in the case of births and 3'07% in the case of other admissions.

The unique feature of the Hospital is that it is run to suit the customs and habits of the people. It provides a homely place for the patients with full freedom for their relatives to see them at all times of the day subject to medical restrictions according to the nature of the disease and the condition of the patient, thus relieving them of their loneliness and isolation from their homes. It is a legitimate desire of the village folk to be close to the patients during their illness and to take a share in their nursing. In experience, it has been found that the psychological reactions of these concessions has been to the advantage of the patients in accelerating their recovery. Medical opinion may differ but the mortality figures have been negligible in the Hospital. Hospital does not provide diets to the patients but kitchens are provided for their use and that of their relatives who attend on them. A Canteen is run in the premises by the Hospital to provide all the needs of the patients at moderate prices.


The above is the romantic story of the first Co-operative Hospital started and developed during the past 18 years. Two Governor Generals, eight Ministers and several distinguished officials had visited it from time to time. The first entry in the Visitors' Book was made by the late lamented and revered Prime Minister Mr. D S. Senanayake in 1939 when he was the Minister for Agriculture and Co operative Undertakings and he described the Hospital as a remarkable institution. He visited the Hospital again in 1950 as Prime Minister and expressed his surprise in its phenomenal growth since his last visit, Co-operative Officials from Uganda, Fiji Sarawak, Sudan, Nepal. Indonesia, India, Northern Rhodesia. Gold Coast, Malaya, Cyprus, Zanzibar, Thailand and Hong Kong have on the directive of the Registrar of Co operative Societies visited it to study its Co-operative methods of running a medical institution. The Press and the Co-operative Department have reviewed its work and progress in most appreciative terms. The Registrar wrote in his Administration Report for 1951, that pioneered by Moolai, Co-operative hospitals and dispensaries captured the imagination of the people and the Co-operative movement is bound to play a prominent part in solving the medical problems of the middle class, particularly the salary earners to whom one serious illness or the inevitable maternity case can often mean a crippling debt for years to follow.


Following the example of Moolai, Co-operative hospitals have been opened at Matara, Bandarawela and Sandalankawa and hospitals without resident accommodation at Kalutara and Kurunegala. The Tellippalai Co-operative Vaidyasalai started as a Dispensary has an ambitious building programme to cost 5 lacs.

Kandy, Negombo and Kuliyapitiya are preparing to open Co-operative hospitals in the near future. Colombo which needs a Co-operative medical institution most is still unable to find a suitable building but hopes to open at least a Dispensary institution during the year.

My warning to all these new undertakings is that Rome was not built in one day and that steady and sustained public spirit and selfabelp are the chief nourishments for any growing Co-operative concern.


Moolai affords an excellent example of steady and progressive growth spread over 18 years. Its needs are still many and to meet them, the President of the Board of Management and the Medical Staff have issued an appeal for funds in connection with the Founders' Day Celebrations fixed for the 24th instant. Emulate the example of its members, who, though entitled to a dividend on their shares every year have never touched it but allowed it to be utilized in the development of the Hospital.

Co-operative Hospitals

efficient and adequate public health programme and a curative service are essential ingredients in a progressive economy. It must be admitted that in spite of recent advances in the field of Wes tern Medicine in the way of inventions of new drugs and better methods of treatment of the more complicated human maladies, lack of adequate medical facilities is a crying need in the less favoured and under-developed countries. With all the attempts made by the State in Cevlon in this direction there is still the complaint that the small man and the middle class salary earner are crowded out of state institutions and are compelled to go to the private practitioner or nursing home at costs far beyond their means. It is not uncommon to hear of overcrowded hospitals and maternity homes. Government hospitals with a few hundred beds each are called upon to cater to thrice the number of in-door patients and the resultant overworking of the limited staff is bound to tell on the efficiency of the Service. Hence the medical services become both inadequate and inefficient. The better favoured, however, can afford and do get efficient services at private nursing homes and "paying wards" while one serious illness or the inevitable maternity case in the case of the salary earner often means a crip. pling debt for years to follow.

