Ruthnaswamy, M.A., (Cant.), C.I.E., K.C.G.S., Vice-Chancellor of Annamalai University who presided at the Annual Prize Distribution of St. Patrick's College, Jaffna, on Saturday 14th inst. at 6-30 p.m. Revd. Fr. B. A. John, O.M.I., Rector, read the report and Lady Ramanathan gave away the prizes. Others nathan gave away the prizes. Others accommodated on the platform were: Very Revd.Fr.J. Emilianus Pillai, O.M.I., Mr. S. Natesan, M.S.C., Mrs. S. Natesan, Mr. V. K. Nathan, Education Officer N.P., and Mr. A. Ratnanather.

Professor Ruthnaswamy said that although it was a pleasure to come to Jaffaa it was no pleasure to take Mr. Justice Soertsz's place specially on account of the reason for his absence which was a son's serious illness. "You will miss his vigorous utterance on the educational problems of Ceylon and I, as a visitor, must exercise the restraint of courtesy in regard to the educational policy of your Government.

"But your educational problems are the same as of India, for there also, as in Travancore, the State aims at monopoly in education. Although I am glad to note that the absolution of the new educational policy of your Government is not so complete as that of Travancore, for I learn the denominational schools already in existence will continue to receive certain grants and aid from the Government covering at least the cost of the teachers' salaries, I cannot understand this opposition of the Governments in India or in Ceylon to the private and denominational schools. "But your educational problems are the private and denominational schools.

"I cannot for a moment understand this present-day opposition to private and denominational schools by politicians after all the services that this kind of schools have rendered to the education of Ceylon. Gratitude is not the characteristic virtue of politicians. You cannot expect gratitude in politics.

"Well, at least a politician ought to know a good thing when he sees it, and denominational schools are responsible for the high standard of literacy and education achieved by Ceylon. For one thing, it is against the eastern traditional policy of governments. But there are al policy of governments. But there are two educational reasons why the private and denominational schools should find a place in any system of a state education, even of compulsory free primary education. Competition is necessary to educational prosperity. The state school will be kept up to the mark only if it has to compete with the private school, otherwise it will sink into routine and mediocrity. mediocrity.

SOVIET ARREST GREEK CATHOLIC BISHOPS EAST OF CURZON LINE

News has been received by the Congregation for Eastern Churches in Rome that the Greek Catholic Ukrainian Bishops in the Polish territories East of the Curzon Line, now annexed by Russia, have been Soviet police and deported into the interior of Russia.

The names of the deported Bishops are: Mgr. Ivan Slipyj, who recently succeeded the late Metropolitan Szeptycki as Greek Catholic Archbishop of Lwow; Mgr. Nihita Budka, Auxiliary Bishop of Lwow; Mgr. Gregory Chomyszyn, Bishop of Stanislawow, Eastern Galicia (aged 82); Mgr. Ivan Laty szowski, Auxiliary Bishop of Stanislaw; Mgr. Nicholas Czarnecki, Apostolic Visitor of the Churches of the Byzantium Rite, who had his See in Kowel, Polish Volhynia. Polish Volhynia.

It will be seen from this list that all Greek Catholic Hierarchy, who were the spiritual leaders of some three or four million Ukrainian Greek Catholics in pre-war Poland have been removed from their Sees, with the exception of only two who are still at liberty: the Greek Catholic Clergy state that Greek Catholic Bishop of Przemysl, the Greek Catholic clergy state that Greek Catholic Bishop of Przemysl, they cannot follow advice leading to Mgr. Kocytowski, and his auxiliary, Mgr. Lakota.

This is due to the fact that following the latest partition of Poland, Przemysl was left on the Polish side, and thus, for the time being, the Przemysl Bishops are regarded as Polish citizens by Russia. In "Western Ukrainia" not one Bishop remains.

Similar news has come from Sub-carpathian Ruthenia, the Easternmost part of Czechoslovakia, which has been annexed by Russia this summer, with Dr. Benes' concurrence. The Greek Catholic Bishops of Chust and Uzhorod have been similarly arrested and deported to Russia. No news is available as to their whereabouts.

An energetic campaign is led by the Russian authorities to uproot the Greek Catholic Church and to force Greek Catholic Ukrainians into the fold of the

SAN FRANCISCO CONFERENCE FAILED TO STAND UP FOR PRINCIPLES

"You must judge the San Francisco Conference by the flag which was missing from amongst the flags of the nations," said Fr. Paul Crane, S J., speaking on San Francisco to the Cath-olic Youth of Birmingham. "That olic Youth of one Youth of 'Birmingham, "That missing flag is the flag of a country which stood by us through" thick and thin and was butchered. San Francisco must be judged against the background of martyred Poland.

"San Francisco is the culminating point of 14 years of war, war which began with the Japanese invasion of Manchuria and the first failure of right against might."

Revenue Record Last Year .-An excess of revenue over expenditure amounting to Rs. 50½ million in the financial year 1944–45, i. e., from October, 1944, to September, 1945 was announced by the Treasury.

The total revenue for this period of twelve months was Rs. 299,490,569, which is the highest annual revenue that has so far appeared in the accounts of the Island. The expenditure was Rs. 243,910,612.

I merely raise the question because, judging from articles and letters by Catholic theologians in English and American Catholic papers, it is not so easy to dispose of the atomic bomb from an ethical view point as the article appearing in your paper would seem to imply.

The only object a man can have is posing as one who is never in the wrong is to create a blind confidence in his unvarying relia-bility. But since no one can really believe him to be always right, the pose ends by defeating its own object, and he is marked out as untrustworthy. There is only one Being who can be trusted without limit because he alone is Inwithout limit because he alone is Infinite Truth and incapable, owing to his holiness, of misleading us. In the case of our fellow creatures we rely on them in proportion as experience has shown them to be trustworthy, both in point of knowledge and of truthfulness. For Catholics, however, there is one apparent exception, because the infallibility of as a body, and of its Visible Head without indebtedness to that body, derives from the Infallibility of God derives from the Infallibility of God communicated to the church within the Christ's promise to its church within the Christ's promise to it of the perpetual assistance of "the spirit of Truth." Hence the exception is merely apparent

Hence the exception is merely apparent not real.

"If it is human to err it is also reasonably human to "own up" to error when incurred. Yet it is not to our fellowmen alone, nor primarily, that our acknowledgement of errors is due, but first and foremost to God, especially as we have sinned against Him. The man who will not humble himself before his fellow-men by owning to his mistakes is not likely to do as he ought before God.