Thus arose the need for an institution which would give efficient medical facilities at rates within the means of the middle class man, The Co operative Hospital Scheme found fertile ground among the community hard pressed by overcrowded hospitals and heavy medical bills.

The Co-operative Hospital Scheme may be described as a long term and simpler form of health insurance. As is usual in any other Co-operative society, the area of operation is limited as is the liability of indi-


vidual members. The value of a share is usually Rs 100 payable in instalments within a period of ten years. The usual admission fee is Rs. 5 and on admission a member is expected to buy at least one share and pay one instalment before he enjoys the privileges of full membership. The objects of the Society may be defined as follows:


- To provide hospital facilities to its members.
- 2. To dispense prescriptions.
- To do such other things as are incidental and conducive to the attainment of the above objects.

With these objects in view societies organised may take the form of either of two types. In the more simple type of society only a quali fied Apothecary or Medical officer is employed by the society. This officer is expected to visit the various villages or central points where he examines medically the members at appointed times and dates. examination is free to the members and their families and any malady thus diagnosed is promptly attended to with free medical advice and outdoor dispensary facilities, at nominal rates. Thus the membership is assured of medical attention at the very initial stages of disease on the payment of a nominal fee. This constant visit of the Medical Officer and the regular 'Check up' has the added advantage of making the members health conscious, and thus prevent heavy medical bills. This form of society however has not proved so

very popular as the other type where the society provides both in-door and out-door medical treatment. Here the Society runs a fully equipped Hospital complete with X'Ray and Operation Theatre and full medical and nursing staffs like in any other private or State institution for the convenience of members. Thus Hospital and Maternity Home facilities with additional expert attention whenever required is available to the members at cost plus a nominal percentage for overhead expenses This scheme of Co-operative Hospitals has been found to be very popular by experience

Pioneered by a few-the number of original members was 31 -Co-operators from Moolai and surrounding villages who were driven by dire necessity-the first Co operative Hospital in the East was organised on 4th August, 1935. Within a short time, in their own humble way the first Cc-operative Dispensary was opened at Tolpuram (village adjacent to Moolai). At this time the members received free medical advice and paid only the cost plus 10% on the drugs and medicines supplied, The members were entitled to 3 free visits from the Medical Officer and subsequent visits had to be paid for at Rs. 2. per visit. This dispensary and the services rendered by it proved popular as it was a long felt need and the membership increased in the 2nd year to 148 with a share capital of Rs. 1875 Within the short period of two years the Society had proved its value and for the year ending April, 1937 the Society had dispensed 5300 prescriptions and their doctor had paid 290 visits to member






INSIDE VIEW OF THE WARD FOR INFANTS.

patients in their homes. This success in their small venture not only encouraged the membership for further development but also created a public opinion and sympathy result. ing in donations up to Rs 20,000-Thus in October 1940, the Hospital was opened and admission of in-door patients commenced. In 1941, the Hospital had treated 32 in door patients while 3700 prescriptions were dispensed The profits and donations increased to Rs 30,000 and the Hospital has been recognised by the State and received an annual grant of Rs. 7500 which was later increased to Rs. 15000, and a further sum of Rs 100,000, towards the building fund. It is today a fully equipped Hospital with an average of 27900 prescriptions and 3700 in door patients per year. It has accommodation for 100 beds and employs 4 Doctors-2 Physicians, 1 Surgeon, 1 Lady Medical, Officer, - 7 Apothecaries, 1 Lab. Assistant 24 Nurses and a trained and adequate staff of Attendants.

As is usual in any pioneer venture, the original members, I am sure, had to face numerous difficulties and criticisms in the beginning. To nurse this scheme from such small beginnings up to what it is today would have required a great degree of patience integrity and selfless service, and I am sure all cooperators will join me in congratulating the pioneers for the success.

Foregoing is but one example and the pioneer at that -- of the application of the Co-operative method in providing medical facilities. The Co operators in other parts of Ceylon soon followed suit and now the scheme has proved to be popular and today there are Co-operative hospitals adequately accommodated both for in-door and out-door treatment at Tellippalai, Matara, Bandarawala and Sandalankawa, and hospitals without resident accommodation at Kalutara and Kurunegala, More are under organisation.

In concluding it is worthwhile mentioning, that as in any other Co-operative venture profits in this type of society are distributed on the basis of patronage and does it not speak well of the Movement that even ill-health can be made to pay dividends if only the patients will co-operate?



Sir Oliver Goonetilleke's Visit

Address by the President, Mr. P. M. Sangarapillai, J. P., on the occasion of the visit of the Hon. Sir Oliver Goonetilleke, Minister for Agriculture and Food on October 11, 1953.

IT is my privilege, as President of this Hospital, to welcome you Sir, on behalf of myself, the members and Board of Management and the staff on your first visit to us as our Minister for Co-operative Undertakings. We recall today with pleasure your last visit to this Hospital in July, 1944 while you were the Civil Defence Commissioner, when you graciously accepted our invitation to unveil the second Cottage Wards built with generous donations made by some of our countrymen. Nine years have passed since and you have seen today the vast expansion the Hospital has made both in its buildings, equipment and usefulness to the people of several villages served by it, apart to a number of others who from all parts of Jaffna even bypassing the Government Hospitals, because they receive quick and efficient service from our most efficient medical staff.

I need not refer to the fact that this is the first Hospital founded on Co operative lines in the Island and as a matter of fact in the world as one of the Soulbury Commissioners jocularly remarked on their visit to us in 1945, Government has always acknowledged its novel features as a unique Co-operative Unit and sent to us all the Co operative Officials of the various countries who came to Ceylon to study Co-operative methods.

May I say with pride that this Hospital has always been the "Show Piece" of all Government's Co-operative Undertakings.

The Assets of this Hospital today amount to little over 5 lacs, almost all of which were contributed by our countrymen, both in Malaya and here Our late revered Prime Minister, Mr. D. S. Senanayake was the first distinguished member of the Government to visit this Hespital in 1937 and make the first entry in the Visitors' Book. He repeated his visit in 1950 to open our Nurses' Quarters and expressed his unbounded appreciation of our efforts to give the best medical service in this rural part of Jaffna. Through the kindness and appreciation of our work by Mr. S. W. R. D. Bandaranaike, who was then Minister for Health, our then representative in Parliament who was also at that time the President of this Hospital was able to get our annual grant raised to Rs. 15,000, in addition to getting a special grant of one lac of rupees which enabled us to put up the Operation Theatre and the Nurses' Quarters. The magnificent Labour Room which provides up-to date Maternity facilities is the handsome gift of one of the distinguished sons of this village, Mr. Mahadevan who is one of the leading and flourishing Business men in Colombo.

Addressing the Public meeting

Since your last visit, we have provided other amenities such as Electricity, clean Water Supply and Anaesthetic Plant. All these help the poor patients to receive modern Medical treatment and facilities at their own doors and at considerably cheaper cost. Our patrons were very generous in their gifts and we are again approaching them for further help in connection with our Founders' Day Celebrations on the 24th instant to which you have accepted our invitation, along with the Minister for Health. During the Celebrations Week, we have organised Health Propaganda work in all the 10 villages served by this Hospital and the Departments of Health, Agriculture, Information and Education are sending their Propaganda Vans with valuable and instructional films. Some of your officials have undertaken to speak on Food Production and other Agricultural problems. Through the kindness and support of Dr. J. H F. Jayasuriya who is devoting his full time now to the eradication of the dire disease of Tuberculosis in this country, we are planning to open a branch of the National Association for the prevention of Tuberculosis and provide facilities in the Hospital for a mass survey of the 50,000 people in the villages served by this Hospital which includes a fairly large child population in about 50 schools. Whatever we propose to collect in connection with our Founders' Day Celebrations will be just enough to replace some of the temporary Wards already condemned as unfit for the patients' occupation. Knowing the financial position of Government we have not asked for any

monetary grant. We however understood that the Australian Government had given a grant of 3 million rupees for Tuberculosis work in this country and we shall be grateful to you if you will use your influence along with the Minister for Health and get us an X'Ray Plant out of the grant which will go a great way to make mass survey possible on the spot, in addition to its use for other ailments.

In reply to our application for an X'Ray Plant out of the Australian gift, we have just been informed that such a gift would be outside the conditions imposed by the Australian Government and that facilities for X'Ray examination would be provided in the proposed Chest Clinic to be attached to the Hospital in Jaffna. We have built and developed this Hospital in the Co-operative way solely to relieve Government of its responsibility to provide medical facilities for a large section of population in this area and we are doing it, you admit, Sir, in a more efficient way than any Government Organisation would do because we are free from the rigidity of the Governe mental rules and regulations. We offer the same help to Government to tackle the Tuberculosis problem. perhaps in a much more efficient way and it is therefore in the interests of the Government to relax its rules and help us in the position in which it is able to do so. You know Sir, how long it will take Government to start the Chest Clinic in Jaffna, especially when no Chest Clinics by Government have yet been opened in any part of the country. With an X'Ray Plant and the enthusiasm and readiness

of our medical staff, I may boldly say that we would be in a position complete our survey and extend our work even to other parts of Jaffna before the Government Chest Clinic in Jaffna is ready for operation.

We are aware how you tackled the Food situation during the War. If not for the elasticity of your mind and your timely decisions of all vital problems as they occurred the Governmental wheel would have been clogged many times before the critical situations in the supply of Food were saved from disastrous results. In our request too, we would ask you to solve our problem in your E. O. G. way.

I thank you again for your honouring us with this visit in the midst of your heavy ministerial duties.

Reply by the Hon. Sir Oliver Goonetilleke

Reasonable Limits

Sir Oliver, replying said: "Whatever financial difficulties the Central Government may have, requirements of institutions like yours should have assistance within reasonable limits. My Parliamentary Secretary described me as a hero of heroes, and all of you will be probably inclined to believe him." Speaking further, he said that he had the special privilege of working with the Jaffna people and was glad to see that Mr. K. Kanagaratnam was present at the meeting.

He also referred to the forthcoming visit of Mr. Casey, Australian Minister of External Affairs and asked the people of Jaffna to welcome him to their land of co-operation and show him the work of that magnificent Institution.

Founders' Day Celebrations

23rd October, 1953.

THE Founders' Day of the above Hospital was celebrated on the 23rd instant attended by a large and distinguished gathering from all parts of Jeffna. The Day commenced with the laying of the Foundation stone by Dr. J. H. F. Jayasuriya for the new Chest Clinic. This was followed by a public meeting attended by a very large gathering. Mr. C. E. Attygalle who deputised for the Minister for Health was the chief speaker.

Address by the Fresident Mr. P. M. Sangarapillai, J. P.

"Friends,

This day, today, signifies an important landmark in the history of this Hospital. Having started and nursed it for over 18 years, we thought it necessary and useful, considering the vast strides, the Cooperative movement is making in the country in various forms in our every day life, that we should take stock of our work and achievements during the past, so that they might serve both as an urge to ourselves to rectify our errors, if any, and supply the gaps that remain unfilled in a complete unit of medical service and also as an example to similar institutions in the making in the various parts of the country, This is the first occasion on which we are celebrating the Founders' Day of this Institution and it is the first duty of those of us, who in the chain of successior, are placed in charge of this Institution to remember those pioneers who struck the first light of a Co-operative Hospital in their fertile imagination and pay them our homage for their initial efforts which, in course of time, bore ample fruits as you have

occasion today to witness them in the various services which the people of these rural areas receive very close to their homes.

We are proud of the fact that we are the torch bearers today of this Institution and we ask for your blessings and support so that we, in our turn, leave over to our successors an unblemished record of work in promoting its growth and usefulness. We are also proud that this Institution has been copied as a model in other parts of the country and used as a "Show Piece" by the Government to enable Cooperative Officials from other countries to visit it and learn its methods of Co-operation in an entirely new field to them. An Official of the International Labour Organisation who visited the Hospital in 1952 made an entry in the Visitors' Book that, to him, it was a great inspiration to see a Hospital organised on the basis of a Cooperative Society and that it has been one of the most interesting Co-operative experiments he has ever seen.


We have in this connection organised a Health and Education Week commencing from the 17th instant in the 12 villages served by the area and the Propaganda Vans sent to us by the Departments of Co-operation, Information, Education, Health and Agriculture along with their respective Propaganda Officers have been showing films in every one of these villages on various Health, Educational and other matters during the whole of this week and will continue to show till early next week. Mr. Periathamby, an Engineer in the Irrigation Department who hails from one of the villages served by the Hospital and has collected a number of films in his official life in various parts of the country has been showing a number of useful films in the Hospital premises.

A Play in Tamil narrating the story of the origin and growth of the Hospital and depicting those who were associated with it at the various points of its development is being acted by School children under very able dramatic directions of two members of the Board of Management assisted by some friends of the Institution. The play serves as an inspiration to the younger generation to know the work and achievements of their elders and follow them when they take their places in the life of the Society.

It is needless for me to review here the great services of this Institution. You can obtain all the literature on our work from our office. We are greatly pleased to have in our midst on this happy occasion as our

chief speaker Mr. C. E. Attygalle. Parliamentary Secretary to Minister for Health. While deeply regretting the inability of the Hon. Mr. Nugawela, Minister for Health who earlier accepted our invitation. to be with us we are glad that he is being represented by his Lieutenant who comes from a noble and distinguished Kandyan family in the Sabragamuwa Province who incidentally, was my college - mate in Colombo. Mr. Attygalle has a distinguished record of work in Parliament since the inauguration of the Soulbury constitution and I am sure he will extend to us the same sympathy in his new office as he has hitherto shown to his own constituency. I welcome you Sir, on behalf of the Board of Management and the staff on your first visit to this Institution and trust that it will receive all support from the Ministry of Health through you and your Minister who visited us in 1951 along with Mrs. Nugawela when he was Minister for Education and made an appreciative entry in the Visitors' Book. When the Hon. Sir Oliver Goonetilleke the then Minister for Agriculture, Food and Co operative Undertakings visited us in advance on the 11th instant, we placed before him our case for an X'Ray Plant for which we have made an earlier application to the Minister for Health and we trust that you, Sir, will overcome all procedual difficulties which seriously affect all Government Undertakings and do your best to provide one from the Australian Gift of 3 million rupees for T. B work in this country.



Senanavake in the field of Co-operation, rightly earning the title of Father of Co-operation, the Board of Management resolved to attach a Chest Clinic to the Hospital undertake mass survey among the 50,000 population served by it and it has been our unique privilege to have the Foundation laid just a few minutes ago for this Clinic by one who in the right spirit of service to humanity according to the tenets of our religions has dedicated his life for this noble cause after a very distinguished career in the Medical Department, as one of the leading Surgeons of Ceylon. It was left to Dr. Javasuria to discover the hidden effects of the dire disease of Tuberculosis eating slowly into the vitals of our nations and rouse both the Government and the people to wake up to eradicate it before it makes a wholesale destruction of our people. We welcome you Sir, as the saviour of our nation and a prophet with a new health message that Tuberculosis is curable with the active support and co-operation of the people. The country observed the 21st of this month as the T. B. Day. We have read with interest the message of the Minister and the articles which appeard in the Newspapers on this day including the instructive article addressed to the children by Dr. Jayasuria. We offer our unstinted support to him in his great medical missionary work and to assist him actively, we have decided to a Branch of the Ceylon National Association for Prevention of Tuberculosis to serve the area covered by this Hospital.

We welcome all the other guests who have responded to our invitation. It is my duty to give expression on this day to the great assistance rendered to this Hospital by the various officials of the Co-operative Department. The name of Mr. G. De Soyza who was the Registrar of Co-operative Societies when the Dispensary which was the forerunner of this Hospital was first started will be written large in the history of this Hospital. It is his sympathetic help in all its early tumultuous days that made this Hospital grow from strength to strength. His successor, Mr. mond Cooray and thepresent Registrar. Mr. S C. Fernando were both towers of strentgh to us. We express our gratitude to them when we remember our founders and patronisers.

Finally, I would beg leave of you to refer to our appeal for funds to meet the further needs of the Hospital. We have had generous response from our members and patronisers both here and in Malaya and we have no doubt that when our lists close by the end of next month we would have received your fullest support to reach our target. I would be failing in my duty if I do not mention here, openly and sincerely the most valuable assistance I received from the staff both high and low in collecting funds. They all showed that they have really imbibed the true spirit of Co-operation and service in one of the noblest professions one can choose and follow."

Mr. Attygalle eulogised the work of the Hospital and said that it had served as an essential adjunct to the Government medical units and had played an important part in supplementing the medical supplies of Government which with all its expansion could meet only 50 per cent of the medical needs of the country. He suggested a fair compromise between the Western and the Indigenous systems of Government as a large number of people in the villages still followed the latter system.

Dr. Jayasuriya made an impassioned appeal to the wealthier people to spend their leisure time and wealth in looking after the health of the large number of underfed and ill nourished people of the villages. He exploded the old theory that a person suffering from Tuberculosis was a leper of the society, condemned for ever for isolation from his family ties With the progress of modern thoracic surgery and other wonder drugs. Tuberculosis today is curable if only people suffering from it disclosed their cases in the early stages without fear of incurring the odium of the other members of the family. He deplored the long lethargy and neglect of the Government in dealing with this problem and stated

that even the handsome grant of 3 million rupees gifted by the Australian Government was remaining idle while Government was still looking for a site in Colombo to build the first Chest Clinic, He congratulated the Hospital in going ahead of the Government programme and undertaking the building of the second Chest Clinic in the country with private aid. He stated that Government should encourage this undertaking with the gift of an X'Ray Plant which is essential for starting the mass X'Ray of the 50,000 people in the villages served by the Hospital.

Mr. N. Manicka Idaikaddar, Director of Food Production stated that the credit of calling the Institution. as 'Our Institution' as the Americans would say, goes to the people of the area as they have built up the Hospital on a basis of self help and mutual co-operation Messrs V. Veerasingam M, P. and R. C, S. Cooke, Asst. Registrar of Cooperative Societies also spcke. The Celebrations ended with the exhibition of interesting films by the Departments of Health, Agriculture and Information and with dance and musical items by the schools in the area.







1944 ம் ஆண்டு ஆடி மாதத்தில், ஆறு அறைகள் கொண்ட மற்ருரு சிறிய வாட் கட்டி முடிக்கப்பட்டது. விரைவில் பிற கட்டிடங்களும் எழுக் தன. 1950 ம் ஆண்டு ஏப்பிரில் மாதம் முடியுமுன் ரூபா 104,727 பெறுமதி யான கட்டிடங்கள் தோன்றிவீட்டன. அவற்றுள் பிரசவ வாட்டும், உதவிடாக்குத்தார்ன் வீடும், மின்சார சக்தி ஊற்று கிலேயமும் குறிப்பிடத்தக்கன. இவையாவும் கன்கொடைப் பணமும் இவாபப் பணமும் கொண்டே கட்டப்பட்டன.

ஆரம்பித்த காலம் தொடக்கமாக நன் மக்களுடைய ஆதரவாலும் ஸ்தா பன இலாபத்தாலுமே, நடந்தவந்த இவ் வாசுபத்திரி, 1943 ம் ஆண்டிலேதான் முதன் முதலாக அரசாங்க ஆதரவை நாடியது. ஏழைகளுக்கு வைத்திய சேவை இலவசமாக அளிக்க வேண்டிய கடமை அரசாங்கத்தின தாகையால், அந்தப் பொறுப்பை ஒரளவில் ஆற்றி வரும் இவ்வாசுபத்திரி அரசாங்க ஆத ரவை நாடியது பொருத்தமே. அந்த நேரத்தில் இருந்த சுகாதார மந்திரியார் 1944 ம் ஆண்டில் வருடமொன்றுக்கு ரூபா 500 வீதம் அரசாங்க உதவியி னேப் பெற்றுக்கொடுத்தார். 45, 46, 47 ம் ஆண்டுகளில் இவ்வுதவி ரூபா 2500 ஆக உயர்ந்தது.

இச் சங்கத்தின் தவேவராகக் கட மை பாற்றும் பேறு அடியேனுக்கு 1946 ம் ஆண்டில் கிடைத்தது. 1947 ம் ஆண்டில், வட்டுக்கோட்டைப் பாராளு மன்றப் பிரதிரிதியாகும் பேறும் கிடைத்தது. அப்போதிருந்த சுகா தார மக்திரியார் எனது வேண்டு கோளுக்கிசைக்து 1947 லும் 1948 லும் இவ்வாசுபத்திரியைப் பார்வையிட்டு. அது ஆற்றிவரும் அரிய சேவையை கோமுகமாக அறிந்து கொண்டனர். அதன் விளேவாக வருடா வருட உத விப் பணம் ரூபா 15,000 ஆக உயர்க் தது. கட்டிடங்களின் பொருட்டு, ஒரு இலட்சம் ரூபா வீசேட நன்கொடை யும் அரசாங்கத்திலிருந்து கிடைத்தது. இவ்வரிய நன்கொடையால் சத்திரவைத் திய நீலே மும் தாதிமார் இல்லமும் கட்டக்கூடியதாக இருந்தது. இக்கட்ட டங்களின் முழுச் செலவு ரூபா 132,400.

இச் சங்கத்தின் முன்னுள் தலேவர் ஒரு வரு டைய வேண்டுகோளுக் கியைந்து மூளாய் வாசியும் கொழும் பீல் பிரபல வர்த்தகராய்த் திகழ்பவரு மாகிய பெருமகன் ஒருவரால் ரூபா 55,000 செலவீல் பிரசவ நிலேயம் ஒன்று கட்டப்டட்டது.

இன்றைக்கு ஆஸ்பத்திரியீன் சொத்து முழுவதும் ரூபா 5 லட்சம் மதிப் பிடத் தக்க நீல்யீல் இருக்கிறது என் பதைப் பெருமிதத்தோடு குறிப்பிட லாம். இப்பொழுது ஆஸ்பத்திரியி லுள்ள சேவையாளரின் விபரம் பின் வருமாறு:

ஐக்கிய சங்க ஆஸ்பத் கிரி கொழும் பிலே தான் மிகவும் அவசியம் தேவை, ஆணுல் கட்டிடமின்மையால் முயற்கி கைகூடவில்லே. எனினும் இவ்வாண்டு முடிவதற்குள் ஒரு மருந்துச்சாஃயாகு தல் ஸ்தாபிதமாகுமெனச் சொல்லப் படுகிறது. இந்தத் துறையில் புதிதாக உழைக்க முன்வரும் யாவர்க்கும் ஒரு எச்சரிக்கை செய்ய விருப்புகின்றேன். பொதுமச்களுடைய ஆதரவில் எழும் எந்த இயக்கமும் மெல்ல மெல்லத் தான் வலிமை பெறும். ஆகையால் பொறுமை வேண்டும், நிலேத்த அள வில் இத்தகைய வ்தாப**னங்களே** நிறுவி விடலாம் என்று **நி**லேத்த லாகாது.



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
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
